Self-Guided Tour of Riverview Cemetery

HISTORY OF RIVERVIEW CEMETERY. Streator was incorporated as a village in 1868. In 1870, a small group of public-spirited citizens met to discuss the need for a permanent and convenient burial ground. A cemetery association was formed in July, 1870, and a fund was started to pay the expenses. Thirty acres were selected three-fourths of a mile west of town. The cemetery was called RIVERWOOD. By March, 1873, debts had accumulated and had to be guaranteed by the officers. In 1874, because of increased indebtedness, there was discussion of abandoning the project. Fawcett Plumb (#17) assumed all of the debts and other obligations of the Association and assured the continued operation and maintenance of the cemetery. In return, he was given title to the cemetery property.

In 1874, the Association filed for incorporation with the Secretary of State. The wooded acres were completely platted, landscaped, and developed. In 1906, 11 additional acres were purchased. In 1909, the owners-stockholders transferred their ownership of the unsold portions, without cost, to a non-profit association. The name was then changed to RIVERVIEW. In 1931, and additional 15 acres were purchased, and 4 more acres were added in 1996, resulting in a total of 60 acres. (Riverview Cemetery booklet)

1. BARR MEMORIAL BUILDING. In the will of the late Cary C. Barr (#23) a bequest was provided to Riverview Cemetery for \$40,000 to be used to erect a memorial to his wife, Mary Urban Barr. The memorial chapel and administration building were dedicated in 1932. There is a chapel with seating for 100 people, as well as offices and additional rooms. Concrete receiving vaults were built beneath the chapel and a hoist was installed to raise caskets from the vault area to the chapel. (Riverview Cemetery booklet)

- 2. SARAH HOWE 1796 1876 Block 22 Row 18. The earliest birth found in the records is Sarah, born some 76 years before the cemetery was formed. The plot of the Howe family includes Sarah's son, William, 1839-1914; William's wife, E. 1849-1915; their son Willie, 1871-1872; and their daughter, C. Pearl, 1882-1890.
- 3. ANDREW H. (ANDY) ANDERSON 1864 -1959 Block 22 Row 8. Born in Pennsylvania, Andy's family moved to Illinois when he was a lad. He attended school until age 13. At age 13 he came to Streator and worked in the coal mines. At age 20 he started working in the printing business. In 1891, at age 27, he opened his own business, Anderson Printing Co. Although at first his business struggled, he managed to turn it into a very successful endeavor.

As an avid golfer, Mr. Anderson played a role in the formation of the Country Club. He also proposed that the buildings at the fairgrounds on North Bloomington St. be replaced and a community golf course and recreation center be developed. A nine-hole golf course, two clay tennis courts, a baseball diamond, a club house and a football field were built at his expense. Two hundred trees were planted. Its opening was July 5, 1925. The nine hole golf course stands today, know as Anderson Field. (Story of Streator p. 97-99. Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976. p. 23.)

- 4. **JENKINS MAUSOLEUM** Block 26 Row 16. This mausoleum was built by Mrs. Edward Jenkins. A Times-Press article stated, "The windows were of cathedral glass and doors of bronze through which 6 crypts are seen within." The exterior is pink marble from Minnesota. It contains Edward, 1855 1925; and Elizabeth, 1854 1943. Mr. Jenkins had built a two-story brick building at 417 E. Main, which was a grocery store in the early 1900's. It is now the site of Bliss Plumbing. (Reed)
- 5. **JOHN H. CAMPBELL** 1845 1937. Block 20 Row 19. John Campbell was Streator's last surviving Civil War Veteran, serving in the 104th Illinois Volunteer Infantry. He had marched with Sherman from Atlanta to the Sea. He was also the last surviving member of Grand Army of the Republic Post # 68 which he helped organize in 1879. During his lifetime in Streator he was an employee of Powers Hardware, later known as Williams Hardware. (Charles Williams # 30). There was never a parade

in Streator without him! When he no longer was able to march, he was provided a special place on a float or in a lead vehicle. He conducted the services at the grave sites of former comrades. The last one at which he presided was that of Lyston D. Howe (#22) in January, 1937. His last ritual at the G. A. R. site was May 30, 1937.

He died August 31, 1937, at age 92. His headstone is a small, white, curved-top stone issued by the federal government for deceased veterans. There are many of these throughout the cemetery. (Tiffany)

- 6. FRANK A. SCHARFENBERG 1899 1983 Block 16 Row 7. Frank ran Scharfenbergs', a men's clothing store at 201 E. Main Street, for 44 years. During and after World War II, he wrote to people in the armed forces. He created the column "A Letter From Home", (later entitled "Streator Sidelights") in the Streator newspaper, telling only "good news". In total 1,150 columns were printed, the last being on Feb. 7, 1966. He was highly praised for more than 21,000 letters and columns mailed. His scrapbooks are at the Historical Society. (Streatorland Historical Society)
- 7. ARTHUR H. SHAY 1872 1947 Block 35 Row 5. Mr. Shay was a famous trial lawyer, beginning his practice in 1891. In 1927, he was chief counsel for the defense for Harry Hill, who was accused of the murder of his mother. (Story of Streator, p. 162. Biography in Black, p.134)
- 8. WILLIAM J. SOWERS 1869 1967 Block 35 Row 7. As a young man, he attended a musical institute in Ohio. He studied cornet and violin for five years, having numerous extra jobs. In 1896, he was invited to teach at a conservatory of music on Main St. in Streator. He also ran a music and jewelry store. Many young musicians received encouragement from Mr. Sowers. He became director of Illinois State Band. In 1925, he suggested that Streator High School organize a band. In 1940, he encouraged the start of a grade school band. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976. p. 4.)
- 9. FRED J. HART 1906 1983 Block 35 Row 2. Fred Hart was City Clerk (1934-1938), LaSalle County Treasurer (1938-1942), state Representative (1942-1950), and state Senator (1950-1966). Senator Hart introduced to the Senate the original measure that the state adopt the slogan "Land of Lincoln." This measure became official May 17, 1955. The motto appears on all Illinois license plates. (Bruce F. Hart)

- 10. THURLOW GAULT ESSINGTON 1886 1964 Block 18 Row 7. Mr. Essington was born in Streator, graduating from Streator High School in 1903. After college and law school, he returned to Streator and opened a law office with Paul B. Heflin. He served as city attorney, 1913-1917, and then served as mayor for one term. He became a state senator in 1918. He was the Republican nominee for governor in 1924. (Streator Times-Press Dec. 21, 1964, obituary.)
- 11. WALTER REEVES 1848 1909. Block 18, Row 6. His family came to Illinois when he was 8 years old, settling in the Odell area. He became a lawyer at age 27, practicing law in Streator. In 1894 he was elected to United States Congress as a representative, returning to Congress for three more terms. After retiring from public office, he became part of the law firm of Reeves and Boys. (#13) He was a leading lawyer in LaSalle Co. and much respected for his appearances before the Supreme Court. (Story of Streator, p. 46; 125 Years, A Celebration, p. 9; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 17; Tiffany)

- 12. MARIETTA REEVES 1845-1926. The widow of Walter Reeves, Mrs. Reeves made a donation of \$5000 to purchase the land for the YMCA building at the corner of Monroe and Bridge Streets in memory of her husband. She promised another \$25,000 to construct the building if the community would contribute a like amount. Completed in 1914, the building served the community for 62 years. Money is still being received by the Streator YM-YWCA from a bequest on her behalf. (Tiffany)
- 13. WILLIAM H. BOYS 1862 1933 Block 18 Row 4. Mr. Boys was Streator's fifth mayor, serving from 1891 to 1893. As mayor, he "broke up public gambling and caused the sports to hide their gambling devices and keep them under cover during his administration." He got an ordinance through the council giving the mayor the power to revoke licenses, and he did revoke several saloon-keepers' licenses. In 1891 the law practice of Reeves & Boys was formed with attorney Walter Reeves. (#11) One can only assume Boys St. is named for him. (Story of Streator, p 83)

The PLUMB FAMILIES' GRAVE SITES are located in Block 17. The Plumb families have contributed to this community throughout the years. The Plumb name has graced buildings that no longer exist, such as The Plumb Hotel, Plumb Opera House and Theater, Plumb School, Plumb Brick Co., as well as the street named Plumb. Our city park, high school and Carnegie Library were the result of Plumb efforts.

- 14. SAMUEL PLUMB 1812 1882 Block 17 Lot 75. Col. Ralph Plumb's brother Samuel Plumb, his wife Levancia, and family are in one part of Block 17. Samuel moved to Streator in 1869. He set up his own private bank, the Bank of Streator, (Streator's first bank) which in 1874 he changed to a national bank, Union National Bank. Upon his death, his wife Levancia became president of the bank. It was Samuel Plumb who, in 1870, called together a group to discuss the plan of forming a cemetery association. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 15; Biography in Black, p. 34; Riverview Cemetery booklet)
- 15. **PIRKEY** monument. Block 17 Lot 70. Between the grave sites of the Samuel Plumb and Ralph Plumb families, there is a bronze monument bearing the name Pirkey. It has the label "Detroit Bronze Company, Detroit, Michigan." There are also bronze markers for twins Clarence Oval, 1874 1878, and Bessie Euva, 1874 1875. (Tiffany)

Note: A bronze monument for David N. Hepler (1864-1886) is in Block 4. There are several smaller bronze markers in other areas.

16. COL. RALPH PLUMB 1816 - 1903 Block 17 Lot 60. Streator owes its early survival and much of its early success and growth to Col. Ralph Plumb. He was born in Busti, New York. He served on Gen. Garfield's staff during the Civil War. Following the war, he came to the village of Unionville in January, 1866. Investing money furnished by Dr. Worthy Streator, Col. Plumb was part of a group of businessmen who formed the Vermillion Coal Co. He headed the operations. He opened mines, platted the town, and later built several hundred miles of railroad to connect Streator with the outside world.

He built a high school in Streator at a cost of \$35,000, and donated it to the town. He erected an opera house and established the Streator National Bank. He was Streator's first mayor. He was elected

representative in Congress in 1884, and then again in 1886. According to information received by the Streatorland Historical Society, Col. Plumb's father, Theron Plumb, was a brother to Dr. Streator's mother, Clarina Plumb, making Dr. Streator and Col. Plumb first cousins.


Next to Col. Plumb is the grave of his wife, Marilla, after whom he named the park northeast of Streator. Other family members are buried there as well. None of these headstones have dates on them. The central monument is probably the tallest stone in the cemetery. (Story of Streator, p 45; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976. p. 2)

- 17. FAWCETT PLUMB 1834 1919. Block 17 Lot 60, with Col. Ralph Plumb site. Coming to Streator in 1868, Fawcett Plumb served as private secretary to his uncle, Col. Ralph Plumb. He originally owned most of the land that made up early Streator. He laid the town out in additions, blocks, and lots. He gave land and money to help new industries come to Streator, including the clay brick and glass industries. He became president of Streator National Bank, owner of the Plumb Opera House, president of the Streator Paving Brick Company and was actively involved in real estate in Streator. In 1872 he was elected to the state senate as an independent, serving four years. (Story of Streator, p. 45; 125 Years, A Celebration, p. 9; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p.22.)
- 18. **JOHN C. AMES** 1852 1922 and Minerva Ross Ames (#19) gravesite is north of Col. Plumb, in Block 17 Lot 54. John was Streator's 2nd mayor from 1885 to 1889, succeeding Col. Ralph Plumb. He was appointed President of Illinois Michigan Canal Commission. In 1878, he founded J. C. Ames Lumber Co. He served as president of Union National Bank. (Story of Streator, p 82)



19. MINERVA ROSS AMES 1853 - 1929 worked on a committee that persuaded the Illinois State Legislature to purchase land that became Starved Rock State Park. She served in the Daughters of the American Revolution from 1901 to 1928. A bronze plaque at her gravesite says she was State DAR Regent of Illinois, 1909 - 1911, and Vice President General, 1913 - 1914. (Reed)

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- 20. MILO J. LUTHER 1835 1910 Block 17 Lot 56. He was born in Allegheny County, New York. Coming to Streator at 31 years old, Milo Luther supervised laying of rails for a branch railroad line from Wenona to what was then Unionville. He established a coal company. His invention of a practical coal washer was probably his greatest contribution to the industrial prosperity of the community. Luther invested in coal mines and gold mines in all parts of the United States, and was able to acquire a large amount of wealth during his life. The fountain on the south side of the city park is in his memory. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 18.)
- 21. WILLIAM W. BEAN 1844 1935 Block 17 Lot 46. He was born in New York. At the outbreak of the Civil War, he ran away from home to serve in the war. After the war, he moved to Illinois, and to Streator in 1870. He purchased the Monitor newspaper, changing it from a weekly to daily newspaper in 1882. The building at 126 S. Sterling bears his name.

William Bean was elected mayor of Streator three times. Bean was mayor at the time of the LaFayette bridge scandal. A contract to build the bridge was awarded against the mayor's protest. The bridge proved to be inferior, and Bean refused to make payment for it. The high courts decided in favor of the city. Some alderman were found guilty of bribery. The bridge was removed and the company went bankrupt. Mayor Bean was greatly praised for his courage and honesty, receiving a gold watch on Nov. 6, 1901, in appreciation. He also served as town clerk, supervisor and county board member. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 23.)

22. LYSTON D. HOWE 1850 - 1937. Block 17 Lot 26. As a drummer in the Civil War, Howe was noted as being the youngest man to ever receive the U. S. Medal of Honor for carrying ammunition under fire at Vicksburg. He may have been the youngest soldier to serve in the Civil War. He left his home in Waukegan with a group of musicians bound for the Missouri Campaign when he was 10 years, 9 months, and 9 days old. He was a drummer boy, the only boy in the outfit. During the first year he developed rheumatism and could not keep up with the others as they marched. He was discharged on June 5, 1861. At age 11, he was determined to be a soldier, and on Feb. 5, 1862, he became a private in Co. B 55th. Illinois Infantry. At age 13, he was captured during Sherman's March into Georgia, but managed to escape.

At age 14, when the war ended, he returned to Waukegan. He became a railroader. Later he worked in the mines and became a mine superintendent. He originated a coal-washing process which he moved to several locations. After moving to Streator, he was tax assessor for Bruce Township for many years. Howe died in 1937. A veteran's headstone marks his grave. Another, larger stone also marks the grave, and includes his wife, Marion S., 1853 - 1932. His hat and sword are at the Streatorland Historical Society. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 12; Tiffany)

23. CARY C. BARR 1851-1931. MARY URBAN BARR 1852-1914 Block 16 Row 12. Cary Barr was born in White Co., Indiana. He came to Streator when he was 41, attracted by the railroads which were here. He invested in the clay deposits and acquired 100 acres of land in the south part of town. He went on to produce building and paving bricks of high quality. He saw the future for the use of paving bricks as the automobile came into the transportation scene.

Barr Clay Company began in 1892 and continued as such until 1923. Some of the structures made with Barr brick included the Civic Opera House and Palmer House Hotel in Chicago. Some bricks were shipped to Panama to be used in connection with the building of the Panama Canal. Many streets in Streator were paved with Barr bricks. Some streets still remain. His early interest in railroads led to his involvement in Streator's streetcar system. He was a Trustee of Riverview Cemetery Association. Funds were acquired from a bequest by him to build the Mary Urban Barr Memorial Building (#1) at Riverview Cemetery in memory of his wife. (Story of Streator, p 49; Tiffany)

24. **GEORGE "HONEY BOY" EVANS** 1870-1915. Block 16 Circle West Row 5. He first appeared in amateur theatricals, then joined a Minstrels' group in Chicago in 1892. Evans was a composer of songs and monologues. He authored the immensely popular song "In the Good Old Summer Time." He was the outstanding black-face comedian of his day, touring until his death at age 45, supposedly from complications of a ruptured spleen when hit by a baseball. (Some sources stated he died of cancer.) A memorial to Evans is at the Streator Elks Lodge, where he was a member. (125 Years, A Celebration, p. 11; Mar. '93 Unionville Dispatch; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p 22; Biography in Black, p. 68-9)

25. FRED H. RENZ 1887 - 1964 Block 16 Row 30. Mr. Renz. graduated from Streator High School in 1906. He then took special courses on development of mines. In 1909 and 1910, he had charge of the construction of the bridge across the Vermillion River on Bridge Street. Mayor W. W. Bean first appointed Mr. Renz city engineer in 1911, serving until 1962. He played a part in planning and development of most mines in Streator, as well as surrounding areas. In 1915 he acquired full rights to an engineering firm for whom he had been a partner. At that time the city had no maps or records of street lines, sewers or other facilities. He spent almost two years preparing maps and designs. By 1918-19, he had a complete topographical survey of all that lay above the earth, as well as below. He devised a way by which storm water could be drained into the abandoned mines, thus eliminating much flooding of basements. This saved the city over \$300,000 at the time. At that time, Streator was one of only two cities in the United States which employed underground caverns to utilize this system.

Mr. Renz planned and designed the Prairie Creek sewer system. This took in the entire north section of the city north of LaRue Street. He worked on bridges, both in and out of the city, sewerage lines, and other government-financed improvements. During the 1930's he planned and supervised the building of 16 miles of street resurfacing. As far as is known, Renz had the longest record of service to the city in its history. (Streator Times Press article at Streatorland Historical Society.)

26. ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC **VETERANS'** GRAND MONUMENT. Block 4. A large burial plot was provided by the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) for burial of veterans of previous wars who had no private burial lots. It was dedicated on Memorial Day, May 30, 1914, and is inscribed "To Our Country's Heroes." There are 30 veterans' markers, none of which contains dates of birth or death. The monument has a statue of a soldier that is in all probability wearing a Spanish-American War uniform. Memorial Day services were held at this memorial until the 1960's. In the early 1940's, an area across the road, southeast from the G. A. R. plot, was set aside for burial of service people. These stones are at ground level. This area is now filled. (Riverview Cemetery booklet, 125 Years, A Celebration, p. 43)

- 27. EDWARD C. KLINE 1873 1953. Block 33 Row 12. He was an outstanding gardener who crossbred asparagus, domesticating it and improving its quality. He studied the nature of the plant, determining its food and soil needs, and its diseases. At one time Streator was the only place you could obtain edible asparagus. At a time when the great asparagus plague moved across the country, he managed to immunize his own beds by inoculating them with seeds of plants already infected. This saved his plants, while others perished. He also developed "bib lettuce" and invented the portable greenhouse. His fields were where Engle Lane Theatre now stands. (The Story of Streator, p. 140; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976; Tiffany)
- 28. CONSTANCE KLINE ENGLE 1900 1986 Block 33 Row 14. She was the daughter of Edward Kline and donor of the land for Engle Lane Theater and Knox Estates. She made an impact on the community by bringing Girl Scouts to Streator and organizing the first Brownie troop. She served on the Boards of Directors of the YMCA, Salvation Army, United Fund, Streator Clay Pipe Company and on the first St. Mary's Hospital Auxiliary Board. (Streator Times-Press Sept. 15, 1986, obituary)
- 29. **DR. THERESA KLINE JENNINGS** 1867 1944 Block 2 Row 2. (N. of road) Dr. Jennings lived on Coalville Road as a child. After high school, she married a physician, Dr. M. B. Jennings. His work interested her and she enrolled at Dunham Medical College, Chicago, in 1901. Being one of the first female students, she was resented and ridiculed by the male students. Hazing was common, and she was subjected to may unpleasant incidents. She was described as "a lady of strong convictions" and was named valediction of her class.

She and her husband opened offices in the 200 block of E. Main Street. Specializing in pediatrics and diseases of women, she opened free medical clinics in Streator and advised mothers and pregnant women on such matters as diet and child care. She served 14 years as city physician. As health officer, she inspected restaurants, demanding sanitation at all times. She was the sister of Edward C. Kline (# 27) (Streator Times Press, June 29, 1976, p. 16.)

- 30. CHARLES H. WILLIAMS 1865 1937 Block 36 Row 1. Mr. Williams moved to Streator from his father's farm about 10 miles NW of Streator in 1885. He started as clerk in Powers Hardware Store, then part owner of Powers & Williams and sole proprietor in 1904. The store became Williams Hardware Company in 1912, moving into its "new" location at 115 S. Vermillion St. at that time. It was known as the "largest hardware store in Illinois." The store was destroyed by fire in 1958. The Williams Storage Building at 128 S. Sterling St. still stands.
- Mr. Williams served as president of the Illinois Retail Hardware Association, and later president of the National Retail Hardware Association. He served on the school board, Union National Bank Board of Directors, and trustee of Riverview Cemetery Association. (Story of Streator, p 125; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 14; Biography in Black, p.43)
- 31. JOHN E. WILLIAMS 1853-1919. Block 2 Row 6. Born in Wales, he came to America in 1864 and soon settled in Streator where he worked as a miner for 15 years. He became the secretary of the first labor union in Streator. In 1910, years after he left mining, he became an arbitrator in a dispute between the Illinois Coal Operators and United Mine Workers of Illinois. After the Cherry Mine disaster on November 13, 1909, Mr. Williams won national recognition for negotiations on behalf of the survivors of the 259 miners killed. A number of victims of the Cherry Mine disaster are interred at Riverview. (125 Years, A Celebration, p.10; Story of Streator, p. 54; Times-Press, June 29, 1976; Biography in Black, p.100; Tiffany)
- 32. LYSTON D. HOWE, M.D. 1880 1942 .Block 37 Row 3. The son of Lyston D. Howe (#22, youngest soldier of the Civil War), was born in Streator. After attending local schools, he went on to become a physician. He was physician for the St. Paul Coal Company in Cherry, Illinois, in 1909 when the mining disaster occurred, causing the loss of 259 lives. As a member of the rescuing party that went down into the fiery mine, Dr. Howe was honored as a hero. In 1910, following the disaster, he began a medical practice in Streator, continuing until his death. (Story of Streator, p. 156)

- 33. **REUBEN G. SODERSTROM** 1888-1970. Block 39 Row 7. He was State Representative from 1916 to 1936. He was a foremost labor leader in the State of Illinois He served with the Illinois State Federation of Labor for 40 years, being elected president in 1930. With the merger of AFL-CIO unions, he became the president in 1958. He held that position until his death. (125 Years, A Celebration, p. 9)
- 34. CEPHAS WILLIAMS 1904 1969. Block 40 Row 8. A construction contractor, his highway construction projects were widely known in Illinois. Locally, he developed Oak Hills subdivision and Westgate Plaza. The Cephas Williams Award is presented annually by the Streator Area Chamber of Commerce to individuals who have invested money back into the community. (Streator Times-Press, May 20, 1969, obituary)
- 35. JOHN R. FORNOF 1889 1978 Block 40, Row 8. He started his newspaper career in 1910 as a reporter with the Free Press, predecessor of the Times-Press. He was publisher when it consolidated with the Independent Times to become the Times-Press, later becoming president. He organized and was president of St. Mary's Hospital Board. During World War II, he headed Red Cross Finance campaigns. He was elected, statewide, to serve on the U. of Illinois Board of Trustees, 1941-1953. He was trustee and president of Riverview Cemetery Association, director of Union National Bank, First Federal Savings and Loan Association, Citizen's Loan and Finance Company, and Stevens News Agency. He served as Streator postmaster from 1921 to 1927. He was active on the YMCA board, Rotary Club, Elks Lodge, Streator Country Club, and Salvation Army Board. Fornof Manor was named in his honor in 1977. He is the son of John W. Fornof. (#38) (Times-Press, March 23, 1978, obituary)
- 36. A plaque to honor **LESLIE G. WOODS** 1900 1917, is at the grave site of his parents Martin D. 1871-1923 and Henrietta Woods 1867-1945. Block 6 Row 22. The Streator American Legion post is named after Leslie G. Woods, who was killed in France Sept. 6, 1917. As a member of the hospital corps, he was one of the first Americans to land in France. He

and three other Americans were the first killed in World War I in a German bombing raid. He was the first soldier from Streator to be killed in that war. His obituary in the Streator Times-Press stated that he would be interred at Riverview at a later date. According to local veterans' groups, he is buried in Flanders Field, France. The American Legion Post placed the memorial to Leslie G. Woods at this site on Memorial Day, 2000. There is a veteran's headstone for Martin Woods at this site, as well. (Biography in Black, p. 111; Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p.18; Streatorland Historical Society)

- 37. **JOHN J. KMETZ** 1898 1928 Block 6 Row 20. The stone is in the shape of a tiered cake. It says, "Carnation: Master baker. Post graduate of Siebels, Lamberts and Fleishmann Schools. His work lives forever."
- 38. **JOHN W. FORNOF** 1855 1921 Block 12 Row 23. The Free Press (which became the Times-Press in 1927) was founded in 1873. Several men, including Mr. Fornof, were responsible for its early development. He was co-publisher in 1884 and became sole owner in 1897. Mr. Fornof was interested in politics, helping a number of candidates to be elected to various offices. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p.3; August 15, 1921)
- 39. **JOSIAH O'NEIL** 1835 1889 Block 9 Row 11. O'Neil came to Streator at age 2, living on the family farm on Spring Lake Road. At age 24, being Streator's first blacksmith, he built a house and blacksmith shop at the top of the rise above the Vermillion River ford, now Water Street. His buildings were the first in what was to become Hardscrabble. His brother John joined him in the business. (It was John who named the settlement "Hardscrabble".) Josiah remained as a blacksmith for almost 30 years. He saw the development from settlement to incorporated village of Unionville in 1865 and then the incorporation of the village of Streator in 1868. His son, Warren, was the first child born in Hardscrabble.

Mr. O'Neil provided dentistry to many residents, as trained dentists were not available. He also served as fire chief, fighting the many fires that often broke out. As the community grew, he became more influential. He was elected village trustee and later alderman of his ward. O'Neil was a charter member of the first Masonic Lodge, holding high degrees in that organization. (Streator Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p. 7)

- 40. CLARA MAY RAND Block 1 Row 25. Her stone is in the shape of a tree stump with a bonnet and shoe along the base. Her stone states, "Died Sep. 2, 1889. 12 Ys. 28 Ds." The Sept. 17, 1889, (page 3) Free Press stated she died of diphtheria Monday, Sept. 16, 1889, at age 12. Her parents were George B. & Mary M. (Legend has been that she drowned and her hat was found along the bank near a tree, thus her stone.) (Reed)
- 41. **ROBERT LITHGOW** Block 1N, Row 18. Dying in 1872, he was possibly the first to be buried at Riverview Cemetery.
- 42. MATTHEW W. JACK 1851 1924 Mausoleum near Block 11. Matthew "Matt" Jack was born in Pennsylvania. He came to Streator as a carpenter. He was employed by Overholt and Holmes grocery and general store; later he studied law. He became superintendent of the Streator Bottle and Glass Co. in about 1881. His trade relations with Adolphus Busch, (founder of Anheiser Busch Brewing Co,) led to the success of the glass industry in Streator. When the company became a part of the American Bottle Co., he served as president. It was later sold to Owens-Illinois Glass.

There are seven buried in the mausoleum. They are, in addition to Matthew, Ella (Jennings) 1856 -1930; Ralph William 1875 -1878; infant daughter 1877 - 1877; Lewis Clark 1880 - 1921; Chester 1889 - 1963: and Mildred P. 1890 - 1968. Legend has it that Mr. Jack's will provided money to have floral bouquets continuously hung on the mausoleum door. (Story of Streator, p. 47; Times-Press, June 29, 1976, p.13; Tiffany)

FOUR MILE GROVE CEMETERY PRAIRIE PROJECT by Alyssa Rod

On June 7, 1856, the Four Mile Grove Cemetery Association received a deed from William and Catherine Dowling for 1 2/5 acres. The association paid \$10.00 for the land

One-half of the area was plotted into 75 lots. The lots were sold for \$3.00 each and 60 lots were sold.

It is not a private cemetery. Most of the people buried there are early pioneers of the area. The last burial in the cemetery was in 1962.

In 1968 the unused north part was dedicated as an outstanding example of virgin prairie which contains 12 or more rare species of plants. The request was made by the Earlville Garden Club.

Robert Betz (Northeastern Illinois University) and Watson Bartlett managed the area for several years. In 1969, the prairie area was designated to be preserved and managed as a memorial to the settlers buried here. It is preserved by the Prairie Preservation Society, c/o Northeastern Illinois University, Chicago.

This year the Natural Area Guardians have helped clear the sumac from the area. This was taken care of by Bartlett until he died and the area was left to become overgrown.

My 4-H project this year was based on Four Mile Grove Cemetery Prairie to show what we have been doing in the past year(including pictures of all the plants coming up in the area). I have found species I have not seen before. Fall 1994 StW Cons.

On June 7, 1856, Four Mile Grove Cemetery Association received a deed from William & Catherine Dowling for 1 & 2/5 acres for which the Assoc. paid \$10.00. Out of the plotted 75 lots, 60 lots were sold for \$3.00 each. Contrary to the belief of some Merident Twsp. citizens today, the cemetery was never a private cemetery. Members of the Assoc. donated each year to the care of the cemetery. Between 1917 and 1923 a cemetery fund of \$1383 was given by 25 persons and those funds were expended by 1969. On Oct. 12, 1977, the Four Mile Grove Cemetery Trust Fund No. 299, Wayne Van Horn--administrator, was established at the Mendota National Bank and over 50 persons contributed. The cemetery has been cleared and moved since that time. Most of the burials were early pioneers of the Meriden area. Six known GAR veterans asc buried there, one a Medal of Honor, a unique honor in LaSalle Co. The last burial in the cemetery was in 1962.

OLD SETTLERS ASSOCIATION OF LASALLE COUNTY

A number of years after the Old Settlers' Society of LaSalle County failed, a new group was formed. The Old Settlers' Association was established on May 29, 1869 at the Court House in Ottawa. Records from the first group were lost, so membership was open to anyone who had resided in the county for at least thirty years.

The group met at an annual picnic where early farm and house-hold implements were displayed. The main program of the day included music and speeches, but the settlers and their friends gathered primarily to visit and reminisce. Early members were:

- Armstrong, Elsie P.O. Ottawa, born Ohio, settled here 1831, died 1871.
- Ball, James W. P.O. Ottawa, born Tioga Co., N.Y., settled here June 4, 1835.
- Beers, Daniel P.O. Ottawa, born England, settled here 1834, died July 2, 1872.
- Buchanan, R. W. P.O. Ottawa, born St. Louis, Mo., settled here 1834.

Crandall Cemetery #201

Crandall Cemetery is in Troy Grove Township, Section 2, on the east side of E. 475th Road and about a half mile south of N. 42nd Road.

This cemetery was inventoried by members of the LaSalle County Genealogy Guild on June 12. 1978. The cemetery is nicely mowed, but most of the stones are in very bad condition. There is evidence of much vandalism. Fortunately, Jean Swanson had obtained much information about this cemetery prior to the destruction of some of the stones.

Members who helped with the inventorying were James "Bill" Brady, Margaret "Dorothy" Clemens, Rea Meier, and Margaret "Peggy" Maierhofer. The introduction and typing were done by Peggy.

In our "Pastfinder", Volume II, Number 1, Page 16, an article written by Jean Swanson includes the following:

On 25 September 1861 Obadiah B. Crandall and wife Myra conveyed to Joseph Lyman Watson, Michael Hawk and Reuben Crandall and their successors the plot of land in Section 2 measuring eleven rods eleven feet on the north and south and eight rods twelve feet on the east and west. Twenty-three stones remain and have been heavily vandalized over the years primarily through adolescent drinking parties.

Prudence Crandall Philleo, who attempted to educate black girls in her school at Canturbury, Connecticut, in 1831, was Obadiah's aunt, his father being Hezekiah. Pardon Crandall, their father, took up the land in 1838 but died back in Connecticut. Her mother Prudence Esther Carpenter Crandall died on the family land in 1872. Prudence did live in this area at times, as when her mother was dying. Her old school in Connecticut is now a museum, dedicated in 1984. Mrs. Nashold is a Crandall descendant.

Mrs. Jessica Nashold of Mendota provided Jean Swanson with photographs taken at the cemetery, perhaps in the 1960s or early 1990s. These are in the Genealogy Gulld's book. The information provided with them is:
