## Mortality Schedules

Almost all genealogists have used the federal census population schedules. Yet far fewer pay any attention to mortality schedules also compiled by the U. S. Census bureau.

In 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1880, enumerators compiled lists of those who died in their census district in the preceding 12 months (from the date of the census back to the same date the previous year.)

Llike the population schedules these mortality llists were compiled on a geographic basis. Virtually all of these schedules have now been indexed.


The original copies were not kept by the National

Archives, but were sent to regional repositories.
However, the National Archives has made an effort to acquire copies of the schedules, and are available from the National Archives as well as the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Locally one can get them through Family History Center.

## Former Ottawa Woman To Sell Lincoln Paper

The original manuscript of Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg address was offered for sale in Springfield today by Attorney Robert Johnson, as agent for the owner, Mrs. Margaret O'Herron of Streator, a former Ottawa resident.

Mrs. O'Herron produced as authenticating documents a sheaf of letters written her by the late Robert T. Lincoln, son of the emancipator. She said Lincoln's friendship for her father T.B. Keegan of Ottawa at whose home Lincoln was snowbound while a circuit rider, was responsible for the gift of the manuscript to her by his son.

Robert Lincoln, she said, called on her at her millinery shop in 1912 and left the manuscript framed, together with Robert Lincoln's favorite portrait of his father. He also left a key made by Lincoln, she said, and a fork which Robert Lincoln had used in the Civil war, as part of his mess kit.

The manuscript is in good condition and according to the story Robert Lincoln told her, she said, was left behind at the White House when Lincoln went to deliver the address. Instead he rewrote it on a scrap of wrapping paper on the train.

One of our members visited the Lincoln Library and took a copy of this article with her, Jenan got this letter in response.

August 5, 2005

Dear Jenan Jobst.

I have never heard of Robert Todd Lincoln giving a copy of the Gettysburg Address to T.B. Keegan before. In fact, he never had any to give away since none were in his father's papers. We have Robert's papers and nothing in them would support the claim made by Mrs. O'Herron in the August 6, 1932 article in the Daily Republican Times. By this time, all but two authentic copies were in institutions. The two in private hands since have been purchased by institutions but Mrs. O'Herron was not the owner of either copy. Has anyone in Ottawa ever seen her copy? Were photographs of it ever made? If so, I would be interested in receiving whatever additional information you might provide.

## MANLIUS' GREATEST MAN Dwight W. Sabin, Who was Elected United **States Senator After Removal** To Minnesota

In its efforts to secure for use of historians of the future the record of prominent citizens of the township, the Manlius Township Historical Society, of which Geo. L. Davison, of Seneca, is the historian, it has been believed that the most noted citizen of the township was Dwight M. Sabin, who afterwards removed to Minnesota, from which state he was elected a U.S. Senator. Recently in response to a letter received at Morris, which is printed below, the Morris Herald, through its city editor, John M. Nicholson, obtained and printed facts in connection with Senator Sabin and heirs which throw much light on early history in Manlius township that it is believed is of much present and future worth to the residents of this locality. The correspondence and replies are hereby given:

Norwich, Conn., June 11 1907

Town Clerk, Morris, Grundy County, Illinois.

Dear Sir: I am informed that Joseph Dyke died in your town about 1874, leaving three children, Abby Dyke, Milly Dyke and Arba Joe Dyke.

I feel confident that said Joseph Dyke was the son of James Dyke and Mary Sabin.

Any living descendants of Mary Sabin are entitled to a share in au estate the heirs to which I have been duly appointed to locate. Hence I am anxious to get in communication with any of her living descendants, and would like to know all that your town records reveal relative to them. Will you kindly fill, as far as you records enable you, tabulated list below, and return to me promptly, with your charge for such search, and I will remit as soon as I know the amount.

The search by the Herald for the heirs of Mary Sabin, in response to the request above, has been rewarded by the finding of most of the heirs and securing of the history of the Sabin family Old residents of both Grundy and LaSalle county have contributed much information, with the result that the connecting links are practically complete.

#### History of Family

Mary Sabin was the daughter of a prominent and very wealthy manufacturer of Connecticut and was born in 1801. She fell in love with and married James Dyke, decidedly against the wishes of her father. Mr. and Mrs. James Dyke moved to Illinois in the early days, settling in LaSalle county, Manlius township, adjoining Nettle Creek and Erienna townships in this county.

They were the parents of six children, Henrietta, Orman or Armond, Luellyn, Claricy, Eunice and Joseph, the latter becoming a resident of Morris. Henrietta, Luellyn and Orman died without heirs, of consumption, and are buried in the Brumbach cemetery two miles north of Marseilles, where the bodies of their parents also rest. Mary Sabin-Dyke also died of consumption, contracted, it was said, by caring for her children. She was a woman of refluement

and education, very stately in appearance. Her husband was killed by a falling tree on the farm now owned by L.M. Butterfield, where the family then resided.

CHIE

Carley Dyke married Carlos Clark, son of Squire Dolphus Clark, one of the pioneers of LaSalle county. Four children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Clark, Dolphus, Carlos, Lee and Eunice. Lee and Eunice died without heirs. Dolphus and Carlos, together with their father, survive, and are residents of Omaha, Nebr. Mrs. Carlos Clark is buried in Bates county, Mo.

Eunice, the other daughter of Mary Sabin-Dyke, and a famous beauty, married Percy Baker. They moved away from Manlius township many years ago to St. Paul or Minneapolis. Two daughters were born and it may be they are alive. The mother, however, has long since passed away.

### Joseph Dyke and Family

Joseph Dyke, the only son of Mary Sabin-Dyke who reached manhood, was twice married. His first wife was Hannah Longhead and his second wife was her sister, Margaret Longhead, to whom he was married in Grundy county in 1856. the children were by the first wife and they were Abby, Milly and Arba Joe Dyke, whom the attorney at Norwich, Conn., specially mentions. The Rev. James Longhead, who married Joseph Dyke and Margaret Dyke, and who was the first congregational minister in Morris, was a brother of the bride. Joseph Dyke, who died in Dwight in 1874, is buried in the Longhead cemetery in Nettle Creek township.

Abby Dyke married George Chapin and Milly Dyke married George Sawyer. They took up their residence in Indiana. Abby died of consumption. She had one child but it died. Milly Dyke-Sawyer is residing near Forseman, Ind., six miles from Goodland and is in good circumstances. The Sawyers formerly resided near Holderman's grove. They have several children.

Arba Joe Dyke went to Texas and became a cowboy. Nothing was ever heard of him except once when he got a broken leg, and wrote to his sister. Milly.

#### Fortune 90 Years Old

The residents of Manlius who were neighbors of the Dyke's heard of the Sabin fortune in Connecticut sixty years ago. The late United States Senator Dwight Sabin's father, who was a brother of Mary Sabin, was also a resident of Manlius township, Dwight being born there. Sixty years ago Dwight and his father went back to Connecticut, and as they branched out on a large scale a short time afterwards, it was supposed that they secured the fortune, which consisted of cotton mills and other large interests.

Dwight Sabin later went to Minnesota, where he was elected to the U.S. senate. He was twice married, but died a few years ago without heirs. It is possible that he and his father did not get the estate of Mary Sabin's father.

Dwight Sabin had a brother, Jude, who married Florence Card, daughter of Dr. Card, formerly of Ottawa, but later of Aurora. Jude is dead. He had one daughter, but it is not known if she is living.
