


PIERCE CEMETERY

According to "Early Days In Greenbush," Pierce Cemetery is a 51' by 90' parcel of land located in Section 31 in Berwick Township on property originally owned by the Pierce family. As tract ownerships changed over the years, the care and maintenance of the cemetery also varied. Located a short distance from a township road, entrance can be made on a well-kept path through a corn field, for easy access.

Pierce Cemetery is well-cared for on a periodical basis with mowings and trimmings (one of the reasons why Scout Regennitter decided on the site for his project). A 1982 census verified inscriptions on 34 graves. The first recorded grave was that of Angeline Waldron Pierce, who died July 9, 1842, and the most recent burial was that of Blanche M. Pierce who passed away in November of 1928.

A very notable descendant in the Pierce family was Franklin Pierce, a son of the Thomas Pierces who came to the U.S. from England in 1633 and settled in Massachusetts. Franklin, who was born Nov. 23, 1804 and died Oct. 8, 1869, in Concord, New Hampshire, was the 14th President of the United States.

William H. Pierce opened up a farm of two quarter-sections, in 1836, one on the southwest corner of Berwick Township and the other on the southeast corner of Roseville Township (then known as Greenfield). He built a home about a mile west of the Village of Greenbush. It was there that his wife, Angeline, died, and she was buried just a few rods west of the house, in 1842. It was a lone grave until 1845, when Mary, wife of Amos Pierce,

DESCENDANTS OF PHINEAS PIERCE, REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER

Amos, the son of Revolutionary Soldier Phineas PIERCE and his first wife, Ruth GAINES, was born July 13, 1784 in Vermont. Phineas was descended from Thomas PIERCE who came from England in 1633 and settled in Charlestown, Massachusetts. (Phineas⁶, Amos⁵, Thomas⁴, Thomas³, Thomas², Thomas¹)

Amos first emigrated to western New York State before going to Ashtabula County, Ohio in 1823. In 1834 he moved to Knox County, Illinois, near Altona before making his last move to Warren County, Illinois later that same year, settling in Section 7 of Greenbush Township. Amos was a member of the Universalist Church and served as chairman of the organizational meeting of Lombard College of Galesburg, Knox County, Illinois, held in his Greenbush home in 1850.

Amos married Mary SANFORD in 1811, and their children were:

- Clement, b. 24 Sept. 1813, Poultney, Rutland County, Vermont; m. Nancy FARR of Essex Co., New York 6 March 1834; d. 25 Dec. 1890 at Roseville, Warren County, Illinois.
- William Henry, b. 23 Jan. 1816; m. first 10 Sept. 1837 Angeline WALDRON; m. second 22 March 1846 Harriett WOODS; d. 25 Feb. 1880 at Galesburg, Knox Co., Illinois and buried there in Hope Cemetery.
- Marietta, b. 1818; m. Henry KELSEY.
- Stephen, b. 24 Sept. 1820; m. 23 Dec. 1847 Elizabeth HANON; m. second 24 Dec. 1857 Lottie JOHNSON. Charlotte was born in Jackson County, Ohio, the daughter of Basel JOHNSON who came to Illinois in 1856.
- Phebe J., b. 7 March 1823; m. Charles W. H. CHAPIN; d. 26 Jan. 1888.
- Eliza B., b. 10 March 1825; d. 19 Dec. 1845.

After the death of the mother of his children, Amos married a Mrs. Evaline WOODS.

The PIERCE Family Burial Ground is located in the southwest corner of the southwest quarter of section 31 in Berwick Township, Warren County, Illinois on the farm acquired by William H. PIERCE in 1840. It has not suffered the neglect of many such plots. The inscriptions of the stones in the PIERCE Family Burial Ground are as follows:

THE PIONEER DEAD LYING NEGLECTED SAD CONDITION OF THE FIRST MONMOUTH CEMETERY MANY GRAVES NOT MARKED

SERIOUS OBJECTIONS MADE TO SUPERVISOR'S PLANS--LIST OF DEAD TAKEN FROM GRAVESTONES

Desolate and neglected, with weeds and brush making an undergrowth over the last resting place of the pioneers of the city, the old cemetery appears a fit candidate for somebody's attention. Warren county is the owner of the property, but the supervisors at their meeting this week took steps to have the bodies moved to some cemetery now in use, and where their resting places would be forever cared for.

It is forty years since an interment has been made in this cemetery. For a time those who had friends resting there cared for it, but the progress of the years has brought new generations and new families and for a long time the old cemetery has been neglected. The supervisors have nearly every year made a small appropriation to keep it from becoming too much of a wilderness, but they have not been able to keep it in the good condition it should be. Now it is proposed to sell it to the highest bidder, then have the city council condemn it as a nuisance. The owner would then have the right to give notice to the relatives having bodies there to move them. The remains not cared for by friends could then be moved with due respect to some other cemetery and laid away under their own gravestones. This method was taken at Danville, Ill., in a similar case and was a satisfactory solution of the problem. The matter was referred to the public grounds committee of the supervisors, of which E.C. Hardin is the chairman.

While it is admitted on all sides that the cemetery in its present condition is a disgrace, there is a sentiment among the old settlers and many others that the ground should be preserved as a sacred place. They would have some way found to have the block beautified and carefully kept up. They do not think the graves of the old pioneers should be desecrated for the purpose of putting the property on the market as town lots and will oppose any such move. There is already talk of an injunction should an effort be made to carry out the plans proposed by the supervisors.

The cemetery occupies block I of the Old Town Plat of Monmouth, and lies between Fifth and Sixth street, Archer and Boston avenues. The block was purchased by Daniel McNeil, June 6, 1831, at the first sale of lots and was given by him to the county as a burial ground June 2, 1834. The first recorded interment in it was Sumner McNeil, a son of Daniel and Mrs. McNeil, who died Jan. 12, 1833, the year before the block was given for cemetery purposes. The block was used as a burial ground for about twenty years until after the purchase of the present cemetery was made Jan. 1, 1857. The last interment made in the old ground, from the record on the stone was that of Mary Smith, daughter of John Smith, March 7, 1861.

The cemetery was a free burial ground and people from all over the county came here and laid their loved ones away within its bounds. There were no lots or block, but anyone had the right to choose any location that suited and was not already taken. In those early days, tombstones could not always be secured, and old settlers think there are several hundred bodies in the grounds not marked by any stone. As an instance of this, Thomas H. Davidson has both his parents, several brothers and sisters and other relatives, twenty-nine in all, and none of their graves are marked by a stone (fold in paper--unreadable) row, but Mr. Davidson does not think their resting places could be found without much difficulty.

A visit to the cemetery now shows it is in a sorry condition. Many of the gravestones have fallen over. Some are broken and on a number the action of the elements has worn the inscriptions until they are barely legible or cannot be deciphered at all. They all show the traces of the years. The grounds are in very bad condition with weeds and brush over all. There is not a sign of a walk, driveway or lot line.

A careful search in every place where such a record might exist has failed to show any plat of this old cemetery, or any list of those who are buried there. To get such facts as possible regarding it, Review reporters yesterday made a list of the names on the grave stones and monuments.
