These records consist of folders that are in numerical order which contain the PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY COURT'S CORONERS INQUESTS, 1719-1850, MSA C5-1, 1/21/10/13. These records were made available by and are published courtesy of the Maryland State Archives. This constitutes a new series for the bulletin.

For the Beginner: The records of the Prince George's County Coroners Inquests were hand-written documents made shortly after the death of the individual listed on the left side of each entry. The handwritten texts are given to the right side of the individual's name. Below the description of the cause of death is a list of people who were involved in the coroner's inquest. These individuals include Judges, Jurors and Witnesses. In transcribing these records from the original records, the author has maintained as close to verbatim or exact copy of the original documents as possible. This includes the original spelling. The hyphenated number refers to the document at the Maryland State Archives and the other number is the year of the inquest. These records contain some of the earliest documented names of Afro-American slaves as well as Caucasian citizens in Prince George's County.

Negro Peter

22 July 1719 at Hinnicks Landing on the Western Branch of Patuxent River in Mount Calvert Hundred of Prince George's County. He was the property of Ephriam Gabor of Calvert County. The witnesses saw Negro Peter on the nineteenth July of this instant washing himself in the water & going out of his Depth casually fell into a Deep place Sinking & was Drowned by Misfortune.

Negro Frank

15 May 1803 near the Skittles Alley that piece of land between the Crab fence & the River. He was the property of Ann Eilbeck Johnson, daughter of John Johnson. Originally believed that Negro Frank had accidentally drowned, but depositions given to the Court indicate that there may have been foul play on the part of Richard Hardisty.

Who being duly sworn upon the holy Evangely of Almighty God, and charged to enquire then, where, how and after what manner the said Patrick Burk came to his death, do say upon their oaths that it was an accidental death that took place on the night of the 25th Instant and this they all say.

Upon their oath, they do say that he came to his death by being drowned & to all appearances by accident.

Filed 21 June 1808.

Filed 21 June 1808.

Charles NEVITT JR. 22 July 1806 at the Tavern called Centerville, upon the oaths of several Jurors a Negro Man called Wall, slave of Basil Soper, not having God before his eyes and being moved and deduced by the instigation of the Devil, used a certain knife made of Iron Steel stabbed the said Charles Nevitt Jr. upon the lower part of his body of the Breadth and the Depth of three inches.

DR. C. WALTER ENGLAND DIES

Former member and consummate genealogist, Dr. Charles Walter England died January 25th at the age of 99. Dr. England retained his membership in the PGCBS until 1995. He donated a copy of his book, *Joseph England and His Descendants: An Historical Genealogy of the England Family as Descending from Joseph England 1680-1748. A Quaker Family of Cecil County, Maryland (Prior to 1767 Chester County, Pennsylvania) Since 1723* to our Library.

Members may recall that Bob Mitchell brought Dr. England to one of our January show and share meetings. Bob introduced Dr. England as his "show and tell" - a 95 year old genealogist. Dr. England then regaled us with highlights of his research and subsequent books.

Dr. England was a dairy products technologist who operated dairy testing laboratories in Washington and Frederick, MD, before he retired in 1969. In 1954 he established his own business in Washington, C. W. England Laboratories, which specialized in quality and bacteria testing of dairy products. He was instrumental in the enactment of the first dairy inspection law in Maryland. [Washington Post]

Dr. England is survived by his wife, Edna Swart England, a daughter Nancy E. Tysdal, two granddaughters and four great-grandchildren.

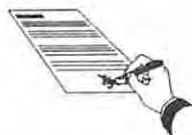

Item: To my tenth son Abiezer one negro girl called Jenny but my will is that she shall remain with & to the proper use & behoof of my son Yate till Abiezer come to the age of 21. Item: To my son Abiezer one feather bed & furniture that stands in the porch chamber the green sett rugg & green curtains and one feather bed that stands in the inner room four high chairs & one new low chaire & two pair of andirons one pott to contain five gllons & one pott to contain one gallon but my will is that all in the custody should remain in the custody & to the proper use of Yate till Abiezer comes to the age of 21. I also give to my son Abiezer one maire called Soupp [Soripp?] & my will is that he have the use of her immediately after my decease also I give to my son Abiezer one iron kettle.

Item: To my son Yates two brass kettles. Item: To my two sons namely Micajah & Yate all my tract of land called "Liford" to be

divided as they shall agree & see fitt. All the rest of my personall estate be equally divided between my two youngest sons namely Yate & Abiezer & my will is that Yate have his part immediately after the apraisement. Item: To my son Yate one bell mettle mortar & pestle. I hereby appoint my two sons Micajah and Yate PLUMMER to my joint executors. Signed: Elizabeth PLUMMER. Proved 23 June 1736 by oaths of Samuell MAGRUDER Sen'r, Andrew SCOTT, Doctor John HASWELL and W'm Mills MAGRUDER, before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Robert MAGRUDER was taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred, PG Co, in 1733 [BB:269]. The inventory of Mr. Robert MAGRUDER's estate was taken 30 Sep. and filed 2 Oct. 1736. Samuel MAGRUDER and Samuel MAGRUDER Jr. signed as next of kin, along with the executrix Mrs. Sarah MAGRUDER. [Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Md. 1733-1738, p.68]

Robert MAGRUDER was b. 11 Oct. 1711, the son of Samuel and Ellinor MAGRUDER. He m. 5 Dec. 1734, Sarah CRABB. His dau. Eleanor MAGRUDER (b. 1735/6), seems to be the person of that name who m. Thomas PRATT, 2 Feb. 1755. Thomas PRATT was b. 8 Mar. 1730, the son of John and Eleanor (WILLIAMS) PRATT. The births of a dau. and son of Thomas and Eleanor PRATT were recorded (ca. 1755-65) but the names and dates are lost. [Queen Anne's Parish register, PG Co]

Thomas PRATT died intestate, PG Co, ca. 1778, with Eleanor PRATT his administratrix. The will of Eleanor PRATT was proved in PG Co, 1795, with Thomas PRATT [her son?] as her executor [IPR p.151].

Samuel MAGRUDER Sr. (the father of Robert) seems to be the man of that name who owned "Good Luck" and "Magruder's Delight." He was the son of Samuel MAGRUDER (1654-1711), son of Alexander MAGRUDER the immigrant (d. 1677). [Bowie. Across the Years in PG Co, p.533-538]

In the register of Queen Anne's Parish we find the following children born to Samuel and Ellinor MAGRUDER: Samuel 1708, Robert 1711, and Zachariah 1714. Elinor MAGRUDER is identified as a daughter of Robert WADE of PG Co, in his will, 1713. [MCW 3:255]. Robert WADE was the son of Zachary WADE of Charles Co. (immigrated 1641, d. 1677). Robert WADE's wife was Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas SPRIGG of PG Co. (1630-1704). [PGCGS Bulletin, 17:37,39 (Nov. 1985)]

There is no record of Samuel MAGRUDER Sr.'s probate in PG Co in the published index [IPR]. It appears that his sons Samuel MAGRUDER Jr. and Zach. MAGRUDER were in Frederick Co, Md, in 1749 when they witnessed the will of their uncle Alexander MAGRUDER [MCW 10:169]. That the son Samuel was still using the "Jr." indicates that Samuel Sr. was still alive at that date, probably living in Frederick Co.

Sarah (CRABB) MAGRUDER was b. 20 Oct. 1717, in Queen Anne's Parish, the daughter of Ralph and Priscilla (SPRIGG) CRABB. Ralph CRABB died testate in PG Co, 1733/4. His will is abstracted and Sarah's ancestry traced in PGCBS Bulletin 22:148-149 (Apr. 1991). Robert and Sarah each have a descent from Thomas SPRIGG (1630-1704), making them second cousins. I have not been able to trace Sarah after Robert's death although she probably remarried.

Pages 262-263. [MCW 7:203] Will of John JONES of PG Co, planter, being of perfect memory. Date: 31 Dec. 1736. Item: To my loving son Henry JONES all that moiety of land belonging to me called "Lyons Hole" & one Negro boy called Peter.

Item: To my loving son John JONES and his heirs lawfully begotten for ever all that part of a tract belonging to me whereon I now dwell called "the Hazard" and my part of a tract called "Partnership" & one Mallatto child named Mary with her increase forever.

Item: To my loving daughter Ann JONES one Negro girl named Susanna with her increase forever.

Item: [Page 263] To my loving daughter Cathern JONES one Negro girl named Sarah with her increase forever, but provided either my said son John, daughters Ann & Cathern or either of them should decease without issue that then their said slave or slaves if any increase to be equally divided to the survivors.

Item: To my son John, daughters Ann & Cathern as vizt: John one feather bed & furniture one mare called Dido & a Negro boy called Robert after my wifes decease. Daughters Ann & Cathern each of them one feather bed & furniture & one Mare called Gift with her increase to be equally divided between them.

Item: To my sons Henry & John daughters Ann & Cathern all the increase that my two Negro women, Moll & Ann shall bring during their natural life to be equally divided between them.

Item: To my loving wife Ann JONES all the remaining part of my estate whatsoever to dispose of as she shall think most meet & fitting for her more competant & comfortable living, and my loving wife Ann JONES to be my whole & sole executrix. Signed: John (✱ ✱) JONES.
Wit: James (f) JOHNSON, Elizabeth (c) GITTINS, Charles WILLET.

Proved 7 Feb. 1736/7 by the oaths of Charles WILLETT & James JOHNSON, before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: In 1733, John JONES was taxed in Lower Piscattaway Hundred, PG Co, along with Charles WILLETT [BB:270]. James JOHNSON was taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred along with John JONES Jr. and Henry JONES [BB:268]. Men named John JONES were also taxed in Mattapany Hundred [BB:267] and Potowmack Hundred [BB:273]. All these reference may refer to the same family, since "Lyon's Hole" and "Partnership" are in the Piscattaway (King George Parish) area, and "Hazard" is in the Mattapany (St. Paul's Parish) area. In 1719, John JONES was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred [BB:164].

The estate of John JONES was inventoried 20 Apr. and filed 23 May 1737 by executrix Ann JONES. Next of kin were Jane EDELEN and Henry JONES. [Skinner, Abstr. Inv. Prerog. Court of Md. 1733-1738, p.79]

Jane EDELEN's name is the clue we need that this John JONES is the son of Moses JONES who d. testate in PG Co, 1704/5. John JONES was under 21 in 1704; his younger brothers Thomas and Notley were under 15; sisters Jane, Anne and Elizabeth were also under age. [MCW 3:60; PGCBS Bulletin, 10:4:7 (Dec. 1978) and 10:5:5 (Jan. 1979)]

Jane dau. of Moses JONES m. 1707 Christopher EDELEN (1682-1771). A deed dated 1727 proves that Thomas and Notley JONES had died without issue (and implies that sister Anne had also), for Jane (wife of Christopher EDELEN) and Elizabeth (wife of Dr. Robert INNIS) had become co-heirs to their land. [Newman, Charles County Gentry, p.188]

In 1748 John JONES, "son of John JONES, who was son and heir to Moses JONES," with wife Elizabeth, sold part of "Partnership" which Moses had patented jointly with William HUTCHERSON [Newman p.175-176]. That patent had been made in 1695 [Hinton, PG Heritage, map].

Edward EDELEN (1676-1756), brother of Christopher EDELEN, married ca. 1705 Elizabeth (d. 1727/31) widow of Moses JONES. They had children Sarah 1705/6 and James 1710. Elizabeth was the daughter of Thomas and Anne JENKINS of Charles Co. Newman shows that in 1731, Jane (JONES) EDELEN, Sarah (EDELEN) QUEEN and James EDELEN (among others) shared in the distribution of their grandparents JENKINS' estate (their mother Elizabeth EDELEN being dead). John JONES is not mentioned as inheriting a share. [Newman p.172-3,185]

If Newman's abstracts are accurate, it is unlikely that John JONES had the same mother as the other children. He was still alive in 1727, and should have been considered heir-at-law of his brothers Thomas and Notley. It was apparently their sisters of the whole blood who became co-heiresses of their estate.

Moses JONES was transported to Maryland in 1675. [Skordas, Early Settlers of Md., p.266]

Henry GUTTRIDGE was appointed a trustee of the estate of Moses JONES, 1704. [MCW 3:60] The will of Henry GUTTEREG, 1711, names his dau. Ann WHEELER as executrix (she perhaps a widow). [MCW 3:215] John JONES becomes his administrator 1712-1719. [IPR p.84] Could Ann (GUTTRIDGE) WHEELER be John's wife?

Ann NORTON (or NARTAN) died intestate in PG Co, ca. 1777, with a John JONES [the son?] as administrator. [IPR p.138,140] Could this be the widow of the testator?

Bible Records Index

Index of Bible records published in the *Bulletin*, Volumes 23-24 (September 1991-June 1993), including all surnames. Surname indexes to previously published Bible records appeared in December 1987 (Volumes 1-18), September 1989 (Volumes 19-20), and September 1991 (Volumes 21-22).

A number to the left of the name indicates a Bible Record for that name. Volume, Number and page follow the name. For example, 109 Adams 24(5)99 means that the Adams Bible Record is in Volume 24, number 5, on page 99. The other number on the right refers to those on the left. Thus, the surname Adams also appears in record number 133, one of the Waters Bibles.

NOTES: The records of the Waters and Laurence families are preceded by a chart showing relationships of the persons mentioned in the Bibles. Surnames from this chart are followed by "a" in this index. The Conn records are introduced by brief family histories. Surnames appearing only in the histories are followed by "h" in this index.

Lancaster vital records before 1850. Then come the records of five churches in the town having extant records before 1850, a death register kept by Rev. George M. Bartol, and private memoranda of births and marriages by Judge Joseph Wilder. Next is found the epitaphs copied from seven cemeteries. Then appears an appendix containing various marriages and births in Lancaster families "made up from sundry sources supposed reliable." Lastly we find a 3-page index of places and a 52-page every-name index.

The preservation of the order of the original entries in the various record books is a useful feature. This system, together with a complete index, is preferable to the more commonly seen alphabetized vital records compilations.

The physical aspects of these volumes are good. Their covers are plastic-coated card stock colored aqua and red, respectively, each featuring an illustration of a colonial gentleman consulting books at a desk in a library. The typography is old-fashioned but very legible. The binding is of the type designated "perfect," i.e., glued. There is no notation as to whether or not the paper used is acid-free, so we must assume that it is not. There is a good comprehensive index of people and subjects in each volume.

Of course, some of the genealogical information supplied by the editor is dated, having been superseded by more modern research. Nevertheless, no one with early ancestors in Lancaster should fail to consult these books. They are available for loan from the reviewer.

The following records are from the Benjamin William and Henrietta (Myers) Reep family Bible. The front of the Bible is embossed: "B.W. & H. Reep." The events recorded are primarily from eastern Pennsylvania and western New Jersey.

Many of the events are not recorded in chronological sequence; although, they appear to be recorded in different inks and written by different hand. In addition, the marriage date of Benjamin and Henrietta should be suspect until proven by other evidence, since the year of their marriage appears to have been altered in two different places.

This Bible record was received in reproduced copy form by the archives of the Reep Family Association (Bladensburg, Maryland) from Linda Griffith (a descendant of the family) of Cedarville, New Jersey. The current owner of the Bible is Teresa Umstead of Trenton, New Jersey.

The following is a transcript of each of the pages of this record:

Page 1 (Marriage Certificate) This is to certify that Benj. W. Reep of Tincum in the State of Pennsylvania and Henrietta Myers of Tincum in the State of Pennsylvania were by me united together in Holy Matrimony on the First day of February in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and 73. In the Presence of W. S. Emery, Southern Pastor and Pastors Wife.

This family Bible record was located through the Periodical Source Index (PERSI) produced by the Allen County Public Library, Fort Wayne, Indiana. The Bible record is part of the Manuscript Collection of the Mesquite Historical and Genealogical Society of Mesquite, Texas. This Society published the record in their June 1973 issue of the Mesquite Tree (Number 2, Volume 9).

The record provided to the Reep Family Association, Inc., contains copies of five pages: four pages are from the Bible and one is a copy of a marriage certificate. No title page from the Bible is available. The current location and owners of the Bible is unknown. The copy of the record is in the custody of the Reep Family Association, Inc., P. O. Box 113, Bladensburg, Maryland.

Date: 21 Jan. 1734 [1735]. 1st. my soul to God. 2dlv. to by loving & only daughter Elizabeth All the tract I now live on call'd "Clyd" containing about 46 acres. to her and her heirs forever. 3dlv. to my said loving daughter all my goods & chattles whatsoever & all debts due to me by bill bond or otherwise the lawfull debts due from me being first paid. I appoint my said daughter Elizabeth my sole executrix. Signed: Rob't CLYD. Wit: George NOBLE, Jo's NOBLE. Matthew RANKINE.

Proved 14 Mar. 1736/7 by oath of Mr. Jos: NOBLE [Page 264]. and he beleves the other subscribing evidences saw & heard the same as he did. Before Pet. DENT. Dept'y Com[missary of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Robert CLOYD was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred. PG Co. 1719 [BB:164]. Robert CLYDE was taxed in Lower part of Piscattaway Hundred, 1733. along with George NOBLE and Mathew RANKIN [BB:270]. Joseph NOBLE Sr. and Jr. were taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred that year [BB:268].

George NOBLE died 14 Sept. 1735. before this will was proved [MCW 7:156. PGCGS Bulletin 23:173-5 (Apr. 1992) and further notes about his origin at 23:218-19 (June 1992)]. It is likely Mathew RANKIN was also dead by 1737.

The register of King George's Parish records the children of Robert and Christian CLYDE: Robert (1710-1715). John (1713-1715). and Elizabeth (b. 2 Jan. 1717 [1718]). Christian CLYDE d. 17 Feb. 1718 [1719].

Robt. CLYD witnessed the will of Thomas ROBINS. also a carpenter. PG Co. Feb. and Mar. 1718/19 [MCW 4:205]. Have found no antecedents for CLYD(E) in Maryland or references before 1710. He may have been a recent arrival. perhaps a companion of George NOBLE and Joseph NOBLE who also arrived during the period ca. 1700-10 (a.v. above).

An inventory of Robert CLOYD dated 24 June 1745 lists James BOLTON as administrator [IPR p.45]. James BOLTON was taxed in 1733 in lower precinct of Mattapanv Hundred [BB:267] and in lower Piscattaway Hundred [BB:270]. If he is the husband of Elizabeth CLYDE. proof should appear in the court minutes and rent rolls.

Page 264. [MCW 7:191] Will of William CLARKSON of PG Co. being sick & weak of body. Date: 21 June 1736. Imprimis: To my eldest son Thomas all that parcel called "Roziers Gift" lving [in] the aforesaid countv of Prince George containing 159 acres to him his heirs & assigns forever. Item: To my sd son Thomas two cows and calves & fourteen pounds sterling to be paid him so soon after my decease as conveniently may be hereby excluding him from any further claim or demand to any part or portion of my sd estate.

Item: To my sons William & Edward all that parcel called "Stoney Hill" lving in the aforesaid countv that is to sav 45 acres formerly laid off in the said tract to be one part & 85 remaining acres to be another part & my sd son William to have his choice of the sd division leaving & bequeathing the sd land called "Stoney Hill" or "Athevs Folly" to them and their heires & assigns forever.

Item: To each of my said sons William & Edward two cows & calves in full of their part or portion of my said estate hereby excluding them from any further claim or demand to any part or portion thereof.

Item: To my dearly beloved wife Elizabeth all the residue of my personal estate so long as she shall remain a widow but in case she shall contract matrimony I will that she retain one third part of the sd residue & that the remaining part be equally divided among my children not herebefore mentioned. Lastly, I appoint my said wife Elizabeth & my forenamed son Thomas to be joint executors & adm'rs. Signed: W'm CLARKSON. Wit: Buttler STONESTREET. James KENDALL. Ignatius (+) HAGEN [MCW: HAGAN].

Proved 25 Aug. 1736 by oaths of Buttler STONESTREET, James KENDALL and Ignatious HAGEN. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The family of William CLARKSON is described in Effie Bowie. Across the Years in PG Co. p.214-219. In 1733. William CLARKSON Sen., William CLARKSON Jr., and Thomas CLARKSON were taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred. PG Co. [BB:268].

William CLARKSON was m. 22 Nov. 1713, in King George's Parish, to Elizabeth HAGIAN or HAGAN. The following children of William and Elizabeth CLARKSON were registered there: Thomas (1714), William (1716), Mary (1717), Elizabeth (1719) and Edward (1721).

William CLARKSON received part of "Stoney Hill" or "Athey's Folly" from the will of his father William CLARKSON who died testate in PG Co. 1703 [MCW 3:34]. The father's will also mentions daughter Elizabeth, brother Notley ROZER, daughter-in-law Martin GALE and wife Ruth. The widow m. Edmund GOODRICK prior to 17 Mar. 1704 [1705] when she filed an estate account as Ruth GOODRICK. Edmund GOODRICK is shown as CLARKSON's administrator 23 Jan. 1706 [1707]. [IPR p.44]

The will of Edmond GOODRICK, Piscataway Parish. PG Co, 1710 (proved 1712). mentions brother George GOODRICK, sister Mary SIMS. sister Julian PRICE. son Wm. CLARKSON, dau. Marton PEARCE, dau. Eliz: SIMS. and wife Ruth [MCW 3:234]. Ruth GOODRICK was administratrix for a Richard FITZPATRICK in PG Co. 1712-13 [IPR p.73].

It is likely that Marton (GALE) PEARCE was a daughter of Ruth CLARKSON GOODRICK by a previous marriage. It appears that her first husband was Edward GAILE who d. testate in Charles Co. Md. 1685. mentioning wife Ruth. Eliza: GOODERICK was a witness to the will [MCW 1:158].

In 1700. Notley ROZER of Charles Co, gent., gave "Roziars Gift" (159 acres in PG Co) To William CLARKSON and Ruth his wife. and after their decease to their son William CLARKSON and his heirs [PG Deeds A:290]. From the wording of the deed and William CLARKSON's will (1703), it seems likely that Ruth was a sister (or half-sister) of Notley ROZER (ROZER was not yet married in 1700). The only two children of Benjamin and Anne (SEWALL) ROZER registered in Charles County court were Notley (1673) and Mary (1675) [Bowie. op.cit.. p.571,582]. If Ruth was married to Edward GAILE by 1685, she was probably b. ca. 1665. Benjamin ROZER was first transported to Md. in 1663, the same year his future wife Anne SEWALL arrived [Skordas, Early Settlers of Md., p.399; Bowie p.581].

Elizabeth (HAGAN) CLARKSON was a daughter of Thomas HAGAN of Charles Co, Md, whose will 1714 names her [Bowie, p.215; MCW 4:66 "Thomas HAGOE"].

Thomas CLARKSON, age 61, his wife Sarah, 59, and 3 children aged 8-30, were living in PG Co. in 1776. Edward CLARKSON, age 54, his wife Martha, 53, and 4 children 15-23 were also there, [Md. Records 1:39,14]. The estate of Edward CLARKSON was inventoried in 1786, though his will was not proved until 1790 [IPR p.43]. Thomas CLARKSON's will, 1777, was proved 1780 in PG Co [Bowie p.216]. The other children have not been traced.

Pages 265-266. [MCW 7:202] Will of John EDGAR of PG Co, being sick & weak of body. Date: 10 Nov. 1736. Imprimis: To my sister Margerett TYLER and her heirs forever 150 acres which I bought of Verlinda HARRISON, being part of a tract called "Markett Overton," also 100 acres part of "Dents Levells," sd 100 acres to be laid out next to the new tenament I seated, I likewise give unto her all the stock of hoggs & cattle & all other goods & chattles to me belonging that is on my plantation seated on the tract of land above mentioned called "Markett Overton" also six Negroes (vidz:) Sambo, Dinah, Pompey, Harry, Charles & Daniel, alsoe 1500 pounds of tobacco's worth of goods out of Mr. EILBECK's store, my best bed and furniture, & my mothers wedding ring, also thirty gallons of rum.

Item: To my sister Joanna MILLSTEED & her heirs forever a tract called "the Adventure" containing 270 acres. I likewise give her one black mare.

Item: To my sister Sarah EILBECK and her heirs forever 200 acres I now live upon being part of a tract called "Whealers Purchase," also a tract called "Long Acre" containing 100 acres, also 100 acres part of a tract called "Dents Levels. also one other tract called "the Horse Pen."

Item: For the use of the Lower Chapple of King Georges Parish for the uses hereafter mentioned. five pounds sterling to purchase a communion plate. with this inscription "the Gift of John EDGAR for the Lower Chapple of King Georges Parish" on the outside, & on the inside "Holynesse to the Lord." five pounds sterling more to purchase a Bible & Common prayer Book for the use of the afores'd Chapple & what other Books the Rev'd John FRASER shall think proper. to be bestowed on the inhabitants of the Lower End of the sd Parish.

Item: To my brother-in-law William EILBECK all my Negroes, white servants, goods, chattels, household Stuff & every other thing or things unto me belonging, and not heretofore disposed of obliging.

hereby him the said William EILBECK in case my nephew John WADE should live to the age of 21 years to pay him the said John WADE a Negro boy or girl about 16 years, also if my neice Sarah Edgar WADE should live to the age of 16 years that he the sd William EILBECK do likewise pay to her a young Negro about 16 years old.

I appoint my brother-in-law William EILBECK sole executor.
Signed: John EDGAR. Wit: John STODDERT, William HITCHINSON. Aaron (A) ACTON.

Proved 22 Nov. 1736 by oaths of Capt'n John STODDERT. Wm HITCHINSON. and Aaron ACTON. [Page 266] Before Pet. DENT. (7-1/2 sides)

NOTES: John Edgar was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred. PG Co, 1719 [BB:164]. In 1733 he was taxed in lower Piscattaway Hundred along with Richard WADE, William EILBECK, Johannah BARNES, John STODDERT, and Aron ACTON [BB:270].

The will of Johanna EDGAR, proved PG Co, 3 Mar. 1730/1, names her son John EDGAR as her executor [MCW 6:180. PGCBS Bulletin. v. 21 (Feb. 1990) which gives some background]. Johanna EDGAR's husband Richard had d. intestate 1719, in PG Co. [IPR p.68]. Richard EDGAR, then of Charles Co, Md, bought land in PG Co, 1700. The births of Richard and Johanna's twin daughters Sarah and Elizabeth, b. 1706, were registered at court 1710 [Dorothy Smith. Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.32].

Elizabeth EDGAR m. Richard WADE 18 Feb. 1728 [1729] in King George (Piscattaway) Parish. She died 2 July 1735. leaving the two children John (16 Nov. 1735 [sic, 1730?]) and Sarah Edgar WADE (29 Dec. 1732).

Joanna EDGAR, the sister, apparently m. (1st) before 1730,---- BARNES who d. before 1733. but no probate has been found in PG Co. A Henry BARNES, also living in Piscattaway Hundred 1719 [BB:164], d. intestate 1727, but his administratrix was named Eliza [IPR p.7]. He did have a next of kin named Joseph BARNES (a son?) who might be Joanna's husband [IPC 1726-29 p.9]. She m.(2nd) 1733/36, Thomas MILLSTEED, whose will in PG Co. 6 Sept. 1737, mentions wife (not named) and unborn child, also brothers Edward, William, and John [MCW 7:229]. Johanna MILLSTEAD was named as administratrix of Thomas MILLSTEAD, 1738 [IPC 1733-38 p.106, IPR p.133].

Margaret TYLER's husband has not been identified. In the King George Parish register is found the birth of William (1706?) son of William and Elizabeth TYLER. A William TYLER who died testate in 1754 may be the same as that boy [IPR p.187]. Much later in the register is the birth of a Joanna Edger TYLER. 1770, daughter of Saml. and Elizabeth TYLER. Samuel is undoubtedly a son or grandson of Margaret (EDGAR) TYLER.

William EILBECK is probably the man of that name who witnessed a will in Charles Co, Md, 1749 [MCW 10:69]. He was also creditor for another estate in Charles Co, 1749 [Harry Newman. Charles County Gentry. p.228]. William EILBECK was also a justice of Charles Co. 1745-1763 [BB: see index]. His will was probated in Charles Co. in 1765 [Magruder. Index of Maryland Colonial Wills. p.146].

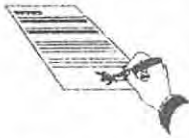

Pages 247-248. [MCW 7:156] Will of John BOWEN of PG Co, being sick in body but of sound and perfect memory. No date. [Likewise in MCW.] To my aunt Ann HARRIS all my crop of tobacco and corn and the share of my negroe man. To my sister Kesiah BOWEN my mare Jenny and a cow with calf to her and her heirs forever. To my cousin [=nephew] Joseph HARRIS one heifer about a year old, to him and his heirs forever. To my cousin Amy HARRIS my Negroe man Joseph my aunt to have this years work of him to her and her heirs forever, but in case the said Amy should die childless then the said negroe be the property of my two sisters Sarah and Ann BOWEN to them and their heirs. The residue of my estate after my just debts are discharged I give to my aunt Ann HARRIS, who is full and sole executrix. Signed: John (JB) BOWEN. Wit: Tho's. HODGKIN, Thomas DORSETT.

Proved 26 Nov. 1735 by oaths of Thomas HODGKIN and Thomas DORSETT. [Page 248] Before Pet. DENT, Dpty Com[missary] of PG Co. (4-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Thomas DORSETT, John BOWEN, Thomas HODGKIN, and Ann HARRIS were taxed in Mattapany Hundred, PG Co, in 1733 [BB:276]. An inventory of the estate of John BOWEN was taken May 1736. Next of kin were identified as Ann HANCE and Kezia BOWEN, his administrator/executor as Samuelli SELBY [Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Md., 1733-1738, p.61]. The next of kin are probably his sisters, showing sister Ann had recently married.

Ann HARRIS was the widow of William HARRIS who died testate in PG Co, 1730, leaving children Joseph, William, and Amy HARRIS, and a son-in-law (stepson) Thomas WEBSTER [MCW 6:163]. She was the daughter of John DORSETT (d. 1711, PG Co. [MCW 3:204]) and his wife Ann (d. 1721, PG Co. [MCW 5:57]). She was unmarried when her father's will was made, but her son Thomas WEBSTER was born before Feb. 1717/18 when her brother John DORSETT made his will [MCW 4:163]. She was Ann HARRISON [sic] by 1721, when her mother's will was made. Ann HARRIS died testate in PG Co, 1751, naming children William HARRIS and Joseph HARRIS, and legatees Kezia BEAVER and Lucy SHERWOOD [MCW 10:158].

John BOWEN was the son of another John BOWEN or BAUEN who died testate in PG Co, 1725/26. In the father's will are mentioned son John, and daughters Elizabeth, Sarah, Felicity, and the two youngest,

Ann and Kessiah. Also mentioned are "sister Elizabeth BOWEN, Nathaniel's wife," and brother Thomas DOSSETT. In my note on this earlier will, I suggested that the elder John was "perhaps the same as John BOWEN Jr. who m. Milcah CLAXTON, 1699, St. James Parish, Anne Arundel Co. His father John d. 1716, Anne Arundel Co." [MCW 5:212; PGCGS Bulletin, v. 19 (Nov. 1987), p.50-51]. This identification is certainly in error.

John BOWEN (d. 1725/26) was m. before 1711 to Elizabeth, daughter of John and Ann DORSETT. The will of John DOSSETT, proved 1711, PG Co, mentions Eliz: BOWING as one of his daughters, as well as Thomas and John DOSSETT as sons. The will of John DORSET (Jr.), 1717/18, mentions sister Eliz. BOWERS, brother-in-law John BOWERS, and nephew John BOWERS, BOWERS apparently being a misreading for BOWEN. The will of Ann DORSET, 1721, mentions daughter Eliza. BOEN, and grandson John BEON Jr. [MCW op.cit.] Elizabeth (DORSETT) BOWEN apparently died 1721/25.

The will of John BOWEN of Anne Arundel Co., 1715/16, mentions eldest son John and his wife Milcah, proving Milcah to be alive at the same time that John BOWEN of PG Co. was married to Elizabeth DORSETT. Also, the A.A.Co. testator had a son named George, but none is named Nathaniel [MCW 4:40].

It is possible that the elder John BOWEN of PG Co. may be the same as a John BONE, servant to Capt. John BAYNE, who was adjudged to be 12 years of age in June 1698 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699, p.350]. If he were b. ca. 1686, his marriage before 1711 would be possible. His tract called "Pies (Pye's) Hard Shift," mentioned in his will is located in Zechia Swamp, in Charles Co, Md. Perhaps his origin should be sought there. John BAYNE also seems to have been a resident of Charles County: a John BAYNE d. testate in Charles Co, 1701 [MCW 2:240].

Page 248. [MCW 7:135] Will of James BRAMEL, sick in body. Date: 16 March 1734 [1735 N.S.]. Impr's: Just debts to be paid. 2dly: To my loving mother Mary BRAMELL her heirs or assigns two tracts vizt: one called "Golden Rod" containing 109 acres or thereabouts, the other being part of a tract called "the Refuse" containing 150 acres or thereabout and both lying in PG Co. I appoint my said loving mother Mary BRAMEL whole and sole executrix. Signed: James (2) BRAMEL. Wit: Dan'l CARROLL, H DARNELL Jun'r., Wm. THOMAS, Richard (R) LENHAM.

Proved 29 April 1735, by oaths of Dan'll CARROLL, Henry DARNELL Junr, William THOMAS, & Richard LANHAM. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Testator was the son of James BRAMELL, saw(y)er, who d. in PG Co, 1728, mentioning in his will his wife Mary, son James and dau. Rebecca, and the tracts "The Refuse," and "Addition to the Golden Rod" [MCW 6:60]. James BRAMELL (the father) was taxed in Piscattawy Hundred, 1719 [BB:164]. James BRAMILL (the son) was taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268].


James BRAMELL was b. 9 Mar. 1711 [1712 N.S.] in King George Parish, PG Co, son of James and Mary BRAMELL. James and Mary BRAMELL also had a dau. Mary 1709; Mary apparently d. before 1728. Daughter Rebecca is not mentioned in the parish register; she probably d. 1728/35, since she is not mentioned in her brother's will. For the father's will see PGCGS Bulletin, v. 20 (Jan. 1989), p.72.

Pages 248-249. [MCW 7:142] Will of Hugh MACKDOGGLE of PG Co, being in perfect and sound health of mind and memory. Date: 18 June 1735.

Impr's: To my loving wife Elizabeth MACDOGGLE one third part of my estate (after my just debts are paid) to her and her heirs forever.

Item: To my son John MACKDOGGLE one third part of the remaining part of my estate, to him & his heirs forever. My execut'x to apply so much of the remaining part of my estate towards my son John's education as shall be (by Mr. Francis HALL of PG Co.) [Page 249] from time to time directed to whose care I earnestly recommend my said son & require my executrix that he be brought up and educated in the manner the said Mr. HALL shall advise and direct, and my said son shall have and enjoy all I have here bequested him at the age of 18 years.

Item: To the poor three barrels of Indian corn to be distributed as shall be directed by the Priest that lives (at the time of my death) on the plantation where Mr. James CARROL deceased lately dwelt.

Item: To my daughters Mary & Elizabeth MACKDOGGLE all the remaining part of my estate to be equally divided between them. I hereby nominate [as] executrix my loving wife Eliz'a MACKDOGGLE. Signed: Hugh (h) MACKDOGGLE. Wit: Robert KNISTUBB[?], Mary (A) POWELL, Mathew (her mark: ) KNUSTUB.

Proved 11 July 1735 by oaths of Robert KNUSTUBB, Mary POWELL and Martha KNUSTUBB. Before D. DULANY, Com[missa]ry. (5 sides)

NOTES: Hugh McDOUGLE was taxed in Patuxent Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:266]. One child of Hugh and Elizabeth MacDUGLE was registered in Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co: Alexander, b. 1727, who apparently died young (before 1735). John MacDUGIL was m. in Queen Anne's Parish, 1757, to Charity DUVAL; their son Samuel was registered there [date lost].

The name MACKDOGGLE/McDOUGAL is rare in early Maryland records. Not found in PG court minutes 1696-1699 nor land records 1696-1709 nor another testator in Maryland 1634-1777 nor headrights (immigrants) 1634-1680. An administration account was filed on a Hugh McDOGGLE (the same?) 6 Aug. 1753, with Benj. RICKETTS as administrator [IPR p.130]. Perhaps this was a settlement after the death of the widow. Benj. RICKETTS is perhaps a son-in-law or the widow's husband. A Benjamin RICKETTS was b. 1708, Queen Anne's Parish, son of Thomas and Rebecca RICKETTS.

Pages 249-250. [MCW 7:135] Will of John PILES of PG Co, planter, being sick of body. Date: 19 April 1735. Item: To my well beloved wife Mary PILES one Negro man called Charles with all and singular my goods chattles household stuff pewter bedding and all

other moveables substance whatsoever now in my possession for her natural life and at her decease to be equally divided among my lawfull children that shall survive her.

Item: To my son [sic] Hunter PILES, Mary PILES, Wm. PILES, John PILES all that tract of land called or known by the name of "Hunters field" to be divided among them in form following that is to say 150 acres to Hunter PILES and the rest to be equally divided [Page 250] and distributed among the other three Mary William & John PILES each one third part to them and their heirs forever.

Item: To my well beloved sons Richard and Francis PILES all that tract called "Hunters Folly" to be equally divided between them and if either of them should die before the[y] come to age the estate to be equally divided [sic, it is not stated who will inherit, presumably "among the rest of my children" is meant].

Item: To Sarah PILES my daughter and to the child that my wife is now big with one tract of land called "Lamesly" [?, same in MCW] to be equally divided between them and if either of them should die before they come to age the land to be equally divided among the rest of my children. Lastly, my wife Mary PILES my full and whole executrix. Signed: John PILES. Wit: Wm. MOORE, Francis HUDSON, the mark (X) of Will'm HARRISON.

Proved 27 May 1735 by oaths of Francis HUDSON and Wm. HARRISON. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co.

May 31, 1735, Wm. MOORE sworn according to form. Pet. DENT, D'ty Com'ry. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: John PILES was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, 1719 [BB:164] and in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. John and Mary PILES had the following children registered in King George Parish: Hunter 1721, Mary 1722/23, William 1724, John 1728/29, Thomas Richard 1729/30. John PILES is named as a son in the will of Francis PILES Sr., PG Co, 1726 [MCW 6:26]. Francis PILES is mentioned in PG Co. court records as early as 1696 [Smith, Court Records, p.6]

An inventory of John PILES' estate was taken Oct. 16, 1735, James PILES and Francis PILES signing as next of kin [=his oldest surviving brothers. Skinner, Abst. Inv. Prerog. Ct. of Md., 1733-1738, p.50].

In Nov. 1735, Hunter PILES, aged (as is said) 16 years or thereabouts [sic, if he was b. 30 May 1721, he would be less than 15], chose Leonard PILES [his uncle] to be his guardian [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.84]. Mary PILES [probably the daughter of John] m. 1739, in King George Parish, John LANHAM "ye 3rd," (b. 1712, son of John and Mary (DICKINSON) LANHAM). They had the following child registered there: Hunter LANHAM 1739/40.

John PILES m. Mary, daughter of William HUNTER Sr., whose will, 1728, mentions his wife Rebecca and a former wife, son William, dau. Mary wife of John PILES, and grandchildren Hunter, William, John and Mary PILES, and Thomas HUNTER [MCW 6:67].

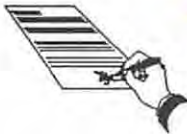
From the Chesterfield Baptist Church, Chesterfield Co., VA records. In 1775, was shown on the microfilm, and after the following item, the words "DO NOT PRINT."

Memorandum for the Flux: First give a Vomet for Decoctions: Take red roots, Black Haw White Shumate Sassafrzx Cumphrey, Eliompane and the inside Bark of Prosimmon of Wuantitys when Chopt fine and equal, then Boil them long, Give in small quantity and often. (And if our ancestors could survive THAT prescription -- they could survive ANYTHING!!)

Pages 250-251. [MCW 7:136] Will of John TALBOT, planter of PG Co, being weak in body. Date: 12 April 1735. To my son Thomas this Plant'n on which I live & to my son Paul the oyr'r [=other] part of it bought of Madam ADDISON after my wifes decease & my will is that Negroe Beverly after my wifes decease be equally divided among my four children Paul John Alice and Elizabeth. [Sic, presumably the slave is to be sold and the proceeds divided.] Item: To my sons Benjamin & Thomas two coves and all the rest of my my personal estate after my just debts are paid I give to my wife Sarah whom I constitute my sole executrix. Signed: John TALBOT. Wit: John EVANS, William TALBUTT, J. Fraser.

Proved May 30, 1735, by the oaths of John EVANS and William TOLBUTT, they saw John TALBUTT the dec'd testator sign the foregoing will. Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co.

June 25, 1734. [1735 is meant.] Then came Paul TALBUT being heir at law & on hearing the will & probat read made this objection that the land left to his bro'r Tho's was what came by his mother & in right belonged to him. Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co.

July 4, 1735. Came Sarah TALBUTT & declaired it is her detarmination to stand to the devise of her dec'd husbands will & relinquish her thirds of the same estate. Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (4-1/2 sides)

NOTES: John TALBURT was m. 2 Feb. 1696 [1697 N.S.] to Sarah LOCKYER, in King George's Parish, PG Co. Their children's births registered there: Paul 1697, Thomas 1699, John 1700 [1701], Alice 1703, Benjamin 1705, Osburn 1708, Ann 1712, William 1715, Sarah 1718 [1719], Thomas 1720.

Paul TALBUTT m. 1719, Ann JOHNSTON and had Sarah 1719 [1720], Eliz'a 1721 [1722]. John TALBURT (Jr.) m. 1722(?), Mary RIAGES(?). [All in King George's Parish register.] The elder son Thomas (1699) apparently d. before 1720. Alice, Benjamin and Thomas (1720) were alive in 1735. Elizabeth's birth is not shown in the published register; perhaps it occurred ca. 1710.

John TALBURT had his livestock mark recorded in PG Co. in November 1697, at the same time as Thomas LOCKYER [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, 1696-1699, p.283].

In Thomas LOCKYER Senr.'s will, 1721, he names only his wife Elizabeth, daughter Frances (perhaps the birth registered in King George Parish, 1718 as a son, Francis), two children-in-law

LAWS OF GENEALOGY

The following has been excerpted from *Lifeline*, Vol. 24, No. 1 (September 1988) published by the Genealogical Society of Riverside, CA.

No one in your family tree ever did anything noteworthy, always rented property, was never sued, and was never named in wills.

Yours is the ONLY last name not found among the 3 billion in the Mormon Archives in Salt Lake City.

Copies of old newspapers have holes which occur only on last names.

You learned that great Aunt Matilda's executor just sold her life's collection of family genealogical materials to a flea market dealer "somewhere in New York City."

That ancient photograph of four relatives, one of whom is your progenitor, carries the names of the other three.

The will you need is in the safe on board the "Titanic."

(stepchildren) James JOHNSON and Elizabeth JOHNSON, and son Thomas, but gives twelve pence to "every one of my children by my former wife." [MCW 5:91, PGCGS Bulletin, v.18 (1987), p.154-155]. Daughter Frances is given "half of that plantation whereon Jn'o TALBOT now dwells," apparently TALBOT owning it in his wife's right, the same land that Paul TALBOT claimed by primogeniture.

Thomas LOCKYER's wife Elizabeth appears to be the widow of Robert JOHNSON whose inventory was filed 17 Aug. 1717 [IPR p.108]. Robert and Elizabeth JOHNSON had the following children registered in King George's Parish: Elizabeth 1709?, Benjamin and Joseph (twins), 5 Dec. 1715, and Francis 19 Feb. 1718. The latter three are also registered as the children of Thomas and Elizabeth LOCKER (same dates).

In 1703, Robert JOHNSON of PG Co, deeded 100 ac. of "Cuckold's Rest," formerly in Calvert Co., inherited by his wife Elizabeth from her father Thomas HIDE [PG Deeds C:64]. Thomas HIDE of St. Mary's Co. made his will Feb. 1697 [1698] naming daughters Mary KILLOW and Eliza: JOHNSON, and wife Hannah [MCW 2:141]. It was granted to Thomas HIDE in 1681 [Hienton, PG Heritage, tract map].

Thomas LOCKER of PG Co, on 28 Oct. 1699, gave 88 acres, one half of a 170 acre tract called "Langley" in PG Co, formerly Charles Co, to John TALLBUTT (or TALLBOT) and Sarah his wife, for "fatherly love he beareth toward his natural born daughter Sarah, the wife of John TALLBUTT" [PG Deeds A:195]. "Langly" was granted to Thomas LOCKER on 16 Jan. 1695 [1696] [Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, tract map].

Thomas LOCKER made a deposition, Apr. 1703, in which he identified a tree in the boundary of "St. Elizabeths" that he had known for 16 years (since ca. 1687) [PG Deeds C:95].

Family naming patterns suggest that John TALBOT's father may have had the given name Paul, but have found no Paul TALBOT in Maryland in the previous generation. Have been unable to connect this John with the TALBOTS of St. Mary's or Anne Arundel Counties. Perhaps he was a recent immigrant in 1696.

John TALBUB Sen., Thomas LOCKER Sen., Thomas LOCKER Jr., John LOCKER were taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:164]. In 1733, the following were taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred: Paul TALBOTT, John TALBOTT Jr., John TALBOTT Sen., William TALBOTT, Benjamin TALBOTT, John LOCKHER Sen., John LOCKHER Jr., Thomas LOCKHER Sen., Thomas LOCKHER Jr., Walter LOCKHER [BB:268].

An account was filed on the estate of Sarah TALBOT, in PG Co, 1762, Paul TALBOT administrator [IPR p.179]. Paul TALBURT's will was filed in PG Co, 1778 [ibid.].

Pages 251-252. [MCW 7:128] Will of John POTTENGER of PG Co, being in good health of body & of sound & perfect mind & memory. Date: 2 Aug. 1734. My body I committ to the Earth to bne decently buried att the discretion of my sons Samuel & Robert POTTENGER whom I leave and appoynt to be my Administrators over my whole personal Esteat. Item: It is my will that my sons Sam'll & Robert POTTENGER have all Negroes into their part of my personall Esteat if they think good to keep them. Item: To my sons Samuel & Robert POTTENGER all my wearing apparall. Item: To my sons Samuel & Robert POTTENGER my House att Queen Ann Town with all my coopers & carpenters tools to them & their heirs forever.

Item: To my son Samuel POTTENGER 20 acres being on the north & east side of that 180 acres I some time ago convey'd to him by deed of gift begining att a bounded red oak standing att the end of the fifth line of the afs'd land & running thence north with the said land 92 perches then east 35 perches then south 92 perches then west to the first tree to him & his heirs forever.

Item: To my grandsons Samuell & Robert POTTENGER the sons of my son Samuel POTTENGER 31 pounds ten shillings sterling each of them. Item: To my grandson Robert POTTENGER the son of my son Robert POTTENGER my new dwelling plantation with 126 acres to him & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten in marriage forever. Item: To my grandson William POTTENGER the son of my son William POTTENGER deceased the plantation whereon his father lived on with 123 acres being the north east part of my land to him & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten in marriage forever.

Item: The land before given to my grandson William POTTENGER be kept in the possession of my administrators without prejudice to the land till he arrive att the age of 16 years & then to have liberty to work on & make use of his land & the rents becoming due for the use thereof be apply'd to educate & bring up my sd grandson William & keep the houses on the s'd land in repair till [he] come to the age afores'd. Item: If my grandson William POTTENGER die without heirs of his body as beofre mentioned that then his land before left him be equally divided between my two sons [Page 252] Samuel & Robert POTTENGER & their heirs forever. Item: To my grandson John PURNELL the son of my daughter Rachell 100 acres being on the north of Matts Branch that falleth into Potowmack river called "Newberry" to him and his heirs forever. To my grandson Richard PURNELL the brother of John PURNELL 100 acres called "the remainder" of 500 acres which I bought of Nathaniel WICKHAM Jun'r to him & his heirs forever.

Item: To my daughter Verlinder WADE 200 acres called "as good as wee could gett" binding on the Muddy branch that falleth into Patowmack River to her & the heirs of her body forever.

Item: My administrators to pay to the Rev'd John ORME my subscription for one year altho my death may happen before the time of the year that he began his ministry amongst us.

Item: To my grand daughter Sarah POTTENGER the daughter of my son John POTTENGER deceased the sum of eight pounds.

Item: I hereby make voyd all my book debts against my children.

Item: Their being due to my grand daughter Sarah POTTENGER 123 pounds 16 shillings & eleaven pence that the same be kept in my administrators hands to pay her when she lawfully demands itt.

Item: The remainder part of my personal estate to be devided equally in seven parts & that my sons Samuel & Robert POTTENGER my daughters Sarah ISAAC, Rachel PURNELL and Verlinda WADE have five of the afores'd seven parts equally divided amongst them in spetia [=specie] & that the other two parts be kept in my administrators hands & one part of the two paid to my son William POTTENGERs children in money according to inventory when they come to the age of 16 years & the other part of the seven be kept in my administrators hands & paid to my daughter Mary HOLMES children in money according to inventory when they arrive att the age of 16 years.

Item: The part of my estate before left to my grandson William POTTENGER altho itt is expres'd that my administrators shall pay itt

at 16 years of age to him itt shall be with this proviso that he make no use [of] itt in bargaining without the consent of his Unkle POTTENGERs otherwise to be paid him when he arrive att the age of 20 years.

Item: Itt is my desire that my neighbours John LAMAR & Francis HALL do overlook & see this my will performed revoaking & imaking voyd all former wills by me made. Signed: John POTTENGER. Wit: John LAMAR, Francis HALL, Thomas (T) MULLIKIN.

Proved 7 April 1735 by oaths of John LAMAR, Francis HALL and Thomas MULLIKIN. Before Pet. DENT, D'ty Com'ry of PG Co. (11-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The children of John and Mary POTTINGER are recorded in the register of Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co: Sarah 1688, Mary 1689, John 1691, Samuel 1693, Robert 1694/5, Rachel 1700, Jemima 1702, William 1704, and Verlinder 1706.

The will of John POTTINGER Jr. was recorded on p. 109 of Will Book 1, and was proved 24 Mar. 1719 [1720] [IPR p.150, MCW 5:2; I apparently missed abstracting it (and other documents?) between p.109-111; cf. PGCGS Bulletin, Jan. and Feb. 1987]. He mentions wife Sarah, an unborn child, father John POTTENGER, brother Richard PURNALL, brothers Samuel and Robert. Apparently the unborn child was named Sarah; she was mentioned in the her grandfather's will in 1734.

Samuel POTTINGER (b. 1693) m. 1717, in Queen Anne's Parish, Eliza: TYLER, dau. of Robert TYLER. The will of Samuel POTTENGER, PG Co, 1735 [1736] names wife Elizabeth, children Samuel, Robert, John, Susannah, Elizabeth, Jemima, Mary MULLIKIN, and Priscilla, and father TYLER. It was proved 25 Mar. 1742 [MCW 8:163].

Robert POTTINGER (b. 1694/5) m. 1718, in Queen Anne's Parish, Ann EVANS. The will of Robert POTTENGER of PG Co, 20 Mar. 1735/6, proved 5 June 1738, names wife Ann, and children John, Mary, Richard, Robert, Elizabeth BOWIE, Ann, Rachel, Sarah, and Ellenor [MCW 7:249].

William POTTINGER (b. 1704), was dead by 10 Sep. 1728 when his inventory was filed in PG Co. by Rachael POTTINGER, apparently his widow [IPR p.150]. This will proves he had a son named William.

Sarah POTTINGER (b. 1688) m. Richard ISAAC and had children registered in Queen Anne's Parish: Mary 1712, Rachel 1716, Kezia 1719, Richard 1720/1, Drusilla 1723, and Jemima 172-. Richard ISAAC's will was filed in PG Co, 1759 [IPR p.104].

Mary POTTENGER (b. 1689) m. William HOLMES, 1711, in All Hallow's Parish, Anne Arundel Co, Md., and had the following child registered in Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co.: Edward 1713. The will of William HOLMES, 1740, was proved in PG Co, 27 Mar. 1741. It names wife Mary, children Edward, John, William, Mary BRASSHEAR, Clara MEKKEAN, Sarah, Jemmima, Vorlinda, Rachel, Elizabeth, and Febe [MCW 8:132].

Rachel POTTINGER (b. 1700) m. Richard PURNELL, and had children registered in St. James' Parish, Anne Arundel Co.: Anne 1720, John 1722, Richard 1724/5, Mary 1726, William 1729.

A John POTTINGER was transported to Maryland in 1665, probably this testator [Gust Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland, p.368]. John POTTENGER witnessed the will of George COLLINS, 1683, Calvert Co, Md. [MCW 1:131].

MORE COMPUTER GENEALOGY NOTES

Before you choose your computer, choose the software (programs) for it. Then choose a computer on which this software can be used.

Budget tight? You can buy a used computer, or use one at any of several public libraries. Even if you've never SEEN a computer, you're welcome at our computer meetings.

I've heard that most genealogy programs are written for IBM (and compatible) microcomputers, using the DOS or MS-DOS operating system. We're discuss-

ing DOS and MS-DOS basics for beginners, probably a brief lesson at each meeting, in addition to other topics which may be announced.

CORRECTION: In the October issue, p.40, among my editorial comments on the will of John BOWEN (Will Book 1, pages 247-248), I interpreted the term "cousin" (as applied to Joseph HARRIS) to mean "nephew." The term cousin could be used during colonial times to indicate a variety of kinships, including those of nephew and niece. An examination of the notes however will show that the Joseph HARRIS in question was indeed the first cousin of the testator, since he was the son of John BOWEN's aunt, Ann HARRIS. [DLW]

Pages 253-254. [MCW 7:136] Will of Elizabeth HEPBURN of PG Co, widow, relict of of Patrick HEPBURN of the same county Gent'n dece'd being sick and weak of body. Date: 4 Feb. 1734 [1735].

Item: To my loving daughter Elizabeth BEALL ten pounds sterling, allso I give her one pint silver tankard to be kept in remembrance of me.

Item: To the Reverend Mr. John ORME the sum of five pounds current money.

Item: To my grand daughter Mary WILLSON the sum of ten pounds current money.

Item: To my loving daughter in law Margaret DICK ten pounds current money and a mourning ring with two diamonds and a cypher in the middle.

Item: To my grand daughter Elizabeth SCOTT all my wearing linnen with all my hoods and scarfs.

Item: To my daughter Elizabeth BEALL and to my two grand daughters Mary WILLSON and Elizabeth SCOTT and my daughter in law Margaret DICK all the rest of my wearing apparel to be equally divided between them.

Item: To my said grand daughter Elizabeth SCOTT a tract of land which was mortgaged to me by Alexander FALCONAR to her and her heirs forever.

Item: All the rest and residue of my good chatels and personal estate I give and bequeath unto my loving son in law John HEPBURN and my grand daughter Elizabeth SCOTT to be equally divided between them but in case the said John HEPBURN shall make any charge claim or demand of any kind whatsover against my estate then my will is that he take nothing by the bequests aforesaid to him.

I make my said son in law John HEPBURN and George SCOTT executors of this my will. Signed: Elizabeth HEPBURN. Wit: Jo's BELT, John SPRIGG, Tho: CLARK.

May 30, 1735: Then came Coll. Jos: BELT, John SPRIGG & Thomas CLARK and declare they saw Mrs. Elizabeth HEPBURN the dece'd testator sign the foregoing will & following codicill. Sworn before Pet. DENT, Dep'ty Com'ry of PG Co.

[Codicil:] I Elizabeth HEPBURN of PG Co, widow, [Page 254] do by this present codicil confirm said last will and testament but do make this alteration: To my son in law John HEPBURN my Negro man named Ben and my Negroe woman named Chimby which I desire he may take to his own use before any division be made as mentioned in my said will and my further will is that my said son in law John HEPBURN shall pay to my grand daughter Elizabeth SCOTT twelve pounds current money out of what I have given and bequeathed him. I do also give my great grandson Lingan WILLSON son of Lingan WILLSON one Negro boy named Lieutenant and then the remainder of my estate to be divided as mentioned in my will aforesaid. This 14th March 1734 [1735]. Signed: Eliz'a HEPBURN. Wit: Thomas SPRIGG, John SPRIGG, Tho: CLARK.

May 30th 1735. Then came Thomas SPRIGG, John SPRIGG and Thomas CLARK, three subscribing evidences to the above codicil, declare they saw Mrs. Eliz'a HEPBURN the dec'd testator sign it. Sworn before Pet. DENT, Dept'y Com'ry of PG Co. (9-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Madame HEPBURN and Henry DICK were taxed in Patuxent Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:266]. Elizabeth HEPBURN, John HEPBURN, Lingan WILSON and George SCOTT were taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred in 1733 [BB:269]. In 1719 Dr. HEPBORN was taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred [BB:159], and Dr. HEPBURN in Patuxent Hundred [BB:162]. The inventory of Patrick HEPBURN deceased was filed 21 Dec. 1728 by Eliza HEPBURN [IPR p.94]. Dr. Patrick HEPBURN served as a justice and coroner of Prince George's County court [Hienton, PG Heritage, p.18, 21].

On 15 Oct. 1711, Patrick HEPBURN of PG Co, gent., made a deed of gift to Richard BENNETT of Talbot Co., Esq., in consideration that a marriage is speedily intended between said Patrick HEPBURN and Elizabeth HOLDSWORTH of Calvert Co., widow and relict of Samuel HOLDSWORTH late of Charles Co., dec'd, and in consideration of a competent and sufficient jointure to be had and made for said Elizabeth HOLDSWORTH. The tract conveyed was "Weymouth," 517 acres, also lots 8 and 9 in Marlborough. [PG Deeds E:147, cited in Effie Bowie, Across the Years in Prince George's County, p.446.]

The will of Samuel HOLDSWORTH of Calvert Co, 10 Dec. 1710, was proved 24 Feb. 1710 [1711], naming son Thomas, sister Anne HASELDINE, and her children Charles, William and Martha, brother John HOLDSWORTH. Elizabeth BUCKERFIELD to receive maintenance during life or while she remains single, and one third of personalty. If she shall marry sd. portion to constitute dower. [MCW 3:185] It seems that Elizabeth BUCKERFIELD [BUTTERFIELD?] might be the same as the widow HOLDSWORTH named in Patrick HEPBURN's deed.

The inventory of Henry DICK deceased was filed by Margaret DICK, 23 Mar. 1742 in PG Co. [IPR p.56]. The will of George SCOTT was filed in PG Co, 1771 [IPR p.162]. The will of John HEPBURN was filed in PG Co, 1775 [IPR p.94].

Rev. John ORME was pastor of the Patuxent Presbyterian congregation at Upper Marlboro [Hienton, PG Heritage, p.98].

Pages 254-255. [MCW 7:161] Will of Francis WHEELER of PG Co, planter, being sick & weak of body. Date: 3 Nov. 1735. Imprimis: A piece of land lying on the upper side of Joseph NOBLEs plantation (being part of "Majors Choice") unto my son William WHEELER and his heirs forever, but in case that he the said William die without lawfull heir then it must fall to my son Leonard WHEELERs second son called John & his heirs forever. I likewise give the piece of land lying on the other side of Joseph NOBLEs plantation joyning to FRANKLINs land unto my son William WHEELER & his heirs forever but with a proviso that if he the said William dies without lawfull heir then the said piece of land is to fall unto Joseph NOBLEs son Francis & his heirs forever.

Item: The lease is to make good the deed [Page 255] given to Joseph NOBLEs son Joseph in case any land is taken from him.

Item: I give the land together with all the improvement which I live on now called "Majors Choice" unto my son Francis WHEELER & to his heirs forever, but in case that he the said Francis die without lawfull issue than the said land is to return unto my son Clement WHEELER & to his heirs forever.

Item: To my son Ignatius WHEELER & to his heirs forever that tract or p[ar]cell of land lying in Calvert Manor joining to Mr. NOBLEs land near the head of Aqua Creek containing 80 acres, but in case that he my son Ignatius dies without lawfull heir that it shall fall unto my son Leonard WHEELER's child called Ignatius & to his heirs forever.

Item: To Mary NOBLE the daughter of Joseph NOBLE & to her heirs forever one pacing mare colt.

Item: To my daughter Ann JONES two barrows & one breeding sow & to her heirs forever, & I likewise give her my black horse & the brown heifer & calf now in their possession, & to her heirs forever.

Item: I give my two feather beds & the furniture therunto belonging between my two sons Ignatius & William & their heirs forever to be equally divided.

Item: To my son Francis & unto his heirs forever my Negroe man Charles & he the said Francis in requital is to give unto my daughter Ann JONES 600 pounds of tobacco and three barrels of Indian corn every year during Negroes life.

Item: To my son Francis & his heirs forever one heifer now big calf.

Item: To my daughter Ann JONES one looking glass now in her possession.

Item: The remaining part of my mares & horses & hoggs to be equally divided amongst my four sons, videlicet: Leonard & Francis & Ignatius & Clement whom I make my whole and soul executors.

Item: I leave to be equally divided between my five sons all the furniture & moveables belonging to the plantation & one not before mentioned. [Seems to mean one son not mentioned in previous paragraph is included, i.e. William.]

Item: To my son Francis WHEELER 5000 nails.

Item: The 600 pounds of toabcco oweing me by Charles ROBINSON unto my daughter Ann JONES and I likewise give her the said Ann six barrils of Indian corn.

Item: To my son Clement one cow and calf now in his possession &

to his heirs forever. Signed: F. WHEELER. Wit: Peter ROBINSON, Henry JONES, Wm. PRSLEY[?], MCW: PRESLEY], James JOHNSON.

Proved 8 Feb. 1735/6 by oaths of Wm. PRASLEY[?] and Peter ROBINSON, before Pet. DENT, Deputy Com'ry of PG Co. (9-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Francis WHEELER was taxed in 1733 in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, PG Co, along with Francis Jr. [BB:268]. Francis and Winifrett WHEELER had the following children registered in King George's Parish, PG Co: Leonard 1691, Mary 1693, Charity 1699, Francis and Winnefrett (twins) 1701 [1702], William 1704, Clement 1706, Ignatius 1709, Anne 1712.

The King George register shows the marriage of Charity WHEELER Jan. 27 ---- [ca. 1719] to George NOBLE, and her death 3 Sept. 1735. Mary WHEELER was m. 1708 to Joseph NOBLE. For information about their families see PGCGS Bulletin, April and June 1992. It seems reasonable to believe that the wife of George NOBLE was the daughter of Francis WHEELER, despite there being no mention of her or her children in her father's will.

Also recorded in that parish are children of Leonard and Elizabeth WHEELER: George 173-, Ignatius 173-, Samuel 173-, and Edward 1738. Francis and Eliz'a. WHEELER had Samuel 1742. Clement WHEELER m. 1732/3, Elizabeth EDELEN and had: Catharine 1734, Clement 1737/8.

Leonard WHEELER d. in PG Co, before 5 Jan. 1764 when his estate was inventoried, Elisabeth WHEELER being his administrator. Leonard WHEELER and Elisabeth WHEELER are shown as his next of kin [Skinner, Abstract of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Maryland, 1763-1766, p. 28].

Francis WHEELER (Jr.) was living "below Piscataway, Prince George's County," in 1752 when he advertised he had found a stray mare [Karen Green, The Maryland Gazette, 1727-1761, p.110].

In the 1776 census of St. John's and Prince George's Parishes, PG Co, Francis WHEELER is shown as aged 85 [sic, should read 75], Elizabeth was 55, and a male in the household is shown as 28 (perhaps Samuel, though the age is wrong). [Brumbaugh, Md. Records, 1:71].

The inventory and account of Clement WHEELER were filed in PG Co, 9 Mar. 1750, by Elizabeth WHEELER [IPR p.198]. The inventory of Ignatius WHEELER was filed 28 Mar. 1771 by Hezekiah WHEELER [ibid.].

Francis WHEELER (the testator) is named as a son in the will of John WHEELER of Charles Co, 11 Nov. 1693, proved 9 Jan. 1694. He inherited 187 acres, "Mayor's Choice," and 96 acres "Middleton's Lot." [MCW 2:88] "Major's Choice" was patented to John WHEELER in 1687, "Middleton's Lot" was granted to Robert MIDDLETON, 1688; both parcels were in Charles Co. before 1696 [Hienton, PG Heritage, land grant map].

The births of several children of John WHEELER are recorded in Charles Co. court proceedings, 1654-1665 [Archives of Md. 60:117]. Francis is not named there, but is named after Ignatius (b. 1665) in their father's will, suggesting he was b. ca. 1667/70.

Among Maryland land grants are several claiming persons named John WHEELER as a headright, dates of immigration ranging from 1653 to 1675 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland, p.497-498].

My daughter Julie was born on October 31, 1858 in 66 6th Street, City of New York.

My daughter Eugenie, or Jenny, was born on February 22, 1860 in No. 123 Avenue A, City of New York.

My Daughter Helen was born on March 24, 1862 in 123 Avenue A, City of New York.

My daughter Minnie was born on February 6, 1870 in 409 Fourth Avenue, City of New York.

Marriage

I, Jacob Hysler, married Miss Auguste Krome on January 4, 1856, in New York City.

Deaths

My dear daughter Helen died on January 1, 1868, at 397 Third Avenue, New York. The pain was great when she passed away but deeper yet was our pain when on July 4, 1872, our dear and precious son George died after a short but painful sickness. He had an abdominal infection at 16 years of age and died in 242 East 27th Street, New York.

Page 256. [MCW 7:193] Will of Robert SKINNER of PG Co, gentleman, being of sound and disposing mind and memory. Date: 25 Aug. 1736. To my broth'r Nath'l SKINNER all the Marsh I hold in PG Co, to him [and] his heirs forever.

To Nath'l and Mackall SKINNER all the remainder of my lands, to be equally divided by a north and south line between my brothers Mackall and Nathan'l SKINNER, my brother Mackall to have the west part and my brother Nath'l to have the east joyning to the marsh to them and their heirs forever, but in case my mother Mrs. Ann BRUSE shall take her whole thirds out of the lands given to my broth'r Nath'l then I give unto my brother Nath'l SKINNER one third part of the land here given to my brother Mackall SKINNER, to him and his heirs forever. The remainder of my whole estate I give unto my brother Nathaniel SKINNER.

Lastly I doe nominate my brother Nathan'l SKINNER to be executor of this my will. Signed: Robert SKINNER. Wit: Tho's GANTT, Alex'r MAGRUDER, Wm. (W.R) READD.

Proved 1 Oct. 1736 by oaths of Mr. Thomas GANTT Sen'r, Alex'r MAGRUDER & Wm. READD. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com[missa]ry of PG Co. (4 sides)

NOTES: Robert SKINNER and Nath[aniel] SKINER were taxed in lower precinct of Mattapany Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:267]. In 1719, Mr. BRUCE [sic] was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred [BB:160]; he is gone in 1733. Since no SKINNER was taxed there in 1719, this probably represents the SKINNER household (unless they were still in Calvert County). Robert SKINNER was a vestryman of St. Paul's Parish in 1733 [Hienton, *PG Heritage*, p.62]. Mackall SKINNER was a vestryman of St. Paul's Parish, PG Co, 1750 and 1751 [BB:662,695].

In Aug. 1728, Mackall SKINNER aged 20 last January [thus b. Jan. 1707/8] made choice of his brother Robert SKINNER as guardian. At the same time, Nathaniel SKINNER aged 17 last April [thus b. April 1711], also chose his brother Robert SKINNER as guardian [Smith, *Orphans and Infants of PG Co*, p.97-98].

James MACKALL of "The Clifts," Calvert Co, Md, died testate 1693, leaving wife Mary and five children, John, James, Benjamin, Ann, and Eliza[beth] [MCW 2:52-53]. Ann, unmarried in 1693, seems to be the right age to be the mother of the SKINNER brothers (b. ca. 1700-1711, including a son named Mackall) and to have m. later, possibly before 1719, certainly before 1736, a Mr. BRUCE.

The will of Mary MACKALL of Calvert Co, 25 Jan. 1715 [1716] cinches this theory. Her will, proved in 1718, names son John (and wife Susannah), son James (and wife Ann), daughters Ann and Elizabeth SKINNER, and son Benjamin. She also mentions Mary (dau. of James MACKALL), Mary (dau. of William SKINNER), and Ann (dau. of Robt. SKINNER) [MCW 4:174].

Another will seems to bear on this problem: Mary TANEY of Calvert Co. died between 10 Aug. 1711 and 29 Aug. 1712. Her will names brothers [apparently half-brothers] Benjamin, Mackall, Nathaniel and Robert SKINNER Jr., and sister Anne SKINNER. Her father-in-law [step-father] Robert SKINNER is named executor, he to pay her sister Ann and brother Mackall (SKINNER) money due the testator from the estate of her father John TANEY [MCW 3:230]. If, as seems likely, this is the same family, then Ann MACKALL must have married (1) John TANEY, (2) Robert SKINNER [Sr.], and (3) Mr. BRUCE. Her daughter Ann SKINNER, living in 1711 and 1715, appears to have died before 1736, probably without issue. Her son Benjamin SKINNER likewise seems to have d.s.p. before 1736. (They were both probably dead by 1728.) John TANEY probably died in Calvert Co. ca. 1700/5. Robert SKINNER Sr. is not found in PG Co.; he probably died intestate in Calvert Co. 1711/19; he was certainly dead by 1728 (Mr. BRUCE may also be dead by that time).

"Robert SKINNER settled in Calvert Co. during the Puritan era, probably about 1658. [He is not found in Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland.] Robert SKINNER married Ann, the widow of James TRUMAN. His plantation, called "The Reserve," originally "Truman's Reserve," is situated on the road leading from Prince Frederick to Dare's Wharf. He also secured grants of adjacent tracts called "Border" and "Scrapp." He died in 1686 and named his eldest son Robert as guardian for his younger sons, Clark, William, and Adderton SKINNER. His will also mentions his daughter Mary, the wife of Joseph LETCHWORTH, and his daughter Elizabeth, the wife of Thomas GREENFIELD." [Charles Stein, History of Calvert Co, Md., p.311; MCW 2:8. Daughter Elizabeth GREENFIELD is not named there, only a son-in-law Thomas GREENFIELD.] The oldest son, Robert, must be the man who married Ann MACKALL.

The will of Ann SKINNER, widow of the emigrant, dated 4 May 1713, proved 19 June 1714, Calvert Co, names her three sons, calling Clarke SKINNER her eldest son [MCW 4:14]. If Robert were still alive, he could not be her son. The will of Mary MACKALL (above) implies that Robert SKINNER was still alive in Jan. 1715/16. Being made guardian of his brothers he was apparently adult in 1686. He must have been born to a previous marriage, since Ann, widow of James TRUMAN, m. Robert SKINNER (1st) after TRUMAN's death in 1672 [MCW 1:70].

Robert SKINNER (2nd, the testator's father) appears as a witness in Calvert Co. 1692; Charles Co. 1697; Calvert Co. 1701, 1702, 1711 [MCW 2:64,162,228,243; 3:201]. "Brother-in-law Robert SKINNER" was named as a residual legatee of the will of Thomas LETCHWORTH, Calvert Co, 1696 [proved 1713; MCW 3:243]. Stein [op.cit., p.289] interprets this to mean that Robert SKINNER's wife Ann was a daughter of Thomas LETCHWORTH (emigrant, 1652). While Robert SKINNER (2nd) could have been previously m. (in 1696) to a dau. of Thomas LETCHWORTH, his wife Ann is clearly a dau. of James and Mary MACKALL. Robert SKINNER was a member of the Maryland General Assembly in 1708-10 [MCW:82,83,107].

The estate of Mackall SKINNER was inventoried 26 June 1754 in PG Co, Anne COX being named administratrix. The inventory of Nathaniel SKINNER was filed 29 Mar. 1744 in PG Co, the administrator being Thomas LETCHWORTH [IPR p.167].

Pages 256-258. [MCW 7:161] Will of Henry MOOR of PG Co, being well of body but [sic] of a sound and perfect memory. Date: 17 March 1732/3. First: To my loving wife Sarah MOOR my dwelling plantation during the time of her widowhood and also I give her one Negro during the time of her widowhood named Peeter. I also give her half of my stock cattle horses hoggs and sheep and also half of movable [Page 257] household stuff during her widowhood.

Item: To my daughter Sarah one Negro girle named Lucia.

Item: To my daughter Esther one slave that my molato woman is big with now let it be boy or girl. I also desire that she may live upon that land where she settled till my son Henry MOORE comes to the age of 21 years.

Item: To my daughter Charity MOOR the next child that my molato woman brings.

Item: To my daughter Elesiabeth [sic] 100 accors of land being part of a tract of where I now live one [=on] lying on the west side of a small fresh run called St. Thomases run to her her heirs and assigns forever.

Item: To my daughter Anne DAVIS 12 pence in money.

Item: To my daughter Benedicto 12 pence in money.

Item: To my son William MOORE 12 pence in money.

Item: To my son Henry MOORE my two Negroes with there incrase and all the rest of my servants and slaves. I also give my son Henry MOOR my dwelling plantation and the tract of land belonging thereunto. I also give my said son Henry MOOR 200 accors of land called "Moors Chance" lying in PG Co. I also give to my said son Henry MOOR all titles of land that shall hereafter be discovered to be mine and I desire that my said son Henry MOOR may live with his mother till he comes to age of 21 years if she remains a widow and if she marryes I desire that he may take the Negro woman with him and go to Hercelus [Mercelus?. MCW: Merallius] LITTLE JOHN and live with him till he comes to the age of 18 years. I also give to my said son Henry MOOR the other half of my stock of cattle hogs horses and mar[e]s and sheep and also the other half of my household furniture and if my said son Henry MOOR should die before he comes of age or without heirs or issue I desire that what I have here left to him may be equally divided between my daughter Charity and the rest of my daughters children and if I should die before my said son comes of age I desire that my said son Henry MOOR and Mercillus [MCW: Meralus] LITTLE JOHN my [=may?] acknowledge my Lords right of 200 accors of escheat land to Thomas SMALLWOOD or his heirs formerly called "Whellers Choice" now called "Moors rest" lying in PG Co.

I desire that my son William MOOR shall not come upon my dwelling plantation nor have anything to do with it nor with any thing else belonging to my estate. [MCW does not mention this.]

I do hear appoint Mercelus LITTLE JOHN to be guardian over my said son Henry MOOR till he comes to the age of 18 years and I also desire that my said son Henry MOOR may have one years schooling. I do hear appoint my son Henry MOOR to be my whole and sole executor.

Signed: Henry (H) MOOR. Wit: Henry (H) WARD, John (mark: [blank]) WARD, James SIMPSON.

Feb 2d, 1735/6. The Widow of the deced determined to have her thirds of the deced's estate & relinqish the bequest in this will. Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co.

Febry 17th, 1735/6, proved by oaths of Henry WARD & John WARD. [Page 258] Henry MOOR the heir at law being ex'r though under age & present made no objection to the probat of the said will. Sworn before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (9-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Henry MORE was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:164] and, as Henry MOORE, along with Marcelos LITTLEJOHN and Nicholless MOORE, in Lower Part of Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:270].

The inventory of Mr. Henry MOORE was filed 26 May 1736, approved by next of kin Henry MOORE and Hester MAALEE, Mrs. Sarah MOORE being administratrix [V.L. Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Maryland, 1733-1738, p.58]. Hester MAALEE is probably the same as daughter Esther. The daughters' lack of surnames in the will should not be considered proof they are unmarried.

On 18 Mar. 1708 [1709] Henry MORE of Charles Co, Md, bought 275 acres called "Wards Wheele" on the east side of Piscattaway River, in PG Co, bounded by St. Thomas Runn [PG Deeds C:243]. This appears to be land mentioned in the testator's will.

Henry MORE of Charles Co. made his will 9 May 1673 (probate date not shown) naming children Henry, Eliza:, John, Thomas, and wife Eliza: [MCW 1:72]. Henry MOORE, servant, was transported to Maryland in 1649 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Md., p.321]. It is not certain that our testator is his son, though a kinship is likely.

A Henary MORE witnessed the will of Henry BORCK, 1708, county not stated [MCW 3:114]. A Henery MORE witnessed will of Thomas GILBORD, Baltimore Co, 1707 [MCW 3:117].

The will of Mercilius LITTLEJOHN of PG Co. was dated 3 Nov. 1740 and proved 18 Mar. 1740 [1741]. It mentions wife Elizabeth, testator's property in Virginia bought by father Oliver, sons Charles, Samuel, and Henry, and dau. ----. Sarah MOORE (MOOR) was a witness. [MCW 8:142]. Naming patterns and associations suggest this testator may be related to Henry MOOR, perhaps a son-in-law, though he is not so identified in Henry MOOR's will.

Oliver LITTLEJOHN's will, dated 13 Sept. 1702, was proved in Stafford Co, Va, 9 Feb. 1703 [1704]. It divides his land between his minor sons Marclon (or Mavicillus) and Charles LITTLEJOHN. Also mentions dau. Joan LITTLEJOHN, dau. Mary WITHERS, grandson John WITHERS, god dau. Mary KEMP the dau. of John KEMP, and "my four children when they arrive to age 16." William WITHERS appointed executor. Probate granted to Francis COFER who m. Elizabeth WITHERS, dau. of Oliver LITTLEJOHN. [Stafford Co. Deeds and Wills 1699-1709 (F):206-207, abstracted by Ruth and Sam Sparacio.]

Henry MOORE [probably son of our testator] was chosen for the Md. General Assembly from Charles Co., Nov. 1754. In Apr. 1756, elections were held to replace him as representative. "Moore, with his family, has moved to Virginia." [Karen Green, Maryland Gazette 1727-1761, p.148,172]

By his good conduct he obtained esteem of all who knew him, and his respectful and extremely polite manners won for him the *soubriquet* of the "Marlboro' Chesterfield." We deem it proper to make mention of him in order that others in his station may imitate his example, and thus win for themselves a lie regard.

—**John Long**, indicted for assault with attempt to kill Mr. **Rezin Pumphrey**, near Surats Mill, on the 8th November last, has been tried in the Washington city criminal Court, found guilty and sentenced to two years imprisonment in the county jail.

"NOODLING" WITH NUMBERS

The Fall '91 issue of the Massachusetts Mayflower Society's newsletter, *The Compact*, included this tidbit of genealogical information, which they had taken from "MASSOC, A Genealogical Magazine for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts". It shows a means of figuring a birth date from a gravestone inscription. Using the 8870 formula to ascertain a birth date can be a tremendous help to the genealogist when checking tombstone dates. If a tombstone records that a person died May 6, 1889 and was 71 years, 7 months and 9 days old, but no date of birth is listed, in order to correctly arrive at the birthdate, one has only to use the 8870 formula to quickly get the date of birth rather than taking time to count backward. An example follows:

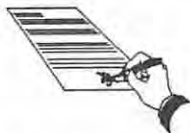
14th Annual Historic Hyattsville House Tour

Prince George's County Will Book 1, 1698-1770

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson
(Continued from v. 24, no. 4 [December 1992])

NOTES: In the February installment, the will of Henry MOORE was presented (he d. 1736). We included a note that: Henry MOORE [probably son of our testator] was chosen for the Maryland General Assembly from Charles Co., Nov. 1754. In Apr. 1756, elections were held to replace him as representative. "Moore, with his family, has moved to Virginia." [Karen Green, *Maryland Gazette 1727-1761*, p.148,172]

Blanch Tompkins of 360 West 20th Street, San Bernardino, CA 92405, sends information about the son. She says "I probably never would have found him in Maryland for I was looking in the wrong county." In Frederick Co., Va., 1755, Henry MOORE of Charles Co, Md, bought 480 acres on White Marsh branch of the Shanandoah. He is listed on the Loudoun Co., Va., rent rolls 1761 and 1762. He m.(2nd) Ann NEALE, widow of Christopher NEALE, 21 May 1764. In 1767 he began to buy lots in Colchester, Fairfax Co., Va. He died there testate in 1773 leaving daughters Susanna SUMMERS (wife of George SUMMERS), Sarah (1752-1816, m. Alexander HENDERSON), Jane KING and Ann PINNER, and sons Cato MOORE (d. Berkeley Co, (W)Va, c.1796) and Cleon MOORE. Son Cleon MOORE (1749-1815) fought in the Revolutionary War and was wounded at the Battle of Brandywine. He was Fairfax County prosecutor 1783-1787; he was later justice and register of wills in Alexandria Co., D.C. Mrs. Tompkins is still looking for the first wife of Henry MOORE [m. between 1736 and 1749].

She also points out that Cleon MOORE witnessed the will of a William MOORE (proved 1769, Fairfax Co.), and that Henry MOORE was indebted to the estate. William may be another son of the Henry MOORE who d. 1736, PG Co. William MOORE's will mentions wife Mary, sons James and Samuel, and daughters Sarah LITTLEJOHN, Mary BUCKLIN, and Ann TYLER. [Fairfax Co. Will Book C, p.66] [Cf. the earlier connection with the LITTLEJOHN family shown in the Feb. notes.]

Page 258. [MCW 7:168] Will of John NORRIS of ye Province of Maryland, planter, being in good health and of a perfect mind and memory. Date: 24 Jan. 1733 [1734]. Item: To my well beloved son Wm. NORRIS a Negro girl named Nanny, also a boy named Charles to be deliver'd him at the death of my wife Mary, also 125 acres of a tract I have lying upon Monockasey Creek near the mountain call'd "Hopewell" containing 300 acres to him and his heirs forever.

Item: To my well beloved son Benj'a NORRIS a Negro boy named George also a girl named Kate also 125 acres of that land above-mentioned to him & his heirs forever.

Clark County, Arkansas, A genealogical Source Book by Pauline Williams Wright and Barbara McDow Caffee (Baltimore: Gateway Press, Inc. 1982) 114pp. A gift of Dorothy and Ivan Rainwater.

When it is impossible to visit the local courthouse, we all resort to published sources. This compilation provides abstracts of numerous sources for Clark County, Arkansas. Among the included items are marriage, probate and tax records. All have been indexed making this volume a good starting place for those with Clark County ancestors.

Marriages of Gloucester County, Virginia, Book 1:1853-1895 by Frances Haywood (Bowie, MD: Heritage Books, Inc. 1992) 337pp. A gift of Heritage Books, 1540-E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716. \$25 + \$3 shipping.

Gloucester, an early Virginia Tidewater county, was formed in 1642. The author has carefully transcribed the marriages from Book 1 which covers the years 1853-95. A typical entry gives the names and ages of the couple, groom's occupation, date of marriage and minister. Race and marital status, nativity if outside Gloucester County, and names of parents, including mother's maiden name, are also frequently shown. All names have been indexed.

Item: To my grandson John NORRIS (son [of] my deceased son John NORRIS) a Negroe girl named Bess, also 50 acres of my land above named [to him] and his heirs forever. My will is that my son William NORRIS shall take into his possession my grandsons Negro girl Bess and the 50 acres till he arrive to age 20.

Item: To my well beloved wife Mary all my personal estate that I have not yet mentioned to my sons. My will is that my beloved wife shall be my only and sole executrix. Signed: John NORRIS (mark: N). Wit: E. ADDISON, John ADDISON, Nich's DOWNING.

Proved 15 April 1736 by oath of Mrs. Eleanor ADDISON, before Pet. DENT, Depty Com[missa]ry of PG Co. Proved 16 April 1736 by oaths of John ADDISON Esqr. and Nich's DOWNING, before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (5-1/2 sides)

NOTES: A John NORRIS appears in PG Co. court proceedings as early as 1697 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699]. In 1711, James TURKE, a servant to John NORRIS, was adjudged 14 years of age [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.106]. John NORRIS was taxed in New Scotland Hundred, PG Co, in 1719 [BB:157] and in 1733 [BB:275]. A Susannah NORRIS was also taxed there in 1733. Benjamin NORRIS was taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. William NORRIS was taxed in Potowmack Hundred that year [BB:273].

John NORRIS Sr. had a land survey in 1724 in the southeastern area of later Frederick County, at Hopewell NE of Sugar Loaf Mountain and including perhaps Kemptown. Grandson John NORRIS deeded 50 acres of Hopewell near Sugar Loaf to Zacharias LYLES in 1750 [Schildknecht, Monocacy and Catocin, 1:64].

The inventory of John NORRIS was approved 19 July 1736 by next of kin Benjamin NORRIS and executrix Mary NORRIS. [Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerogative Court of Maryland, p.63]

The will of Mary NORRIS of PG Co, dated 31 Aug. 1738, was proved 15 Apr. 1745. It mentions her son Benj. NORRIS, grandchildren William and Anne NORRIS, children of Benjamin. [MCW 9:22]

The will of William NORRIS, Schoolmaster of the Parish of All Saints, P.G.Co., dated 1 Jan. 1746/7 was proved 27 Jan. 1748 in Frederick Co., Md. He names his wife Elizabeth NORRIS and two children William Sierrs NORRIS and Elizabeth Sierra NORRIS. [MCW 10:9 and Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills, p.350] William NORRIS was taxed in All Saints Parish, Frederick Co, 1756 and William NORRIS Jr. in 1760 [Ronald Jackson, Early Maryland, v.1, p.219].

In 1742, Benj. NORRIS was among those petitioning for the creation of Frederick County from PG Co. [Tracey and Dern, Pioneers of Old Monocacy, p.370; BB:454]. In 1757, Benjamin NORRIS advertised a stray mare at his plantation near the Sugar Loaf Mountain in Frederick County [Green, The Maryland Gazette, 1727-1761, p.197].

It is not clear which earlier family the testator may spring from. Men named John NORRIS, roughly contemporary with our testator, lived in St. Mary's, Anne Arundel, Calvert, and Baltimore Counties, as well as on the Eastern Shore. John NORRIS of Anne Arundel Co., who died in 1740, also happened to have a wife named Mary and sons named John (b. 1691) and Benjamin (b. 1698) [MCW 8:110. Births found in register of St. James Parish, in Wright, Anne Arundel County Church Records, p.150].

Among the early NORRIS immigrants to Maryland was a John NORRES

who was transported in 1675-7 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland, p.337].

Page 259. [MCW 7:174] Will of Leonard BROOKE of PG Co, being sick in body. Date: [blank] day of June 1735. Imp's: To my dear and well beloved wife Ann BROOKE the plantation I now live on with all the land houses and improvements and advantages thereto belonging or in any wise appertaining during her natural life and after her decease the same to be equally divided between my two sons Leonard and Richard BROOKE to them and their Heirs forever but in case either of them dye before they arrive at the age of 21 years then the part of the deceased to be the right of my son Oswald BROOKE and if they both shall dye before they arrive to the age of 21 years then the whole to be the right of my son Oswald and his heirs forever.

Item: To my loving wife Ann BROOKE one third part of what personall estate I have in the Province. Item: To my son Oswald BROOKE what money I have in England or shall have at the day of my death. As for the residue of my personall estate I will that the same be equally divided between my sons Baker, Oswald, Leonard and Richard BROOKE and my daughters Ann, Katharine, Jane, Mary and Henrietta BROOKE.

Lastly I appoint my loving wife full and sole executrix. Signed: Leonard BROOKE. Wit: Henry HILL, John BOWIE, Mary Ann HILL.

Proved 4 May 1736 by the oaths of Henry HILL, Mary Ann HILL and John BOWIE, they saw Mr. Leonard BROOKE sign the will. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co.

The Heir at Law is under age. Signed: Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry. May 4, 1736. The widow is determined to stand to the devices in the will expressed. Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry. (5-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Leonard BROOKE was taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:159]; in 1733 he was there and in Mattapany Hundred [BB:269,276]. The inventory of Mr. Leonard BROOKE's estate was approved 24 Aug. 1736 by his next of kin Richard Marsham WARING and W. BEANES, and his executrix Mrs. Ann BROOKE. [Skinner, Abstracts of the Inventories of the Prerog. Court of Maryland, 1733-1738, p.65]

The ancestry of Leonard BROOKE is given in Maryland Genealogies [from Maryland Historical Magazine], v. 1, p.91-131. He appears on p.104. He is identified as the son of Baker BROOKE (d. St. Mary's Co., 1698) and of Katherine MARSHAM, daughter of Richard MARSHAM of PG Co. His father was the son of another Baker BROOKE (1628-1679) and of Ann, daughter of Governor Leonard CALVERT. The next generation back is the immigrant Robert BROOKE (1602-1655) and his first wife Mary BAKER (d. 1634).

The testator's wife Ann (whose maiden name is not given) did not remarry, and died testate in 1779 in PG Co. Of his children, only Leonard and Richard are traced further. Capt. Leonard BROOKE of PG Co. (1728-1785) was commander of the ship "Horatio" in 1755. He m.(1) Anne, dau. of Henry DARNALL of "Portland Manor," and (2) Elizabeth ----; seven children are named in his will. Richard BROOKE of Charles Co., Md. (d. 1771) in his will mentions brother Leonard BROOKE of PG Co, and four children [ibid. p.108-109].

A Baker BROOKE d. testate 1756 in St. Mary's County; another d. 1771 in Charles County [Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills, p.56].

Dr. Oswald BROOKE d. testate in PG Co, 1800, his executrix being Rachel BROOKE [IPR p.29].

Pages 259-260. [MCW 7:168] Will of Jonathan PRATHER Senr. of PG Co, being sick in body. Date: 4 Dec. 1734. Item: To my granddaughter Rachel DORSETT my now dwelling plantation and all that tract thereunto belonging to her & the heirs of her body lawfully begotten forever. Item: To my grandson William PRATHER son of Jonathan PRATHER deceased one cow after the decease of his grandmother.

Item: To my grandson John DORSETT one cow after the decease of his grandmother. Item: To my granddaughter Rachel DORSETT one cow after the decease of her grandmother. Item: To my son John PRATHER the sum of one shilling curr'tt money, & to my son Thomas PRATHER the like sum of one shilling curr't money to be paid them by my executrix after my decease.

Item: To my other seven daughters: to my daughter Elizabeth one shilling curr't money, to my daughter Anne one shilling curr't money & to my daughter Jean one shilling cur't money, and to my daughter Susannah one shilling current money & to my daughter Rachel one shilling current money & to my daughter Sarah one shilling current money, to be paid them by my executrix after my decease. [Sic, only six daughters listed. MCW adds "Martha" between Ann and Jean.]

Item: I appoint my dear and loving wife Elizabeth PRATHER my sole and whole executrix. Signed: Jonathan (P) PRATHER. Wit: James CROW, Edward TALBOTT, Francis DORSETT.

Proved 23 March 1735/6 by oaths of James CROW and Francis DORSETT. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Jonathan PRATHER and Jonathan PRATHER Jr. were taxed in Collington Hundred in 1719 [BB:163]. John PRATHER Senr. was taxed in Collin. Hundred in 1733 [BB:265].

The register of Queen Anne's Parish, PG Co. includes two children of Jonathan and Elizabeth PRATHER: Susanna 1708, Rachel 1711 [mother not identified]. Jonathan Jr. and Jane PRATHER had the following children there: William 1712, Mary 1716, Elizabeth 1718.

The will of his mother, Jane SMITH, widow of Jno. SMITH, dated 1710, was proved in PG Co, 1713. She made bequests to her sons William, Thomas and Jno. PRATER; also to Jonathan PRATER's sons Jonathan and Thomas, his eldest dau. Eliza:, and his daughters Ann, Martha, Jane, and Susannah; and Jane daughter of James MULLIKEN [MCW 3:258]. The will of John SMITH of Mattapany Landing, PG Co, 1707, mentions wife Jane, amd John son of Jonathan PRATHER [MCW 3:91].

In 1707, Jonathan and Elizabeth PRATHER sold 100 acres, part of "Toogood," taken up in 1672 by John BIGGER Sr. [PG Deeds C:191a]. John BIGGER had conveyed the 100 acres to Jonathan PRATHER before 1697 [PG Deeds A:68A].

In 1698, the will of George PRATER (PRATHER) of PG Co. mentions brothers William, Thomas, and John [=Jonathan?], and sister Jane MOLIKINE, James MOLIKINE, and wife Mary [MCW 2:150].

The will of Andrew ROBINSON, 1666, proved 1670 [county not stated], mentions Jonathan PRATHER Jr. [MCW 1:58]. A Jonathan PRETHER, presumably the father, was transported to Maryland in 1658 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Md., p.372].

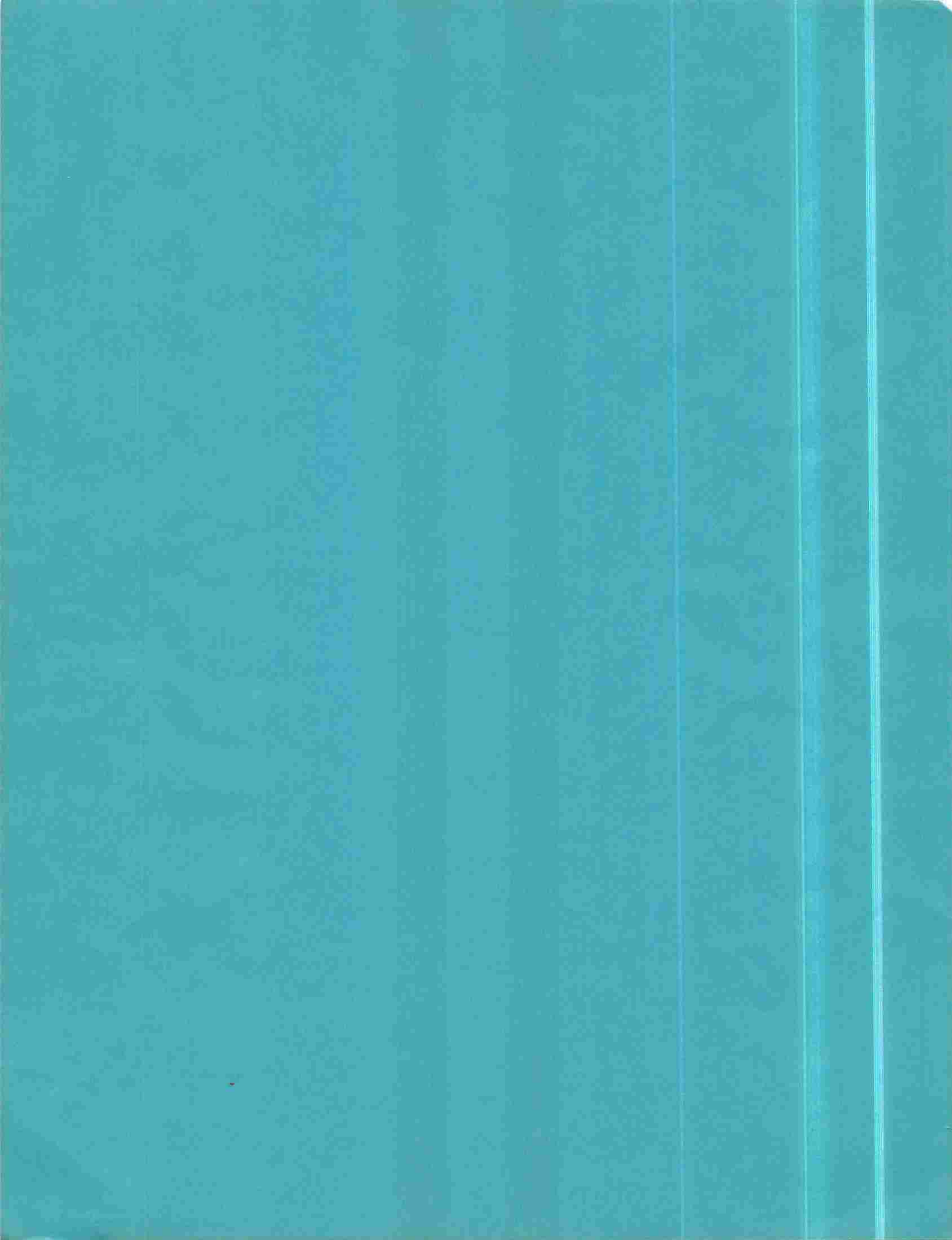

MEDICAL REGISTER

JOHNS HOPKINS HOSPITAL

With this issue of the *PGCGS Bulletin* we begin a new serial of previously unpublished material. The Society is deeply indebted to member Stuart Fife Brown (#0948) of Greenbelt, Maryland, for the preservation and donation of an original genealogical source.

Stuart presented the *Johns Hopkins Medical Register* to the PGCGS on March 13, 1996. At a subsequent Council meeting it was determined that we would extract the information and publish same for the benefit of all genealogists and researchers.

The **Johns Hopkins Medical Center** is located in Baltimore, Maryland. Before the advent of computers, the Hospital admissions records were kept in ledger books. This register is a hardcover book approximately 17" by 14" by 2". The spine is in poor condition and the edges of the covers are worn but the pages and handwriting are in excellent condition.

The register contains information on 5,000 patients at Johns Hopkins from May 1898 to October 1899. All pertinent information contained in the register will be reported here. To conserve space a slash shall separate each item. The original column headings in the register read Date [of admission], No. [of admission], Name and Address, Ward, Class, Diagnosis, Birth-Place, Occupation, Race, Age, Sex, Condition, Service, No. of Discharge, Result of Treatment, Discharged (Year, Month, Day), Days in the Hospital, Address of Relatives.

The No. column was strictly an admission number for record keeping purposes. The No. of Discharge column is blank throughout the register. The Ward, Class, Condition and Service columns do not contain relevant information. For these reasons these columns will be omitted from the extraction. To summarize, the extracted columns are: Date [of admission], Name and Address, Diagnosis, Birth-Place, Occupation, Race, Age, Sex, Condition, Discharged (Year, Month, Day), Days in the Hospital, Address of Relatives.
