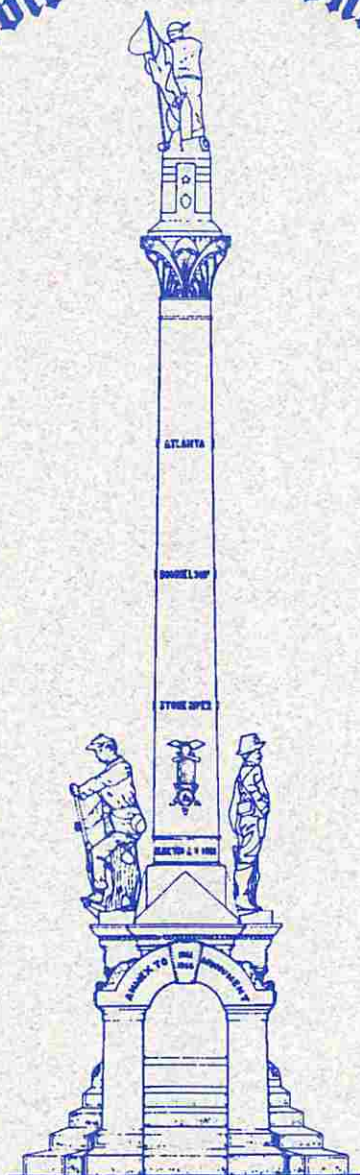

CARROLL COUNTY DURING THE CIVIL WAR

* THE HOME FRONT *

Taken from the *HISTORY OF
CARROLL COUNTY* (1878)

The first war meeting held in Carroll County convened at the old courthouse on the evening of April 17th, 1861, for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of organizing a military company to act for the defense of a common country. T. T. Jacobs was chosen as president, and S. C. Hays was appointed secretary. Volney Armour stated the object of the meeting, and stirring speeches were made by J. P. Seedy and Honorable B. L. Patch.

V. A. Armour, B. L. Patch, Adam Nase, Samuel Preston of Mount Carroll, and Monroe Bailey of York (Thomson) were appointed to prepare a series of resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting. During their absence, short and enthusiastic speeches were made by Messrs. Hays, Colehower, Chapman and others.

Pursuant to adjournment, the meeting re-assembled in the new courthouse for the purpose of commencing the organization of a volunteer company to be tendered to the governor. Judge Wilson presided at this meeting, and J. P. Emmert acted as secretary. Upon taking the chair, Judge Wilson electrified the audience with a manly and patriotic speech, which was frequently interrupted with heart-swelling cheers.

He was followed by Honorable W. T. Miller, Dr. B. L. Miller, H. A. Mills, C. B. Smith, Henry Ashway, James Shaw, V. Armour, N. Halderman, William T. Frohock, and others, with warm and patriotic speeches, which were heartily cheered. Mr. Armour presented a roll for the signatures of volunteers, and the work commenced. While the roll was being signed, a delegation from York Township, headed by a martial band, entered the court house and were greeted with wildest applause.

As soon as quiet was restored, Monroe Bailey, the chairman of the delegation, announced that "York Township was all on fire for the cause of their country, that

nine of her sons had already enrolled themselves, and that at least as many more would before the Carroll County company was filled." This announcement created an enthusiasm that could not be restrained, and cheer after cheer greeted Mr. Bailey as he resumed his seat.

The York boys were also greeted with hearty shouts as they filed forward to enroll their names. In the *Mirror* of May 1st, we find the following:

"Our large new court house is turned into barracks for the Carroll County volunteers now awaiting the governor's orders. The company is under the command of Captain Nase. The boys are exceedingly anxious to be off. They are a fine-looking company, and will fight like tigers and bull-dogs. Woe to the equal number of rebels that fall into their hands. Following is the list of the names of the officers: Captain, Adam Nase; First Lt, R. J. Heath; 2nd Lt, James O'Brien; 1st orderly sergeant, John W. Puterbaugh; 2nd orderly sergeant, P. D. Kenyon; 3rd orderly sergeant, James A. Shaffer; 4th orderly sergeant, Charles W. Wilcox; 1st corporal, Milo Cummings; 2nd corporal, Albert P. Rapp; 3rd orderly corporal, George Kridler; 4th orderly corporal, Henry McCall Jr."

Then follow the names of ninety-four of the sons of Carroll who were ready to march to the field of danger, courage, and strife.

While the men were busy polling up this company, the ladies of Mount Carroll had fashioned a handsome flag, which, on the evening of April 29th, was presented to the company at the courthouse. Reverend O. D. White represented the ladies, and on their behalf made a very appropriate presentation speech. Dr. Miller received the flag for the company, and responded to Mr. White's remarks in fitting terms, when Captain Nase, whose modesty had kept him in the background, was called out, and made an excellent, solid, short, impromptu speech. Others of the volunteers pledged themselves to stand by, defend, and return the flag to the fair hands from which they received it.

This company could not be received at once, in consequence of the quota of the six regiments assigned to Illinois being so quickly filled, and on Saturday, May 4th, were dismissed for the time, but ordered to hold themselves in readiness to be summoned at any time. The boys were disappointed, but their

turn came ere long. Before a week had passed, Captain Nase received orders to march his company to Freeport, and go into camp as a part of a regiment for this congressional district. The evening before their departure, they assembled in the courthouse, where they were feelingly addressed by Reverend C. M. Woodward and John Irvine Sr.

Early on Saturday morning, the 11th, the boys marched away, escorted to the outskirts of the town by the Carroll Cornet Band and a large number of citizens of both sexes.

This company was raised under the call for volunteers for three months, but the quota for three-month units was filled before the company was ready. When it reached camp at Freeport, the alternative of being mustered into service for three years, or of being dismissed, was presented. The men nearly unanimously accepted the situation, and were sworn in.

The informal election of officers, held in Mount Carroll, was confirmed, and the duty of camp life on the tented field commenced in earnest. Shortly after, the company was ordered to Alton, where it was soon followed with a uniform provided by the people from whose midst the men composing the rank and file had been raised.

The war went on and recruiting continued. A second company was soon after raised, which met at the courthouse on May 18th, and proceeded to the election of officers. Abram Beeler was elected Captain; S. S. Dunn, 1st Lt; James Watson, 2nd Lt; J. P. Beebe, 1st Sergeant; and D. W. Price, 2nd Sergeant. This company was christened the "Hickory Rifle Guards."

While there was a hand raised against the government, the people of Carroll were alive and active. Men, women, and children were busy: the men in the arduous duties of recruiting and providing means for equipping the volunteers, and the women and children in providing and shipping to the "Boys in Blue" a thousand and one things that carried gladness and joy to hundreds of tents.

15th Illinois Infantry Regiment

Raised under the "Ten Regiment Act," the Fifteenth Regiment of Illinois Volunteer Infantry, of which Company K consisted of men from Carroll County, was mustered into United States service for three years on May 24, 1861.

After electing officers, organizing, and drilling for some time, the Regiment proceeded to Alton where it remained for six weeks. In July, it deployed to St. Charles, Missouri. From there it went by rail to Mexico, Missouri, where it remained for a time in company with Colonel U.S. Grant's 21st Illinois Infantry.

Before long, the unit moved to Rolla, Missouri, arriving in time to cover General Sigel's retreat from Wilson's Creek. The men next marched to Springfield, Missouri, where they remained for a short time before moving on to Sedalia where they assisted in the capture of 1,300 rebels nearby. They went into winter quarters at Ottumville, Missouri on December 26th. Here the men suffered greatly during the unusually harsh winter.

On the first day of February of 1862, the Regiment moved to St. Louis and embarked for Fort Donelson, arriving in time to take part in that Fort's surrender. The men marched on to Fort Henry and were then taken to Pittsburg Landing, being one of the first units to arrive there.

At the Battle of Shiloh, on the sixth of April, the Regiment was in the first line of battle. Hardly had Veach's Brigade, of which the Fifteenth was a part, taken position when a Confederate column, massed three lines deep, assaulted from the woods on two sides and, with rebel yell that echoed through the surrounding forest, charged at double quick. The Fifteenth was flanked by the Fifty-third Ohio on the right. At the first enemy fire, the Buckeyes broke and ran.

The enemy was not only in front of the Fifteenth, but on both sides in a short time. For more than an hour, the men held their position and fought as gallantly as any troops could fight at what was later called "The Hornet's Nest."

The Fifteenth disputed inch by inch the advance and incessant attacks of the best troops in the Confederate army. However,

with no support, the men were forced to withdraw to a new position. Within minutes of forming its first line, six of the Regiment's officers, including Lieutenant John W. Puterbaugh of Company K, were killed. Captain Adam Nase of Mount Carroll lost a leg and was taken prisoner.

Eventually a new line was formed, with the Fourteenth Illinois to the left of the Fifteenth. When the enemy got close enough the two units, acting as one, rose and delivered a tremendous fire into the massed ranks of the rebels who of necessity called off the attack. Again the enemy assaulted.

For three hours the two Illinois Regiments gave no ground as the Confederates sacrificed more than two thousand as brave men as ever trod the battlefield. This baptism of blood cemented the two Regiments, and they always afterward served together during the war.

The Fifteenth Regiment was in the hottest of the fighting on both days of the battle and not a man faltered in his duty or failed to perform all that was expected of him. General Grant personally led the Fourteenth and Fifteenth in the final charge on the second day of the battle. The detachment moved forward and delivered their fire before charging with fixed bayonets. The raking fire, however, had been effective and the Confederates had fled.

In the fight at Shiloh, the Fifteenth lost 250 in killed or wounded. There, there are more "known dead" of this Regiment than of any other whose fallen members lie forever at the National Cemetery there. Many others died later in hospitals and at homes in Illinois.

After Shiloh, the Regiment participated in the siege of Corinth, Mississippi, where a number of men were lost. When Corinth was evacuated, the men marched to Memphis where they arrived on July 21st. They remained in Memphis recruiting, drilling, and being fitted with new uniforms before marching on to Bolivar, Tennessee.

The Division to which the Fifteenth was attached was ordered by Grant to relieve Rosecrans at Corinth "Or Perish." At the Hatchie River, on the morning of October 4th, they met the enemy on Metamora Hill. The Fifteenth, on the extreme left, forced the enemy from its position and charged, routing them in wild confusion and driving

them to the river. The Fifteenth captured a four-gun battery and around 300 rebels, many others of whom drowned after jumping into the river.

The Fifteenth then charged across the Hatchie bridge and formed the first line with the Fourteenth by their side. Together the two Regiments charged into the timber after the rebels, driving them from their position and capturing another battery at the crest of the hill. The enemy was soon in full flight. Torn and bleeding, the Fifteenth laid on the ground that night crowned with new and everlasting honors. On that day, the Fifteenth suffered a loss of fifty men killed or wounded.

The Regiment, shortly thereafter, was sent to Vicksburg to take an active part in the siege of that city. After Vicksburg's surrender, the men marched with Sherman to Jackson, Mississippi and back and were then transported to Harrisonburg, Louisiana, where they captured Fort Beauregard on the Wachita River.

The unit went into winter quarters at Vicksburg where the men reenlisted as veterans.

In February of 1864, they marched again with Sherman, this time through Mississippi. At Champion Hills they had a severe fight with the enemy. They charged the Confederates several times and successfully drove them from the field. Before returning home on veteran furlough, the Regiment destroyed nearly fifty miles of rebel railroad.

After returning from leave, the Veterans joined with Sherman in moving on Atlanta. At Allatoona Pass, they were ordered to fortify the area. The forts they constructed there enabled General Corse and 2,100 men to defeat Hood's entire army there. At Allatoona the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Infantries were consolidated and General McPherson, knowing the honorable record of these Regiments, agreed to the request of Colonel Rogers and had the new unit called the "Veteran Battalion Fourteenth and Fifteenth Infantry Volunteers." The Organization numbered only 625.

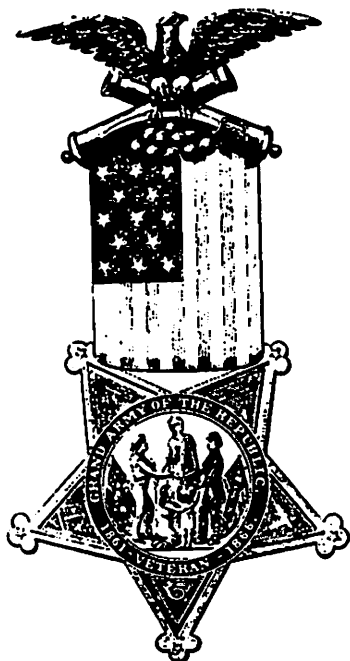
The new unit was stationed at Ackworth, Big Shanty, and Marietta, for some time. While at Big Shanty and Ackworth, they were attacked by General Hood and a number of men were captured.

The remainder of the unit fell back to Allatoona and fought under General Corse. Many were killed or wounded. Those who survived were used as scouts. They were next transferred to General F. P. Blair and "marched to the sea" with General Sherman.

After the fall of Savannah, the Regiment participated in numerous skirmishes in the Carolinas before moving on to Raleigh. At Raleigh enough recruits arrived to bring both units back to full strength. The Veteran Battalion was discontinued and the Fifteenth reorganized.

With the surrender of Johnston, the war ended and the Fifteenth Reorganized marched to Washington and participated in the Grand Review there.

The Regiment was next sent by steamer to St. Louis and from there to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, where it arrived on the First of July, 1865. They then served on the plains, arriving at Fort Kearney on August 14th. From there they were ordered back to Fort Leavenworth, and in September were mustered out of service.



34th Illinois Volunteer Infantry

The Thirty-Fourth Illinois Volunteer Infantry was organized at Camp Butler September 7th, 1861. On October 2nd, it deployed to Camp Nevin, Kentucky, where it remained until February 14th. It later moved to Savannah, on the Tennessee River.

Arriving at Pittsburg Landing on the 7th of April, it became hotly engaged in the battle of Shiloh, losing 16 killed and 112 wounded. Six more casualties were suffered in moving to Corinth a month later. From Corinth, the Regiment advanced to luka and Florence, Alabama.

Several weeks later, the men of the Thirty-Fourth marched to Louisville, Kentucky. On their way back toward Nashville, they were engaged in a skirmish at Clayville, Kentucky and later at Lavergne, Tennessee. They remained in camp south of Nashville until December 26th.

The day after leaving camp, the Thirty-Fourth moved toward Triune and encountered the enemy commanding the approaches in strength. The Confederates, who had formed in the town, were finally out after an advance of the infantry and a "sharp" fight. Two days later the Thirty-Fourth advanced toward Murfreesboro and took up a position on the extreme right of the Union line.

On the last day of December, 1862, the rebels attacked the right flank in overwhelming numbers, and the Regiment was driven back on the main line. The Confederates followed their successful infantry attack with a cavalry charge which captured a great many men. Total losses at Stones River was 180 in killed, wounded, or missing.

While at Murfreesboro, the 34th was assigned to the 20th Army Corps which moved toward Liberty Gap, where it was ordered into battle lines on June 25th, 1863. The men advanced across an open cornfield, lately plowed and softened by rain. With every step, the soldiers sank half-way to their knees. Without support, in the face of a rebel brigade, they drove the enemy from his position and captured the flag of the 2nd Arkansas.

For the next few months, the 34th was assigned to guard duty in the vicinity. On November 8th, 1863, it moved to Harrison's Landing on the Tennessee. On the 15th, the



men arrived at Chattanooga and two weeks later were ordered to the battle-field. On the 27th, near Graysville, they met and fought the retreating enemy.

The next day, those able to march were sent on an expedition into Eastern Tennessee. The 34th remained in Tennessee operating a grist mill to supply corn and wheat for the Division. In late December, the troops returned to Chattanooga and were mustered as a Veteran unit before returning home on veteran furlough.

Returning to Georgia in late February, the men joined the Second Brigade in camp near Roseville. They left here on May 5th, and four days later were in the fight at Rocky Face Ridge. At the Battle of Rasaca, on May 14th, the men crossed an open field and charged the enemy. In the face of furious artillery fire, delivered at close range, they drove the enemy from the hill and held it until night. The price paid for this victory was fifty men killed or wounded.

Three days later in a fight at Rome, eight more men were lost. From the time they left Rome on May 24th, the Regiment was involved in skirmishes daily until arriving at Big Shanty on June 15th.

At Big Shanty, they charged an enemy fortification of railroad ties and, in capturing the works, took more of the enemy as prisoners than they had men on the field.

On June 27th, at the Battle for Kennesaw Mountain, the Brigade to which the 34th was assigned led the attack. Upon reaching the top of the rebel works, overwhelming

numbers forced them to fall back, leaving behind some of their dead. During this battle, the Regiment suffered forty-five casualties.

For the next week the 34th pursued the enemy to Atlanta, in the siege of which it took a prominent part. Men were lost nearly every day in skirmishes of various consequence. In early September, the 34th led in a charge upon the Confederate works at Jonesboro. They were the first men in the rebel fort and captured a number of prisoners and artillery pieces.

At the month's close, the men left Atlanta to help drive Forrest from Tennessee. They forced him across the Tennessee River, rejoined Sherman's Army south of Chattanooga, and advanced with him on his "March to the Sea," and through the Carolinas. They engaged the enemy in a fight at Averysboro, North Carolina. At Bentonville, on March 19th, they were attacked from two fronts, but repulsed the enemy at a cost of eight killed and twenty-two wounded.

After staying at Goldsboro, North Carolina, the Regiment left for Raleigh and soon thereafter set out for Cape Fear to intercept General Johnston's retreat. Once Johnston surrendered his army, the 34th went with Sherman to Washington and took part in the Grand Review there on May 24th.

In June, the Regiment left Washington for Louisville to be mustered out of service on July 12th, 1865.

45th Illinois Infantry

The Washburn Leadmine Regiment, later to become the Forty-Fifth Illinois Infantry, was organized at the Jo Daviess County fairgrounds near Galena by John E. Smith of Galena. Although only seven Companies met at Galena's Camp Washburn, the unit's organization was completed. In November the Regiment was fully manned and mustered into service at Camp Douglas.

In early 1862, the men departed for Cairo and from there soon moved to the Tennessee River with General Grant's Army. On February 4th, they arrived at Camp Halleck just below Fort Henry. Two days later, they occupied Fort Henry, the enemy having

evacuated it that day. A week later, the 45th was sent to relieve the 49th Illinois which was in need of help at Fort Donelson. Here the soldiers came under fire for the first time and bore their "Fair Share" for the three days of fighting.

On the 4th of March, they departed Fort Donelson for Savannah, on the Tennessee River, and stayed for three weeks. During this time, they took part in the "Pin Hook Expedition" to the interior.

In late March, the Regiment relocated to Pittsburg Landing and went into camp at the Purdy and Corinth junction, not far from the Shiloh Church. On the 6th of April, the men had their regular Sunday morning inspection and left their arms

stacked on the color line so they could have breakfast. The call to eat had just sounded when the "long roll" was heard on the line. Within minutes, the men had their arms in hand and the officers were all in place. The order was to move "double-quick" to support Sherman.

The 500 men of the 45th who went into battle remained on the front line for both days of the fight. On Sunday they fought back and forth over the same ground a number of times. Late that day, it fell back and took its place on the right of the line for the day's final stand. Here the 45th lay with its weapons during the rainy night.

At daylight, it moved forward and remained there nearly all day. When the battle was over, the Regiment found itself on the same ground from which it had so suddenly departed on Sunday morning. At Shiloh, the 45th suffered 26 killed and 199 wounded or missing. Most of the missing rejoined the unit when darkness fell on Monday night.

On April 24th, the men broke camp at Shiloh and moved with the Army on its approach to Corinth. Corinth fell and the 45th was then ordered to Jackson, Tennessee, and went into camp in a grove east of town. Here the unit performed guard duty on the Mississippi Central Railroad. Four companies were stationed at Medon Station, one at Treager Station, and five at Toon's.

On the 31st of August, Armstrong's Cavalry raided within the Union lines and attacked all three locations. Company C was captured at Treager's Station, but at Medon's the rebels were repulsed.

The 45th was continually on the march for the rest of the year, ending up at Memphis. In February of 1863, the Regiment moved with General Grant to take part in the Vicksburg campaign. At Milliken's Bend, volunteers were called for to attempt to run Union transports, whose civilian crews had refused to go any further, through the Confederate artillery lining the banks of the Mississippi, and deliver critically needed supplies for the army. All the officers and men of the 45th stepped forward and a detail that included Captain Fisk of Mount Carroll was selected. They successfully took the steamer "Anglo-Saxon" through to the troops surrounding Vicksburg.

The beginning of May found the 45th on the east bank of the Mississippi, below Vicksburg, to begin the campaign which caused that city's surrender. The position held by the Regiment was immediately in front of the rebel Fort Hill, regarded as the key to the fortress. Over a period of several weeks, the men repeatedly assaulted the rebel works while at the same time digging a mine under it.

On June 25th, the explosives were placed and the match applied. The 45th Regiment was chosen to lead the storming party when the breach was made. Immediately after the explosion, the men rushed into the crater only to be met by a murderous fire from the rebels who were still protected by a three-foot embankment constructed as a back-up. In this undertaking, the Regiment lost eighty-three in killed and wounded.

Among the dead was Major Leander B. Fisk. Corporal William Robbe was left with the dead on the battlefield, to be rescued later by men of his Company.

When the city surrendered, General Grant ordered the 45th Illinois to be at the Army's advance, owing to its conspicuous service. The Regiment raised its flags over the Vicksburg courthouse. The unit remained in the area for the rest of the year and reenlisted "Almost to the Man" as veterans.

After returning from a thirty-day furlough, the 45th rejoined the Army, then on the Atlanta campaign. The Men did their share in the fighting for Atlanta before leaving on November 12th for a six-week "March to the Sea." The Regiment next saw action when they took part in an attack on Pocotalig, South Carolina. After continuing to march in the Carolinas, the Men took camp at Sugar Loaf Mountain on the last day of February. They continued to be active in the Carolinas and were at Raleigh when the news of the surrender of Lee and Johnston was received.

On May 1st, the Regiment set out for Washington, passing through the fallen Confederate capitol on the way. In a single day, the men marched thirty-nine miles. After participating in the Grand Review, they were ordered to Louisville and from there were mustered out of service on July 12th, 1865.

55th Illinois Volunteer Infantry

The Fifty-Fifth Illinois Infantry Volunteers, of which Company H included a number of men from Milledgeville, was mustered into service at Camp Douglas on October 31st, 1861. The next month, the men left Camp Douglas for Benton Barracks where they remained, under the immediate command of General Sherman, until their departure for Paducah. After the fall of Fort Donelson, the Regiment was sent on an expedition to verify that it had been evacuated.

On March 8th, the 55th embarked by steamer and moved down the Tennessee River, landing several miles above Pittsburg Landing. Soon it was relocated to Pittsburg Landing, where it was brigaded with the 54th and 71st Ohio Regiments, then situated nearly two miles from the other brigades of Sherman's Division. They were on the extreme left and met the rebel attack when the Battle of Shiloh began. Prentiss's heroic Division was nearly a mile away to their front and right. The 55th and its companion Regiments were encamped near a small branch of Lick Creek.

On the morning of the battle, like the other troops on the field, they had no warning of the terrible conflict that was to follow until they heard firing. The 55th was in the center of the Brigade, with the 71st Ohio on their right, and the 54th Ohio Zouaves on their left. Soon a new line, which had been formed near the camp, came under fire from Gage's rebel battery.

With the exception of eighteen men, the 71st Ohio abandoned the fight. The 55th, with the 54th still to its left, was in grave danger from the half-mile gap created by the flight of the

71st Ohio.

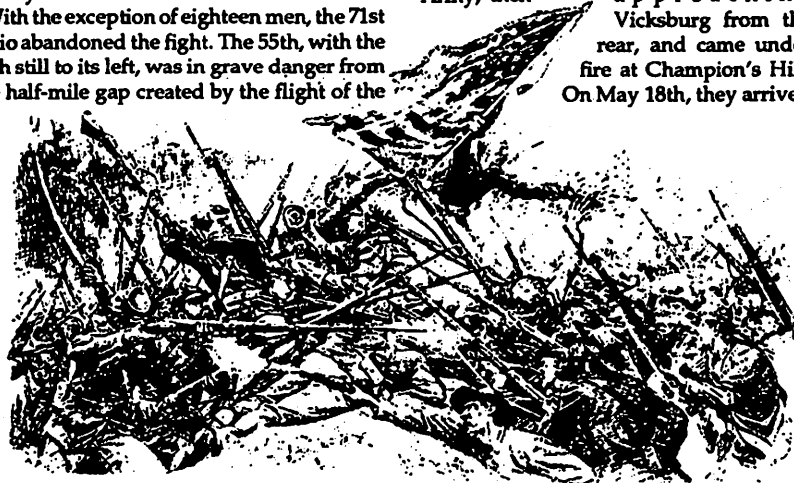
The 55th had exactly 512 Men on the field and the 54th Ohio nearly 400. No artillery was available for support. In this position, they were attacked by Chalmer's and Jackson's Brigades of Bragg's Corps under the personal direction of Confederate General Albert Sidney Johnston.

About noon, the main attack came and for nearly three hours the isolated units held their position. Inasmuch as they were defending the Army's extreme left, this action was of incalculable value to the ultimate outcome of the Battle. After suffering terribly, the Regiment retreated with its organization still intact, and took a position in the last line formed that evening near the Landing. On the fighting of the second day, the 55th took more casualties.

During this terrific conflict, the 55th had the greatest losses of any unit except the 9th Illinois. Its total losses were: 52 killed, 199 wounded, and 26 taken prisoner. Nine more men were lost in the advance on Corinth.

The Regiment entered Corinth on the 30th, and moved westward with Sherman, reaching Memphis on July 21st, 1862. They remained in Memphis until late November, having taken part in the "Tallahatchie Campaign." They next descended the Mississippi to take part in the Battle of Chickasaw Bayou and, in January of 1863, the Battle of Arkansas Post.

In the spring, they caught up with the Army, then approaching Vicksburg from the rear, and came under fire at Champion's Hill. On May 18th, they arrived



at the front works of Vicksburg and the next day were in an assault on it. The Regiment was present for the surrender of Vicksburg on July 4th, but soon set out with Sherman on his expedition to Jackson.

That fall, they moved across Tennessee on the laborous march to Chattanooga where, in one of the most daring operations of the war, they boarded pontoon boats in the North Chickamauga Creek and crossed the Tennessee in total darkness to capture the rebel pickets there.

The 55th fought next at Mission Ridge before marching, again with General Sherman, on a relief trip to Knoxville. Following this, they went into winter quarters at Larkinsville. Here the Regiment veteranized. All of the line officers resigned inasmuch as they failed to be reelected by the men, who then went home on veteran furlough.

The men arrived back to participate in the opening of the campaign for Atlanta. Nearly half their number, 122, were killed or wounded at the battle for Jonesboro. Another 47 were lost on the assault on Kennesaw Mountain on June 27th.

After Atlanta, they joined in the pursuit of General Hood through Northern Alabama and followed this by marching with General Sherman "to the sea." In the Carolinas, they fought at Bentonville, North Carolina. The Confederate General Johnston surrendered shortly thereafter, and the 55th marched through Richmond to Washington and took part in the Grand Review there.

Due to its extraordinary losses at Shiloh, and in view of it having received less than fifty new recruits, the 55th was of small numbers throughout the war. All its casualties were acquired by its original members. The Regiment was engaged in thirty-one battles and was under fire for 128 days. It lost 108 men killed, and 339 wounded. There is no information on the exact number of mortally wounded, although it is known that at least thirty-five died from such wounds within a year of "Shiloh."

Of the men who took the field in battle, more than *two-thirds* were hit by bullets. About *one-third* lost their lives from battle or sickness. Forty-nine men of this Regiment were taken prisoner during the war.

75th Illinois Infantry

The Seventy-Fifth Illinois Infantry, with Dr. George Ryan as Colonel, was organized at Dixon, and mustered into service on September 2nd, 1862. Near September's end, it was ordered south and, on the 30th, crossed the Ohio River to be assigned to the Third Corps of the Army of the Ohio. The Regiment quickly moved against Bragg's forces at Bardstown and, on October 8th, was hotly engaged in the critical Battle of Perryville, where it fought bravely and gallantly with great loss.

The Regiment moved further south. Arriving at Bowling Green on October 31st, it was assigned to the right wing of the Army. Soon the men became involved in skirmishes at Nolansville and Knob Gap.

At the battle of Stone River, the 75th was on the right flank. The men were ordered to fall back inasmuch as Johnson's Division had retreated and left them exposed. Before pulling back, Companies E and H were ordered to delay the rapidly advancing enemy until a new line could be formed. These skirmishers were so far in the Union advance that they were thought to be rebels, and a tremendous fire was taken by them from their own forces. The 75th Regiment was actively involved throughout the battle.

The next action seen by the Regiment was at Liberty Gap and Chickamauga, where it was besieged by the enemy.

On November 24th, 1863, the men fought in the Battle for Lookout Mountain.

On the First of February, 1864, the Regiment went into camp at Blue Springs, Tennessee, and remained there until early May when it moved with Sherman to Atlanta. The men were engaged in the battles of Dalton, Resaca, Marietta, Kennesaw Mountain, and the other fights that concluded in the occupation of Atlanta.

When he began his "march to the sea," Sherman left the 75th in Tennessee and the Regiment suffered greatly at the Battle of Franklin. In December, the Regiment marched to Nashville to take part in the battle there. At Nashville, the men attacked the rebels across an open field and captured 223 prisoners.

This was the last fight seen by the 75th. The Regiment was mustered out of service from Nashville on June 12th, 1865.

92nd Illinois Volunteer Mounted Infantry

The Ninety-Second Infantry was organized by Major Smith D. Atkins and included two companies of Carroll County men. It mustered into United States service on September 4th, 1862, and during its three-year existence was involved in more than sixty battles or skirmishes including Murfreesboro, Chattanooga, and Atlanta.

The Regiment drilled in Rockford under its unanimously elected Colonel Atkins until October 10th, when ordered to Cincinnati to help protect that threatened city. The 92nd helped drive General Morgan from Kentucky.

At November's end, the 92nd was brigaded with Colonel Corchran's 14th Kentucky Infantry at Mt. Sterling, Kentucky, to protect that area from rebel guerillas.

A great many Blacks had flocked into the camp but, with the exception of some who were hired as servants by the Illinois officers, were forced to leave. Colonel Corchran opposed that situation and ordered the servants to be returned to their owners. Colonel Atkins, refusing to accept the order, was indicted by the Kentucky Grand Jury but did not fall under their jurisdiction as long as he stayed in camp.

When the Regiment left camp it was confronted by an angry mob in Lexington, determined to recover their "property." The Regiment passed without harm after a display of fixed bayonets and loaded weapons.

During the fall, the 92nd confronted the rebels numerous times in Kentucky and Tennessee. On November 26th, it was ordered to Danville, which it reached after driving part of Bragg's army from Camp Robinson.

In late January, with Colonel Atkins in command of the brigade, the men marched to the mouth of the Cumberland to await orders, but before the orders arrived, firing was heard at Fort Donelson. They arrived at that fort the next day, just in time to see the rebels, under Forrest and Wheeler, withdrawing.

On February 6th, 1863, the Regiment arrived at Nashville and, a month later, moved on Franklin to help drive out Van Dorn. On March 27th, they retook the camp at Brentwood where Van Dorn's cavalry had captured Colonel Bloodgood and three hundred of his men. Atkins' Brigade soon returned to

Franklin, arriving just in time to repulse a furious attack there on April 10th. Accompanied by a cavalry regiment, the Brigade met Van Dorn again on May 1st, at Springhill, successfully pushing him from town.

At the beginning of summer, the entire Corps marched to Triune where, on June 11th, a furious attack by Forrest was repulsed with heavy losses to him. On June 23rd, the 92nd marched with Rosecrans in the campaign that ended in the evacuation of Bragg's army from Murfreesboro and Shelbyville.

On July 1st, Colonel Atkins requested that Rosecrans assign his regiment to Wilder's Brigade of mounted infantry, armed with Spencer repeating rifles. Within ten days this was done. A detachment of two hundred men joined an expedition to scout the countryside for horses. In the next four days, the detail had captured 1,700 horses and mules, and 800 Black men who were soon mustered into a colored regiment. On August 16th, Wilder's Brigade, of which the 92nd was a part, forced Bragg out of Chattanooga.

After settling in the Trenton Valley southwest of Chattanooga, a detail under Captain Van Buskirk climbed Lookout Mountain on the Nickajack Trail forcing the rebels off the mountain and bringing General Rosecrans the first authentic report that Bragg had evacuated Chattanooga. When Union troops entered that city on September 9th, 1863, the Ninety-Second led the procession.

Two days later, the 92nd was furiously assaulted by Forrest's rebels a mile from Ringgold. The men held their ground until Wilder arrived with the rest of the Brigade and drove Forrest back. The next day, at the Battle of Chickamauga, the brigade was on the extreme right and later helped in covering McCook's retreat to Chattanooga.

After guarding the Tennessee River north of Chattanooga, the 92nd relocated to Huntsville, Alabama, for winter quarters. This quiet period was interrupted on January 25, 1864, when the 92nd moved on Athens and Shoal Creek to intercept a rebel raid. The Brigade met and repelled the first rebel column at Shoal Creek. Two miles west, the second rebel column was also turned back after a brutal fight in which the rebel commanding officer was killed. A

number of men were captured and with them orders that indicated that the just defeated unit was to merge with another rebel column at Athens the next morning. The Brigade quickly returned to Athens during the night and there met and defeated the third rebel detachment.

In the spring of 1864, the 92nd was assigned to participate in the campaign for Atlanta. On April 23rd, while guarding a trail over Walden's Ridge, an enemy force surrounded the men on guard there. Over half of the sixty-two men on duty were killed, wounded, or taken prisoner. In one of the most blatant examples of inhumanity to come out of the Civil War, twelve of the captured men were shot dead after having surrendered and been disarmed.

Continuing on the arduous campaign to take Atlanta, the regiment, October 1st, discovered the movements of Hood's army. The next day, Hood was attacked with the loss of some of his infantry. Two days later, when Hood was pushed from the Powder River, it was discovered that his entire force was on the move.

The Brigade continued in maneuvering against the rebels until Sherman moved them toward Savannah. The Men completed the march after being involved in much of the fighting that took place along the way.

They continued to fight throughout the Carolinas until the close of the war. Before being mustered out at Concord, North Carolina, special order #61 transferred four officers and 225 enlisted men to the Sixty-Fifth Illinois Infantry.



7th Illinois Cavalry

The Seventh Illinois Cavalry, of which Company B was mostly from Carroll County, was mustered into service at Camp Butler on October 13th, 1861 and, within weeks, was ordered to Bird's Point. In January, all except Companies B, C, I, and L were moved to Cape Girardeau and, early in the spring, joined the forces under Pope.

They led the Army advancing against New Madrid and captured a battery of guns there. The Regiment again came together at New Madrid and was used to scout the Mississippi River area. When that area was considered secure, it moved in the direction of Corinth with General Pope.

Since the roads were nearly impassable, new corduroy roads were constructed at the rate of five miles per day. Upon reaching Farmington, the Horsemen were involved in a charge on concealed infantry.

After the evacuation of Corinth, the 7th protected the Memphis and Charleston Railroad from rebel guerrillas between Tusculum and Decatur, Alabama. At the Battle of Iuka, and later at Corinth, they were actively engaged in fighting. Seven companies fought near Summerville on November 23rd, and captured the rebel colors and seventy men.

The next week, the Regiment joined Colonel Dickey at Holly Springs, Mississippi. The combined cavalry pursued Price south to Coffeeville, where he successfully repulsed Dickey's men. The Northerners, however, succeeded in recovering about 1,200 prisoners in Price's possession.

In late December, 500 men from the 7th and 300 from the 2nd Iowa moved from Oxford to Okalona, laying waste the countryside. The command returned to Lagrange, Tennessee on January 1st, after having traveled 900 miles and fought with the enemy on nearly a daily basis.

At Lagrange, the 6th and 7th Illinois Cavalry and the 2nd Iowa were brigaded together under the command of Colonel B. H. Grierson. They made foraging raids into rebel country "relieving" the inhabitants of many fine horses and mules.

The rebel Colonel Richardson was operating in this same area and was conscripting every able bodied man and taking all serviceable animals for the rebel cause. Frequently, his camp was raided by Grierson, who nearly

captured him at one such event.

On the 17th of April, the Brigade started on what is known as "Grierson's Raid." Probably no action of the war so clearly illustrated the courage and power of endurance of Illinois soldiers. The country covered by this force was dominated by swamps and bayous, and the rebels seemed as numerous as the mosquitoes. Not a day passed that they were not in danger of being annihilated.

Cut off from communications, and destroying any way of backtracking, they gallantly made their way to Baton Rouge. They remained at Baton Rouge for two weeks before moving on to Port Hudson where they took part in the Battle of Plain's Store.

After the fall of Vicksburg and Port Hudson, the Mississippi River was open and Grierson's command was ordered to Memphis to protect the Memphis and Charleston Railroad. Numerous times they fought rebel units under the command of General Chamblers.

On the 26th of December, the 7th fought Forrest's entire command and was badly mauled. A few days later they fought again at Moscow, Tennessee.

In February of 1864, the 7th, bringing up the rear, moved from Germantown to West Point, Mississippi. They withstood some severe attacks, but never allowed the enemy to get through to the main body of troops. They returned to Germantown where 289 officers and men reenlisted as veterans and soon went home on furlough. About 120 of the non-veterans were at Guntown with Sturgis when he took that place.

Later in 1864, Forrest raided Memphis. Seven companies of the 7th cavalry fought his entire force on the Hernando Road and then

pursued him to the Tallahatchie River.

On September 30th, The Regiment crossed the Tennessee River at Clifton, joined by an infantry force under General Washburn, in the vain pursuit of Forrest. For the next two months, it remained in the area on picket duty, clashing with Hood at Lawrenceburg.

At Cambellsville, the Division found itself nearly surrounded by Forrest, but escaped with the loss of only 100 men. On the move to Franklin, the 7th protected the Army and engaged the rebels at Harts' Cross Roads and several other points.

At Franklin, they charged a division of rebel infantry, driving it across the Harpeth River. They were involved in many fights during December, the most serious of which was at Brentwood Hills where on the 14th it lost thirty-two men in an attack. Hood's army now having been routed, the cavalry pursued him to the Tennessee River where he crossed at Bainbridge. Here Hatch's Cavalry Division captured 2,000 of Hood's men and a quantity of weapons.

On January 13th, 1865, the Seventh took camp at Gravelly Springs. In number it counted 199 officers and men fit for duty, compared with 450 for the previous month. After three weeks, it was sent to Eastport where recruits poured in bringing its number to over 1,600.

Having done its work, the next few months were relatively quiet for the 7th. The Seventh Illinois Cavalry was mustered out at Nashville and discharged from Camp Butler on November 17th, 1865.



8th Illinois Cavalry

The Eighth Illinois Cavalry was formed at St. Charles, Illinois, in September 1861. The Regiment was sent to Washington City, and in December was encamped at Alexandria, Virginia, before joining in the advance on Manassas on March 10th.

Remaining at Warrenton until April 12th, it drove the rebels across the Rappahannock four times. In early May, the Cavalrymen were assigned to General Stoneman's Light Brigade, and fought in the advance up the Peninsula. On June 26th, six companies of the Regiment met Jackson's advance on Mechanicsville and held him until late in the afternoon before being driven back to the infantry lines.

Soon afterward, the 8th saw action at Gains' Hill, Dispatch Station, and Malvern Hill. Being the Army's rear guard, they continually skirmished with enemy cavalry. On the second occupation of Malvern Hill, they led the advance and, in company with Benson's Battery of Artillery, bore the brunt of that fight.

On August 30th, 1863, the men left Yorktown and the next day arrived at Alexandria, only to be moved immediately to the front. Within a week, they crossed into Maryland and fought at Poolsville. Following this, they captured the colors of the 12th Virginia Cavalry at Monocacy Church, and later took twenty prisoners at Barnsville.

They next engaged the rebels at Sugar Loaf Mountain, Middleton, and South

Pass. At Boonsboro they met the enemy, inflicting 67 casualties and taking 200 prisoners.

The Eighth Illinois Cavalry was engaged in the decisive battle at Antietam.

Located at the Army of the Potomac's advance, the 8th fought rebel cavalry at Philemonte, Uniontown, Upperville, Barbee's Cross Roads, Little Washington, and Amesville.

During the disastrous Battle of Fredericksburg on December 13th, two squadrons of the 8th Cavalry remained in that town until its final evacuation. The Regiment was next placed on picket duty along the Rappahannock to protect the Army's left flank. So far, the Regiment had taken 118 casualties.

In 1863, the 8th fought almost continuously in the critical Northern Virginia campaigns. They fought the Confederates at: Sulphur Springs, Warrenton, Rapidan Station, Northern Neck, Borstly Ford, Upperville, Fairville, Gettysburg, Williamsburg, Boonsboro, Funktown, Falling Water, Chester Gap, Sandy Hook, Culpepper, Brandy Station, Dumfries, Pony Mountain, Raccoon Ford, Liberty Mills, Manassas, Rexleyville, Mitchell's Station, and Ely's Ford.

Their loss during these fights was 23 killed, 116 wounded, and 37 missing. The Eighth Illinois Cavalry was mustered out of service on July 17th, 1865 at Benton Barracks, Missouri.

This was one of the truly fighting units of the Civil War. This brief and modest account cannot do justice to the actual story of their experience, the history of which is studied by Civil War historians everywhere.



11th Illinois Cavalry

Recruiting for the Eleventh Illinois Cavalry began in October 1861. By November 4th, twelve companies were raised and soon mustered into service. They organized at Camp Lyon, near Peoria. From there they deployed to Benton Barracks, Missouri, where they stayed before being moved down the Tennessee River in March.

The First Battalion joined General Lew Wallace at Crump's Landing, and the remainder of the Regiment camped at Pittsburg Landing about two miles away. On the morning of April 6th, the unit lost several men when it came under fire for the first time at the Battle of Shiloh. The next day was even more costly.

Prior to the fall of Corinth, the Regiment was on duty between Pittsburg Landing and Corinth and participated in a raid at Purdie. Following this, they fought at Bolivar, Tennessee, and at Davis Bridge on the Hatchie River, where they suffered heavily.

In October, they were in the three day battle for Corinth, and fought at Iuka, before taking up winter quarters at Jackson, Tennessee.

In meeting Forrest's advance at Lexington on December 16th, seven officers and about one hundred men were captured, and many others killed or wounded. General Forrest paroled the captured men the following day. In the ensuing days of pursuing Forrest, the men fought at Jackson, Humbolt, and Parker's Cross Roads. These actions had reduced the Regiment to less than three hundred men and even fewer horses fit for duty.

The Regiment next moved to Grand Junction, Tennessee, to be stationed along the Memphis and Charleston Railroad. The men continued to be involved in raids and skir-

mishes, and suffered a great many casualties in an engagement with Confederate cavalry at Hudsonville, Mississippi, on June 21st. During the summer, the Regiment gained strength as numerous sick, disabled, and paroled men were exchanged.

On September 17th, it was ordered to Memphis and, from there, embarked for Vicksburg. Immediately upon arrival, the men were used for scouting at Messenger's Ford on the Big Black River, where skir-

mishing was frequent. In October, they were dispatched on an expedition to Canton with General McPherson and, in February and March of 1864, with General Sherman to Meridian, Mississippi.

The men had now served their three years, and went home on veteran furlough. Upon returning to Vicksburg, the Regiment was

used again for scouting. They operated with Elliot's Marines at Yazoo City and relieved the 11th Infantry, besieged there, in the fall of 1864.

After moving to Baton Rouge, they fought at Woodville, Louisiana, where they captured an artillery battery and one hundred men. Following this, they embarked for Memphis where the non-veterans and most of the officers were mustered out. During the winter, the 11th Cavalry conducted a raid into Arkansas and, following that, was in a sharp fight at Egypt Station.

The Eleventh Illinois Cavalry was ordered to Memphis for mustering out on September 30th, 1865.

12th Illinois Cavalry

The Twelfth Cavalry was organized at Camp Butler in February of 1862, and remained there guarding rebel prisoners until late June, when it was sent to Martinsburg, Virginia.

After the Union evacuation of Winchester, the forces at Martinsburg were mustered into action. On the morning of September 5th, about five miles from camp, a scouting detail commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Davis encountered rebel cavalry in numbers far superior to his own. Colonel Davis's party took the offensive and charged. The rebels were driven several miles and, in so doing, lost a number of men.

Two days later the rebels, after being strongly reinforced, positioned themselves to take the Union command. Anticipating this, Colonel Davis dispatched a scouting detail. After having been surrounded, this detail made it though the enemy line and rejoined the main unit.

A force of only forty men, under Captain Thomas Grosvenor, was sent out immediately with the understanding that the entire 12th Cavalry would soon follow. Very shortly, the undersized detail of Grosvenor's was faced by a Confederate force numbering eight hundred. After taking a terrific volley from the rebels, the forty-man detail charged the enemy, causing them to flee all the way back to Winchester. In the face of being greatly outnumbered, the Twelfth fell back to Harper's Ferry.

A week later, Colonel Davis and his men moved out to join General McClellan at Sharpsburg, Maryland. After destroying an enemy supply convoy of sixty wagons, they arrived at Sharpsburg and were augmented by two companies of "McClellan Dragoons," who had been the General-in-Chief's bodyguards.

On November 16th, the Twelfth escorted Sigel's army on its move to Fredericksburg, frequently fighting off elements of J. E. B. Stuart's feared cavalry. After the disaster of Fredericksburg, the unit moved back to Manassas and performed scouting duty.

The 12th was next assigned to Dumphries and, along with the 1st Maryland Cavalry, was surprised by the enemy which took

nearly fifty prisoners. A vigorous fight, lasting all day, ensued. At day's end, the enemy had lost nearly one hundred men; the Federals, eleven.

In the celebrated "Stoneman Raid" of May 3rd, 1863, the Twelfth performed a conspicuous role. Colonel Davis had been ordered to destroy communications between Lee's army, then opposing Hooker on the Rapahannock, and the capitol at Richmond. The Twelfth moved out at daybreak and passed through a region never before occupied by Union troops. After fighting mounted guerillas, they succeeded in destroying telegraph lines, bridges, and railroad tracks. Eventually a train appeared with seven carloads of wounded Confederates from the Chancellorsville battlefield. After destroying the engine, the captured men were paroled by Colonel Davis.

The 12th struck again on the 5th, this time raiding the Central Railroad at Hanover station. After completing their mission of destruction, the men camped that night only seven miles from the Confederate capitol before marching for Williamsburg in the morning. At Tunstall station, on the way, they were surprised by a train filled with rebel infantry and an artillery battery. Colonel Davis decided to break through the enemy's line before they could prepare their forces. A charge was gallantly made, but having met without success, Davis withdrew to Gloucester Point. On this raid into Virginia, it is estimated that over one million dollars in damage was done.

The Regiment was divided at Gloucester Point. A battalion was sent to General Dix at Fortress Monroe, and from there conducted frequent raids. On one such raid, William H. Lee, a son of the Confederate commander, was captured. In June, the Regiment was brought together into Buford's Division, and sent toward Fredericksburg.

On July 1st, the men attacked the flanks of Longstreet's Corps. They charged the rebels repeatedly, forcing them into battle formation. This slowing of the enemy was of great help to General Meade who was trying to push his lagging infantry to meet the enemy in Pennsylvania.

A Brigade of the Pennsylvania militia fighting Longstreet was in a situation in which they would soon be overrun by the rebels. The men of the 12th charged directly into the

enemy infantry and broke free the militiamen pressed there.

While Lee was trying to save his army, defeated at Gettysburg, the 12th was ordered to Williamsport to seize the fort there and hold it against the enemy. In this venture, the regiment captured 2,000 rebels and 200 wagon teams. Upon reaching Williamsport, the 12th joined with the 8th Illinois Cavalry in a successful attack on a regiment of J. E. B. Stuart's cavalry.

After Gettysburg, The 12th fought at the cavalry battles of Falling Waters, the Rapidan, and Stevensburg, and acquitted itself with its usual bravery. On the 20th of November, the regiment was relieved from duty with the Army of the Potomac and ordered home. The veterans reached Chicago to a grand and patriotic welcome.

Upon completion of veteran furlough, the regiment, fully staffed by new recruits, was moved to St. Louis until ordered to New Orleans to join General Banks move down the Red River. A great many men were lost in the numerous engagements of the Red River campaign.

The Regiment returned to New Orleans and performed picket duty there during the summer. In early November, the 12th was in a severe fight at Liberty, Mississippi, and captured a number of prisoners there. The Regiment next participated in an expedition against Mobile, and returned to Baton Rouge before moving to Memphis in January. It continued raiding and scouting in this area.

In June, The 12th was assigned to General Custer's Division at Alexandria, Louisiana, and from there moved to Hempstead, Texas, and later to Houston. The 12th Cavalry mustered out from Houston, Texas, on May 29th, 1866.

It can be observed from studying the disposition of our men who served in this unit that a great deal of turmoil or discontent took place in the final days of the Regiment. Otherwise brave men deserted; others refused to muster out, perhaps foreshadowing the troubles to come for Custer.

1st Artillery Battery F

Battery F of the First Light Artillery was recruited at Dixon and mustered into service at Springfield, February 25th, 1862.

On April 1st, the men were ordered from

Benton Barracks, Missouri, to Pittsburg Landing. On April 9th they arrived and were assigned to Major General Lew Wallace's Third Division. Battery F was engaged at the siege of Corinth and, following that campaign, marched to Memphis. They continued to be used in the Tennessee and Mississippi operating area.

On March 7th, 1865, Battery F was consolidated and its numbers were assigned to other batteries of the regiment.

71st Illinois Infantry

This regiment was mustered in on July 26th, 1862, at Camp Douglas for three months' service. The regiment was ordered to Columbus, Kentucky, but two companies were dispatched back to Mound City, Illinois. The regiment guarded railroads and bridges before being mustered out on October 29th, 1862.

134th Infantry

This was a one hundred day regiment and performed garrison duty at Columbus, Kentucky.

142nd Infantry

This was a one hundred day regiment. Moved to Memphis via the Mississippi River and guarded the Memphis and Charleston Railroad.

146th Infantry

This was a one-year infantry regiment assigned to guarding draftees and substitutes at Camp Butler, Illinois.

153rd Infantry

This was a one-year infantry regiment assigned to guard the Nashville and Chattanooga Railroad. In March of 1865, three companies of the Regiment conducted a campaign into Alabama.

Army Experiences of John Armstrong Robison 96th Illinois Volunteer Infantry

In August of 1862, twenty-four year old John Armstrong Robison left the farm in Washington Township of Carroll county and joined the 96th Illinois Infantry being organized at Galena. Having survived the war, he wrote in graphic detail of his army experiences. The following is his account of the Battle of Chickamauga.

On Friday, September 18th, at noon, we started for Chickamauga Creek with our Brigade. General Whittaker was in command, and our haversacks were full of cooked beef and ham and some hardtack, and our cartridge boxes full of good ammunition. I don't think a jollier set of men ever started out from camp, not knowing we were going to intercept the enemy so quick. Even General Whittaker seemed to be jolly and fearless at first.

They did not put out advance or rear guards on that march. A very unusual thing, as we had been marching after the Rebs for twelve months through Kentucky and Tennessee and always had advance and rear guards out and had never run into any Rebs yet. Just as the head of the column was crossing the Chickamauga Branch, the 96th being in the lead and I think Company A was about over, we heard some shots fired. Here came General Whittaker back pell-mell dashing through the Branch, and would have run over the first few companies if they had not let him by.

However, there was a skirmish line formed and advanced. Soon there was one man killed in the road. The Rebel skirmish line fell back to their main line and General Whittaker sent our artillery up and had it placed in position to shell the Rebs, after which we advanced in line through timber and brush up to an open small field. The Rebs on the opposite side were too far for musketry to do much harm. One spent ball struck a comrade near me and sounded as though a small pebble had struck him.

Our cannon shelled them until dark and we lay there on our arms, in line, until about two o'clock in the morning, when we were ordered back to an open flat, and were held there all day as a reserve, with the cannon shot and shell flying about eight to ten feet

about our heads all day long.

The next morning, Sunday, September 20, 1863, about eight o'clock, we were ordered out and went on the double quick for about four miles, through brush and timber and over logs and ditches to the relief of General Thomas. While on the way the Rebs threw a few shells, one of which exploded in our column and crippled some of the men, one Lieutenant badly. I supposed he was dead, as he lay on his face in a pool of blood, but I saw him afterwards, with much surprise.

We finally arrived at our destination. We had marched so fast that our artillery did not keep up with us. Hence we went into line of battle without it. The bullets were flying thick and fast and whistling all different tunes just above our heads, with a continual roar of cannon and musketry, and we were ordered to form in a line. That is where it tried a man's courage.

Such a look as was on the face and in the eyes of many of my comrades, I shall never forget it if I should live forever. I suppose I looked the same way, for I felt it at least, but it soon passed.

We were ordered to advance up a small rise until we could see the enemy's line and then drop on one knee and fire. We did so. We were in line two deep and the enemy, Longstreet's men, were formed on the opposite ridge in line six deep. They would fire by two lines, and then the second two and so on. They poured musketry into us and grape and canister shot, which just missed our heads from two to twenty feet.

We returned the fire as best we could. Our gun barrels became so hot we could hardly hold them to load, and we held our position for thirty-five minutes, so it was said. During that time the corporal of Company H was shot and fell against my left leg, my position being in the front rank next to the colors or Nation flag. Corporal Dave Isible of Elizabeth was on the right. Sergeant Bruno carried the National flag and Sergeant Swanbrough the banner. The banner staff was shot in two twice.

The boys began to fall quite thick and fast. I happened to look down the line while loading and saw one of our boys, Walton Reed, struck in the forehead with a bullet and it seemed to me he leaped ten feet in the air and fell forward to the ground.

Our artillery battery came up finally and

set up on a small ridge behind us, and we were ordered to fall back in line with it. It was getting quite late in the afternoon now. The Rebs supposed we had broke lines to retreat and they came after us pell-mell, running with their Rebel whoop. Colonel Champion stopped our colors and companies C and H, and faced us about for the Brigade to form on. While doing so I was loading my gun.

A large Reb was a little ahead of the rest and Dave Isible's gun being loaded, he fired across my shoulder, I leaning over at the time holding my gun and ramrod. He dropped the Reb. I commenced ramming the ball in my gun again, then I was struck with a ball through the elbow joint, the ball passing through the bone above and below, my arm being in a bent position. I had the gun in my left hand and the ramrod in my right, and I could not let go of it, as the muscles of my hand were clamped around it. I spoke to Isible and told him I was shot in the elbow.

Just at this moment, the Colonel ordered the flag to fall back about two rods, to straighten up the lines in range with the battery, and then is when I fell back of the Regiment. They waited until the Rebs came up quite close, probably within sixty or eighty yards, and then opened up on them with cannon and musketry and mowed them like sheep.

They were Longstreet's men, had just come in on the cars from the Potomac, where they had always been successful if they could get our men to break. Some of them claimed afterwards they had run across some fireeating devils that did not know when they were licked. However that may be, that round repulsed them so that they had to stop and rally up their forces and get them in line again.

Our men held them there until near dusk. Dave Isible was killed a short time after I was wounded, so I was told, and Color Sergeant Bruno was shot through the right arm and through the right breast, but our Brigade held that Rebel horde back until General Thomas got his men out, as they were aiming to flank him.

We lost of our Regiment in that thirty-five minutes, 250 men. General Whittaker was wounded and Lieutenant Colonel Clark was killed or shot through the breast and

died in a couple of days. The Battle of Chickamauga is counted as one of the bloodiest battles of the war. Neither army was victorious and each withdrew from the field. The losses sustained by both armies in this conflict were simply appalling: a combined total loss of 33,980.

After I fell back on the Regiment, I did not know which way to go. The firing seemed to be all around in a complete circle. I was climbing uphill like and the bullets kept spating the ground around me and my arm bled terrible. I had to throw my gun away, which I hated to do, as I always had thought if I ever got home I would like to take it with me, but I found on this occasion I would have to abandon that idea, so away she went.

I then reached around and pulled the ramrod out of my hand, took off my accoutrements and brought my arm against my side, and it was but a short time until the blood began to run out of my shoe top at every step. I began to feel quite weak from the loss of blood, and to lose courage. I once had the notion to give up and sit down and let the Rebs either kill me or take me prisoner, but I was very near over the top of the ridge and when I did get over the hill where I was sheltered from the bullets then I felt scared and trembled like a leaf. Something I have thought of many times since, as I did not feel that trembling fear while in the fire of the enemy.

I did not go far down the slope until I met Captain Barker of our Regiment, who had stayed back behind a tree and was very shortly after presented with a white feather and sent home in disgrace. Well I passed on a little further and met one of our color Corporals who had played the same trick and then my ire began to rise to see so many of the skulks. Why, I had never thought of such a thing as hanging back. I could not help but abuse him a little as weak as I felt. I passed on and soon came to the wounded camp and a nurse bandaged my wound.

For the next week this soldier suffered incredibly as he made his way to Nashville to get medical attention. Only within hours of probable death did he receive proper care from an overworked yet dedicated doctor who amputated his arm.

John Armstrong Robison lived until June 4th, 1910.

Battles Listed on the Carroll County Civil War Monument

The vertical shaft of the Carroll County Civil War Monument bears the names of twelve battles, in raised letters: Atlanta, Chickamauga, Corinth, Donelson, Gettysburg, Hatchee, Nashville, Resaca, Shiloh, Stone River, Vicksburg, and Wilderness.

There are some surprising omissions from the list of battles. Except for the Battle of Franklin, the west is well covered, as would have been expected since most men from Carroll County fought in the western theater.

In the eastern theater, however, it is strange that no mention is made of the two Battles of Bull Run, or of Chancellorsville, Fredericksburg, Cold Harbor, Spottsylvania, any of the battles around Petersburg, or any fought during the Peninsular Campaign.

Several of the battles listed were not all that important, including Resaca, Hatchee, and Corinth. We may assume that a committee of veterans was responsible for selecting the battles to be remembered on the monument. It is possible that these men had fought in the twelve and so wanted them to have special prominence. There is no apparent order to the way the battles are listed on the monument.

On the *Northeast face* are listed, from top to bottom, the battles of *Resaca, Hatchee, and Chickamauga*.

Resaca was fought from May 13-18, 1864 between the Union forces of William T. Sherman and the Confederate forces of Joseph E. Johnston. The town of Resaca lies some 80 miles northwest of Atlanta along the vital railroad line to Chattanooga.

Following the astonishing victory at Missionary Ridge, near Chattanooga, Bragg was forced to retreat to Dalton, Georgia. Here he was replaced by "Fighting Joe" Johnston.

Grant was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant General and moved east to Washington and the Army of the Potomac.

Sherman was left behind with orders to attack Johnston's Army of Tennessee and break it up, get into the interior of the South, and inflict all possible damage on Confeder-

ate war resources. Atlanta was the natural target and the campaign therefore followed the railroad from Chattanooga to Atlanta.

The entire campaign resembles a formalized dance. Johnston would find a fine position defending the railroad and his supply line and wait for Sherman to attack. The Union Army would advance along the railroad, determine how well-defended Johnston's position was, and then McPherson's Army of the Tennessee would be sent around Johnston's flank to menace his rear. Johnston would then withdraw to yet another good defensive position and the whole movement would be repeated.

This is what happened at Resaca. After withdrawing from Dalton, Johnston established a new line near Resaca. On the 14th Sherman ordered an attack along the entire line which was easily repulsed. So encouraging was his success against Sherman that Johnston ordered a counterattack for the 15th. But when he learned that McPherson was threatening his rear he had no choice but to withdraw to Dallas.

When the Atlanta Campaign began, Sherman had some 100,000 men divided into seven infantry and one cavalry corps. Thomas's Army of the Cumberland consisted of the 4th, 14th, 20th, and Elliott's Cavalry Corps.

McPherson's Army of the Tennessee contained the 15th, 16th, and 17th. Schofield's Army of the Ohio was made up of the 23rd Corps and Stoneman's cavalry. The third division of the 15th Corps, the 17th Corps and three cavalry brigades were charged with guarding the lines of communications.

"Hatchee" is a real question mark. Neither Shelby Foote's *The Civil War, A Narrative* or Mark Boatner's *The Civil War Dictionary* mentions this name. There is a "Hatchie" River that plays a small role in the small battle of Brice's Crossroads and a "Tallahatchie" River in northern Mississippi where a minor engagement was fought with Nathan Bedford Forrest. Another possibility is that the action took place on the "Chattahoochee" River near Atlanta.

A better guess is that the name is a misspelling of the "Hatchie" River which saw a skirmish between Union General Ord and Confederate General Van Dorn as the latter was retreating from the Battle of Corinth on 5

October 1862. Van Dorn lost 300 men taken prisoner. This is the same river mentioned above in connection with the Battle of Brice's Crossroads. The monument probably refers to the more significant engagement following the Battle of Corinth.

Chickamauga followed a brilliant campaign by the Union General Rosecrans as he maneuvered Braxton Bragg out of Tennessee and into northern Georgia. Chickamauga Creek is some 8 miles southeast of

the vital railroad junction of Chattanooga and was the scene of some of the most savage fighting of the entire war.

Rosecrans had divided his army into several parts as he attempted to trap the Army of Tennessee. His overconfidence cost him his job and nearly destroyed the Army of the Cumberland as Bragg unexpectedly attacked him when Rosecrans believed he was retreating. Both Bragg and his subordinates must bear the blame, as they failed to defeat the widely separated Union forces. Finally aware of the dangerous position he was in, Rosecrans ordered his commanders to unite in an area along Chickamauga Creek.

After some preliminary skirmishing, the main battle began on 20 September 1863 with Bragg attacking and Rosecrans fighting on the defensive. Due to a tragic series of mistakes a Union commander withdrew from the center of the line just as James Longstreet's Corps, sent west from Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, attacked. The Union line was shattered and most soldiers, including Rosecrans, believed that retreat was the only hope to avoid catastrophe.

However, George Thomas and his 14th Corps were solidly entrenched on a hill at the north end of the Yankee line known as Snodgrass Hill. Here Thomas's troops, and later Gordon Granger's men, fought a heroic battle that only ended at dark when they followed the rest of the defeated army into Chattanooga. Thomas and his 14th Corps were known forever afterwards as the "Rock of Chickamauga."

This is one of the very few battles in the Civil War where the Confederates enjoyed an advantage in numbers of men. It was a victory for the South, but it could have been a triumph. Bragg took over 66,000 into battle and lost over 18,000. Rosecrans had over 58,000 men and lost over 16,000. Both casualty figures equal 28%.

The monument's *Northwest face* lists: *Corinth, Vicksburg, and Wilderness.*

Corinth took place on 3-4 October 1862 in the important railroad center located in northeast Mississippi a few dozen miles from Shiloh. Confederate General Van Dorn decided to attack Union General Rosecrans at Corinth, because he thought he outnumbered him. He did not! While the typically

slashing southern attack at first gained some ground, the Yankees finally drove Van Dorn off.

Unusually fierce fighting took place at Battery Robinett, a small Federal earthen fort that was about the size of a basketball court. Out of a total of 43,000 men involved on both sides, total casualties (killed, wounded, missing) were nearly 7,000.

Vicksburg, Mississippi saw a nine-month campaign to capture the southern fortress. The battle of Vicksburg resulted in a Confederate catastrophe, and gave undying fame to General U. S. Grant. Vicksburg was vitally important because it was the last fortress blocking the Mississippi River to northern shipping. In addition, it was the last link between the main body of the Confederacy and its trans-Mississippi empire.

For months Lincoln had been pressing his forces to capture this city and bring an end to the talk in the midwestern states of leaving the Union, because the cheapest way to ship the farmer's crops to market was closed and the railroads were charging high rates to move the grain east.

Vicksburg sits atop a ridge of high ground along the east bank of the Mississippi surrounded by swamps. Grant's men were on the west bank, and during the fall and winter of 1862 they tried a variety of schemes to get close enough to the city to attack. These plans all failed and the wisest course of action would have been for Grant to move back upstream to Memphis and start all over again, this time down the east bank.

But this admission of failure would have caused serious political problems, so Grant had to think of something else. What he came up with was a brilliant idea to move below Vicksburg, cross the river, move against Jackson, Mississippi, and then turn and attack Vicksburg from behind. The problem with this plan was the impossibility of protecting his supply lines from Confederate attack. He solved this dilemma by cutting loose from his lines of communication and living off the country.

When the Confederate armies under Pemberton tried to break his supply lines, they discovered that Grant had none! In a matter of weeks Grant had captured Jackson and either driven the southern armies away or

forced them to retreat into the lines of Vicksburg.

Back on the banks of the Mississippi, Grant was again in communication with the North and able to receive supplies, though he still had to capture a very formidable fortress. Initial assaults were bloody failures and so Grant settled down to a siege operation which lasted from 19 May to 4 July 1863 when the Confederates capitulated.

Grant was a hero and, as Lincoln said, "The Father of Waters rolls unvexed to the sea." Coming a day after the victory at Gettysburg, these two battles spelled eventual ruin for the Southern cause.



Wilderness took place from 5-7 May 1864 in an area of scattered woodlands along the Rapidan River northwest of Fredricksburg, Virginia. The Battle of Wilderness marks the beginning of the final campaign in the eastern theater of the Civil War.

Grant, superior in numbers and equipment, had no desire to fight R. E. Lee and his Army of Northern Virginia in the difficult terrain of the Wilderness area. For this same reason, Lee was eager to attack his foe since his scouts knew the territory well and the

superiority of the Army of the Potomac's artillery would not count as much in the rough country around the old Chancellorsville battlefield (characterized by rolling hills and thick second-growth timber crossed by meandering lanes).

The fighting was savage in the woods and clearings of Wilderness and Grant was basically beaten by Lee's superior generalship. But at the end of the battle when every other union commander would have retreated to Washington, Grant turned south trying to cut Lee off. Never again would Lee be able to make his brilliant offensive moves. Grant's army would stay in contact until the war ended at Appomattox Court House nearly a year later.

Out of slightly over 100,000 men, Grant lost nearly 18,000 in the Wilderness; Lee lost only about 7,700 of 61,000.

The monument's Southwest face lists: *Shiloh, Nashville, Gettysburg.*

Shiloh, 6-7 April, 1862, took its name from Shiloh Church, a meeting house south-southwest of Pittsburg Landing.

Following the capture of Fort Henry and Fort Donelson, which guarded the Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers just inside the northern border of Tennessee, Grant hurried his men south up the Tennessee River to attack the railroad center at Corinth, Mississippi. The closest way to get there was to disembark the army at Pittsburg Landing and then move on Corinth to the southwest.

The high ground above the landing, around the small Shiloh Church, was found to be a superlative campground and soon Grant's forces were encamped there, utterly oblivious to the impending Confederate attack.

The South simply could not let Tennessee go without a fight since this would imperil their hold on the Mississippi above Memphis. Albert Sidney Johnston resolved to push the Yankees into the Tennessee. "Gentlemen," he told his staff prior to the battle, "tonight we will water our horses in the



Tennessee." It very nearly came out that way.

At this point in the war, commanders on both sides believed that putting soldiers into fortifications somehow reduced their fighting spirit. Accordingly, the Federal troops, with no defenses prepared, were happily boiling coffee and frying bacon in front of their tents on the lovely Sunday morning of 6 April 1862 when the Confederate hosts unexpectedly came yelling out of the woods. One of the hardest-fought battles of the war was underway.

Few men on either side had much experience at war before the battle began; this was to change quickly. The massed Confederates were soon driving the Northerners back to-

wards the bluff above Pittsburg Landing. Grant was not on the scene at first and there really wasn't much need of generalship; either the men fought or they ran. What saved the Union Army was the heroic stand by General Benjamin Prentiss along a sunken lane lying across the Confederate line of attack. One of his men's bullets even found the Confederate commander, who bled to death under a tree nearby. The confusion this caused the Southerners as P. G. T. Beauregard replaced Johnston also helped prevent a Union disaster. As daylight faded, the Confederate attacks died out. All night long additional reinforcements made it to Pittsburg landing as Grant struggled to bring in more ammunition and reorganize his shattered units.

Grant was driven out of his headquarters because it had been turned into a hospital, and he could not bear the sight of blood. He and his chief subordinate, William T. Sherman, were forced to seek refuge from the rain under a tree. Sherman observed that they had taken a "hell of a beating" and was ready to propose the possibility that they might have to retreat the next day. Grant, who was probably smoking a cigar, thought a moment and said, "Yes, but we'll whip 'em tomorrow." And that is what they did.

The Yankees lost over 13,000 out of 62,000 engaged while the Confederates lost 10,000 out of 40,000. Today, Shiloh is among the loveliest of Civil War battlefields. The Peach Orchard has been replanted and the Bloody Pond lies serene, no longer surrounded by dying men straining for one last drink while their blood stained its waters.

Nashville was fought on 15-16 December 1864, and represents the last major action in the western theater of operations.

Following his victory at Atlanta, Sherman took the Army of the Tennessee off on the celebrated "March to the Sea." "Pap" Thomas went back to Nashville with the Army of the Cumberland and Hood was left wondering what to do with the Confederate Army of Tennessee. He decided that an attack into Tennessee might deter Sherman. Thomas sent Schofield south of Nashville below the town of Franklin to delay Hood.

In a brilliant piece of work, Hood got his men behind Schofield and nearly captured the entire army at Spring Hill. But due to ter-

rible leadership and botched command on the part of the southerners, Schofield was able to escape with his army and retreat to Franklin where his men dug in. Hood was in a fury after the inexcusable fiasco at Spring Hill and drove his men right at the Yankee lines on the southern edge of Franklin.

The attack involved more men than Pickett's charge at Gettysburg, and was just as doomed. Five Confederate generals gave their lives at Franklin. Schofield marched into Nashville following the Battle of Franklin and Hood prepared to lay siege to this great Union supply base, even though his fine army was now sadly depleted.

On 15 December 1864 Thomas struck Hood. Within hours his men had smashed the southern defensive positions, and were driving Hood back towards Alabama. The losses were relatively light at Nashville. Thomas lost some 3,000 men out of nearly 50,000 engaged, while Hood's losses have been estimated at 6,000 out of 23,000.

Gettysburg, June-July, 1863, was the greatest battle ever fought in the Western Hemisphere and the high water mark of the Confederacy. When Pickett's men stumbled back from the doomed charge, the dream of Southern independence died with many of her sons on a lovely ridge in the midst of fine Pennsylvania farmland.

In early May, 1863 Lee had won a stunning

victory in the Wilderness at Chancellorsville. This is generally considered to be that great general's finest battle. Alas, it was followed two months later by his worst battle: Gettysburg.

The problem the Confederacy faced after Chancellorsville was that the Army of the Potomac would be back reinforced and re-equipped and Virginia would continue to suffer. Lee received permission to invade the North in hopes that a great victory there would convince northern public opinion that the war could not be won and that the Confederacy should be allowed to depart from the Union in peace.

As Lee's troops moved across the Potomac, through Maryland and into Pennsylvania, the Army of the Potomac was losing its old commander, Joe Hooker, and receiving a new one, George Meade. But the northern troopers kept marching to keep themselves between Lee and Washington, D.C.

Purely by chance, a unit of Lee's army (Pettigrew's brigade) met John Buford's cavalry division on the outskirts of the small Pennsylvania market town of Gettysburg. This unplanned encounter set the stage for the main battle, as both commanders began to rush reinforcements to support the units in contact. (A large number of roads intersect in the town, which made access all the easier.)



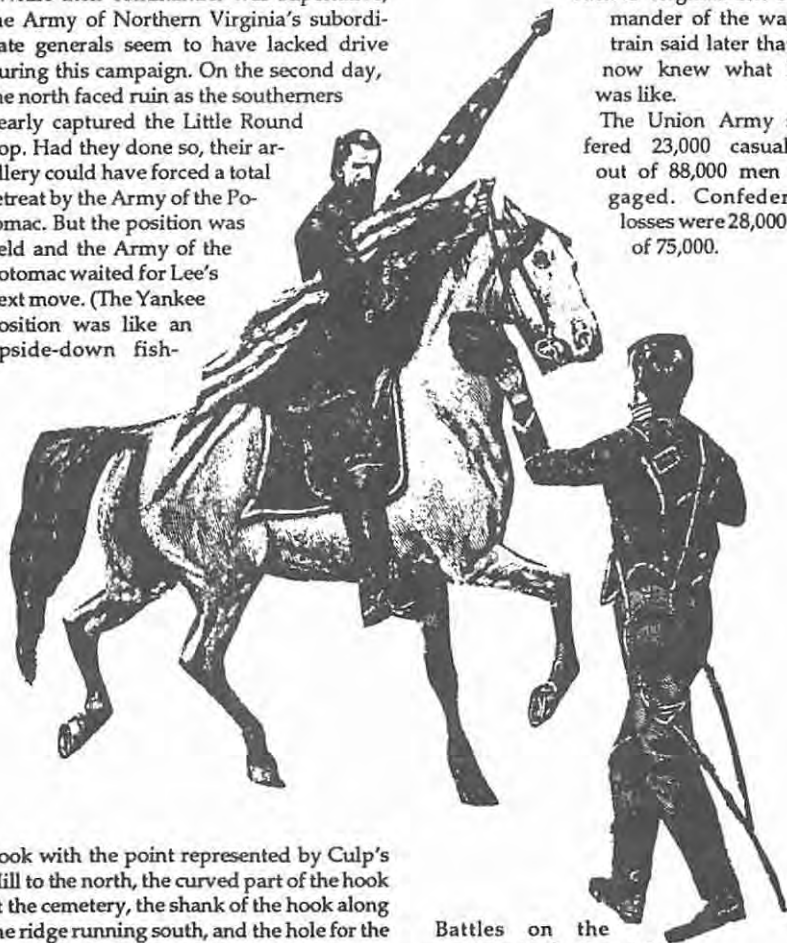
On the first day things went well for the Confederates as they pushed the outnumbered Yankee troops out of the town and onto the ridge to the south. The fine Northern General Winfield Scott Hancock reported to Meade that the Army of the Potomac should make its stand at Gettysburg, and Meade agreed, rushing all troops possible into the positions along Cemetery Ridge. No doubt Lee sorely missed the great skill and pugnacity of "Stonewall" Jackson who had been mortally wounded at Chancellorsville.

While their commander was superlative, the Army of Northern Virginia's subordinate generals seem to have lacked drive during this campaign. On the second day, the north faced ruin as the southerners nearly captured the Little Round Top. Had they done so, their artillery could have forced a total retreat by the Army of the Potomac. But the position was held and the Army of the Potomac waited for Lee's next move. (The Yankee position was like an upside-down fish-

This is what he did, sending George Pickett and 15,000 crack infantrymen against the middle of the Cemetery Ridge line. The attack failed after savage fighting and thousands of dead and wounded men littered the gentle slope after the Confederates retreated, leaving behind some 19 regimental colors. The battle was over.

Lee stayed in his position for another day, at least in part to allow his 17-mile-long wagon train of wounded a head start. No stops were allowed as the unsprung wagons jolted over the miles of rough country roads back to Virginia. The commander of the wagon train said later that he now knew what hell was like.

The Union Army suffered 23,000 casualties out of 88,000 men engaged. Confederate losses were 28,000 out of 75,000.



hook with the point represented by Culp's Hill to the north, the curved part of the hook at the cemetery, the shank of the hook along the ridge running south, and the hole for the line at the Little Round Top.)

Meade believed that, since the two attacks at the ends of the Union lines had failed, Lee would attempt to break through the center.

Battles on the monument's Southeast face:
Atlanta, Donelson, Stone River.

Atlanta took place on 22 July 1864 when

General Sherman tried to surround the city to prevent Hood from making a successful retreat. But Hood was planning to attack, not to retreat, and he struck at McPherson's Army of the Tennessee on their exposed southern flank. The fierce attack was repulsed with considerable losses. General Dodge's 16th Corps was then attacked with similar results.

Returning to his headquarters after viewing Dodge's successful defense, McPherson was shot by Confederate skirmishers from Pat Cleburne's division. McPherson's body was sent through the lines under a flag of truce and Sherman wept over his young friend's corpse. McPherson's fiancée, Emily Hoffman, spent the next year in her room mourning her lost love.

Illinois General John Logan took command of the Army of the Tennessee and led it to eventual victory. As Logan, a very popular commander, rode down the Union line, then under heavy attack, he shouted to his men, "Will you hold this line for me?" His men would chant back his nickname, "Black Jack." It is probably for this action that he is remembered in the official State Song of Illinois.

Northern losses are estimated at 3,700 out of 30,000 engaged; Confederate losses are placed at 8,000 out of nearly 37,000 in action. The fine Southern General W. J. Hardee wrote later that the Battle of Atlanta was "one of the most desperate and bloody of the war." Few authorities would dispute this view.

Fort Donelson guarded the Cumberland River a few miles below the northern border of Tennessee. Its capture by U.S. Grant was a serious blow to the Confederacy. (The monument spells this fort's name as "Donelson." Modern spelling is "Donelson.")

Roads were very poor throughout most of the U. S. in the 1860's, but they were especially bad in the rural south. Therefore, a deep river was important for transportation. Soldiers and their vast amounts of supplies could be moved rapidly. Realizing this, the Confederacy built two forts, Henry and Donelson, to prevent the Union forces from using the Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers through Tennessee.

Grant and Naval Commander Foote moved up the Tennessee in early February,

1862 and laid siege to Fort Henry. The fort had been poorly located and was nearly under water from the flooding of the Tennessee.

After a short bombardment, the fort surrendered. Grant and the Navy then moved the 10 miles east to Fort Donelson. Although this fort was much stronger than Fort Henry, the top Confederate commanders (Floyd and Pillow) were inept, and it soon became clear that they could not defend the fort for long.

After some hard fighting Pillow and Floyd escaped and General Simon B. Buckner, an old friend of Grant's from before the war, asked for terms. His former comrade replied, "No terms except immediate and unconditional surrender can be accepted." Buckner had no choice but to accept these conditions. Grant's initials ("U.S.") matched the key terms in his letter to Buckner (demanding "Unconditional Surrender"), which added greatly to Grant's increasing fame in the North.

The twin losses of Fort Henry and Fort Donelson forced the Confederates to surrender much of Tennessee. These were the first two important Union victories, and they made Grant's name a household word in the North.

Stones River was fought from 30 December 1862 to 3 January 1863 on the edge of Murfreesboro, Tennessee. (The monument gives the spelling as "Stone River.") The battle itself is odd, as both commanders, Rosecrans for the Union and Bragg for the Confederacy, planned the same attack: hold on the left and attack on the right.

The initial Southern attack was most effective. Rosecrans' line was forced far back along the Nashville Pike. At one point a Rebel attack was on the verge of success when it was shattered by the massed fire of 58 Union guns. Two Illinois regiments distinguished themselves in this battle: the 100th and the 110th.

Although it was considered to be a Confederate victory at the time, the fact that Bragg withdrew following the battle marks it as a Southern failure. Losses on the Union side were nearly 13,000 out of 41,000, while Bragg lost nearly 12,000 from some 35,000 engaged.

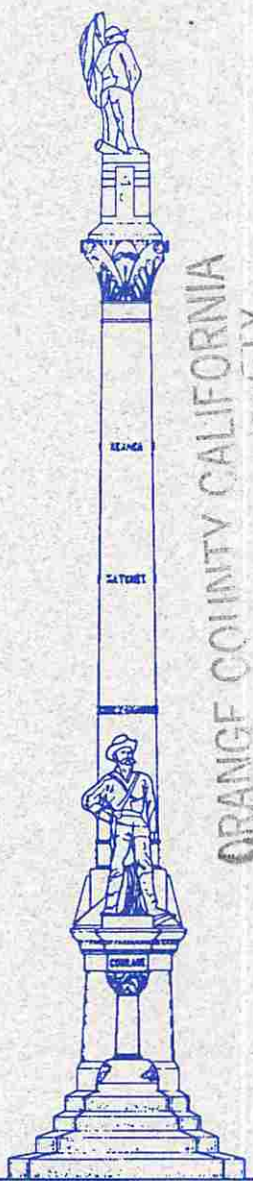
From a population of about 20,000, 1284 Carroll County men bore arms in the Civil War. Most fought under Generals Grant, Sherman, McPherson or Logan in Alabama, South Carolina, Mississippi, Georgia, or Tennessee. A few saw action against Lee in the eastern front's Army of the Potomac.

In support of Union efforts, county residents contributed over \$400,000, the equivalent of between \$2 and \$5 million, today.

The Civil War Memorial on Courthouse Square, Mount Carroll, was erected to honor those who fought and those who gave their lives. Made of barre granite, the monument was constructed at a cost of \$6,000.

Noted artist Lorado Taft carved the cavalryman that faces Market Street. An infantryman faces Main Street, and a standard bearer tops the monument, 50 feet above the ground. The annex, reportedly unique, was constructed to record more names.

The monument was dedicated on Sunday, October 6, 1891 at 2 p.m. and rededicated exactly 100 years later.
