The St. Johns County Court ordered the Clerk of the Court (Mr. P. B. Dumas) to report all wills that were not recorded by the previous Clerk (Mr. Sequi). According to the newspaper "The probate business of the county, has it appears been neglected entirely for the last three years. Not a will, letter testamentary, or of administration, has been recorded since the 21st September 1837, and the committee have discovered that there is an omission to record a will in the year 1835."

"The committee conceive it their duty to present to this court a list of unrecorded wills and letters of administration, now on file in this office."

The dates referred to in the list refer to the time when probate or administration was granted.

The following people are listed on the 1840 Federal Census of Pensioners. Because of their age, connection to a Revolutionary War is questionable. After checking the index to the 2nd Seminole War, it was discovered all of the male names are listed as soldiers. The female names are either living with a possible soldier or are listed as widows whose husband was killed in the Indian War. Therefore, it can only be concluded the 1840 Florida census enumerator did not follow directions and included people who served in the Second Seminole War, not the Revolutionary War.

Tampa, Florida - American Civil War

On June 30, a Union gunboat came into Tampa Bay, turned her broadside on the town, and opened her ports. The gunboat then dispatched a launch carrying 20 men and a lieutenant under a flag of truce demanding the surrender of Tampa. The Confederates refused, and the gunboat opened fire. The officer then informed the Confederates that shelling would commence at 6:00 pm after allowing time to evacuate non-combatants from the city. Firing continued sporadically into the afternoon of July 1, when the Federal gunboat withdrew.
