Rural Schools, cont.

Supervisors filled the vacant chair July 8, 1859, by appointing AE Rea county superintendent, as only by a report of this officer was the organized school district of a county entitled to an appropriation from the state for its school. In 1859 Plymouth Co., having then 112 inhabitants, reported one school in the county, in Plymouth township, which then with Westfield township embraced the entire county. The number of school population, from age five to twenty-one years of age was reported as twenty-six. The school house is now located in Lincoln Township. The name of the first teacher was James Moreton."

"The official report does not tell how many students attended. At the general election of 1859, J.V. Stafford was elected county superintendent of schools. As an example of the princely salaries of the office, it is here mentioned that his bill for services rendered as county superintendent from November 1, 1859, to March 1, 1860, was \$8.32, which was duly allowed by the board and paid in county warrants."

"No records are found in the county superintendents office for the years 1858 to 1872. These notes were gathered from well kept minutes of the board of supervisors, and the reports to the state superintendent. If, however, the expenses for the county superintendency would be as large per school now, as they were in 1860, the superintendent's salary would amount to over \$5,000 per year." During 1860 the number of inhabitants increased to 148. A county school tax was raised of 1 1/2 mills. Plymouth township raised that year 9

mills for school purposes, and 4 mills for a schoolhouse in sub-district No. 2. The township district of Westfield raised 6 mills for school purposes, but never reported a school until after its reorganization many years later. During this year Lincoln township divided, Lincoln receiving \$243.14; while Plymouth got but \$214.77. But as Lincoln had not maintained a public school for a sufficient length of time, a re-division was ordered; and, at this, Lincoln received but \$174.94 and Plymouth, \$323.68. The average length of time school was taught during 1860 was but two and four-tenths months. The school report for 1860 records three schools, two gentlemen and one lady teacher, a school population of forty-three, but had only fifteen enrolled, and three school houses valued at \$950."

"From 1861 to 1866 the population of the county did not increase. New settlers came and left again. Having no railroad, they had no market. In 1863, the number of inhabitants decreased to ninety-three."

"During 1867 the number of inhabitants reached 214. The approach of the Illinois Central railway encouraged the people to settle the wild prairie near the Big Sioux River, whose very name had before kept them away. Now, with the immigration from the east, instead of from the west, and the laying of an "iron trail," new life was infused into the county, and "progress" became the watchword of our public schools."

"In the fall of 1869 William Hunter was elected county superintendent. In his printed report to the state superintendent, he reports 20 schools--6 (See p. 8)

## Terrible Accident.

News was received in this city Tuesday of a terrible accident that occurred near Middle Creek, Neb., on the line of the Sioux City & Omaha railroad, whereby six men were instantly killed, and another badly wounded.

From the meager particulars at hand, it appears that a gang of ten men, under one Carnes, was engaged Tuesday morning in shovelling the snow out of a deep cut a short distance below the station. About ten o'clock the train going south entered the cut at its usual speed, and the shovellers to avoid it, stepped aside and stood upon the embankment of snow that they had thrown up. A portion of the train passed them safely, when without a moments warning seven of the unfortunate men were hurled beneath the cars, six of them being instantly killed and the other so horribly mangled that death would be a relief.

The injured man was put aboard of the passenger train in charge of one of his companions, and taken to his home in Oakland, while the construction train to which the men belonged, followed, bearing the six dead bodies.

The victims were nearly all Swedes and resided at Oakland, or in that vicinity.

The coroner held an inquest the next day, and the verdict of the jury is set forth in the following dispatch.

OMAHA, Jan. 5.—The result of the inquest held to-day at Oakland, over the bodies of the six laborers killed in the cut at Middle Creek yesterday by the St. Paul train, was that the jury found a verdict attaching the whole responsibility for the accident to Edward Carnes, foreman of the gang, for failing to display the usual signals of warning.

## Obituary Of Martha Jett

Funeral services were held for Mrs. Martha Jett at 2 p. m. last Thursday, October 1, in the Methodist church at Sloan. Rev. J. Ralston officiated and burial was in the Sloan cemetery.

Martha Candace Fairbanks was born at Belmont, Wisconsin, on May 1, 1850, the only child of the Rev. Oren and Elizabeth Fairbanks, and died September 28, 1942, at the age of 92 years, four months and 28 days, at the home of her son, Charles Jett of Whiting, Iowa. She was united in marriage to William Cyrus Jett of Belmont, Wis., and to this union was born seven children, six sons and one daughter. In 1878 they moved to Woodbury

county, Iowa, living on a farm in the vicinity of Salix until the death of Mr. Jett in 1921. After this she made her home with her daughter and sons.

Ancestry of Mrs. Jett dates back to Jonathon Fairbanks who came to this country in 1633 from Yorkshire, England, and settled at Boston, Mass., later moving to Dedham, Mass., where he built the noted old Fairbanks home which is still standing. It is the oldest home in New England and has been continuously owned and occupied by members of the Fairbanks family.

Mrs. Jett was converted at the age of seventeen and joined the Methodist church. She and her husband were charter members of the Methodist church at Salix, joining in 1879 and was the last charter member of the church.

Surviving are six sons: George C. of Milwaukee, Wis., Merton L. of Jamestown, N. Dak., Chas. W. of Whiting, Ambrose C. of Ypsilanti, N. Dak., Ernest A. of Anthon, Oren F. of Sloan, and one daughter, Mrs. George C. Winters of Stockton, Ill. Also ten grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren.

Mrs. Jett was a kind and helpful neighbor, a loving mother, and devoted companion. Her motto was "Live and help others to live." She was faithful to her Lord unto death and has received her reward. She will be long remembered by her family, grandchildren, and her many, many friends.

## Frank McNear as a Seducer—The Fall of a Postmistress.

A great many people in this city and throughout the county know Frank McNear, an ex-stage driver and general blither, although for a time past a store keeper at Danbury. Frank was always on the sell out and men who knew him never trusted him. But he found a woman who was willing to marry him. She soon suffered from his treacherous nature as much as a woman can and that is more than anything else alive can.

A short time ago he attempted to shoot a man with whom he had been gambling, and now, right on the heels of his escape from murder, he turns up a seducer if not a raper.

### THE LATEST.

About three weeks ago McNear put up at an Ida Grove hotel with a woman and registered as "Frank McNear and wife." A Danbury man who knew McNear's wife had not been there happened to see that register and reported the facts when he returned. It was soon discovered that the woman in the case was none other than Miss Sarah E. Bowser, the postmistress and a lady theretofore highly respected.

Her parents are old settlers and devoted a great deal of time and money to educating her. She was teaching school at the time of this denouement and the post-office was in charge of a deputy. Miss Bowser's mother soon came to hear of the gossip and began to investigate. McNear denied it at first but could not explain away the hotel register. A lawyer was engaged who paid the reprobate a visit but before he could repeat it or an arrest was effected he hired a team and left the place, closing up his store.

The first criminal act occurred in this city last November when McNear as a pretended friend came here with her ostensibly to settle a controversy about her postoffice. They put up at the Washington house, and during the evening went out for a walk, when McNear took her into a house of ill fame and then refused to take her back to the hotel until she promised him to submit to his desires.

Miss Bowser confesses that he did come to her room after they got back to the hotel and remained all night. She has resigned her postoffice.

It is a pity that the scoundrel escaped and no stone should be left unturned to effect his arrest and conviction. The penitentiary is the only safe place for him.

Sioux City enjoyed a visit the past week from one of her pioneers, the Honorable N. G. Hedges of Des Moines. Colonel Hedges is the father of the lamented Charles Hedges and Mr. D. T. Hedges with whom he was visiting, and came to Sioux City 24 years ago this month. From that day to this he has been a champion of power and profit to the city; he had faith which never dimmed and friendship that never cooled. On that first memorable visit he was accompanied by his son Charles, then scarcely of age, and the trip was made in a sleigh from Council Bluffs. All the way up the valley the snow was waist deep and in places much higher. The business of keeping the road was left to the little mule team they started with, for to turn off the beaten track, was to have an upset. As they approached Sioux City they found a crust on the snow so strong that men traveled afoot upon it.

On that visit Mr. Hedges invested several thousand dollars here, for his judgment told him that this was a site for a great city. But he invested more than thousands—he left his son, deputy Recorder, soon to become Recorder, and one of the leading men of the great northwest. But that history is known of all men. The Colonel returned to Lee county identified himself with her interests and assumed a leading role in her advancement. The people of that county, sent him four times to the lower house of the legislature, made him sheriff several times (the best paying office in the county) and then further distinguished him by electing him to the Senate over a popular Union General, by a majority larger than any other man on the ticket.

While serving in the legislature he won one of our most important battles, the initial struggle for a railroad. A. Oliver was in the legislature then and wanted the road at Onawa, the Senator wanted it to go down Maple Valley and John F. Duncomb the invincible, was interested in that route. But strong and keen and persuasive as they were he proved more than their match. Remembering the home of his boys and his own early attachment to this place, he labored to have the road come here and it did come. That is his chief characteristic; what he set out to do he always did, whatever the size of the obstacles.

The same affection for Sioux City still holds in his breast. He is familiar with all the variations of her fortune and acquainted with her friends and enemies

in public and private life, and it were worth a days journey to hear him discourse of the early days of his first visit here.

Mr. Hedges is now in his 70th year but a hale and vigorous man with every faculty alert. The elements of popularity are still his, too, and the Democrats of Polk county are ever urging him to lead them out of the wilderness. But he says he is too old to enter politics again as a candidate, much as he loves the cause of the party. He prefers to enjoy his competence in the society of his wife who is as remarkable a woman as he is man. He returned to Des Moines by the noon train Wednesday.

The man who drove Judge Dillon off the bench, Mr. Isaac N. Cate, is a strict moralist. His road, the Central of Iowa, has an order prohibiting conductors, engineers, station agents and other employes of the company from smoking or drinking whisky, ale, beer, cider, or other intoxicating liquors, while on duty, under the penalty of discharge or suspension from service. No fault is found with the edict against drinking, but the smoking clause, which applies even to section hands, is looked upon as an unnecessary requirement, and the swearing along the line is said to rival that of the army in Flanders.

The growth and prosperity of Sioux City during 1880 were admirably depicted in a special edition published by the *Journal* New Years. It was a heavy undertaking but the execution was the admiration of every ambitious citizen of Sioux City. The list of building improvements footed up \$257,045 for the year.

### (INDIAN ACTIVITIES)

#### Domestic.

At the 26th the special Ponca Commission reported that the removal of the Indians from Nebraska and Nebraska was without sufficient effect, that the Government had covenanted to protect their persons and property, and that those who have returned to Dakota are self-sustaining, and desire a teacher and a minister. It is recommended that one hundred and sixty acres of land be given to a person, and that the recipients be taken to the civil and criminal laws of the territory in which the lands are selected. It is urged that \$25,000 be appropriated for cultural implements, stock and seed, and that suitable persons be employed by the Government to instruct the Poncas in religious, educational and industrial development.

This terrible plague is now raging in many parts of the country. The Sun of the 25th says that the small pox is more prevalent in New York City at the present time than for many years. The same authority states that even with the very best treatment fully 25 per cent of those taken with the disease die.

Friday night the 4th of February set in the worst snow storm of the season. The wind blew from the South and the snow fell in round hard pellets all night and part of Saturday. Then the wind changed to the east and came in flakes thick and fast. Locomotion was almost impossible at bed time but the average citizen was horrified Sunday morning to see the snow still coming violently, the wind unchanged. All day Sunday, except at slight intervals, the same condition of things existed, the temperature moderating just enough to melt part of the snow that fell. Monday morning it had almost turned into a rain. But during the forenoon another snow fall, thick and white came, and it looked as though it had set in for forty days. Late in the day, however, the sky became clear and people rejoiced that the end had come. Tuesday opened up clear and beautiful and the business of life was resumed. There has been no considerable damage reported, but of course the railroads lose heavily by stoppage of trains etc. A few sheds fell down in the city and no doubt farmers will lose a great deal of comfort by having to hunt water for their stock and clear away roads. For a while it looked as though the storm would end in rain and the city fathers went about saying "I wouldn't give ten dollars for the ten thousand dollars worth of Bridges on Perry creek."

O. A. Patterson is the first man to say he had seen a worse winter than this. It was early in the forties and the doctor says the mercury went 32 below the 24th of March.

It has been proposed that as the water question is of vital importance to this city, that it be made the issue at the approaching city election. Let us have some kind of water works.

The North Nebraska *Journal* gets after the S. O. & St. P. road last week because goods bought in Sioux City do not reach Ponca within ten days after the purchase. [The *Journal* should] recollect that this has been bad rail road weather and that they road probably swears more about it and with more reason, than the people at either end.

He thereupon toned down and gave the guard an order for some things, and this is his order "1 pound Lorrillard plug tobacco, 2 pounds smoking tobacco and one gallon of alcohol." He was out of provisions. Our contemporary should recollect that "warm drinks" is a standard remedy for small pox.

Mags Kunts, the man that deserted his family a short time ago, wrote a letter back to his wife after he had arrived at Sioux City, telling her that he was on his way to the Black Hills, and that she need never look for him any more. The wife upon receiving the letter expressed her gratitude that her husband was not frozen as was first feared, and seemed to take his announcement that he had left for good, as a great relief. There had been considerable unpleasantness in the family.—*Ida Grove Pioneer*.

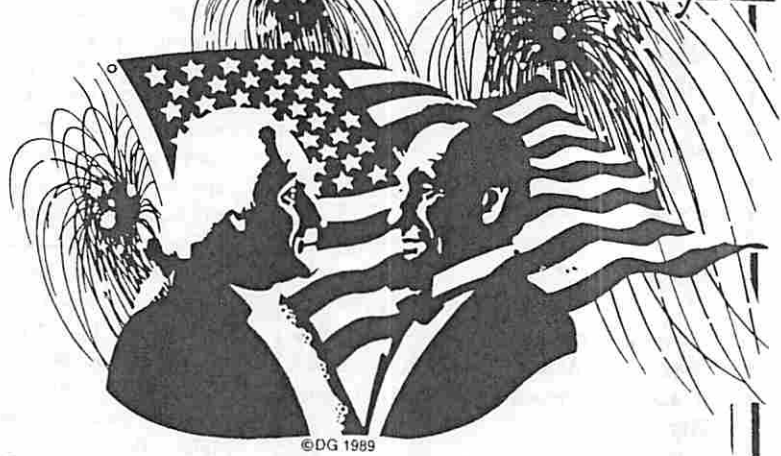

### Homicide in Jackson.

Monday the 7th instant, Sioux City learned the particulars of a killing in the neighboring town of Jackson, Nebraska. A respectable citizen of the place by the name of P. H. Boyle, a merchant and Justice of the Peace, shot and instantly killed one Michael Dorsey, who came into his store with a billiard cue to whip him.

Dorsey was related to one Martin Ryan, a saloon keeper whose place has a bad reputation, and by reason of this fact became in a drunken state his obstreperous champion. The better people of the town have been trying to suppress the place and recently enlarged the corporate limits so as to get jurisdiction. But after that was done he became more defiant and when brought before Justice Boyle Saturday was so demonstrative as to break up court by firing his revolver and making a manner of threats.

After the court adjourned Mr. Boyle went back to his store and Ryan and his friends returned to his saloon to celebrate the victory. Dorsey finally concluded that it would not be complete until he whipped the Justice and so got a billiard cue and went to Mr. Boyle's store. The latter tried to mollify him but it was not to be and after retreating to the far end of his store he drew his revolver and warned his assailant off. Even this did not have the desired effect and a bullet was sent toward the belligerent man's breast which entered and ranged downward to the heart. Dorsey then retreated to the street and there was no further shooting. When he close outside of the door he fell and

Section 1055 of the Code, is the place to look for the law in Dr. Smith's case. The Doctors hosts of friends all wish for his candidacy and yet the question of eligibility is still discussed. If he is a candidate he will not be a party candidate. And if he is mayor he will not be a partisan mayor. So it is for the Doctors benefit as much as anybodys that the matter should be settled before he runs. That will avoid all excuse for a contest and prevent any disagreeable squabbling injurious alike to all property interests and annoying to Mr. Smith.
