Naturalizations - First Papers

The lowa Genealogical Society recived a number of naturalization documents from the district court files in Polk County. Volunteer members scanned the documents and, when the ink was faded, transcribed the information. Great care was taken to assure each name was correct with the coordinating scan. The documents were then indexed for easy use.

The images on this page are available to IGS members for \$5.00 or to non-members for \$7.50 per sheet plus \$2.50 postage and handling by writing to IGS (see page 1 for the address) with the requested names. The front side, back side and transcription for an individual all are included in the mailing.

The indexing of the naturalization images used the following guidelines.

- If there was more than one date on a document, the earliest date was used in the name. The dating system of "year-month-day" was used.
- If the immigrant's signature was legible, his spelling was used for the name.
- If the name was difficult to decipher, other volunteers were consulted. Census indexes, city directories and Ancestry.com were also used to determine the name.
- In the rare instance of not being able to decipher a given name, the symbol ^^^ is used with the first initial of the name.
- There are a few documents in which the immigrant wrote his first name and the clerk wrote a different/similar name; i.e. Johannes vs. Jonathan or Charles vs. Carl. In these cases, the immigrant's signature was used as the name with the clerk's interpatation in parentheses.
- If the document originated in another county, the document was filed in Polk County Iowa.
- Even though the document was larger than 8x11 inches, the information on the back side may not have been that large. So the back side was usually scanned at the 8x11 size. No information was omitted to do this.
- Depending on the original paper size, the document was bi-folded or tri-folded to about 3x8 inch size. The name was written by the court clerk across one end for filing. This resulted in the "back side" of the document.
- There were some documents where the name on the back side did not agree with the name on the actual document. (Sometimes this is the name of the court clerk, which is the first name appearing on the document).

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
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

CEMETERY MAP



Application for Certificates


The Iowa Genealogical Society issues certificates to persons who are directly descended from Iowa Pioneers. Applications must prove direct descent and prove that the ancestor settled in Iowa

- By 1846, to receive a **Statehood Certificate**;
- By 1856, to receive a Pioneer Certificate;
- More than 100 years prior to the date of application, for a Century Certificate.

Applicants may apply for certificates to be issued to themselves or to other persons. The person to whom the certificate is issued need not currently live in Iowa.

The purpose of the Certificate Program is to recognize families with Iowa roots, encourage people to undertake genealogical research, and to provide genealogical resources for researches in our library.

The information and application are available at the library or by sending a self-addressed stamped envelope to IGS. You may also find the information and application on our website <www.iowagenealogy.org> under the "Research Collections and other Resources" menu. The cost is \$10.00 per certificate. Certificates are suitable for framing.

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

THE COUNTIES OF IOMA

The state of Iowa has ninety-nine counties. The first, Demoine and Dubuque, were established under Michigan Territory in 1834 when the treaty land open for settlement was a narrow strip along the Mississippi river. As a part of the new Territory of Wisconsin, Demoine was subdivided in 1836 into several new counties: Lee, Henry, Louisa, Musquitine (Muscatine), Cook, Van Buren and Des Moines. In 1837 Dubuque, including the Indian cession of that year, was reorganized into the following: Dubuque, Clayton, Benton, Linn, Jones, Clinton, Scott, Johnson, Delaware, Buchanan, Cedar, Fayette and Keokuk. Iowa became a Territory in 1838.

Large tracts of land in south and central Iowa were acquired by the government from the Sauk and Fox in 1838 and 1842. In 1846 the Pottawattamie and Winnebago ceded their claims. Iowa became a state the same year. Northern Iowa hunting grounds of the Sioux were released to the United States in 1851.

Boundaries of new counties were established by law but in many instances remained "paper counties" for years. Areas of limited population were attached to neighboring local governments for administrative purposes. In the listing below the first date indicates legal establishment of county, the second, organization of the county. Lists of counties eliminated by law or judicial action and of those whose names have changed will follow the roster of counties.





IOWA COUNTIES

The State of Iowa has ninety-nine counties. The first, Demoine and Dubudue, were established under Michigan Territory in 1834 when the Black Hawk treaty land opened for settlement was a narrow strip along the Mississippi river. As a part of the new Territory of Wisconsin, Demoine was subdivided in 1836 into several new counties Lee, Henry, Louisa, Musquitine (Muscatine), Cook, Van Buren and Des Moines. In 1837 Dubuque, including the Indian cession of that year, was reorganized into the following: Dubuque, Clayton, Benton Linn, Jones, Clinton, Scott, Johnson, Delaware, Buchanan, Cedar, Fayette and Keokuk. Iowa became a separate territory in 1838.

Large tracts of land in south and central Iowa were acquired by the government from the Sauk and Fox Indians in 1838 and 1842. In 1846 the Pottawattamie and Winnebago ceded their claims. Iowa became a state the same year. Northern Iowa hunting grounds of the Sioux were released to the United States in 1851.

Boundaries of new counties were established by law but in many instances remained "paper counties" for years. Areas of limited population were attached to neighboring local governments for administrative purposes.

In listing below the first date indicates the legal establishment of the county; the second, organization of the area. If writing to a county courhouse for records do not ask for data prior to the year of organization. County officials receive so many requests for genealogical information they cannot always reply. When writing ask for the name of a local researcher who can secure information for you.





THE NEWSPAPER COLLECTION OF IOWA STATE DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY AND ARCHIVES

By Edward F. Pittman

This institution came into existence in 1892, and was founded by the Hon. Charles Aldrich. Newspapers were offered to him by publishers in Iowa—bound volumes as well as current papers. Beginning in 1905, many leading dailies of the United States were received upon subscription, until 1914, when it was found necessary to discontinue these on account of the crowded condition in the newspaper division.

We now have 11,231 volumes of bound newspapers. Of these, 2,341 non-Iowa papers were taken from our stacks in 1923, and stored where they were not accessible; but several years later, were placed in steel cupboards (Thirty-one in number) in the subbasement of this building, and are now accessible.

We have 225 volumes of the New York Herald, and 103 volumes of New York Times, and 17 other various old New York papers. The Herald and the Times give us a continuous New York paper from 1848 to 1923.

We have 5,290 volumes tied and ready for the binder. These accumulate at the rate of 122 volumes each year. At the present time we are receiving 204 weekly Iowa papers each week, and 33 Iowa dailies. We pay nothing for these, receiving them in exchange for our quarterly, The Annals of Iowa, and other reports we publish from time to time.

During the year 1930 a re-arrangement of the entire newspaper division took place. We have twenty-one steel stacks as shown by the accompanying diagrams. The stacks and sections are numbered, and the following alphabetical list of bound newspapers show the stack and sectional location of each volume. A card index of my own invention, shows the exact shelf upon which each volume rests, requiring no hunting when you reach the proper stack, whose number and number of sections are plainly painted upon base of stack or on the floor, as indicated on the diagram of the floor plan of both stack rooms.

The oldest paper we have is the Boston Chronicle of 1768, which is now 178 years old. We have a few other papers over one hundred years old, all of which are in a good state of preservation. We have a year of the first paper printed on what is now Iowa soil, which was the Dubuque Visitor, from May 1836 to May 1837. We also have five years (Not complete) of the first newspaper published in Des Moines, The Iowa Star 1849 to 1854. This paper was published by Barlow Granger. I now own and am living in the residence where Barlow Granger once lived and owned.


Our files are used by thousands of people each year, some coming from eastern states and remaining here for weeks. Graduates

and undergraduates of colleges make much use of them in writing their theses when obtaining college degrees. These newspapers contain the real history of the state of Iowa, and are becoming more valuable as the years pass. In 1932 their appraised value was placed at \$17,335. At this date, January 1947, it would be upward of \$25,000.

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

It is one hundred and thrity-six miles nearly due west from Chicago, being the nearest point in low a tothat great metropolis of the Northwest. The land which comprises the site of the city was purchased of the United States in 1840, by Dennis Warren, Elijah Buell and Buell Ennhald. Mr. Buell settled here in the Fallor 1836, and the same year George W. Harkan located near him. The two families remained the only settlers of what is bow Lyons until the Sping of 1837. In Aprill of this year Messrs, Buell and Harlan, in connection with Dennis Warren, Chockley A. Its plinelpid growth, however, has been since 1855, during which year it was incorporated, C. H. Toll being the first mayor. HARDIN COUNTY.

This county is in the fourth tier from the southern boundary line of Minneso This county is in the fourth tier from the southern boundary men of sumeson, and somewhat east of midway between the two great rivers. It is twenty-four miles east and west, by the same north and south, and contains an area of 576 square miles. PHYSICAL FEATURES.

The surface of the county is generally rolling and gently undulating prairie, the largest extent being found in the southwest, which is well adapted to farming and graving purposes, but in consequence of its remoteness from thinker, was the last to be settled. Most kinds of wild fruits found in other parts of the state are common here, including grapes, plunus, rais-applies, red and black raspherries, strawherries and gooseberries. There are some blackberries, but they are not considered abundant. Amon the different kinds of native strutus may be mentioned the hard, sumach, elder and prickly ash. The beautiful and highly ornamental tree known as the white birch is also found along the lowa fifter. This, together with the white pine and cedar, are annually sought for and carried away to other counties as ornamental trees. Some two or three different species of willow grow along tho borders of the streams.

RESOURCES.

Although Hardin County has not proved to be the wonderful Elderade that it

appeared in the golden dreams of some enthusiasts away back in 1855, yet it turns out to be rich in inhereal resources of far more practical importance for the conifort, happiness and present and future prosperity of the county.

The early settlers scarcely appreciated the importance of the occasional coal croppings, as they appeared along the lowa filter on their sides, between the points where the towns of Steamboat Bock and Edora are now located; or at least it was a number of years before it began to attract any considerable attention. Hardin County enjoys the advantage of an abundant supply of excellent building stone, obtained nearly all along the lowa River and its tributaries. The finest quality is found at I howa Falls, where a limestone is easily quarried in unlimited quantities, which admits of a finish almost equal to marble. By some one of her wonderful and mysterious processes, Nature has lifted up for the use of man eighty feet in thickness of her auth-carboniferous limestone strata. It is quarried in blocks of any size, and with the greatest case. GOLD EXCITEMENT.

In the Fall of 1852, the few adventurers who had found their way up the Lowa River Into Hardin County caught a little of the gold fever which then prevailed preity generally throughout the country. Shining particles of a substance resembling gold were found mixed with the sames along the river and in the ravines, and immediately proclaimed to the world that gold had been discovered. The reports spread far and for a time the newspapers of the country teemed with reports fro Hardin County gold mines. At one time, from five hundred to one thousand p were encamped in tents and wagons along the river between Eldora and Stea Rock, all engaged in prospecting for gold. The excitement, however, gradually su sided, but was revived again to some extent in 1837. In that year O. M. Holcomb spe considerable time in prospecting and washing for the precious metal, and it is succeeded in obtaining small quantities.

The question as to the existence of gold here, which is strenuously maintained by some, is still an unsettled one, although there is no disputing the fact that its equivalent is here, in rich bests of coal, potter's clay and building stone, all of which the excited gold serkers of 1853 overlooked.

PRODUCTIONS.

All the cereals yield abundantly, and with as little labor on the part of the farmer as in any other part of our great grain-producing state. Corn, wheat and oats are the staple productions, but all kinds of vegetables and the different tame grasses do well. The abundance and excellent quality of the nailve grass, howere, have rendered it unnecessary up to the present for farmers to devote much attention to raising tame grasses. Hay in sunferient quantities to supply all demands is found on the prairies, free to all, at the expense of cutting and saving. Stock raising, for which the county is peculiarly adapted by the general characteristics of its surface and its numerous permilal springs and streams, is successfully carried on by the farmers, and is probably one of their largest and most reliable means of revenue. Thereughbred and imported stock have been introduced with antisfactory results, so that the character and grade of the stock is but little, if any, inferior to that of the more noted stock breeding counties. the eastern and southern part of the state. Sheep have been introduced, and do well

in the eastern and southern part of the state. Sheep have been introduced, and do well where properly cared for.

Although this county is too far north to ever become a first class fruit county, yet by the use of reasonable care in the selection of the hardler varieties of apples and pears, and by giving them proper cultivation, there is no difficulty in raising an abundant supply with reasonable certainty. Orchards have been set out in various places, which grow tour-landly and yield fine annual crops of excellent flavored fruit. Sinall fruits of all kinds grow with little care, and produce with the rich profusion of their native detune.

EARLY HISTORY.

The first settlement in Hardin County was made on the Iowa River, in the southeast corner, in what is now Union Township, by Greenberry Higgins, who moved with his family from Reokak County, in this state, in 1849. During the next year the following families located in the same vicinity: James A. Dawdy, William Robinson, Abraham Grinsley, and Samuel Smith, Sr., with his son, Samuel Smith, E. At this time Cetar Raphds was the nearest market, but it being a poor one the settlers did most of their trading at lowa City, one huntred and fifteen miles distant. In the Fall of 1850 Jacob Kidwirer made a claim on the river some ten miles above the present site of Eldora, his nearest neighbor being Samuel Smith, Sr., who had taken a claim about twelve miles below. The next settlement was made in the vicinity of lowa Palls, if February, 1851, by h. I. Taibott, his nearest neighbor being Kidwiler, eight miles down tor river. In the spring of 1852, Natian Townsend and John Caldwell settled in the same vicinity. These three families were from Pleasant Plain, deflerson County, Iowa, and their settlement was the farthest west at that time up on lowa titver. Mr. Taibott's claim embraced the siles of the present town of Iowa Palls and the depot grounds. Som after this a town was laid out a little southeast of the place where fowa Palls is bearted, which was known by the name of Hocksylvania. A stone building was creeted and ecoupted at a hord, and some other Improvements made.

In 1851, several families of the Noctety of Friends from North Carolina, settled in the same part of the county, on Honey Creek, where they subsequently laid out a town, calling it New Providence. This was the nucleus of the large thriving settlement of Friends in that part of the county. The town site was entered by the county for county seat purposes, except one forty-acre tract which was entered by James II. Drain, who donated one half of it to the county. During the same year, the Edgington Bros. brought the first stock of goods to the new town, and the first to the county. While the commissioners were pondering the question as to what the name of the new town should be, they were relieved by the

suggestion of Mrs. 8. R. Eigington, that it be called Eldora-being a contract Eldorado—as this way the era of the memorable gold excitement in Hardin County W. H. The county was duly organized in February, 1853, the following being the county officers: Alexander Smith, County Judge; James Putman, Clerk; S. 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POTTAWATTAMIE COUNTY.

POTTAWATTAMIE COUNTY.

Pottawattamic County borders the Missourt River, in the third tier of counties from the south line of the state. With the exception of Kossuth it is the largest in the State, its superficial area being about 960 square miles, or 514,400 acres. Besides the Missourt River, it is drained by numerous small streams which traverse its surface from morth to south with a slight westerly defection.

The western portion of the county is a broad, level strip of territory, from three to ten miles wide, and known as the Missourt River Bottom. Bordering this, on the east, the range of bluffs, rises steep and grand, in many places aimost perpendicular, from the two to three hundred feet in height. The range is parted by numerous narrow valleys and ravines, which descend from the adjacent uplands, but never loses its distinctive outlines, this remarkable range, rising abruptly from the sweeping plant, without a rock or stone upon its face, presents a view at once varied, grand and beautiful. The adjacent uplands are broken, and in many places too uneven for tillage; but are well adapted to grazing, and are frequently interspersed with thrifty groves of timber. Further east the broken outlines give place to a beautiful, undulating or waved surface, peculiar to the Western Slope, alternating with level valleys, from a half mite to a mile width, tordering the streams. Everywhere there is a pleasing variety of secnery, enhanced in loveliness by a pure atmosphere and a constant succession of rich, melow this, which never fail to charm the eye with new and delightful forms and colorar revealed by the perpetual play of light and shade upon the varied outlines.

The county is not abundantly supplied with timber, but there is enough, with proper economy in the use, to answer for all ordinary purposes. The largest bodies are the cottonwood groves along the Missouri, but there are also some excellent bodies, embracing different varieties on West Nishnalotany, Honey, Pigeon and Mosquito Creeks, The soil is that of t

HISTORY.

In the Summer of 1804, the celebrated explorers, Lewis and Clarke, on their way up the Missouri River, held a council with the Indians at the place where Fort Cathoun was subsequently established, on the Nebraska side of the river, about twenty miles above the present city of Council Bules. From this elreumshauer they pave to that place the name of "Council Bules." For early as 1824, a French trader named Hart, had established a trading house on the burls just above the large apring, now known as "Mynster Spring." within the limits of the presentity of Cruncil Bules. At this time the American Fur Company had established various trading posts in the great Northwest, and this point was known to their employes who saccusted the river as Lasted Bart, or Hart's Billet. The spot was doubtless selected for the advantages of the splendid spring of pure water which bursts out high up on the blurt and flows down in a volume almost sufficiently strong for propelling machiners. At that time the Missouri River was navigated by a few traders and persons belonging to the Fur Company, having their headquarters at St. Louns, and only with small keel boats propelled by hand. In 1827, Francis Guittar, a Preuchman in the employ of the American Fur

Company, encamped with others in the timber at the foot of the bluffs where now Broadway with its double row of magnificent business blocks is located. He and his companions indulged in the fine sport of shooting deer, els, and buffalo on the prairie now within the city limits. Ho subsequently selected this as his home, counting the years from the date above given. Others, however, permanently located here before

he did.

In the Summer of 1838, Davis Hardin and family, including his wife and seven children, landed in the county, at the point then known as Council Point, about four miles below the City of Council Builts, Mr. Hardin had been appointed to act as government farmer among the Pottawattamie Indians, who were then about to be removed from the Platte Purchase in Missouri to fown. Council Point is now known as Hardin's Bend. A few months after, the Indians were brought up, and Mr. Hardin then removed to where he opened a farm on a little stream known as Indian Creek, now in the business portion of the city. His sons were John, Allen, Richard, and Martin, D. Hardin, and became permanent settlers, remaining here throughout the time when the region was under Mormon control, but maintaining very little intercourse with them. When the Pottawattamic Indians were brought up, a number of white persons came also, Incidulty traders, agents, and other government employes. The Indians scattered in various portions of the adjacent country, but received their government annuities and supplies at Council Point and Trader's Point, a few miles below the city.

In 1839, two companies of troops came up and built a block house, or sort of fort, on the bluff in the east part of what is now the city, and shortly after, a Catholic Mission was established here under the charge of Fathers be Smith and Veright. They joulit a dwelling house and used the block-house for religious services. They also located a burying ground near the fort, which is now within the city limits. At this time "Billy Caldwell" was the principal chief of the Pottawattamics. No while persons came as settlers, except those among the Indians as traders and agents in various did.

The center of this community was established on Indian Creek in the vicinity of the old fort, at a place first called Miller's Hollow, and afterwards by them name! Kanesville, in honor of Colonel Kane, of Pennsylvania, who visited them at an early day; but their settlement spread rapidly over the cennty and into some of the adjoining counties wherever groves of timber and water afforded an available location. Over this community Orson Byde, priest, writer, editor, and lawyer, was installed as the president of the quorum of twelve, and the country remained under their exclusive control for several years. In 1846, they raised a battalion flos strong for the Mexican War under Colonel Clark, which, after traversing Northern Mexico, and taking part in the battles there, closed its canupaign in California. It is claimed that the gold in the Sactamento was first discovered by this battalion. Here many of them remained and engaged in mining. Mr. William Garner was one of these, who, after accuring considerable gold, returned to Kanesville and made his permanent home in the county. The Mornous population was probably most numerous in 1848, but in 1849, after many had left for Utah, it numbered 6,352, and in 1850, 7,828, but they were not all within the present limits of the county. Many followed Brigham Young previous to 1852, when finally the word went round that all true believers should gather together at Salt Lake. ORGANIZATION.

The county was organized Sept. 21, 1848. The first county commissioners were A, H. Perkins, David D. Yearstey, and George D. Coulton, and they held their first acession at the house of Hiram Clark in Kanesville—T. Burdlek was their clerk; he was also first county judge, elected in 1851; James Floan was elected district judge, and held his first term in the county, May 5th, 1851. Evan M. Green was Clerk, and Alexander McRea, Sheriff. At this term Orson Hydo was admitted to the bar. Sloan was appointed by the Governor; he was a native of Ireland, and many anecdotes are related of his wit and eccentricity on the bench. He resigned in the course of a year, and was succeeded by Judge Bradford. These officials were all Normons.

Evan Green was appointed post master at Kaneaville, receiving his commission in 1848, but it was sometime before regular mail service was established letween it and the nearest post office in Missouri, and four or five years before mails arrived regularly

THE FIRST GENTILES.

In June, 1848, a store was established on the present site of Council Hinds, a point then known as Miller's Hollow before it was maned Kaneaville. The husiness was opened in the name of Stuisman & McDonald, and was carried on by Mr. Stuisman, Mr. Jonathan B. Stutman was the first Gentile who settled among the Mormons. He soon after married and remained a prominent resident of the place, becoming one of its leading merchants. His tusiness was carried on for some time in a log building, He subsequently built the first frame store, and also the first frame dwelling house in Council Biuffs. The next Gentile settler was Mr. Cornellus Yoorhis, who arrived on the 17th of August, 1848, and opened a small store in partnership with Eddy, Jamison & Co., of St. Louis. The third was Wm. B. Ferguson, of St. Louis, who also engaged in trade.

The various settlements scattered about the county included one a short distance cast of Kanesville, on Mosquito Creek, near the seat of Wick's old Indian Milk where Wm. Garner, Erra Sconfeid, Simon Graybill, Alexander Follett and Alexander Marshall remained after the exodus; another on Pigeon Creek, in the northern part of the county; another on the Nishnabolany at a place afterwards called Macedonia, where Peter Hasa and Weyneyer butt a mill, and another in the northwestern part of the county in and about Lewin-M Grove, where the first actities were Capitain Joshus Head-lic, Wm. Henderson and John Kritzinger, the latter of whom built a mill. In the Summer of 1850 Joseph Toole came up from St. Joseph, Mo., and established the celebrated outfitting house for California emigrants, known as the Elephant Store, and J. A. Jackson became connected with the house in 1851. The trade of the place was also increased in 1850 by the accession of W. D. Turner, S. H. Riddle and J. L. Foreman. Dr. B. T. Shelly commenced bere the practice of medient the same year, and Dr. S. E. Williams, then a medical student, arrived in the Fall. Dr. P. J. McMahon came in 1851, so also did B. R. Pergram, A. S. Bryant and the Robinson Brothers. The immigration that came in 1852 to take the place of the Mormons was numerous. The public lands of Poltawattamic County were surveyed during the years 1851-2, and the United States land omce was located at Council Bluffs early in the Spring of 1853, with Joseph H. D. Street, Register, and Dr. S. M. Ballard, Receiver. The first entry was made by Joseph D. Lane. The amount of land entered in the month of March, 1853, was 3,810 acres. This was under the preemption law, and actual sales did not take place until the 6th of June. The amount of land taken at this time was small, but sales soon increased. At the first election thereafter, J. S. Houton was chosen mayor, and reas entering Recorder. A more efficient code of ordinances was passed more after, and considerable progress was made in public improvements.

A Lanking house was first opened in the city by Green & Weare, in the Yall of 1854, and managed by them until 1855, when Thomas II. Benton, Jr., was added to the first, and directed its affairs until its dissolution in 1857. Banking houses were opened if 1855 by Baldwin & Dodge and by Henn, Williams, Horton & Co. A Franch of the State Bank of Lowa was established in 1860, with James A. Jackson, Product, and John Lockwood, Cashier. This was afterwards changed to the First National Bank of Council Bluffs, and was the first bank of Issue established in 1858, by F. C. Bendric & Co., and Incorporated as a stock company in 1856. 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
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Plow through your research in the Hawkeye State.

ear "Iowa," and if you're like most people, corn comes to mind. After all, it's no secret the state, with its rolling, fertile hills, is tops in corn and runner-up in soybean production. But the Hawkeye State is more than farms: Historically, it's led the nation in education and women's rights. An October 1884 Annals of Iowa article boasts about the state's high number of schoolhouses and excellent attendance record, as well its progressive attitude toward women. Its author, citing the 1880 US census, claims more than 80,000 Iowa women worked outside the home. And Iowan Carrie Chapman Catt began crusading for suffrage in 1900.

She's in the company of well-known musicians, writers, actors and political figures, including painter Grant Wood, comedian Johnny Carson, western movie star John Wayne, first lady Mamie Eisenhower and frontiersman Buffalo Bill Cody. As the highway signs say, Iowa offers "fields of opportunities"—not only for farmers and other natives, but also for genealogists.

Fields of dreams

The Fox (now called the Meskwaki), Ioway, Sauk and other American Indians were first to make their homes on the prairie. In 1788, when France controlled the land, Europeans started planting roots where Dubuque is

today. France and Spain alternately owned the "lush, green and fertile" land (as explorers Louis Jolliet and Jacques Marquette described it) until the United States acquired it in the 1803 Louisiana Purchase.

Most settlers didn't start arriving until after the Black Hawk War ended in 1833. The Sauk and Fox had to move west of the Mississippi River, opening up the area for westward expansion. The Great Lakes Region of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA; <archives.gov>) holds Bureau of Indian Affairs records covering these tribes; censuses of Northern Plains Indians are at NARA's Central Plains Region in Kansas City, Mo. See the April 2004 Family Tree Magazine for in-depth help researching American Indian ancestors.

In 1834, the area became part of Michigan Territory; two years later, it transferred to Wisconsin Territory. Finally, in 1838, Iowa became its own territory. Meanwhile, people from Kentucky, Tennessee, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and other states migrated there. The population blossomed during the decade following state-hood in 1846. Among the newcomers were German, British, Irish, Scandinavian and Dutch immigrants, as well as some Eastern Europeans and Italians. Many had arrived in America through ports in New Orleans,

New York and Canada. The Family History Library (FHL) < www. familysearch.org > and NARA have microfilmed passenger lists and some naturalization records. For naturalizations before 1906, contact the state or county court where your ancestor became a citizen. The subscription Web site Ancestry.com < ancestry.com > (\$155.40 per year) indexes passenger lists from many US ports.

Iowa's agricultural economy meant land was an important commodity. Land claims made while the area was under French and Spanish rule are recorded in the American State Papers collection of congressional documents from 1789 to 1838. These are online at <memory.loc.gov/ammem/amlaw/lwsp.html> and on FHL microfilm.

Uncle Sam opened the Iowa land office in 1838. Records for this publicland state are at the Bureau of Land Management (BLM); the BLM's General Land Office site <www.glorecords. blm.gov> offers a searchable index to many Iowa land patents. NARA has microfilm copies. Go to the State Historical Society of Iowa (SHSI) <www.iowahistory.org> in Des Moines for microfilm of General Land Office Tract Books listing patents issued; they're arranged by legal land description.


If you're having trouble finding early records—especially those from the 1800s, when Iowa's territorial affiliation changed—try consulting resources for the territory it was part of at the time.

A swift population movement to western Iowa prompted officials to move the state capital from Iowa City to Des Moines in 1857. Today, the SHSI has offices in both locations. Although most of their records overlap, check with each location before traveling there to make sure it holds the records you seek.

Bumper crop of lowans

Begin cultivating your Hawkeye State family tree in census records. Iowa's federal enumerations took place every 10 years starting in 1850. Look for them (except for the 1890 count, which was destroyed by fire) on microfilm at the FHL and other large libraries, NARA and both SHSI locations. You also can search the censuses online at Ancestry.com and HeritageQuest Online <heritagequestonline.com> (available through many libraries).

Additionally, the FHL has Iowa's territorial censuses, which exist for 1836 and 1838 (as part of Wisconsin Territory), and 1840, 1844 and 1846 (as part of Iowa Territory). These are head-of-household counts, though the 1840 census also lists the number of males and females by age group.

Iowa tallied its growing population in state censuses, including ones in 1856, 1885, 1895, 1905, 1915 and 1925. Look for them at the SHSI (the Iowa City office doesn't have the 1905 count) and the Iowa Genealogical Society (IGS) < iowagenealogy.org >. Some counties are on FHL microfilm. The 1925 census is a boon for researchers because it recorded everyone's parents' names and places of birth and marriage. IGS volunteer Theresa Liewer notes this census is arranged in an unusual way: "It's organized by county and township, but is presented by 'books.'" The SHSI has indexed the heads of household for the 12 largest towns-look up the name, address and book number, then use the microfilm of that book. Order indexes for each of 22 counties on IGS' Web site (click Publications).

Towns and counties took censuses throughout the 1800s, too. You'll find a list of these enumerations and coverage areas in the FHL's Iowa Research Outline. (From the FamilySearch home page, click Guides, then Research Outline, then Iowa Research Outline.)

Soy many vital records

Iowa began requiring counties to keep vital records in 1880, but many births and deaths went unrecorded until the state passed stronger laws in 1921. Vital records are restricted for 75 years after creation; request older records from the state vital records bureau (see resources). More-recent birth certificates may be available from your ancestor's county. The IGS, SHSI and FHL have microfilmed vital records from every county, and the SHSI offers a statewide index to deaths covering 1904 to 1916.

Counties started keeping marriage and divorce records as early as 1835, but no statewide index exists. To get the records, you'll need to consult the county recorder in the county that issued the license, or search the FHL online catalog for microfilmed copies. For divorces prior to 1906, contact the county's district court. After 1906, you also can check for transcriptions at the state vital-records office. The FHL and the SHSI in Des Moines have copies of divorce records after 1906.

In lieu of official vital records, consult church records, as most churches recorded baptisms, marriages and burial information. FamilySearch's Iowa Research Outline provides a list of church archives; see the February 2004 Family Tree Magazine for more on researching religious records.

Fields of battle

Iowans turned out in droves to support the Union's Civil War effort—at least 75,000 enlisted. You can find Civil War service records on microfilm at the FHL and NARA. Start your search with the Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System <www.itd.nps.gov/cwss>, which indexes 6.3 million Union and Confederate soldier names.

After the war, soldiers formed Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) posts in most Iowa towns. A fraternal and veterans aid organization, GAR was succeeded by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, which offers GAR history and post lists at < suvcw. org/research>. Post minutes, rosters and microfilmed membership cards may provide a member's name, birth information, military service details, and wife's name. The SHSI in Des Moines has records for Iowa posts, and the IGS and the SHSI in Iowa City have microfilmed membership cards. You'll find a microfilmed index to Iowa GAR records at all these places, as well as the FHL. Information on all US military veterans buried in Iowa is in the SHSI's Armed Forces Grave Registrations.

If your male ancestor was between ages 18 and 45 in 1917 or 1918, look for a WWI draft registration at NARA and on FHL microfilm, as well as on Ancestry.com. The Des Moines SHSI also has State Bonus Board case files recording bonuses paid to WWI and WWII vets and their survivors. With resources like these and a little care and nurturing, your family tree will start sprouting branches in Iowa's fields of genealogical opportunity.
