BLADEN CO .: DEEDS, 1734-1778

Bladen Co. was formed in 1734 from New Hanover Co., and from 1734 until 1750 took in all the settlements to the north, northwest, and west. The following early counties were formed from Bladen: Anson, 1750; Orange (partly), 1752; Cumberland, 1754; Brunswick (partly), 1764; Robeson, 1787; etc.

The early records of Bladen Co. are especially valuable, since they covered such a vast area the first few decades. Unfortunately, however, the Bladen courthouse has had more than one devastating fire. According to Crittenden & Lacy in their "The Historical Records of North Carolina," Vol. I, p. 227, Bladen courthouse burned in 1800 and again in 1893, and the majority of the records were destroyed or seriously damaged by those fires. A statement on the wall of the office of the Bladen Register of Deeds reads as follows: "Bladen courthouse & all record were burned 1765. In second fire, 18 Jan. 1893, following were destroyed: Deed Book N, RR, T, U, V, X, Mortgage Deed Book # 6."

In the Archives in Raleigh (File No. 11.002) there is a volume of Bladen Co. Deeds, 1738-1779--433 deeds, 559 pages, unindexed. The following is inscribed in the front of this volume: "Commenced Transcribing the old Books of the Registers office of ---[torn] County the 12 Feby. A. D. 1861 By Durram(?) Lewis, Regr." There are 66 deeds dated 1737 through 1765; 367 deeds dated 1766-1778. Following is a brief listing of these 433 deeds:



Halifax Co. was formed in 1758 from Edgecombe County. In 1774 Martin Co. was formed from parts of Tyrrell and Halifax Counties, with Halifax contributing roughly 75% of the area for the new county. In 1779 a small portion of Halifax was annexed to Edgecombe County, and the boundaries for Halifax have remained unchanged since that time.



Newton Land Records

The availability of land brought many immigrants to the American colonies as well as encouraged expansion into southern and western regions. The first land claims in what is now North Carolina were established by numerous royal, colonial, state and federal governments. These governments later gave or sold land to individuals. Grants were issued by the Eight Lords Proprietors of the Carolinas.¹ The person who obtained the land from the government received a land grant or land patent.² The technical term for this document was patent and the government action was a grant of patent.3

The paperwork of petitioning and obtaining individual grants was handled by land offices. Although there were several ways to acquire first title to lands, they usually followed the four steps of petition, warrant, survey/plat, and grant/patent.4

The petition was the application for the land. The petitioner would enter the claim with the appropriate official or the entry taker as well as provide a reason for acquiring the land. This might be money, other property, "love and affection," the promise of land for military service, bringing an immigrant into the colony, thus being eligible for a headright land bounty, or other described value. When purchasing from individuals, the grantor, or seller, would bargain with the grantee, or buyer, to transfer a tract of land in exchange for some consideration.

The entry taker, a local court appointed official, issued a warrant which certified the right to a particular acreage. It also gave authorization to an official surveyor to survey the acreage. Sometimes several years could pass between the petition entry and the warrant.

The surveyor would receive the warrant and then survey the land. His drawing of the land, based on the legal description, was called a plat. He would certify that everything was in order as far as the warrant, the acreage and the legal description of the land. The surveyor then sent copies of the plat and description to the land office.

The grant or patent was the document that the new land owner received after all paperwork was filed and fees were paid. A copy of the patent was usually entered onto lose sheets or into a bound volume as a permanent, official record. Plats were sometimes recorded in volumes and the surveyor's copy was sometimes kept. Some land offices kept the warrant records. The petition was seldom kept.5

A voice replied: "Oh no! Oh no! don't let's."





WAYNE COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA: - 1786 TAX LIST

Wayne Co., N. C., was formed in 1779 from Dobbs County. In 1793 a small portion of Glasgow (Greene) Co. was annexed to Wayne Co., and in 1855 Wilson Co. was formed from parts of Edgecombe, Nash, Johnston, and Wayne Cos. (roughly, Wayne Co. contributed the middle third of the southern half of Wilson Co.); there have been no other major changes in the boundaries of Wayne County.

With the exception of some very incomplete lists for 1796/7, this 1786 tax list of Wayne Co. is the one and only tax list that appears to have been preserved for the county (Archives, Comptroller's Papers, Tax Lists, Various Counties). The following data is given for each person (head of family or taxable) listed: acres (of) land, free poll(s), black poll(s), stud horses, and carriage wheels. 

CLAIMS BEFORE THE SOUTHERN CLAIMS COMMISSION BY RUTHERFORD COUNTY, NC RESIDENTS by Beverly Farr Barnes

On a recent trip to the Hunter Library at Western Carolina University, I stumbled upon a book by Dr. Gary B. Mills entitled <u>SOUTHERN LOYALISTS IN THE CIVIL</u> <u>WAR: THE SOUTHERN CLAIMS COMMISSION - "A DIRECTORY OF CASE</u> <u>FILES CREATED BY THE U.S. COURT OF CLAIMS, 1871-1880"</u> (Baltimore, Md.,: Genealogical Publishing Co., 1994).

It seems the Southern Claims Commission was established by the federal government in 1871 to allow individuals from Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia who had sustained losses of property, supplies, or animals during the Civil War to file claims for reimbursement. The President nominated three commissioners of claims to "receive, examine, and consider the claims of those citizens who remained loyal adherents to the cause and the Government of the United States during the war, for stores or supplies taken or furnished during the rebellion for the use of the Army of the United States in States proclaimed as in insurrection against the United States."(1)

The claimant had to swear that he/she had been loyal to the Union and had not provided aid of any kind to support the Confederacy. There were 80 questions asked by the commissioners of the claimant as well as the witnesses called to support the claim. They included questions about name, age, residence, occupation, place of birth and naturalization papers if not from the U.S. There were questions concerning any close relatives who served in the Confederate Army and how the applicant contributed to their support or what influence they exerted to keep them from entering the hostile army. If a woman was making a claim, she was asked about her husband and why he was not joining in the claim, Witnesses were asked questions about the claimant's reputation for being loyal or disloyal to the U.S. There were questions about the losses and how they came about. Some of these files are 50 or more pages in length and contain a wealth of information for genealogists.

From 1871 to 1880, 22,298 claims were made, but less than one third of them were ultimately paid. A newspaper dated January 8, 1874, *Peoples Press* of Salem, NC, commented that "The Southern Claims Commission, to which it is proposed to refer all war claims, has now before it claims in the amount of \$22,000,000." (2) By 1880, claims totaling \$60,528,150.44 had been made, but only \$4,636,920.69 was paid. (3)

Dr. Mills' book is an index of the claims filed and gives enough information to be able to request copies of the claim from the National Archives and Records Administration in Washington, DC. You write to the General Reference Branch, National Archives, 700 Pennsylvania Ave., NW, Washington, DC 20408. State that you are looking for a Southern Claims Commission claim. Give the name of the



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claimant, the state, and the claim number. The Archives will respond and tell you how to proceed from there. Some of the claims went before the House of Representatives while others were heard in the U.S. Court of Claims.

There were three types of claims:

ALLOWED: The U.S. paid the claim. This is the worst type of claim for the family researcher since the only records surviving are the name of the claimant, the place of residence, and the amount paid. (There may be exceptions to this statement, so it may be worth the effort to request these records. See my paragraph at the end of the article.)

BARRED: This means the claim was filed too late or the commissioners doubted the loyalty of the claimant. The only records available are the name, place, and description of the loss.

DISALLOWED: This claim was not paid but the reason is something other than the filing date or the fact that the claimant was a Confederate supporter. This type of claim gives the most information for the family researcher.

If your ancestors are not listed in the Southern Claims book, try looking for the names of neighbors since there would be a good chance your relative gave an affidavit for a neighbor making a claim. If a claimant died during the claims process, his heirs often continued with the claim, proving their relationship through Bible records and depositions, often providing valuable genealogical information.

In the brief time I had access to the Southern Loyalist book, I noted these claimants from Rutherford County. This may not be a complete list and I would urge you to do a more thorough check on your own. This is the name of the claimant, the case number, the amount of the claim, the amount paid, the year of the claim and the loss claimed:

ORANJE OCUPEN CALEORANA BENEALOGICA - WARE IV I did not find any claimants from McDowell, Gaston, or Lincoln counties. There was one claim from Cleveland County made by Thomas S. Bridges, Case 12200, which was barred.

If you have access to the Internet, a search on Google.com for "southern claims commission" will bring up many useful "hits". The State Archives of Tennessee, as well as some counties in Georgia and Texas have websites that list claimants. I visited a very nicely-done family page website and have received permission from the author, Deborah A. Bass-Frazier, to quote from her ancestor's Southern Claims Commission file. Even though the claimant is not from our area, this is a good example of a claim. Deborah's Middleton ancestors moved from Marion Co., SC to Monroe Co., AL about 1820-1830. John G. Middleton served in Co. E, 1st Ala. Arty, CSA and had been a POW at Camp Chase.

John G. Middleton made a claim for two bay horses, at \$150 each. This is part of his statement:

On 18th day April 1865. Soldiers and officers came to his residence, and told Mrs. Middleton, that they were compelled to have good horses, that they were on provost duty and would take those in the Col. but would return them the next day, and they went and took the horses, and went off with the. Petitioner was in his field at work and arrived at the house just in time to See the Solders leaving. Can only say report Says that Genl. Smith camped within two miles and a half of his residence but petitioner did not go to the camp himself, but every circumstance connected with the facts requires him to believe it, as much so that as there is a God and that the Soldiers belongs to Sd. command, that carried his horses to the United States army Under command of Genl. Smith, although he did not see them only as they were leaving his house - and believes would further aver that he was a loyal adherent to the cause and government of the United States at the time at the time the above claim accrued, and was so loyal before, during and since the rebellion, and would further aver that he never [never was twice underlined] furnished any Slaves, Supplies or other Material aid to the Said Confederate army or navy, or to the Confederate government, or to any officer, solder, department, or adherent of the same in support thereof, and that he never accepted or exercised the function of any office whatsoever under or yielded when any support to the Said Confederate government. Sworn to and subscribed before me, on 26 May 1871.

Joel Hardee, J.P. (signed) John G. Middleton

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Personally appeared before me an acting justice of the peace in and for Monroe County Ala. is the J. Simpkins and J. E. Feagin and being duly sworn testifies that the above statement of John J. Middleton is, that they knew he had the horses above stated, and they live about one mile from said petitioner, and knew that they were taken from him at the time the place where stated and from every

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circumstance [stat]ted, to the best of their information and beliefs, and willing to testify that they were taken by Soldiers under command of Genl. Smith.

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Sworn to and subscribed before me on 26 May 1871. John J. Simpkins

Mr. Middleton made a good case, but the commissioners denied his claim and made these comments:

REMARKS


One of this claimants witnesses says "I was off in the army three years one month & 19 days." + + "I went into the army the 2nd day of April the second year of the war." It appears from this that he served until the 21st day of May 1865. He also says "I was a Union man at the commencement of the war and all of the time." He entered the army before the first conscript law was passed so must have volunteered. It will be perceived that the opinion of such a witness entertaining such a notion of constitutes a Union man is utterly worthless & when he says of the claimant "I know the he was a strong Union man" the statement is entitled to no weight whatever. It is very evident that this claimant was just exactly such a Union man as this witness for he was also in the Confederate army from the fall of 186___ until the 2nd day of May 1865. He also took the oath to support the Confederacy. Mr. Middleton may have been a Union man according to the standard of Monroe Co., Ala. but he served too long as a solder in the Confederate army for a "loyal adherent to the cause & the government of the United States."

The claim is disallowed. Signed, A. O. Aldes, Orange Ferrim, J. B. Howell, Commrs. of Claims (4)

Now to confuse matters a little bit, Deborah Bass-Frazier, who transcribed the preceding claim, has sent for three different claims and had better luck with the allowed claims, which differs from what I said in the first part of my article. She says if the claim was disallowed, the application and all the supporting papers were copied to microfiche and the paperwork was destroyed. The cost of the microfiche was \$6 to \$7 and the microfiche can be very hard to read. If the claim was allowed, the actual application and supporting papers were kept and you receive photocopies. The case she received was 52 pages long, and it took several phone calls to convince the NARA clerk that she actually wanted the entire application copied. Deborah does not remember the SCC requiring a special request form, but she says it has been years since she requested the files and policy may have changed. The phone number for NARA is 1-866-272-6272.

Following the Civil War, many people faced economic hardships. The Southern Claims Commission offered a chance to be compensated for losses sustained during the War. Most of the claims were disallowed. I read one comment by a commissioner that "most witnesses in said county are liars and this should be taken into consideration in these claims." I imagine these ancestors of ours lied under oath all through these claims, but it seems like I heard one time that it

There were many names in the register. This is something you will want to look at during your next visit to the State Archives.

REGULATION OF ROADS

CRX 313: Buncombe County Pleas and Quarter Minutes 1810-1812

July Session 1811

An act passed at Raleigh Dec. 23, 1811 entitled "An Act for the Better Regulation of Roads in the County of Buncombe, etc." that all roads in said county over which said court has jurisdiction by the aforesaid act heretofore laid out, or that shall be hereafter directed to be laid out shall be fully cleared out the width of one rod or pole and that 10 feet of said road be kept clear of roots and runners as the nature of the case will admit of, and all stumps shall be cut within not more than 8 inches for the largest and 6 for small ones and well rounded on their tops, and all bridges, causeways shall be made at least 10 feet wide and when natural impediments prevent the roads from being made one rod wide, it shall be the duty of the overseer to make it completely passable at least 10 feet wide. [Did this act apply to all roads in NC as well?]







(Rowan County Tax Lists, 1758-1772 North Carolina State Archives)

Introductiom

The area covered by the tax list is the entire northwestern quadrant of North Carolina. Rowan County was formed in 1753 from Anson County and was not divided until 1771 when the counties of Guilford and Surry were carved from it.

In his The Rowan Story, 1753-1953 (Salisbury, NC: Rowan Printing Company, 1953), James Shober Brawley in Appendix A, pp. 351-357, presented "the earliest list ever found in Rowan County." It is labeled

List of Taxable Persons in Rowan County in the year 1759. Found in bad condition in walls of Old Court House 1944 by Wm. D. Kizziah, Register of Deeds, and transcribed by him.

Mr. Brawley used the list transcribed by Mr. Kizziah and never saw the original tax list. No one knew the whereabouts of this tax list. It had disappeared.

In 1967, William Perry Johnson, editor of North Carolina Genealogy, published what he called "The 1759 Tax List of Rowan," from Archives File No. 85.007.1, which had disappeared well before 1972 when this genealogist tried to find it. Mr. Johnson didn't say whether the list was labeled 1759. He did say he had once been "allowed" by Mr. Kizziah a very brief look at the original 1759 list he had found, that it was fragmentary -- but that it did have the number of taxables, which numbers were omitted from Kizziah's transcription. Mr. Johnson printed his list and Brawley's and suggested that a combination of the two lists would provide a fairly complete list of names for Rowan County in the period 1758-60. Rowan County at that time covered an area from which twenty-seven counties have been carved.

Your editor, who has published abstracts of the Rowan County wills through the period of 1850, abstracts of the Rowan County deeds through 1792, the minutes of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions through 1795, militia lists, petitions, and other early tax lists knew that the 1759 William Perry Johnson Tax List was far from complete, that the reader could not use this list (or any tax list or census) in a negative fashion: i.e., one could not state categorically that a man was not in this locality because his name does not appear. He may well have been here.

We in number amount to about three thousand voters; and seldom not more than four or five hundred are given in at the town of Salisbury. We must again assert our rights as free citizens; and pray that your honorable body would grant us a seperate election in the third battalion to be holden at the dwelling house of Andrew Mocks: which we do not desire through any faction or party work; for we can assure your honorable body that as little of that business is carried on in this County, as in any other of this State. In granting us this, we your petitioners will ever prav

To the Honurable the Speakers and Members of the General Assembly in the State of North Carolina

The petition of the inhabitants in the western End of Rowan County Humbly Sheweth

That a large number of your petitioners lives thirty to fifty miles distant from Salisbury. That although a Law has been passed allowing your petitioners to have their general musters at Thomas Allison's with certain conditions and restrictions, yet it is found not to answer the solutarry purposes which was intended by your petitioners and was intended by the honourable Legislature.


Your petitioners are frequently Called upon to Attend General musters at Salisbury and the officers are repeatedly Called upon to attend there to consult on the business of the whole regiment to form Courts Martial etc. That the distance and expenses makes it an insupportable burden. Your petitioners humbly Conceive that the Military department of this extensive and populace County would be administered to much greater Advantage for the publick if it was divided into two or more batallions.

Your petitioners therefore humbly intreat that a law may be passed establishing a second batallion in said County to meet at the plantation of Christopher Irvin comprehending the Companies Commanded by Captains Huggins, Davidson, Cowan, Crawford, Caldwell, Purviance, Graham on hunting creek, Nichols, and Sharpe. Your petitioners are not fond of a division of the County especially in these times of publick commotion.

If the honourable Assembly will please to grant a second Batallion it will greatly ease and relieve your petitioners who as in duty vound will ever pray.

13 July 1809 – Election Judges: Irvinsville: Casper Webber and John Roberts.²⁷

27 July 1809 – William Graham of RCNC to Patton & Erwin of Buncombe County, North Carolina, 100 dollars, lot # 6 on the east side of Broad Street and on Union Street in the town of Erwinsville in Rutherford County, containing 280 feet in length and 165 feet in breadth. Wit. Danl. Moggan, [*Daniel Morgan*], Merrit Burgin. # 36, 18 Mar 1811.²⁸

Burrtown did not have a post office until 1813 when a post office was established as Irvinsville. Hugh Quinn was post master, followed by Samuel Julin in 1828, Francis Young in 1835 and Lawrence H. Logan in 1837. In September of 1839, the post office was discontinued only to be reestablished in 1840 with Jammes D. Butler as post master, followed by Charles Ellis in 1841. Ellis was the first person to serve as post master in Cleveland County.

North Carolina Postmasters for Erwinsville are listed as: Charles Ellis, 30 January 1841, Charles Ellis, CSA,[*Confederate States of America*], 4 July 1861 until the CSA office closed on or before 30 April 1865. Sallie L. Ellis, 1 March 1866, and Logan Ellis, 12 Mar 1873. The postoffice was discotinued on 5 February 1877, until John R. Ellis became postmaster on 2 July 1877. David H. Gramling became postmaster on 26 January 1889. On 5 October 1894, **Erwinsville's** name was changed to Dellinger. John P. Dellinger was postemaster 5 October 1894. The post office moved to Cherokee County, S.C. on 11 May 1899.²⁹

The 1887 Tax Map shows the **Irvinsville** post office on a road southwest of the Ellis Ferry.³⁰

October 1816 – On motion and petition of a numbr of the inhabitants for an order of court to be renewed that was granted some year ago, that is for turning a part of the post road leading from Lincolnton and appoint a new overseer, the ct. did not grant the order in full but appointed Jer. Runyans ove, [*overseer*], of the road from the --?—road to the forks of the Camp ferry road & **Irvinsville** road.³¹

20 November 1817 – Hugh Quinn of RCNC to Robert A. Allison of the same, 200 dollars, 50 acres on Broad River joining land belonging to the heirs of Robert Allison dec'd, conveyed to Hugh Quinn by Sheldrake McCombs 23 November 1819; also, town lot in Ervinsville, formerly Burrtown, number 37, at Water St. and between Spring and Back Alleys, one square acre. Wit. Hugh Sproatt, Wm. Henderson. #243, 10 February 1828.³²

15 July 1818 – William Hambrick of RCNC to Frederick F. Alley of the same, 1892 dollars, 100 acres on Shoal Creek joining widow Bridges, James Bridges, and McSwain; also, tract joining the first, on Little Shoal Creek joining Jeremiah Runion, James Hamrick, and Wm. McSwain; also, 98¹/₂ acres on Borens Creek joining Bridges; also, 2 ¹/₂ lots in the Town formerly called **Bursville** now called **Erwinsville**, one whole lot # 11 on Broad Street, one whole lot #38, the ¹/₂ lot of No. 16; and for further sum of 5 shillings, one negro woman suck about 21 years old, negro child Mary about 2 years old, and a negro child called Allen about 1 year old, and a negro man Lawrence about 21 years old. Wit. Robt. H. Burton, Jesse H. Benton. # 163, 16 September 1818.³³

In October 1818, the court appointed Hugh Quinn and Theodoric Birchett "as inspectors of tobacco, pro tem, for the Town of Irvinsville, until January court, 1819: as follows for inspecting each hogshead³⁴, \$1.00; for coopering³⁵ each hogshead, .50¢ and for storage per month, 18 ³/₄ cents."³⁶

On 13 January 1819, Hugh Quinn and Theo Burchett were appointed inspectors of tobacco for Irvinsville.

12 January 1819 – According to the Pleas and Quarter Sessions minutes, the court appointed Lemuel Moore, M.R. Alexander and Theo Burchett a committee to settle with the old commissioners, Joseph Camp, William McBrayer, Abram Irvin, William Grayhams, [Graham], Aaron Bridges, or the survivors of them and the representatives of the deceased commissioners of the Town of Irvinsville, and that they be directed to call on all persons who have heretofore acted as commissioners of said town, and their legal representatives for settlement and make report at our next county court; and that they be allowed \$1.60 a day for their trouble out of the money due for the sale of Lotts in said Town. On motion ordered by Court that Samuel S. Ross, William Porter and Hugh Quinn be appointed Commissioners of the Town of Irvinsville in the room and place of William Grayham, resigned; and Joseph Camp and William McBrayer, deceased; and said Commissioners are directed to purchase a well bound book out of the money arising from the sale of Lotts in said Town and record all their proceedings therein for which they shall be allowed in their settlement with the Court.

7 January 1820 – Clayburn Camp, Edward Camp heirs, Abner Camp, Benjamin Camp, John S. Camp, William Camp, Flemmin Goodman, James Raney, William Laswell and George Wilson for \$11 to Hugh Quinn, one town lot in Ervinsville, one acre. Witnesses: William Camp, Lewis Camp, and Eliza Allison. The deed is signed: Clayburn Camp, Edward Camp heirs, Abner Camp, Benjamin Camp, John S. Camp, William Camp, Flemmin Goodman, James Raney, William Laswell, George Wilson. Recorded 4 April 1821. Deed Book 32-33, p. 337.

7 January 1820 - Claiborn Camp, Edward Camp's heirs, Fleming Goodman, James Raney, Beni. Camp, John Camp, William Laswell, Geo. Wilson, Fleming Goodman and Wm, Camp, all heirs of Joseph Camp deceased, to Abram Camp, 300 dollars, 200 acres on the head of the long branch of the (blank) of Broad River, joining James Bridges and Wm, Camp; also one town lot in Ervinsville. formerly **Burrtown**, number 31, one square acre on the north side of Water St. between Spring and Hutson Alleys. Wit. Hugh Quinn, Wm. Camp. #291, 17 May 1828.³⁷

26 November 1827 – Hugh Quinn and wife Frances, late widow and relick of Robt. A. Allison, son of said Robt. Allison dec'd 300 dollars, all dower of Frances Quinn in Robt. Allison dec'd land and town lots in Burr now Erwinsville: (1) 100 acres adjoining Erwinsville on Main Broad River;
(2) 100 acres about ½ or ¼ mile from above tract, joining First and Main Broad River, town of Erwinsville, and John McSwain; (3) one town lot in Erwinsville number 12 on which the dwelling house now stands; (4) one town lot in Erwinsville number 43; (5) one town lot in Erwinsville number 22. Allison of the same, 600 dollars, all right descended to Eliza as one of the heirs of Robert Allison dec'd, (1) 100 acres joining Erwinsville, east side of Broad River, and Reuben Blanton, (2) 100 acres one-fourth mile from aforementioned tract, joining public land of Erwinsville, John McSwain, Main Broad River, land totally occupied by Hugh Quinn, Bridges, mouth of First Broad River; also one town lot in Ervinsville, number 12 on which dwelling house stands which was lately occupied by Hugh Quinn; and another lot number 43 and another lot number 22 in said town. Wit. John Mills, Benj. Ellis. #251, 15 February 1828.⁴⁶

11 July 1839 – Lawson Logan to sell liquor at Irvinsville.

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In 1841, Cleveland County was formed from the existing counties of Rutherford and Lincoln. The following year, in 1842, the county seat was established and named Shelby. Irvinsville / Ervinsville would now be in Cleveland County.

18 May 1842 – G.B. Palmer and John Borders were appointed Inspectors of the Sheriffs Election for Erwinsville precinct. The court also ordered that Benjamin Elliott and John Randal be appointed inspectors for the Governors Election at the Erwinsville precinct.

14 July 1842 – Pollwatchers: John Green in Capt. John Burge's Co. with Lewis Green; at Sandy Run; Edmund Jones, Willis McKinney; Irvinsville, B.B. Bridges, George McSwain.

The Cleveland County Business Directory for 1896 shows **Erwinsville**, with a population of 20. Subsequently, little else is mentioned of this town.

The perfidy of Aaron Burr had an adverse effect on Burr Town, it did prosper until about 1840. Nevertheless, the improvement of roads and the extension of railroads services in the area brought about the abandonment of building canals and the eventual demise of the town. "With the advent of rail transportation, the center of trade shifted from Burrtown to Gaffney and Shelby."⁴⁹

Hamrick – Putnam Wedding

She is an attractive young woman possessing an amiable disposition and many splendid traits of character. She is quite an accomplished musician and her hosts of friends wish her happiness.



The Petition of a number of the Inhabitants of Rutherford in favor of Ransom Myrick. No. Carolina Rutherford county held at Reighly

To the honourable and general assembly, we your petitioners humbly pray you that grant us our request. Whereas Ransome Myrick labourer for the county of rutherford was in the year of one thousand eight hundred and five convicted of petty Larceny and suffered corporal punishment for the same in due form of law by which he is deprived of the privilege of his oath and benifit of law and we your petitioners do believe that the sd Myrick hath ever sence behaved him Self well and semed to be an honest man in all respects and we do certify that he hath lived ever sence in our Settlement and neighbhour hood and that we have particularly wached the same and there has never sence been any thing laid to his charge. We there fore pray you that you by your honourable power restore him the sd Myrick to his agency again so that he may have free Bennifit of the Law and we your petitioners will ever pray September the 25th 1811.

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


N. C. INVENTORIES OF ESTATES, 1677-1784 (As originally filed with, and recorded by, the Secretary of State)

North Carolina wills and inventories of estates were filed with the Secretary of State prior to 1760. Both Hathaway and Grimes published abstracts of the bulk of the wills about fifty years ago, and a few of the inventories. The listing below, however, is by far the most complete and comprehensive list of these inventories of estates ever published. The volumes in which these records were originally recorded by the Secretary of State are now in the Archives, in Raleigh, and the file numbers will be given, below, for each volume so that persons may send to the Archives (P. O. Box 1881, Raleigh, N. C.) for full copies.

Many hundreds of "missing links" will be found in this material, since so many early N. C. counties have lost their records for the late 1600s and early 1700s. Especially valuable will be the inventories of those persons who died intestate (without a will). Several of the inventories are dated after 1760, and there will be a few items other than inventories included in the listing, below.

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

UNCLE JAKE CARPENTER'S

WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA

Down on Three Mile Creek in the heart of the Blue Ridge lived Uncle Jake Carpenter for eighty-seven years. His house lay two miles up the Gap from the main road, but there was not one of the many scattered families in that mountain region with whom he was not intimately acquainted. From 1845 to the time of his death, March 10, 1920, Uncle Jake kept a unique record of every death in his community. It is valuable in that it is the only accurate date of the sort in Avery County, but he has given it rare interest in the annotating of a brief but enlightening personal comment aftermany of the dates, showing keen human insight and at the same time picturing native mountain life.

These pages are taken verbatim from his own notebook in his own writing and are preserved in his own spelling. Afterwards they were read to Aunt Naomi Cuthbertson, nee Barrier, who added her own remarks which have been added with her name after each.

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

HISTORICAL NOTES CONCERNING EARLY FAMILIES

By William Thornton Whitsett

The First United States Census of 1790 showed 13 states, with an area of 820,377 square miles, and a settled area of only 239,935 square miles or about 29 per cent of the total. There were then only 75 post of ices in the entire country, with four of these in North Carolina. The total population with between three the four million. North Carolina had 393,073 people, and Guilford county 7,191. Now (1930) North Carolina has an estimated population of three million, and Guilford county an estimated population inety thousand.

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In Guilford county in 1790 the per cent nationality of the people was as follows: English 33 per cent, Scotch 11, German 3, Irich 2, all other 1. For the entire country at that time the proportion was English 83 per cent, Scotch 7, German 6, Irish 1, and all other 3. Lany class of as English had gone into England before coming to America from other nations, hence the nomber of English is greatly reduced when traced back to original sources. The entire number of surnames in the United States in 1790 was

about 30,000. The surname, Smith, lead the list with about 30,000 of this name alone. Brown, 15,000; Williams, 10,000; Wood, 7,000; Wilson, 8,000; Taylor, 8,000; ac. were among the others tith large numbers.

During the past few years there has been a remarkable increase of interest in family history, local history, the story of the earlier churches, and as a necessary result, a deepened interest in both state and national history. Scores of the family associations that meet annually have begun the active collection of historical records in which they are interested, and some are taking up the matter of publishing the results of their findings. For this reason, the historical notes that are given under the virities heads will prove of interest. These notes apply inparticular to Guilford county, and adjacent ter itory.

WHEELER

The Wheeler family is of English ancestry, coming from hull, and Somersetshire, England. In 1160 A.D. their ancestral home first came into notice as Wyko-upon-Hull. The American branches of this family truce to three Wheeler brothers coming over in 1616; two of these founding the northern and western branches, and one the family in the south. In 1790 there were 3,479 members of this family in the U.S. with 30 families in E.C.

PUGH

The Fugh family traces its origin back to Vales, most of the emigrants coming from the counties of Pembroke and Clamorgan in south Vales. At the first ensus, 1790, there were 31 Fugh familes in N.C., and in the U.D. there were 577 members of this family. The family none is Celtic, beginning as Labdugh; mab meaning son, hence "the son of Hugh." James Fugh, original emigrant from county Pembroke, South Vales, had a son. Them s Fugh, torn 1706, died.1794, reached N.C. in 1750, founder of the present families.

At this meeting John Hoffman of Cumberland county presented a Petition showing that he held a tract of 400 acres of land, formerly in Bladen county, now in Cumberland, about two miles above the houth of Hockfish Creek. He stated that John Babtista Ashe had obtained a patent for 1,280 acres of land in Bath county, now Cumberland, and apprehends that it will interfere with his claim. The claim of John Hoffman for a re-survey of his land to show his proper meets and bounds in granted by the Governor and Council of State.

On page 753-754 of Vol. 10, we find that Col. Ambrose Ramsey was to lead a company from the Southern Battalion of the Militia of Grange county against the hostile Indians in the year 1776, and that Daniel Hoffman was one of his soldies for this duty.

In the year 1783 while Alexander martin of Guilford county was governor of North Carolina, we find that the General Assembly met at Hillsborough (Hillsboro) April 18, 1783. The senator from Granville county was Robert Harris, and on Monday, April 21, 1783 he presented a petition from citizens of his county in favor of Jacob Hoffman which was read and or ered to lie on the table.

Federal Censis of 1790

From the 1790 or first Federal Census we find the Huffman family then settled as follows:

In nowan county, Daniel Huffman with wife, one grown son, three younger sons, and four daughters. Francis Huffman with wife,

three sons, and two daughters.

Jacob Huffman with wife, six sons, and three daughters.

Another Jacob Huffman with wife, one son, and one daughter. In Stokes county, George Huffman with wife, two sons and two

daughters.

In the Chatham district, Sarah Huffman is listed as the owner of 400 acres of land.

Eminent members of the Hoffman (Huffman) family.

One who is interested in the Hoffman family will easily find many distinguished members of this stock. We may name a few: John Christian Adakad Hoffman (1810-1877) Lutheran theologian and historian and often spoken of as "unquestionably the chief glory of the University of Erlangen." Loted for a number of books that are regarded as authorities in their field. melchior Hoffman (1498-1544) friend of martin Luther who published

in one of his tracts a letter from him dated June 22, 1525.

August Hoffman (1818-1892) widely known as one of the most eminent organic chemists of his generation. Well-known as a writer on chemical subjects, and as a speaker with international reputation. He spoke fluently

English, French, German, and Italian. John J. Hoffman (1805-1878) noted for his extensive researches in Orinetal philology, and his translations of Siebold's Nippon.

Frederick Hoffman (1660-1742) a member of a family that for two hundred years held high reputation as physicians. Known throughout Lurope as one of the authorities in the medical world.

Francois Benoit Hoffman (1760-1828) French dramitist and critic, and author of numerous operas; one of the famous names in the world of plays and music, as well as criticism of the arts.

Ernest Theodore Hoffman (1776-1822) a romance writer, and one of "the master novelists of the Romantic movement of his time. "Every vision and character that he described seems to have been real to him".

August Henry Hoffman (1798-1874) one of the most popular poets of his day, often composing melodies for his verses.

Charles W. Hoffman prominent Cincinnati, Ohio lawyer, and judge of

the juvenile court of his city since 1915.

Frank Jargent Hoffman, professor of philosophy in Union University . since 1885, at Schenectady, New York.

Arthur S. Hoffman, editor of the magazine Adventure since 1911, and author of several books; home in New York City.

Prederick L. Hoffman of Wellesley Hills, Mass., author of a score or more of booklets, pamphlets, tracts &c. on vital subjects of our times. John W. Hoffman president of Ohio Wesleyan University at Delaware, Ohio since 1916.

This list might be greatly extended, but sufficient examples are here cited to show the long and honorable standing of this family nume in various countries of the world.

Original Record Book of Brick Church

The original Record Book of Brick Church, at first called "The Reformed Congregation on Beaver Greek, "and later known for more than seventy years as Der Klapp Kirche. (The Clapp Church), and since then called Brick Church is still in existence, and this German record book has been translated and gives a wealth of information concerning the early families of all this section of the State. It was begun by Rev. Samuel Suther who was the first pastor, and served from the beginning of the Church in the year 1770. From this accord Book we copy names and dates of the Weitzel (or Whitesell) and huffman (hoffman) families to show the active part that these two families played, together with many other families, in the early life of this section.

HISTORICAL NOTES CONCERNING EARLY FAMILIES

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CLAPP

This family comes from near Bingen on the Rhine, Germany. George Valentine Clapp, and his brother John Ludwig Clapp, sailed from dotterdam on the ship, "Jomes Goodwill" in 1727, and Landed at Philadelphia, Penn., on Sept. 27, 1727. Came to N.C. in 1745. Name often spelled Klapp in early records. Founders of The Brick Church, first known as Der Klapp Lirche. (See Rupp's 30,000 immigrants.)

HUFBEAN

The Huffman, or Hoffman, family traces back to Hesse-Cassel electorate, Germany, founded by William IV. in the 14th. century. During the rule of Frederick I. (1730-1751) Christian Hoffman sailed for America, reaching Berks county, Penn., in 1745. In 1749 he came into N.C. together with his two brothers, Jacob and George Hoffman. The five sons of Christian Hoffman were, Christian, Jr., Jacob, Daniel, Feter, and John.

WHITESELL

Henrich Whitzel (Henry Whitesell) reached Penn, in 1745, from the Black Forest (Schwarz-wald) on the Khine river, Germany, which is located between the present towns of Nurnberg and Dusseldorf. In the year 1750 he came into M.J. with the tide of Palatine settlers that were coming down at that time from Penn, where many of their descendents are still to be found. Adam Whitesell, his brother, came in the year 1751, nd settled on one thousand acres of land between Alamance creek and Haw River. Interesting stories are preserved of their dealings with the Indians of that time.

OSBOHNE

Latthew Osborne, from England, settled in Sus ex county, Del. in 1682; father of Matthew Osborne, Jr., who moved to Penn., where he married Isabel Dobson, and Later with his KHAILJABE family of seven sons moved to N.C. in 1750. The family name of Osborne (tracing to Norse Ozbun) is spelled in twenty different ways, - Osborne, Osborn, Orsbern, Osban, Osburn do. In 1790 there were 45 Osborne familes in N.C. and a total of 1,930 of this name in the U.S. The name appears more than fifty times in the N.C. Colonial Records.

MARSAN MCLEAN

Of Scotch incestry, this family name has been variously spelled has heClaen, mcClain, mcClaine, McLain, Maclain, McLene, &c. In 1790 there were 278 of these families in the U.S. with a total membership of 1,265. Pa. had 89 families, followed by M.C. with 83 families; the others were scattered as follows, - Me. 4, N.H.1, Vt. 3, Mass. 10, H.I.2, Conn. 5, N.Y. 31, Md. 21, Va. 14, and S.C.15.

SUMMERS

The ancestral home of the Summers family is found in Oberbexhach, Province of the Whineland, Territory of the Saar Basin; also, in the Palatinate of Heidelberg, Germany. From the first place came John Summers, born 1687, died 1790, and his brother Jacob Summers, born 1710, died 1790. (See

Rupp's 30,000 intigrants, pages 201, and 264.) John Summers settled near Alexandria, Va., and is buried there in a well-marked grave. Jacob Summers settled in Guilford county, and is buried in Friedens cemetery. Capt. Peter Summers (1757-1837) was a son of Jacob Summers. (See N.C.Col. Records, Vols. 14, 16, 17, 18 &c.) (See records of the First N.C. Battalion.) Both the Virginia and the North Carolina line trace to these two brothers; elso, many who went to other states. The name is spelled Summers, Sommers, and Somers, but most land grants were made in the name Summers which is now the accepted spelling.

LEDBETTER

Durham county, England is the original home of this family, and WE first records show them living near Seaham marbour, a town on the North Sea, near the Cheviot Hills. They came to America with early settlers and in 1790 they were in several N.C. counties. The records of Charles City county, Va. show them landing there in 1668, locating near Malvern Hill, Shirley. Weyanoke, and other places. Henry Ledbetter was the head of a family in 1710 in Charles City county, Va. Many N.C. descendants trace to him. The name is spelled Leadbetter, and Letbetter , also, in early times. There were 13 of these families in N.C. just after the War of the Mevolution, 1771-1781, more than in any other state,

FIELD

The Field family regards Chester, England as their early nome, and the name as derived from Hubertus de la feld, or Hubert Field. Their family history has been compiled in two large volumes, giving their Coat-ofarms &c. The family is numerous over the U.S. there being 1.761 members recorded in 1790 Census, with 38 Field families in N.C. In Field Genealogy, Vol. 2, p. 111 it is recorded that John Field from Culpeper county, Va. moved to Guilford county, N.C. His will his in Book A. page 116, dated Joc. 12, 1787. The four notable sons of Rev. David Dudley Field are outstanding in history.- ministers, historians, builders of the Atlantic cable, C. Few families have collected so much of their family history as this one.

ROSS

The Ross family traces to the Gauls or Celts, ancient inhabitants of France, once called Gaul. We usually call them Scotch, but the Lighland Scotch are called even to-day Gaelic. The Ross clans of Scotland go back to the earliest records of the Gauls. Their story is interwoven with the romantic history of Scotland and its clans. 41 of this family in N.C. are MANAANSE connected with the Revolutionary War. Various histories of this Ross family have been ritten, carrying full records of the family story. They once lived in Ross and Cromarty, northern Scotland, just west of the North Sea.

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WHITSETT

This family is of Scotch-Irish ancestry, coming from Scotland into Ireland at an early date, and settling chiefly in the counties of Antrim and Armagh, Ireland. From thence, William Whitsett with his brothers, Joseph and John, came to Am&rica in 1770, settling in what are now the counties of Wathington, Fayette, and Greene, in Pennsylvania. From these, the various family branches are descended. (See History Fayette county, Pa. also, Hanna's Scotch-Irish, also, N.C. Colonial Pecords, Vol. 8, &c. &c.) There were 36 families with 168 members here in 1790, in these states, - N.Y., Pa., N.C., and S.C. Barly spellings of the name are, Whitsitt, Whitesid, &c. Full family history found in American Historical Magazine, Vol. IX under title, Annals of a Scotch-Irish Family.

INGLE

Henrich Engle (Henry Ingle) from the Palatinate region, Germany, care over on the vessel, "Virginus Grace," landing at Philadelphia, Pa. Sept. 24, 1737. Married in Pa., and come with family to N.C. in 1749. Founder of the Ingle family. Name variously spelled, - Ingle, Engle, Ingol, Ingold, Ingall, &c. In 1790 3 families in N.C., 2 in S.C., with others in Pa., Md., Va., &c. See First Census U.S., also N.C.Colonial Records, Vols. 8, 10, 11, 13, 16,17, 22 &c.

FOUST

Founder of N.C. branches of this family, John Foust, born 1719, died 1789, married Anna Barbara Albright, born 1719, died 1802. Native of the Palatine region, Germany. Nine children, - Philip, John, Jacob, Christian, George, Barbara, Judith, Peter, and Daniel. Original immigrant, buried in Old Stoner's cometery, Alamance co. N.C. Spellings, Foust, Faust, and Foost. At first ensus, 1790, 30 families, with 148 members; 6 families in N.C., 8 in S.C., and 16 in Pa. See N.C. Colonial Records, Vol. 8, pp. 734, 735, 736 and 737.

The earliest settlers into what is now know as Guilford county, North Carolina, came here between the years 1725 and 1775, and during these fifty years there was a steady stream pouring into this territory.

Practically all who came here in that early day trace their ances-est settlers in Western Guilford for the most part are descended from the English Friends, or quakers; those in the Central portion of Guilford from the Scotch, or as they are generally called the Scotch-Irish Presbyterians; and those in the Eastern part of the county from the earliest settlers who came from the regions along the Rhine river known as the Palatinate region. There are a few early settlers of Guilford who do not fall under either of these divisions, but are descended from the scattered Irish, Welsh, Dutch, French and occasional Hebrew settlers of the earlier times. The great bulk of the population of Guilford, however, is descended from the first three sources mentioned, and their history is intimately connected with the history of the oldest churches of their denominations in the county. In many of these families we may find even to-day books, and relics, that have been handed down through the generations. The telling of their full story will be the KAEK interesting labor of some future historian. Many of them KE are gathering year by year through annual family reunions, and the organization of family associations, valuable historical information that will some day by of priceless value.

LINEBERRY FAMILY HISTORY.

Careful examination fails to reveal anything of the Lineberry family in certain sources that might be expected to show results. N.C. Colonial Records; the first Census of 1790 by the U.S. Government; various copies of Who's Who in America; the Am. Compendium of Abridged Genealogy,all lack any reference to the Lineberry family.

We owe much to Capt. W. S. Lineberry, superintendent for six years of the Soldiers' Home, Raleigh, N.C. who in 1918 published a booklet giving such facts as, We had gathered of the Lineberry families.

Capt. Lineberry takes the view that there is but one original source family of the Lineberrys in America; he does not think that the Linebarkers, the Linebacks, or the Linebachs are of the same stock as the Lineberry family.

He traces this family to Jacob and Elizabeth Lineberry who came from the Hartz mountains of Germany, in the Brunsweigh region, to America in 1752 bringing with them their two sons, William and Jacob. Religious persecution drove them to seek a home in this Western World. The family settled near the Randolph and Chatham line in North Carolina.

Jacob Lineberry, Junior, married Mary Youngblood and settled on Brush Creek in Randolph county; while William Lineberry married and made his home in Chatham county; hence the name, The Randolph Lineberrys, and the Chatham Lineberrys. From the Chatham Lineberrys there descended the wellknown Rev. William Lineberry, a great Baptist preacher in his day, often spoken of as Uncle Billy, and from this line comes the Prof. E. G. Lineberry of Raleigh, N.C.

Jacob Lineberry was an arlent Whig, and on one occasion would have shot the notorious David Fanning, but for the pleas of his wife. From Jacob and Mary Youngblood Lineberry there descend the followin

ing ten children; - seven boys, - Jacob, Francis, James, Thomas, Solomon, Eamuel, and George; and three girls, - Mary, Katie and Amy. Those who are interested in the Lineberry families will do well

Those who are interested in the Lineberry families will do well to consult the booklet of Capt. W. S. Lineberry for all the familes who are connected with the Randolph Lineberrys and who are to be traced back to the original Jacob and Mary Lineberry, who were but one generation removed from the original German immigrant, Jacob and his wife Elizabeth Lineberry of the Hattz mountains, Germany who reached here in 1752.

Many facts can be found concerning Rev. Arlendo Wood Lineberry, D.D one of the most popular preachers in the Methodist Protestant Church in N.C., and who was often made President of the Conference. His home was in Guilford county, just east of Greensboro, N.C. His wife was Celia Gillespic of Surry county, and a family of five boys and one girl made up this happy family.

county, and a family of five boys and one girl made up this happy family. Many facts of interest must here be omitted, but it may be mentione ed that Mary Lineberry daughter of Samuel Lineberry became the wife of Rev. Brantley York, D.D., whose work at Union Institute near Trinity in Randolph county, laid the foundations of what became Trinity College, and later Duke University at Durham. Dr. York's family consisted of five boys and one girl.

Capt. W. S. Lineberry who has, done, a real service in giving us his booklet of Lineberry history was a captain in the junior reserves in Company F. later known as the 70th. Regular N.C. Troops. He was in charge of 110 men, and fought at Poplar point on the Roanoke river; Bellfield, Va., Kinston and other places. He surreendered to Gen. W. T. Sherman at Greensboro, April 27, 1865.

The history of the Chatham Lineberrys remains to be collected and written, and this task ought to engage some early historian, together with the completion of the history of the Randolph Lineberrys. Soon it will be to too late to rescue this family history from oblivion, if the work is not taken in hand at an early date.
