

**RED FALLS**, on Batavia Kil, contains a cotton factory a paper mill, and several other manufacturing establishments. Pop. 231. Settlements were made on the flats at Prattsville by Dutch immigrants from Schoharie co., during the period between the close of the Old French War in 1763 and the breaking out of the Revolution in 1776. Among the first settlers were John Laraway and his sons John, Jonas, Derick, and Martinus, Isaac Van Alstyne, Vrooman, John and Peter Van Loan, John Becker, and a family by the name of Schoonmaker. The first school was taught by Mr. Banks, in 1790. Martinus Laraway kept the first inn, soon after the Revolution, and with his brother John erected the first gristmill. During the latter war the settlement was attacked by a body of Indians and Tories led by a British officer. The inhabitants rallied, and a battle took place upon the bank of Schoharie Kil, a little below the Windham Turnpike Bridge, N. of the village, in which the Indians and their allies were routed. Rev. Cornelius D. Schermerhorn was the first settled preacher. There are 3 churches in town; Ref. Prot. D., Prot. E., and M. E.

**WINDHAM**-was formed from Woodstock, (Ulster co.) as part of Ulster co., March 11, 1798.

"GREENLAND" (now Hunter) and Lexington were taken off in 1813, Prattsville in 1833, and a part of Ashland in 1848. A part of "Freehold" (now Durham) was annexed March 26, 1803.

**WINDHAM CENTER**, on Batavia Kil, in the w. part of the town, contains 3 churches, and has a pop. of 350.

**HENSONVILLE**, on the same stream, s of the center of the town, contains 124 inhabitants.

**BIG HOLLOW**, in the s. part, 2 churches and 12 houses.

**EAST WINDHAM** and **UNION SOCIETY** are p. offices. The first settlement was made in 1790 by Geo. Stimpson, Abijah Stone and Increase Claflin. Perez Steel and his son Perez from Tolland Conn., settled in town in 1795, and Joshua Jones, Wm Henderson, and Lemuel Hitchcock (from New Haven co., Conn.) in 1796. The first marriage was that of Daniel Perry and Mamva Hitchcock; and the first death was that of Mrs. Lemuel Hitchcock, in 1804, Nathan Blanchard taught the first school, in 1809;

Tobias VanDusen built the first gristmill, in 1793; Van Orden kept the first inn, in 1796; and Bennett Osborn built the first tannery, in 1822.





Jan. 1. The Bank of the Union went into operation, with a capital of \$300,000. A snow storm of the preceding night made the first good sleighing of the season. William H. Lee, of this city, died at Palmyra, Mich., aged 29.

Jan 2. The Festival of the New Year observed with great hilarity, heightened by the fine sleighing and the bright sun. Mrs. Betsey Kendall, wife of Benoni C. Allen, died in Philadelphia, aged 60.

Jan. 3. Meeting of the legislature; Robert H. Pruyn elected speaker of the house, and Hugh J. Hastings clerk of the senate.

Jan. 4. There were forty insane persons in the Alms House.

Jan. 5. Edwin Crosswell, late of Albany, was prostrated by paralysis, in New York. Adam Todd builder, died, aged 55.

Jan. 6. A workman engaged on the Round House of the Central rail road, fell to the turntable, a distance of 70 feet, and escaped with a broken limb. .... Mrs. Ann Brown died, aged 87.

Jan. 7. Rachel Ursula, wife of Jacob A. Lansing, died, aged 31. Amanda, wife of Jason Russell, died aged 31. Francis C. Marble died, aged 23.

Jan. 8. Col. John Osborn, died at Batavia, aged 44. He was colonel of the 25th Regiment, commander of the Burgesses Corps and Emmet Guards, and took a great deal of interest in military affairs.

Jan. 9. Lydia Lush died, aged 53.

10. Funeral of Col. John Osborn, attended by all the military in full uniform. Meeting of the new board of common council; present Wm. Parmelee, mayor; Wm. A. Young, recorder; Bleecker, Chesebro, Davidson, Feltman, Godard, Harris, Jones, McCall, McElroy, Marrow, Rossman, Russell, Thompson. Townsend, Vanderlip, Van Rensselaer, Wilson. The officers of the board were appointed as follows: David M. Barn, clerk of the board; Henry S. McCall, city attorney; Henry T. Spencer, almshouse physician; Henry H. Burhans, marshal.

11. Prof. Carr commenced a series of lectures, forming the chemical department of the University.

12. A rain storm removed all the snow which had fallen, and deluged the streets.

13. The ice moved down the river, carrying with it the two ferry boats, which came in collision, staving in their sides, and choking them in the ice... A lad was killed at the rail road crossing. .. Ira B. Cary, of the firm of Dews & Cary, died at his residence at Whitestown, Oneida county. He had been a produce commission merchant in this city and New York nearly thirty years, and was supposed to have left a fortune of more than three hundred thousand dollars. W. W. Groesbeek, formerly of Albany, died in New York, aged 70. .... James Cahill died, aged 74.

14. Agnes Jane McClure died, aged 22.

17. Mathew Coulter died, aged 42. .... Mrs. Elizabeth Bayard died at the manor house of Stephen Van Rensselaer, aged 92.

18. Catharine, wife of Edward Reily, died, aged 37.

20. The Cavalry Corps made a formal presentation of a sword, valued at \$200, to Capt. J. W. Harcourt, at Knight's restaurant, in Beaver street..... Elizabeth, wife of James Farrell, died.

21. Michael Howard died, aged 31. ... Mrs. Margaret Clark died, aged 30.

22. Margaret Jane, wife of Wm. J. Caldwell, died aged 32 . ..... Susan, widow of Josiah Clark, died, aged 53.
23. The river was again covered with ice, so as to obstruct the passage of the ferry boats for the crossing, of which channels had to be cut. Thermometer below zero. .. Donald Fisher died aged 46. ....Nancy M. Redden, wife of J. H. Corbett late of Albany, died at Greenbush, aged 31.
24. Thermometer below zero.
25. Thermometer below zero zero in the morning. Potatoes \$1.25 a bushel; flour \$9 to \$10 a barrel; coal \$8 a ton. .... Amanda M. wife of Asa Fassett, died.
27. Mary Jane, wife of Paul Cushman died. .... Lucy Ann Drummond, daughter of the late E. Fay died at Sacramento, aged 30.
29. Thermometer ranged from four to eight degrees below zero in the morning. .... Diana Van Rensselaer died, aged 61. .... Edgar Crapo died. aged 24.
- 3 1. J. H. Wood died aged 20. .... Mrs. Louisa, wife of John Meads, died aged 69.

## FEBRUARY

1. A number of Germans assembled at the Capitol park, and burnt the effigy of the pope's nuncio, Bedini; as had been done by their countrymen in other American cities. .... Dr. P. Gannon died, aged 74: a native of Ireland, who practiced medicine in this city many years, and was much esteemed. .... Catharine Fitzgerald died aged 59.
2. Mrs. Alida Groesbeck aged 97; supposed to have been the oldest inhabitant of the city at the time.
3. A fire corner of Lydins and Hawk streets, injured a dwelling house slightly. At an election of officers of the Young Men's Association, George C. Lee was chosen president. .... Mrs. Maria Dederick died aged 76..
4. Peter B. Leddy died aged 38.
5. An alarm of fire about 11 o'clock at night, caused by the burning of a carpenter's shop. .... Mary Gibson died, aged 42.
6. The Franklin House took fire about 11 o'clock in the morning, and was considerably damaged by fire and water. .... John S. Vandervolgen died, aged 42.
7. Mrs. Jane Thompson died, aged 86; a colored woman, known as Jenny Dick. She was famous many years ago as the keeper of a restaurant, and having married Richard Thompson, who was called Dick, she acquired the name of Jenny Dick; and having outlived one -or two generations, it was generally supposed to be her correct cognomen. When her death was published in the newspapers, no one recognized it as the well known Jenny Dick. .... Wm. J. Angus died, aged 36.
8. A great poultry show at Van Vechten Hall; the result of the chicken fever that had raged for only about -one year among the amateurs of foreign fowls. It was a much greater exhibition than its friends anticipated when the affair was proposed. The State Agricultural Society held its annual fair, and elected officers for the ensuing year. The State Medical Society, in session at the City Hall, held its annual election for officers. An alarm of fire at nine o'clock in the evening was caused by the burning of a dwelling in Greenbush. .... Ellen, wife of David Lynch, died.
9. A fire broke out early in the morning, in the fourth story of the building corner Maiden lane and Dean st., - occupied as a stove store by Vose & Co., which damaged the building and goods more than five thousand dollars.

11. Elisha Putnam died, aged 89. Mr. Putnam was an eminent builder in his day, and several of the older churches were erected by him.

14. A convention of women, *male and female*, held at Association Hall, when justice to woman was discussed -eloquently by several of the shining lights among the sex. .... Harriet Amelia, wife of Wm. J. Morrison, late of Albany, died at South East, aged 22.

15. A special election was held throughout the state to determine whether the people were in favor of borrowing money to enlarge the canals. The number of votes cast in Albany was 3,767 for the measure, and 876 against it.

16. The rise of water in the river submerged the docks,

### "THE REST OF THE STORY"

My family vacationed, July and August, for 25 years in Columbia county, New York. Columbia county is where New York, Massachusetts, and Connecticut meet. The little towns are very old. There was a R.R. once that carried coal and iron ore North and South. All that is just a memory now. There is an Historical Society that meets in an old church in the town of Copake Falls. In the summer of 2006 they printed a leaflet entitled "A History of the Roeliff Jansen Area." This Area consists of five townships in this part of Columbia county.

The people that compiled this story told the background of every building they remembered. Who built it? What was it used for? They named the owner, the builder and all of their family they could think of. It was a peek into the past. It was a terrific memoir. BUT, there was no index.

I listed all the names and alphabetized them. I printed it up and mailed it to them about September 2006 and suggested they put it with their booklet - as a Supplement.

In March 2009 - 2 1/2 years later - I received a phone call. The woman who called asked many questions to determine if I was the person who sent the Alphabetized Index. Then she asked me WHY? I made the Index. I explained that my hobby was Genealogy. There were at least 200 names. Genealogist love indexes. Browsers who come into their Historical Museum would be more inclined to buy their booklet with an Index.

Then she told me 'the rest of the story'. My index arrived in the FALL of 2006 and was given to a committee head to decide what should be done. Unfortunately that woman was ill and died within the month. Her family put all her Historical Society papers into a box. When another person was appointed to take her place, the family passed that box on.

Two years later another woman was elected to this position and the box was passed along to her. As a new committee head she opened the box and started sorting the material. She found my Index and contacted me to get the Background.

Two weeks later I received a Thank You letter.

My hope: some genealogist will find her family in the added Index.



## **Skunk Made Home in Adams Store**

(WDT 3/14/1921)

Early last week Edward Clark of the drug firm of E. W. Clark, went to the store's second floor, where almost every conceivable thing is stored, looking for supplies needed below. He saw, to his great surprise, a skunk, apparently full-grown. He beat a hasty retreat.

Others employed there searched for the skunk, but failed to find him and accused Mr. Clark of "seeing things." Saturday, about noon, as one of the men went up for some desired article the skunk sat quietly on the window sill. They immediately called Greenley's Garage for Eugene Greenley. He came right over and directed them to get a barrel ready. After a somewhat tedious time with the animal, as they dare not touch it with any article whatsoever, they tied a cloth on a stick, saturated with chloroform, which the skunk strongly objected to, and by this means it was landed finally in the barrel and taken some distance away. It returned, however, and when last seen was crouching between an empty box and the back of the stove outside. It is a mystery no one can explain how the animal came there unless possibly unnoticed, through an open door, in the daytime and by climbing the stairs at night.

(As if this wasn't enough, a couple months later E. W. Clark's Drugstore was visited by burglars).

## **Store Safe is Blown at Adams**

(WDT 7/2/1921)

Professional cracksmen burglarized the drug store of Edward W. Clark & Co., Main Street, Adams, either late last night or early this morning, stealing the majority of their loot of approximately \$300. from the large safe which they blew open. The rest of the booty was taken from the two cash registers. About \$60. of the burglar's receipts was in money, while the rest comprised folding cameras, a typewriter and other goods.

The sheriff's office was notified of the burglary this morning. Sheriff Ernest S. Gillette, accompanied by Undersheriff Brumley C. Wilde, arrived here shortly after and started an investigation. As far as had been learned up to today, no clue that would lead to the identity of the yeggs had been obtained by the authorities. Both the sheriff and the drug store proprietor, following an examination of the safe this morning, expressed the belief that the work was that of professionals.

The crime was committed sometime between 10:30 last night and this morning at 7:30. Mr. Clark was the last one to leave the place last night and he securely locked the doors. He said this morning that he did not notice any suspicious looking characters about the place during the day. A night watchman employed nearby told Mr. Clark this morning that he was at the store at 3 this morning and there were no indications at that time that the place had been entered.

The yeggs entered the drug store by a hatchway in the rear. The entrance was securely barred from the inside. Indications pointed this morning that the burglars placed some sharp object through the crack where the two doors join and succeeded in removing the wooden bar. The bar was found on the cellar floor

this morning. Opening the latchway doors, the safeblowers went to the cellar and from there they proceeded up the stairs to the main floor. The entrance from the cellar was unlocked, Mr. Clark said today.

The door of the safe was not blown off, the yeggs drilling a hole in near the combination, injecting glycerin and attaching a fuse. The glycerin was held in the hole by the use of soap, according to indications. The combination of the safe was completely shattered. Although it is thought that there was a loud report when the glycerin was exploded, there are no persons near the place who heard it, they say. Previous to the safeblowing the burglars removed all of the currency from the two cash registers.

The burglars, it is thought there were two, left by the rear door, which is over the hatchway. The key was in the lock and they had no difficulty in making an easy exit. The burglary was discovered this morning at 7:30 by Charles Hitchcock, clerk of the store. This is the first safe blowing episode that has occurred in this county since last spring when the postoffice and general store at Natural Bridge were entered. At that time the cracksmen blew the door off the safe instead of drilling a hole near the combination.

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### Methodist Church Destroyed By Fire

(CJ 2/8/1922)

Loss About \$50,000. - Insurance on Church \$18,300., on Parsonage \$3,600.

Adams met with a serious loss early Monday morning when the Methodist Episcopal church, located on the corner of Church and Wardwell streets, was burned to the ground. The parsonage, 30 feet east of the church, was seriously damaged by fire and water, and the dwelling to the north, owned by the church and occupied by sexton, John Harwood, and family was badly scorched. The church sheds were also slightly damaged.

The fire was discovered about 3:15 am by Mrs. E.J. Lavis, wife of the pastor, who was awakened by the light in her room and who found the basement of the church in flames. The alarm was given immediately but the fire had already gained such headway that the sky was bright from the illumination and the streets almost as bright as day. The church was a wooden structure and nothing could stay the course of the flames.

Firemen and citizens responded promptly to the repeated blasts of the whistles on the municipal building and Rice's factory, and in no time a large crowd had gathered. Fortunately there was very little wind and the efforts of the fire department were directed toward the saving of other buildings in the immediately vicinity. The heat was so intense that firemen had to work from under sheds primarily erected for a protection.

The roof of the parsonage repeatedly started to burn, also the side of the house next to the church under the eaves, but the persistent work of the fire department under the efficient leadership of Fire Chief C.M. Pierce the fire was brought under control and saved the parsonage and protecting the Episcopal Church from damage. The efficiency of the steamfire engine was very evident for it was not until it was put into operation that a stream was secured of sufficient force to accomplish much.

Kent Rice's house in the other corner of Church and Wardwell Streets was in no serious danger. A pane of glass was broken and the paint some what blistered from the heat.

Nothing was saved from the church, but practically all the furniture was removed from the parsonage and Mr. Harwood's residence. As the Presbyterian manse, just across the street, was unoccupied, Rev. C.L. Luther having but recently accepted a charge in Oklahoma, the household

goods of Rev. E.J. Lavis were moved into the manse and it is expected that he and his family will occupy it until repairs can be made to the Methodist parsonage.

Mr. Harwood's family moved back into their home Monday morning.

The burning church made a beautiful picture when the framework and steeple were still standing and the whole building was outlined in flames. It was a skeleton church of fire. With a great deal of suspense the crowd watched to see in what direction the steeple would fall, and it was with a sigh of relief that it was seen to fall backward into the mass of ruins.

The first Methodist Episcopal church of Adams village was organized in 1827 by Rev. Elisha Wheeler. The trustees elected were Laban Ross, Philip Young, David Wright, Zephaniah Tucker, Chester McKee, Daniel Dikeman and John Adams. Rev. William W. Ninde was its first pastor. The society purchased the old house of worship formerly owned by the Presbyterian Society. The building was moved across the street and was occupied until 1852, when it was destroyed by fire. The building just burned, also of wood, was then built at a cost of \$10,000. and would comfortably seat 400 persons. It was remodeled in 1913 with a seating capacity of at least 600.

There was a large auditorium with the Sunday school rooms in the new addition, built in 1913, opening into the body of the church by means of rolling doors, which operated like a roll top desk. The church also contained a large dining room, which could easily be converted into an assembly chamber, and a commodious kitchen well equipped with modern appliances for assembly suppers and banquets.

The church was out of debt and held insurance of \$18,300. on the church, \$3,600. on the parsonage and \$430. on the church sheds. No insurance was carried on the cottage occupied by Mr. Harwood.

It is thought that the fire started from a defective or overheated chimney connected with a furnace in the rear of the basement under the main auditorium.

Rev. E.J. Lavis became pastor in April 1920. Under his active leadership the church has prospered and grown. About three months ago the pipe organ was repaired and tuned and an electric blower installed at a cost of \$275.



### Early Douglas County, Colorado Pioneer

#### Rode With Wm. 'Buffalo Bill' Cody

James Beeman was born in Canadaigua, New York in 1833. He served in the Union Army during the Civil War and like many of the veterans he wanted to see more of the country. He moved to Michigan and then on to Kansas where he farmed. He also made several trips west before 1869 with Wm. 'Buffalo Bill' Cody to hunt buffalo for the railroad. During one of those trips he was forced to hide for three days from hostile indians, taking refuge in a swamp.

Returning to Wilson Co., Kansas he continued farming and in 1869 he married **Kisziah Jane Brady, called Kizzie**. He longed for the hills of Colorado and in 1876 they sold their farm and headed west with their three children, **Walter, Myrtle, and Charles** and their belongings in a covered wagon. They bought a farm from **Johnathan House** just outside the town of Plum (which became Sedalia in 1883.) They built an eight-room two-story house and planted walnut trees from Missouri along the road in front of their property. Those trees later became a bone of contention when telephone lines were being strung along this road. The phone company intended to put a line by the trees and James sat on his front porch with his rifle across his knees. The line was placed on the opposite side of the road.

It was a custom that people traveling from Denver to Colorado Springs often stabled their horses at the Beemans and camped for the night. Early in 1878 one such strangers horse kicked James in the head. No doctor being available a fellow veteran and local blacksmith, **Marcus Victor**, cared for him, saving his life despite the loss of his left eye. Young **Walter**, only eight, took over most of the chores as his mother gave birth to another son, **Louis**, April 22, 1878.

**Louis**, known as **Lou**, grew up on the farm and in 1905 married **Harriett Davis**, the daughter of **Tom Davis** and **Harriett Esben**, who were married in 1881. Harriett's mother died in 1890 and she and her siblings, **Matthew** and **George**, were cared for by her fraternal aunt **Sallie Highland** until her father married **Kathryn Ryan** in 1894 at which time they homesteaded in Douglas County.

**Lou** and **Harriett** moved into a small house on the Beeman farm. **James Beeman** died in 1911 and in 1918 the farm was sold and **Kizzie** bought a house in Sedalia. **Lou** ranched at Jackson Creek for three years and then also moved to Sedalia. **Kizzie** fell, breaking her hip early in 1922 and remained bedridden, under the care of **Lou** and **Harriett**. However, **Lou** died of pneumonia on April 15, 1924 leaving **Harriett**, their children **Arthur, George, Harriett, Annie, Florence, Jack** and **Louise**, and his mother. **Kizzie** died May 6, 1925 having outlived all her children. When **Harriett** was 95 years old she had seven children, 24 grandchildren, 32 great-grandchildren, an two great-great- grandchildren.



OVID

The township of Ovid was formed in 1794 from the military tract of the same name and contained one hundred lots as shown on the accompanying map. In 1817 the town of Covert was formed from lots 26 and 34-100. In 1826 Lodi was formed from the western half of Covert. These towns are indicated on the map by dotted lines.

As with Romulus, I have consulted the Seneca County history and attempted to assign as many settlers as possible to a specific lot. Only greatly misspelled names are provided with the alternate re-spelling as in the history. There are some holes in pages of the census returns, indicated in the index with brackets. In some cases the missing letters could be supplied by strong circumstantial evidence. Where a man was mentioned without reference to a lot the town is indicated: C=Covert, L=Lodi. Where the general area is known it is given by a compass point abbreviation.

It is recommended that the reader consult the history, if possible, since in many cases additional information of genealogical importance is given.

ROMULUS

The present towns of Varrick and Romulus were together the town of Romulus in 1800. The accompanying map shows the lots and their numbers, 43-64 lying in Varrick and 64-100 in Romulus. The area in the upper right hand corner of the town is the Cayuga Reservation. This area was only sparsely settled in 1800, because of the presence of Indians.

The history of Seneca County gives the landowners of this early period. I have attempted to correlate the information given in the history with the names found on the census. The extra column gives the lot number when this could be ascertained. If there was doubt as to whether the information given applied to the given individual I inclosed the number in parenthesis. Lot numbers on the Cayuga Reservation are preceded by "C". It is to be noted that many of the lots were not settled by 1800, and others were settled by squatters.

Some men prominent in the settlement of Romulus, e.g., Abram Brown on lot 71 does not appear on the census though his probable heirs do. I was unable to note these. In any event it is advisable for the reader to consult the history himself.



## KINGS COUNTY ADMINISTRATION PROCEEDINGS 1817-1856

The Society has just published *Kings County, New York, Administration Proceedings, 1817-1856*, compiled by B-Ann Moorhouse, CG, FGBS, assisted by the late Joseph M. Silinonte. This book gives genealogists greatly improved access to a portion of the Kings County Surrogate's files. For example:

Mary Gilmore died in Brooklyn on 1 Nov. 1843. The Surrogate's index shows that Fitch Taylor was issued Letters of Administration, meaning that Mary had died intestate (without a will). If you are researching this family, you will check out the Letters and, of course, will be disappointed that they only name the decedent and administrator.

However, if you think that is all that the Surrogate's Court has on this case, you are making a big mistake. Behind the Letters there is a file containing the court clerk's notes and documents relating to the proceedings in the case. Depending on the date, the size and value of the file are going to vary, but it will almost certainly provide you with information not in the Letters.

In the case at hand, the court file reveals the following, as abstracted by Miss Moorhouse:

MARY GILMORE d. Brooklyn 1 Nov 1843; L/A 22 Feb 1844 to son-in-law Fitch Taylor of Brooklyn; next of kin: husband Elijah Gilmore of Salem, Salem County NJ and children Susan wife of Archibald Thompson of Burlington, Boone County KY, Julia Ann wife of Benjamin F. Lodge of Paris, Edgar County IL, Harriet Brooks of Burlington aforesaid OH (sic), and "Mareen" wife of John Penton; Citation, returnable 11 Apr 1844 to all, published in the *Albany Argus*. (675)

Mary's next of kin, like many described in the abstracts, were scattered in several states. The Albany newspaper notice was required when citations could not be personally served on next of kin.

Our new book contains almost 2,000 such abstracts, starting with the earliest surviving file in 1817 and running to 1856. The files reveal many different situations. All of the deceased either died in Kings County or died elsewhere but left property in the county. In this period Kings County's population grew rapidly, mainly because of the expansion of the City of Brooklyn. Many of the abstracted files pertain to older Kings County families, largely Dutch (see the Stoothoff abstract on the next page), but more of them reflect the large-scale migration of the period into Kings County from other parts of New York, other states, and other countries. Numerous files also show migrations out of the county. Thus the abstracts may be relevant to genealogical research in numerous locations far from Brooklyn.

Here is a sampling of the abstracts, starting with one for an African American resident of Brooklyn, some of whose relatives were still in slavery in the South:

WILLIAM HATHAWAY d. Brooklyn 19 Aug 1843; L/A 17 Feb 1844 to widow Eliza Hathaway; next of kin: mother Lucy (surname not known), and siblings Betty Johnson of Edenton NC and a sister whose name not known, also a brother whose name not known and another sister whose name not known, all slaves at Edenton NC. (677)

As might be expected in 19th century Brooklyn, many of those who died left relatives in Ireland:

ELLEN MULLEN of Brooklyn; d. there on or about 17 Aug 1850; L/A 12 Sep 1850 to nephew James Cain and, with his consent to join, to Daniel McDonnal of NY City; next of kin: 3 brothers Michael, Miles, Hugh "Tool", and a sister Catharine wife of Alexander McDonnal all of County Tyrone, Ireland; and the children of deceased sister Bridget (namely, said nephew James Cain of NY City, Patrick Cain, Ann wife of Daniel Mullen of County Derry, Ireland); and the children of deceased brother Matthew Mullen (namely, Peter, Hugh, Sarah and Jane Mullen residing County Tyrone, Ireland); and the children of deceased brother John Mullen (namely, Arthur, Hugh M., Sarah wife of John McCogh, Catharine wife of Daniel Conway and Ann wife of Thomas McCarden, all of County Tyrone, Ireland); assets totaled \$1000. (1364)

—or in England:

WILLIAM ROBINSON of Brooklyn; d. there 7 Apr 1845; L/A 21 May 1845 to brother Charles Robinson of Brooklyn; next of kin: siblings said Charles; John residing Bradford, England; Joseph residing Richfield, Otsego County NY; James residing Northamptonshire, England; George residing Bedfordshire, England; Mary Ann Rowlett residing Huntingdonshire, England; and Anna Matilda Townsend residing Northamptonshire, England. (1688)

—or in Germany:

HENRY JURGENS of Williamsburgh; d.s.p. there 21 Oct 1851 of consumption; L/A 8 Nov 1851 to brother Martin Jurgens of NY City and, with his consent to join, to John H. Cordes of NY City; next of kin: siblings said Martin, Margaret Jurgens residing in the Kingdom of Hanover; and the children of Catherine Strucke, deceased, namely, Claus Strucke residing NY City and George Strucke residing in the Kingdom of Hanover, both minors. (1511)

—or in many other countries, such Christian Magens who had relatives in both Denmark and the then Danish West Indies:

CHRISTIAN E. MAGENS d. Brooklyn 1 Nov 1854 of debility; L/A 19 Dec 1854 to brother Edward W. Magens of Brooklyn; next of kin: siblings said Edward W.; Carl R. residing Elsinore, Denmark; and Eliza Hicks residing Brooklyn; and Julia Haagensen and Anne Magens both residing on the Island of St. Thomas, West Indies. (1133)

—or Zachariah Griswold who had a son in the Philippines and a granddaughter in Belgium:

ZACHARIAH GRISWOLD widower; d. Brooklyn 26 Oct 1854 of a rupture; Citation issued to son Charles Griswold, residing Manila, Island of Luzon, Philippines, published in the *Albany Evening Journal* for 6 weeks beginning 3 Nov 1854; L/A 31 Dec 1854 to daughter Emily A. Griswold of Brooklyn and, with her consent to join, to William W. Skaats; next of kin: children said Charles, said Emily A. and Elizabeth J. both residing Brooklyn, and Julia G. Hosmer residing New Haven CT; and grandchild Frederick James Heron (ink blot by clerk left some of that entry illegible) residing Brussels, Belgium (whose parent, i.e., decedent's predeceased child, not identified by the clerk). Some abstracts mention Canadians:

DANIEL BOYLE of Liverpool, Nova Scotia, d. there 13 Feb 1855 leaving assets in Kings County NY; L/A 2 Jul 1855 to widow Jane of said Liverpool; next of kin: said widow and children Rosanna, Josephine, Mary and Teresa. (1251)

Quite a few abstracts pertain to men who died in military service. Some served in the Mexican War:

BERNARD CRUMMY of Kings County, a soldier in the NY Volunteers under Colonel Ward B. Burnett, d. of wounds 20-21 Aug 1847 at the Hacienda of Los Portalos, Churubusco, Mexico; while in Company "G" under Captain D. E. Hungerford; L/A 3 Jul 1848 to mother Rosanna ("x") Crummy who deposed that her said son left no widow and no child; and her husband (decedent's father John Crummy) also deposed that the decedent had enlisted as a Drummer and after the War, he was promoted from Drummer to the rank of Private; that decedent's brothers Henry, Edward and James Crummy received directions from decedent to turn over to their mother Rosanna the assets of decedent. (1948)

—while others were in the Navy:

JOHN O'NEIL, otherwise WILLIAM JONES, who entered the Service of the US on board the Frigate *Constitution* about 12 Dec 1852 under the name of William Jones; d. at sea between May and Nov 1854 of a natural death; L/A 19 1855 to father John ("x") O'Neil of Brooklyn and, with his consent to join, to decedent's sister Agnes Sloan of Brooklyn; next of kin: said father and said daughter. (1138)

Many decedents had connections in New York City (Manhattan) or in the other Long Island counties:

CATHERINE STOOHOFF d. Flatbush 25 Apr 1848 of consumption, leaving will 31 Dec 1849 declared null and void; L/A 2 Jun 1854 to brother John Stoothoff of NY City with the consent of William Stoothoff of Jamaica, Queens County NY; next of kin: said brother John; Gertrude wife of Samuel Ryder of Bushwick, Ann wife of Stephen J. Voorhis of Gravesend (children of M--hard Stoothoff, deceased brother); and Catherine wife of Charles Hendrickson of Flatlands, Elizabeth Bennem of Gravesend, John Bennem of Success, Queens County NY, Ann widow of James Donly and Sarah wife of Bernardus Donly of Gravesend (children of deceased sister Joanna Bennem); and Cynthia Smith (clerk's writing not legible here) of NY, Catharine wife of Nicholas Bogart of Brooklyn, John Van Duyne of Flatlands (children of deceased sister Catharine Van Duyne); and Sarah Remsen of Flatlands (a daughter of deceased sister Ann Remsen); assets totaled \$2000. (961)

—or in New England or Upstate New York:

WILLIAM P. WELLS of Brooklyn; d. there on or about 29 Apr 1846; L/A 12 May 1846 to widow Phebe R. of Brooklyn; Theodore Eames and Ruston S. Hammond to be appraisers; next of kin: Thompson Wells of Westerly RI, half-brother Elisha C. Wells of Providence RI, Susan P. wife of Jacob Tremper of Westchester County NY, Charlotte C. wife of Theodore Ballou of Utica, Oneida County NY, and mother Susan Wells of Attica, Wyoming County NY; (widow's name not listed by the clerk); assets totaled \$9000. (1733)

**Scottish Settlers from Islay & Jura  
(in the Western Isles of Scotland)  
Who Were Awarded Lots In the Argyle Patent  
in  
Washington County, New York**

Captain Laughlin **Campbell** having served successfully in the early Colonial wars in America wished to establish a settlement of his kinsmen in what is now Washington Co., NY, that was then beyond the frontier. He consulted with Lieutenant Governor Clarke at Albany and was promised an allotment of 30,000 acres without the usual heavy fees, if he could provide a colony of hardy Scottish Highlanders who would guard the invasion route favored by the French and their Indian allies from Canada.

He hurried back to his native Islay where many of the 'crofters' (similar to America's share croppers) listened avidly about the fine new lands they could own. His recruitment was so successful, not only on Islay, but also among his kinsman on neighboring Jura and the mainland. Three boatloads sailed, the first from Islay in 1738, the second, also from Islay and third, from Jura, both in 1739. Most of these Scots spoke only their native Gaelic and none could write or read even that language when they landed in New York City. Captain Campbell arranged temporary quarters and tried to complete his arrangement for the land. "Grasping, corrupt officials demanded, not only excessive fees, but the gift of one-half of the lands allotted. Neither the emigrants nor Captain Campbell could afford to pay. . ." It was twenty-six years after the first ship left Islay, in 1764, that a patent was eventually granted for about 40,000 acres. The trustees then set about distribution among the original emigrants, and the widows or children of those that had died. By 1765 the tract was surveyed and deed warrents were issued for one hundred and thirty three lots.

Many claims were made in various petitions between the arrivals of the ships in 1738, 1739 and 1740 and the actual distribution. Only those who received an actual lot number received land, despite any listings on earlier documents. The names of those lot holders identified are listed. It should be noted that surnames had come into use in the Highlands of Scotland only a few years prior to the sailings. The names given were usually clan or subclan names and do not necessarily identify close family relations. Wives retained their own surnames when married and did not take their husbands surname. Also, some spellings changed or the name itself was changed if the pronunciation of the original proved to difficult for the English speakers they encountered in America. The prefix M', Mc, or Mac are interchangeable and all mean "son of" and reflect common Celtic usage.

Those awarded lots were as follows:

**Mary Anderson**, arrived November 1740, widow with two daughters. She died before 1764 and the daughters designated **Mary Anderson, Sr.**, Lot 126, 300 acres; **Mary Anderson, Jr.**, Lot 10, 300 acres.

**Mary Beaton**, arrived 1738, a widow with a married son. By 1763 name was spelled **Beton**, Lot 62, 300 acres.

**John Caldwell**, arrived June 1739 with **Mary Nutt**, his wife and two sons Alexander and James. By 1763 he and his two sons had gone to Pennsylvania and no information was available. A daughter Elizabeth, living in New York awarded Lot 123, 250 acres.

Alexander Campbell, arrived July 1738. By 1763 he had married and with a family lived in Amboy, New Jersey. Lot 28, 350 acres.

Anna Campbell, arrived Nov. 1740. By 1763 married with six children and spelling given name as Anne Lot 55, 300 acres.

Archibald Campbell, arrived Nov. 1740. Archibald, Jr., Lot 24, 250 acres.

Catherine Campbell, arrived June 1739 awarded Lot 1, 250 acres.

Donald Campbell, arrived July 1738 with Mary McKay, his wife and Margaret, Robert, James, and Isabel, his children. Robert Campbell, Lot 40, 450 acres and James Campbell, Lot 100, 300 acres.

Duncan Campbell, arrived Nov. 1740 with Anna Campbell, his wife and daughter Catarine. By 1763 he had three sons and two daughters. Duncan, Jr., Lot 26, 300 acres and Duncan 3rd, Lot 88, 300 acres

Duncan Campbell, arrived June 1739 with Sara Fraser, his wife. Duncan, Jr., Lot 116, 300 acres.

Duncan Campbell, of ye family of Dunn, arrived Nov. 1740. He died and his brothers daughter, Mary Ann Campbell awarded Lot 5, 350 acres.

Duncan Campbell, of ye family of Duntoon, arrived Nov. 1740. He married in New York and had four children, Lot 36, 450 acres.

James Campbell, arrived July 1738 with Anna McDougall, his wife and Archibald, Laughlin, Elizabeth, and Janet his children. Archibald's daughter, no name given, awarded Lot 14, 250 acres.

John Campbell, arrived Nov. 1740. Married in New York, his son George awarded Lot 133, 300 acres.

Malcolm Campbell, arrived Nov. 1740, Lot 46, 300 acres.

Mary Campbell, arrived July 1738, Lot 35, 250 acres.

Ronald Campbell, arrived July 1738. He died by 1763 and his portion requested by his brother. George Campbell, Lot 93, 300 acres.

Elizabeth Cargill, arrived Nov. 1740. Lived in Tappan and married there. Awarded Lot 2, 250 acres.

James Cargill, arrived 1740. Has children, was awarded Lot 49, 250 acres.

Jean Cargill, arrived June 1739. Married in New York to Mr. Van Vleck. Awarded Lot 49, 250 acres.

John Cargill, arrived Nov. 1740 and lived in New York and had children. Awarded Lot 74, 300 acres.

**Dugald Carmichael**, arrived June 1739 with Catherine McEuen, his wife and Janet, Mary, Neil and Catharine, his children. By 1763 he was dead and one son living, named John. The order of 1764 indicates an award of 300 acres; however, no lot number available.

**John Christy**, arrived Nov. 1740 with Isabel McArthur, his wife and Hannah and Mary, his daughter. The son Alexander awarded Lot 76, 350 acres.

**Angus Clark**, arrived Nov. 1740 with his wife Mary McCollum and Catherine and Mary, his daughters. The parents died prior to 1763 leaving two sons and one daughter. The eldest son Daniel had died leaving a son and daughter. Daniel Clark (grandson?) awarded Lot 29, 350 acres.

**William Clark**, arrived June 1739 with his wife and one son, John. Awarded Lot 124, 350 acres.

**Janet Ferguson**, arrived July 1738 with her son Alexander McDonald. Son was awarded Lot 117, 250 acres.

**Catharine Fraser**, arrived July 1738. Daughter Elizabeth Lot 27, 200 acres.

**Robert Fraser**, arrived June 1739 and Mary McLean, his wife plus Charles, Sarah, Catharine, Mary and Isabel, his children. William Fraser, son of Charles, who was the eldest son of Robert, and two sisters was awarded Lot 34, 350 acres.

**Alexander Gilchrist**, arrived July 1738, Lot 83, 300 acres.

**Duncan Gilchrist**, arrived July 1738 with his wife Florence McAllister and daughter Mary. At the award in 1764 Margaret, Lot 68, 250 acres and Duncan Lot 138, 500 acres. (Margaret Gilchrist, came in 1740 but was not on passenger lists but on petitioned in 1763. This may possibly be the Margaret listed above.)

**John Gilchrist**, arrived 1738, Lot 79, 300 acres.

**Neil Gillaspie**, arrived June 1739 with Mary McIllepheder, his wife and two sons, Gilbert and Angus. Awarded Lot 4, 450 acres.

**James Gillis**, Lot 108, 500 acres not in passenger lists, married to sister of Duncan Taylor.

**Angus Graham**, arrived Nov. 1740, Lot 114, 300 acres.

**Alexander Graham**, arrived July 1738. William Graham, Lot 98, 300 acres.

**Mary Graham**, arrived July 1738 but died before 1763. Mary's child (no name given) Lot 120, 300 acres.

**Mary Hammel**, arrived Nov. 1740. By 1763 she had died, but left a daughter, name not recorded, who was awarded Lot 137, 250 acres.

**Charles McAllister**, arrived June 1739 with Catharine McInnish, his wife and John and Margaret his children. Margaret, Lot 39, 250 acres and Charles (believed to be the youngest son) Lot 97, 300 acres.

Duncan McAllister, arrived June 1739 with Effie Keith, his wife. Barbara McAllister received Lot 125, 300 acres.

Dugald McAlpine, arrived July 1738 with Mary McPhaden, his wife. Lot 12, 300 acres.

Robert McAlpine, arrived Nov. 1740, Lot 121, 300 acres.

**John McGown**, arrived June 1739 with **Anna McCuarg**, his wife and **Malcolm** and **Angus**, his sons. **John McGown, Jr.**, Lot 112, 250 acres.

**Archibald McIllepheder**, arrived June 1739, changed his name to **McNeil**, Lot 11, 300 acres.

Donald McIntyre, arrived July 1738. His son Malcolm Graham, Lot 31, 350 acres.

John McIntyre, arrived Nov. 1740, Lot 135, 350 acres.

Duncan McKay, arrived Nov. 1740. By 1763 he died at sea and his cousin Mary McKay made claim and in 1764 Edward McCoy (new spelling) awarded Lot 115, 300 acres.

**Why A Sudden Exodus From The New England States In 1816?**

In 1816 and 1817, despite the hardships of travel and poor roads, tens of thousands of New Englanders from Vermont to Rhode Island and Maine to upstate New York left for the West. The exodus was so general that whole towns were threatened with desertion. What convinced these immigrants to leave family farms and towns that dated from well before the American Revolution?


Strange as it may seem, the cause of this exodus occurred half-way around the world the year before. In April, 1815 on the Indonesian island of Sumbawa the volcanic eruption of Mt. Tambora, which has been ranked as the most explosive volcano of the last 10,000 years, ejected twenty-five cubic miles of ash and debris into the atmosphere. Its more famous neighbor, Krakatoa, when it erupted in August 27, 1883 only ejected five cubic miles, from a force equivalent to 200 megatons of TNT, and this was enough dust to cause world-wide red sunsets for a year. The Mt. Tambora eruption caused a small nuclear winter in both America and Europe the year of 1816, often called, "the year without a summer." There was snow and killing frosts in New England during each month of the summer season, on the thirtieth of May frost occurred as far south as Virginia. During early June deep snow covered the uplands of Vermont, New Hampshire, New York, and Maine and in Massachusetts where the preceding day the temperature had been 92°F. at noon, by morning standing water had frozen one-eighth inch thick. Sheep that had been shorn died of cold and summer birds flew into houses seeking shelter. Many tender crops were destroyed and in Europe the entire winter grain crop of Germany and Switzerland was lost.

People began to leave for the more southerly western lands in Ohio and Indiana. From Maine alone, "on a single day a train of 16 wagons with 120 men, women, and children from Durham departed the state accompanied by their minister." The *History of Maine Agriculture* by Clarence Day indicated 15,000 left Maine alone. The dust from a South Sea volcano so changed the weather in the year of 1816 that people over 12,000 miles away were forced to become pioneers.

**Methodist Church in Penfield** continued

*In the summer of 1829 or 30 a society of Methodists was organized by Rev. Philo Woodworth then of Victor Ct. at the house of James Chase, the house is now standing on the hill a little south from the Penfield Mills. This society at its organisation consisted of the following named persons—John Tillottson, Leader, Mrs. Lucy Owen, Mrs. Phebe Chase, Mrs. Phebe Hull, Mrs. Sarah Barrett, Mrs. Lucy Williams and Mrs. Lois Mann. These, all except the last named who is still living, died in peace—they rest from their labors and their works follow them.*

*Soon after its organisation this society was turned over to the care of Rev. Jonathan Heustis of blessed memory then Pastor in charge of Penfield Circuit and the place for meeting was changed to this village at the house of Jonathan Barrett after being driven from one private house to another for a length of time the society by the blessing of the Lord slowly increasing in numbers and we believe in graces too found a stopping place for worship for about two years in what was denominated the "Old Penfield Store". Then the charge during the pastoral labors of Rev. Jonathan Benson purchased a portion of the "Globe building", since burned, which stood opposite the Brick Church where for several years it continued to worship. God owning its labors and slowly but certainly enlarging its borders until June 29<sup>th</sup> 1843 when it moved into the neat and commodious church that stood nearly on the ground occupied by the beautiful and convenient Temple we today (Feby 17, 1870) dedicate to the service and worship of Almighty God. The former church was dedicated by the Rev. Samuel Lucky D.D. deceased.*

Fillmore one year, T. B Hudson two years, Samuel Luckey one year dead, S. W. Alden two years, C. L. Bown two years, Robert Hogoboom two years, Wm. Manning two years, N. A. DePew two years, James L. Edson one year, Porter McKinstry two years, Geo. G. Markham one year, L. D. Chase two years, Wm. B. Holt one year, Rev. A. L. Baker present pastor (two years). The rest you know. In view of the whole may we not say what hath God wrought.*



CLARK. In Newark, **Willie P. Clark**. Funeral 2 Dec in the Universalist church by Rev. R[ichmond] Fisk. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 22 Dec 1860)

CLOSS. In Rose on 31 Oct of consumption, Miss **Anjenetta Closs**, age 24. Twin sister of Mrs. Juliaette C. Wade, also of Rose. Funeral by Rev. Dunning, Presbyterian, of Huron. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 26 Nov 1853)

COALBURN. In Rose on 3 Jul, as the result of an accident, **Simeon Coalburn**, age 19. Funeral 5th by Rev. Kinsley, Methodist. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 4 Aug 1855)

CONNOVER. In Newark on 5 Aug 1852, funeral of **Wallace Connover**, age 4 ½ months. From the record of Rev. Charles Augustus Skinner.

COOK. In Butler on 24 Jul, \_\_\_ **Cook**, age 6 weeks. Son of Nathan and Jane Cook. Funeral the following Sabbath by Rev. T[heodore] D. Cook. (*Herald of Truth*, Rochester NY, 29 Sep 1837)

COOK. In Butler on 25 Mar, **Anna Cook**, age 81. Born in Taunton, Massachusetts on 2 Feb 1775, daughter of Joseph Esen. Came with her father to Plainfield, Otsego Co. when it was a wilderness. Her first husband was Elijah Guild, who was buried on their farm. Her second husband was Nathan Cook. She settled in 1816 on the farm where she eventually died. Mother of twelve; predeceased by four. Her

husband died 14 years earlier. "She was a firm believer in the salvation of all mankind." (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 12 Apr 1856)

COOK. In Butler 15 Sep, **Nathan Cook**, age 28. Survived by his wife and one child. Another child died the previous 24th of July. Funeral 16th by Rev. T[heodore D.] Cook. (*Herald of Truth*, Rochester NY, 29 Sep 1837)

DAVIS. In Ontario on 7 Jan, **Betsy Davis**, age 60. Wife of Ebenezer Davis. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 20 Feb 1858)

DEUEL. In Galen on 14 Dec, **Darius Herbert Deuel**, age 6 months and 9 days. Son of Walter and Keziah M. Deuel. Funeral by Rev. A. G. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 27 Dec 1862)

DOLPH. In Clyde on 20 Feb, **Sarah N. Dolph**, age 22. Wife of H. S. Dolph and daughter of Horace Landon Esq. of Collins, Erie Co. Funeral in the Baptist church by Rev. K[neeland] Townsend [Universalist]. (*Western Luminary*, Rochester NY, 9 Mar 1844 and *Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 22 Mar 1844)

BARNEY. In Newark on 1 May of diphtheria, **Nancy E. Barney**, age 8 years less 15 days. Only child of Wm. T. and Theresa Barney. Funeral 4th by Rev. G. W. M. [George W. Montgomery]. (*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 21 May 1864)

BARNEY. In Newark on 12 Apr of consumption, **Peter J. Barney**, age 47. Had been in declining health for 10 or 15 years; before that time had been noted for business enterprise. Gen. V. G. Barney of Newark was his brother. Funeral 13th in Newark by Rev. J. J. A. [Joseph A. Aspinwall], who wrote the obituary. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, Fri 18 Jun 1847)

BARNEY. In Newark on 25 Jan, **Theresa G. Barney**, age [34?]. Wife of Wm. T. Barney. A member of the [Universalist] Sabbath School and Church. Funeral by Rev. L[ewis] C. Browne. (*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 10 Mar 1866)

BARNEY. In Newark on 5 Oct 1866, **Vincent G. Barney**, age 71. (*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 16 Mar 1867)

BARNS. In Newark on 17 Nov 1863 of heart disease, Hon. **Thomas Barns**, age 63. A grandson of Rev. Thomas Barns, a pioneer Universalist minister in New England. A district legislator in 1855; a member of the local Universalist Society; a fruit cultivator by trade. Funeral in the church by Rev. L. C. B. [Lewis C. Browne]. (*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 2 Jan 1864)

BARTLE. In Newark on 1 Feb of consumption, Miss **Alice S. Bartle**, age 23. Predeceased by her father and a sister. Funeral Sunday the 5th by Rev. G. W. M. [George W. Montgomery of Rochester]. **BROWN.** At Manchester Centre on 25 Jun of consumption, **Charles Brown**, age 48. Funeral 26th by Rev. J. J. A. [Joseph A. Aspinwall]. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 6 Aug 1847)

**CABLE.** In Arcadia on 29 Mar, **Benjamin Cable**, age 89. A native of Maine; settled in Arcadia in 1814. His wife died some 5 or 6 years previously. They were converted to Universalism under the ministry of the late Rev. Wm. I. Reese. All but one of their several surviving children were also Universalists. (*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 16 Apr 1859)

*Advocate*, Utica NY, 25 Jun 1847). [G.S. in Newark village cem. for Betsey, wife of James Ackley, 26 Apr 1847 age 36 years and 6 months. Also James A., son of James and Betsey Ackley, 7 Jun 1846 age 2. Also Jane, daughter of James and Betsey Ackley, (?) Mar 183(6?), age 4 months]

ALLEN. In Sodus on 2 Jun, **Jedediah Allen**, age 65 years and 9 months. Predeceased by his wife, age 63, about 5 weeks earlier. Notice was written by Rev. A[lanson] Kelsey. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 18 Aug 1855)

Her first husband was Elijah Guild, who was buried on their farm. Her second husband was Nathan Cook. She settled in 1816 on the farm where she eventually died. Mother of twelve; predeceased by four. Her

**Methodist Church in Penfield** continued

*In the summer of 1829 or 30 a society of Methodists was organized by Rev. Philo Woodworth then of Victor Ct. at the house of James Chase, the house is now standing on the hill a little south from the Penfield Mills. This society at its organisation consisted of the following named persons—John Tillotson, Leader, Mrs. Lucy Owen, Mrs. Phebe Chase, Mrs. Phebe Hull, Mrs. Sarah Barrett, Mrs. Lucy Williams and Mrs. Lois Mann. These, all except the last named who is still living, died in peace—they rest from their labors and their works follow them.*

*Soon after its organisation this society was turned over to the care of Rev. Jonathan Heustis of blessed memory then Pastor in charge of Penfield Circuit and the place for meeting was changed to this village at the house of Jonathan Barrett after being driven from one private house to another for a length of time the society by the blessing of the Lord slowly increasing in numbers and we believe in graces too found a stopping place for worship for about two years in what was denominated the "Old Penfield Store". Then the charge during the pastoral labors of Rev. Jonathan Benson purchased a portion of the "Globe building", since burned, which stood opposite the Brick Church where for several years it continued to worship. God owning its labors and slowly but certainly enlarging its borders until June 29<sup>th</sup> 1843 when it moved into the neat and commodious church that stood nearly on the ground occupied by the beautiful and convenient Temple we today (Feby 17, 1870) dedicate to the service and worship of Almighty God. The former church was dedicated by the Rev. Samuel Lucky D.D. deceased.*

Seaver two years, during whose pastorate the Church now rebuilt and today rededicated, was built and dedicated, Wm. P. Davis two years dead, E. Thomas one year, Henry Hickok one year, A. N. Fillmore one year, T. B Hudson two years, Samuel Luckey one year dead, S. W. Alden two years, C. L. Bown two years, Robert Hogoboom two years, Wm. Manning two years, N. A. DePew two years, James L. Edson one year, Porter McKinstry two years, Geo. G. Markham one year, L. D. Chase two years, Wm. B. Holt one year, Rev. A. L. Baker present pastor (two years). The rest you know. In view of the whole may we not say what hath God wrought.*

*In concluding this brief history let us pray that the glory of the latter house may exceed the glory of the former house.*



(*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 3 Feb 1866) [G.S. in Soule Cem., Chestnut Ridge section, for Marcus Tulley Doty, 3 Jan 1866, age 67 years, 5 months and 10 days. Also Lucy Baxter, his wife, 10 Feb 1867, age 62 years and 5 months]

DUNNING. In Williamson on 30 Dec 1835, **Merritt**

**Dunning**, age 11. In the death notice, Rev. Jacob Chase wrote an apology that he had been unable to officiate at the funeral. (*Herald of Truth*, Geneva NY, 8 Jan 1836)

**Mt. Hope Cemetery Interment Records**

Volume 3 is finally here! Interment records for years 1882-1892, nearly 15,200 names spanning 11 years, are now available in book form and on CD (PDF format). Not only is this information a great genealogical research tool, but also a valuable historical resource.

To complete the project six volunteers, Sharon Burch, Bob Coomber, Kathryn and Roger Heintz, Larry Lavery and myself spent hundreds of hours comparing the transcribed files to the original records at the cemetery. Great thanks is also due to the Friends of Mt. Hope-Frank Gillespie and the cemetery staff for allowing us the opportunity.

Look for both the book and CD at the publications table at regular RGS meetings. The book sells for \$25.00 (plus \$5 shipping when required) and the CD for \$10.00 (plus \$3.00 shipping).

Proofing of Volume 2 (mid. 1860-1881) is also complete and we are anticipating publication of this volume early 2006.

At the completion of the first three volumes of interment records (spanning 56 years), information from a searchable database of more than 50,000 entries will be available to researchers.

When I initially volunteered to chair this project, my goal was simply to assist in the completion of an effort

that had stalled and maybe learn a little something new along the way. What an incredible education I received! By becoming involved in all details of a project such as this, information about local history, culture, health issues, lifestyle patterns and more are revealed that are not as easily recognizable when research is specific to your own family's story.

We have outstanding resources at our finger tips locally, but it is not always easy to identify that one little detail needed to get to the next step. My message is, get involved and help in any way you can to help make information available to fellow researchers - the rewards are amazing!!!

**SPEAR.** "Mr. Lemuel Spear, of Macedon, committed suicide by hanging himself, on Thursday morning. It appears that there had been a protracted meeting [a religious revival] in session near where the deceased resided; he attended, got his feelings excited, and his brain bewildered, by listening to ... dark and gloomy pictures of the future, which probably caused him to commit the horrid deed. We come to this conclusion from the fact that about four years since, there was a similar meeting in the same town, Mr. Spear attended, and it had a similar effect upon him at that time. He became wild, and remained in a state of mental derangement for several weeks; his family were obliged to watch him; they feared he would then commit suicide; but the excitement passed off after a while, and he became in possession of his reason again. He was never, during his life, suspected of being in the least insane, with the exception of these two cases; but always bore the character of being possessed of strong mind and most excellent judgment." An early settler. Survived by his wife and several children. (*Herald of Truth*, Geneva NY, 29 Apr 1836)

**STEBBINS.** In Arcadia on 3 Jul, Miss **Emily Stebbins**, age 16. Funeral 5th by Rev. J. A. A[ustin]. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 6 Aug 1847)

**STONE.** In Clyde on 25 Aug, **Eliza Jane Stone**, age 22. Daughter of Joseph and Betsey Stone. Also survived by 2 brothers. Funeral 26th at the home by Rev. H[enry] Roberts. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 10 Sep 1841)

**SWARTZOUT.** In Lyons on 11 Feb 1853, Mrs. **Jemima Swartzout**, age 52. Funeral by Rev. Charles Augustus Skinner, from his record.

**TABOR.** In Newark on the 24th inst., **William Tabor**, age 36. Born in Dover Plains, Dutchess Co. in 1821 and came to Newark in 1842. A partner in the mercantile firm of Tabor and Alleston. Survived by his wife, a son, his mother, and 4 brothers. Funeral 28th in the Methodist Episcopal church by Rev A[lanson] Kelsey, by request. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 16 May 1857)

**THOMPSON.** In Newark at the home of J. P. Bartle on 30 Dec 1857, Miss **Jenette A. Thompson**, age 29. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 20 Feb 1858)

**TIBBITTS.** In Arcadia on 16 Oct, **Clarissa Tibbitts**, age 62. Wife of Caleb Tibbitts. Funeral 17th at the home by Rev. A[lanson] Kelsey. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 5 Nov 1853)

**TOBEY.** In Marion on the 25th ult. of consumption, Miss **Lovenia M. Tobey**. Her parents predeceased her. Funeral in the Christian church by Rev. R. F. [Richmond Fisk, Universalist], assisted by Rev. Stanton, the pastor. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 5 and 26 Apr 1862)

**TOBY.** In Marion on 5 Feb, **Lucy Toby**, age 65 years and 4 months. Wife of Ephriam Toby. Formerly of [Sullivan], Madison Co. Funeral 7th in the Christian church by Rev. R. F. [Richmond Fisk, Universalist], assisted by Rev. Amasa Stanton, pastor. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 18 Feb 1860)

**TODD.** In Pultneyville on 13 Nov, **Albert S. Todd**. Eldest son of Dr. A. Todd. Born in Lisle, Broome Co. in 1817 but lived most of his life in Pultneyville. Funeral 18th by Rev. Asa Saxe [of Rochester]. (*Christian Leader*, Utica NY, 23 Nov 1878)

A. [Joseph A. Aspinwall], who wrote the obituary. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 21 May 1847)

TODD. In Williamson on 15 Feb, **William H. Todd**, age 40. A son of the late Dr. Todd of Pultneyville and a lifelong resident of the county. Survived by his wife and 3 children. Funeral 19th by Rev. Asa Saxe [of Rochester]. (*Christian Leader*, Utica NY, 10 Apr 1875)

TOMPKINS. In Wolcott on 22 Jun, **Orestes Hubbard Tompkins**. Infant son of Nathaniel W. and Bethiah Tompkins. Funeral in the Universalist meeting house by Rev. T[heodore] D. Cook. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 21 Jul 1837)

TOPP. In Pultneyville on 20 Mar of consumption, **Albert V. Topp**, age 23 years and 6 months. Funeral at his father's home by Rev. Asa Saxe [of Rochester], assisted by Rev. Williams, Methodist. (*Christian Leader*, Utica NY, 12 Apr 1873)

TOWNSEND. In Newark on 4 Aug, **Elizabeth Townsend**, age 13. Eldest daughter of Kneeland and Caroline Townsend. Funeral 6th by Rev. [Oliver] Ackley. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 21 Aug 1840 and *Universalist Union*, New York NY, 5 Sep 1840)

TOWNSEND. "On board the steamboat Indiana, on his passage from Newark [NY] to Ohio, on the 8th of Nov. last" of consumption, **Jacob B. Townsend**, age 20. Son of Kneeland and Caroline Townsend of [Milan, Ohio]. (*Western Luminary*, Rochester NY, 19 Jul 1845)

TOWNSEND. In Milan, Ohio, **Kneeland Townsend**. A former Universalist clergyman in New York State: settlements included [Albion], Gaines, Newark, and Troy. Born in Derby,

Connecticut in 1800. On the death of an uncle, he was called to take charge of a large land estate, and he felt that his duties rendered him unfit for the ministry. He officiated at funerals but otherwise was not in the active ministry. Funeral "17th." (*Christian Leader*, Utica NY, 30 Sep 1876)

TOWNSEND. In Milan [Ohio] on 9 Feb, **Sarah Townsend**, age 8 months. Daughter of Kneeland and Caroline Townsend [formerly of Newark NY]. (*Western Luminary*, Rochester NY, 19 Jul 1845)

UNDERHILL. In Wolcott on the 30th ult., **Irena Underhill**, age 3. Daughter of David Underhill. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 16 Apr 1836)

UNDERHILL. In Alton, IL on Wed the 19th ult., from injuries suffered in a fire in the Alton House on the 16th, **Robert Underhill**. Son of Wm. Underhill Esq. of Wolcott, Wayne Co. and brother of Wm. Underhill Jr. of New York. He was a bookkeeper for the firm of Godfred, Gilman & Co. of Alton. Mr. Gilman sent Wm. Underhill a letter about his son's death and assured him that every possible attempt had been made to save Robert's life and that his death was greatly lamented. Funeral by Rev. Ives, Baptist. (*Universalist Union*, New York NY, 26 Aug 1837)

VALENTINE. In Rose on 13 Jul of consumption, **Ann Valentine**, age 34. Wife of the late Dr. Richard S. Valentine, who had died just over 2 years earlier. Survived by one son. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 7 Aug 1858)

VALENTINE. In Rose on 1 Apr, Dr. **Peter Valentine**, age 63. He had experienced a "shock of paralysis" [probably a stroke] on 5 Mar. Had begun the practice of medicine shortly after Rose was first settled, and had served on the Board of Supervisors for several years. He once wrote that he "leaned some toward Universalism" but was not established in the faith. A son died the previous June. Survived by his wife and 4 children. Funeral 3rd in the Baptist meeting house by Rev. Ladd,

VOSBURGH. In Newark on the 8th inst., **Anna Z. Vosburgh**, age 1 year, 5 months and 1 day. Second daughter of Dr. Wm. and Mary Vosburgh. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 25 Feb 1860)

WADE. In Rose on 7 Nov, **Willis Edwards Wade**, age 3 months and 20 days. Only child of Willis G. and Juliaette C. Wade. Funeral by Rev. Dunning, Presbyterian, of Huron. (*Christian Ambassador*, Auburn NY, 26 Nov 1853)

WARD. In Wolcott on Sat the 4th inst., **Lucy Jane Ward**, age 19. Wife of Joseph Ward and daughter of Rufus Sabin. Her 10 day old infant was buried the Tuesday previous to her own death. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 18 Sep 1830)

WELCH. In Clyde on 30 Jul, **Samuel M. Welch**, age 72. Survived by his wife and children. Funeral 1 Aug by Rev. Otis Morton of the Methodist Episcopal Society, "whose sermon caused the women that belonged to his own society to murmur." (*Western Luminary*, Rochester NY, 16 Aug 1845)

WELLER/WELLES. In Newark on 23 Apr, **Norton Weller/Welles**, age 1 year, 9 months and 1 day. Youngest son of John Norman Weller/Welles. Survived by his parents, sisters, a brother. "The father has experienced multiplied afflictions; the mother mourns her first bereavement." Funeral by Rev. L. C. B. [Lewis C. Browne]. (*Christian Ambassador*, New York NY, 23 May 1863 and record of Lewis Cresaba Browne, in which the family name is given as Welles)

YOUNG. In Butler on 18 Dec 1836 of consumption, **Amy Young**, age 42. Wife of Isaac Young and mother of three. Funeral by Rev. T[heodore] D. Cook. (*Evangelical Magazine & Gospel Advocate*, Utica NY, 3 Mar 1837)
