#### LOST CEMETERY

On one of those unseasonably warm days in February I was taking a walk along a back road in Mount Olive Township and came upon a surprising sight: a gravestone right next to the road. I looked further down the slope and saw about a half a dozen more, most in very good condition. The surprise was not that there was a cemetery in this place, but that I had lived about two miles away for many years and had driven this road many times and had never seen these stones before. I know, or think I know, where all the other cemeteries in the area are.

After thinking about this oversight for a bit, I was able to make some excuses for myself: There was a bad curve on the road at this point, not a good place for sightseeing when driving. There was no church or small settlement nearby, likely places to spot a cemetery. The cemetery was not shown on the township engineer's map, or on the Department of the Interior Geological Survey maps. It was not shown on 19th century atlases of the area either. In winter the stones would be covered with snow. In summer the plot would be overgrown with ground cover and brambles (now, in May, it is). So I was perfectly within my rights to have missed it. I still felt guilty about it though, and wondered how many other little cemeteries have been "lost," even to the township and federal engineers.

This "lost" cemetery is located in Mount Olive Township, Morris County, New Jersey, approximately one-half mile southeast of the point where Interstate Route 80 crosses over U.S. Highway 46. The graveyard is located just east of the intersection of Netcong Flanders Road and Ledgewood Road (also known as Mountain Road). It is on the south side of Ledgewood Road. There is one dark grey four-sided stone located close to the road. The remainder of the stones are down the slope. The stones I saw are listed here.

in the Tower Room. Above the Tower Room are the famous bells of Christ Church. The bells were cast by Whitechapel Bell Foundry.

From the Church continue north on Second Street. Just beyond Arch Street, hidden among warehouses, is a cobbled street known as Elfreth's Alley. Dating back to 1690, it is said to be the oldest continuously occupied residential street in the United States. It is named for a blacksmith, Jeremiah Elfreth. Butchers, bakers and yes, candlestick makers lived and sometimes sold their wares here. There is a tiny museum located on the street that shouldn't be missed. Unfortunately, the museum is only open in the summer.

From the west end of the Alley, walk a little farther north along Second to Quarry Street. Here you will find the Museum of the Fire Department. Inside you will find many rare pieces of hand and horse-drawn fire fighting equipment. You will remember that Franklin started the first fire company in the city.

Return south along Second Street to Arch and turn west. On the north side of the street the Betsy Ross house stands. The house has been generally accepted as the home of Betsy Ross, the seamstress who is credited with the design of our flag. Records show that the house was owned by Hannah Lithgow during the time that Betsy Ross was supposed to have lived there. Betsy Ross, or Elizabeth Griscom Ross Ashbourn Claypoole, was raised a Quaker, and learned her trade at Webster's, the leading upholstery shop in colonial Philadelphia. After marrying her first husband, John Ross, she became active in the patriotic cause and joined the "Fighting Quakers." It is not known whether she actually lived in the house but it is a fine example of a small eighteenth century Philadelphia house and worth a visit.

Cross over the street and on the south side you will see the Arch Street Friends Meeting House. It is a long, low, two-story building. The meeting house was designed by Owen Biddle and built in 1804. The building is still used for the Society of Friends yearly meet-

ings. An exhibit room displays an interesting collection of memorabilia related to Quaker life. It will take about 25 minutes to tour the building and it is free.

By now you must be starving and your feet probably could use a rest. Continue on Arch Street and head back toward the Independence Mall. Enjoy your lunch. From this part of the Mall you should be able to see the steeple of Independence Hall.

Across from the Mall the United States Mint is located. It is open daily 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., except Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. It is free and you should allow yourself 45 minutes. The tour is self-guided. There is a terrific museum located here also. One fascinating exhibit deals with the Indian Head penny of 1836. The model was not an Indian, but the twelve-year-old daughter of the chief engraver!

After leaving the Mint there is one last stop before you head for home. It is the Christ Church Burial Ground, located opposite the Mint and facing the Mall. (You passed it on your way to lunch.) The grave of Benjamin Franklin can be seen through a special grating. Within the burial grounds you can find the weathered markers of many celebrated men: John Dunlap, printer of the Declaration of Independence; Dr. John Kearsley, architect of Christ Church; Francis Hopkinson, signer of the Declaration of Independence; Capt. Richard Budden, who brought both the Liberty Bell and the bells for Christ Church from England; and many more too numerous to mention here. The grounds are open daily 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

I hope you have enjoyed this tour of my favorite city. Every time I tour Philadelphia I am reminded of what a difficult job our forefathers had. They pledged their lives and fortunes for an idea. After every visit I return home with my pride in the past renewed and I eagerly await the next time I shall visit Philadelphia.
