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GRANVILLE COUNTY, N. C.:-

SOME WILLS, ADMINISTRATIONS, AND INVENTORIES, 1746-1772

Granville County was formed in 1746 from Edgecombe County. Persons doing genealogical research in Granville County find that the deeds date from 1746, and the marriage bonds from 1752. However, the Court Minutes from 1746 to the 1780's are "missing." The Archives in Raleigh has about half the Granville County Court Minutes covering the period from the 1780's to 1820. According to the W P A listing of 1938, the following Court Minutes were in the Granville County courthouse: 1754-1770, 1773-1785, 1786-1787, 1789-1791, 1792-1795, 1820-1868; but if they are there yet they are not now available to the general public, so perhaps they, too, are "missing."

Granville County will books, from 1746 to August Court, 1772, are likewise "missing," and have not been available, apparently, since the 1890's. Thus with both the will books and the court minutes "missing," it is difficult to ascertain the names of those who died, testate and intestate, in Granville County in the 1746-1772 period.

Among the unrecorded wills in the Granville County courthouse are 76 for the 1746-1772 period. 71 of these, for the 1746-1771 period, are on microfilm at the Archives, and the following five should have been included, since they were dated 1772 and never recorded: James Boyd, Wm Bell, Louis Riethweil, Richard Roberts, and Jonathan White. The will of George Brassfield is not included in the 76 wills listed below, for even though it was dated 1771, it was probated in 1790 and was recorded in Will Book 2, page 155.

The oldest will preserved for Granville County is that of Frederick Homes or Holmes, probated sometime in 1749. The will of Phillip Wallstone was dated later than the will of Ho(1)mes, but was probated in March of 1749. Wallstone may have deceased prior to Ho(1)mes; so the Wallstone will may be the oldest extant will probated in Granville County.

NOTE: Thanks to Mrs. Mildred Park Roberts for calling the following article to your Editor's attention:

In the "Annual Report of the American Historical Association," for 1895, there is a chapter on "American Historical Association - Literature in North Carolina," with a subsection entitled: "Private Libraries in the Western Section & the Scotch Irish," p. 212, etc. In a footnote beginning at bottom of page 211, the author of the article, Stephen B. Weeks, gave some valuable information regarding the early records of Granville Co., N. C. His footnote is copied in full, below:

"Mr. Thomas M. Owen, A. M., of Jefferson County, Ala., now in the Post-Office Department, Washington, D. C., is preparing an historical and genealogical account of Granville County, N. C., up to 1800, based entirely on the manuscript records of the county, and has kindly furnished me the following items in regard to the state of culture in that county, 1750-1772. This county was formed in 1746, and was therefore for the whole of this period a frontier county. This fact should be

kept in mind. Besides the books enumerated below, there were other matters which will tend to show the state of education. One of these was the 'Test,' In 1754-55 the officials of Granville County, including the sheriff and his deputies, justices, clerks, colonels, captains, lieutenants, and ensigns, surveyor, coroner, and attorneys, were required to subscribe to the following test: 'I do Declare that I do believe that there is not any Transubstantiation in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, or in the Elements of Bread and Wine at or after the Consecration thereof by any person whatever.' The original test, with the autographs, has been preserved. There are 38 separate signatures appended; of these, 37 signed their names in a bold, strong hand, and only one signed by mark.

"An examination of the first four record books of Granville shows the following results as to the ability of the makers of wills to write:

Record book, 1750-1761, 10 signed their names to wills and 10 signed by mark; record book, 1761-1762, 13 signed names and 10 by mark; record book, 1762-1765, 4 signed names and 4 by mark; record book, 1765-1772, 21 signed names and 7 by mark. For the twenty-two years, 48 signed their names and 31 signed by mark.


EDITOR'S NOTE: A few items from later inventories are also given, in above footnote, but since Granville wills, inventories, etc., are preserved beginning 1772, they have not been copied in above listing. Incidentally, many a literate man was too ill to sign his name on his will, but signed by mark, instead, creating the impression to later generations that he could not read and write. The foregoing footnote mentioned 79 wills in Granville Co. Record Books, 1750-1772, and 153 inventories, which would indicate that at least 74 persons died intestate (without a will) in Granville Co., in the 1750-1772 period. Most if not all the wills appear to have been preserved, but we have record of only a few of the intestates. Perhaps the descendants of the Mr. Thomas M. Owen, if located, would have copies of Granville Co. records of value, since Granville Co. Record Books, 1750-1772 are now missing (they were available around 1895, or prior, as proven by the foregoing material). But unless some of the many "missing" volumes of Granville Co. records come to light in the future, the data on these pages will be all we will ever be apt to learn of the persons who died testate and intestate in Granville County, North Carolina. 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ARMFIELD FAMILY RECORD

Nora Armfield was born 1856 February 24th; Henry Armfield born January 16th 1858; Eli Armfield was born Nov. 18th 1859 - died Nov. 16, 1867; Rosa Armfield was born Oct. 23, 1866. Henry Armfield died the 1 day of Oct. 1872, aged 14 years. Sarah Armfield was born the 24 day of August 1828. Elam Armfield died 30 of August ("Ogust") 1875 (was born 1823), aged 57 years 11 Mo. (Henry was aged 14 years 8 Mo. and 15 days.) Nellie Byrkitt died the 28 of Jan. 1879. Sarah Armfield died the 16 of "Janery" 1898 aged 70 years 4 months and 23 days. Rosa Armfield Leeson died 13 day of Oct. aged 56 years. Nora Armfield Byrket died January 1929 age 73 years. (Paulina Armfield died age 19 year 9 mo. 18 d.) Miss Nora Armfield, Ogden, Henry Co., Ind. (Perhaps year of birth for Sarah was 1827 rather than 1828--last figure indistinct. Ed.)

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Wilma Dykeman, Writer

When widower Willard J. Dykeman, age 54, a farm developer from Putnam Co., NY, married Bonnie Cole, age 21, of Asheville, NC, in 1917, the couple set the stage for their only surviving child, daughter Bonnie Wilma Dykeman. One of the few women actually from Asheville who later became prominent, Wilma Dykeman was born in May, 1920. Wilma had a brief childhood acquaintance with her father as he died in 1934, age 74, and was buried at Carmel, NY. Wilma's mother lived on in Asheville until 1992, age 96; she was the daughter of William A. Cole and Loretta Ballard.

Wilma Dykeman grew up in the Beaverdam area of north Asheville, graduated from Biltmore Junior College (now UNCA) in 1938, and attended Northwestern University in Chicago, where she majored in speech, was Phi Beta Kappa, and graduated in 1940.

She married James R. Stokely, Jr., in 1940 just after graduation. Before he died in 1922, the senior Stokely had been president and chief financial officer of the Stokely Canning Co. After 1933 Stokely Canning became part of the affluent Stokely-Van Camp canning empire, and later Seneca Foods, a large conglomerate.

When James R. Stokely, Jr. died in 1977, the couple had been married for 55 years during which they divided their time between family homes in Newport, TN (principal address) and in Asheville, NC. When she died in late 2006, Wilma Dykeman had two sons and two grandchildren. Both sons attended Yale University, an elite New England College.

Dykeman's first book *The French Broad* was published way back in 1955. Its adherence to maintaining the environment helped set the tone for Rachel Carson's famous 1962 book *Silent Spring*. In all, Wilma was to write eighteen books between 1955 and 1993, including three biographies and three historic novels. Her numerous newspaper articles covering history, environmental activism, and folklore.

Wilma Dykeman was honored numerous times and received many awards. She was elected Tennessee State Historian in 1981. In 1996, she was inducted into the North Carolina Literary Hall of Fame, putting her in the company of notables such as William Sydney Porter and Thomas Wolfe. Wilma's fame led to an obituary in the *New York Times*.

The funeral service for Wilma Dykeman Stokely was in the First Baptist Church in Newport, TN, with burial in the cemetery of the Beaverdam Baptist Church in North Asheville. She died in December 22, 2006, age 86, and is buried near her mother. Her upright gravestone, an unusual dark gray, nearly black, diorite, reads "writer, speaker, educator, environmentalist." As a permanent memorial, the City of Asheville Planning & Development Dept. has labeled one of its Greenway plans as the Wilma Dykeman Riverway Plan.

Anniversary of Note On Sept. 2, 2007, *The Asheville Citizen-Times* had a short note and picture regarding the 50th wedding anniversary of Billy Plemmons and his wife, the former Patrician Sayles who live in Fairview. The couple was married in Asheville on Sept. 7, 1957. They have a son and daughter, two grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

The Plemmons family name is widespread in Buncombe, Madison and Yancey Counties while the Sayles name is commonly found in the Fairview, Gashes Creek, and Swannanoa areas of Buncombe Co.

Notable Markers at Riverside Cemetery

Introduction

Using Aslund & Ledbetter's 1989 survey of Riverside Cemetery, we noted the grave inscriptions for fourteen women who achieved some measure of fame. The gravestones are remarkable for the story they partially tell. The inscriptions read:

Maud Sisley Boyd – Sect. I

1851-1937 (age 86)

Added Inscription: Buried Avondale Cemetery, Australia

First single lady foreign missionary of S.D.A. (Seventh Day Adventists)

Author's comments: Mary Boyd is commemorated together with her husband, the Rev. Charles L. Boyd (1848-1898), on a flat gray granite, 12 x 36". Maud Sisley Boyd was born in Kent, England as the daughter of John and Susannah Sisley. She went to a rural area of Michigan in 1846, and then to Battle Creek, MI, where she was engaged in composing religious journals and helping conduct evangelical work for the Seventh Day Adventists. In 1877, she spent a year in Switzerland as a compositor for the S.D.A., and returned to Nebraska where she married Elder C. L. Boyd. The couple went to Cape Town in South Africa in 1887, and to Avondale, Australia in 1897. For an unknown reason, the couple was in Asheville in 1898, where the husband died of "teething fever." About 1906, Maud Boyd went to southern California, apparently dying there in 1937.

Clara E. Chapman – Sect. J.

Inscription: w/o Robt. H. Chapman, D.D. b. Oct. 12, 1812, m. Oct. 18, 1831, d. Aug. 13, 1858 (age 46)

Author's comments: She was a daughter of Samuel Chunn (1772-1855) and Hanna Chunn (1786-1816). Tall, ornate upright, imported marble, 8 x 31 x 68" above ground. Reportedly gave name to Chunn's Cove area in east Asheville.

Mary Charlotte Bean – Sect. J.

b. Jan. 19, 1872, d. Apr. 14, 1952 (age 80)

Inscription: Organizer and Charter Member Esther Chapter No. 12, Order of Easter Star. She served as its first worthy matron in 1905 and again in 1920-21.

Author's comments: Mary Bean, a native of Newton, KS is commemorated on the same stone as her husband Samuel Isaac Bean (1867-1947), being an upright gray granite, 10 x 36 x 48". The walled Bean plot contains eleven persons. The stone notes that the Beans are descended from Capt. William Bean, 1st settler of TN. In 1891, Samuel Isaac Bean came to Asheville as a stonecutter on the Vanderbilt mansion construction. About 1899, Bean began S. I. Bean Tile & Marble, a shop originally on Patton Ave., and now on Clingman Ave., under another name. S. I. Bean provided stone, tile, and marble for many notable buildings in downtown Asheville. When the elder Bean retired around 1940, the firm was run for a couple of decades by sons Ervin R. and Samuel I. Bean, Jr.

Mary F. Shuford, M.D. – Sect. K

b. May 23, 1897, d. June 7, 1983 (age 86)

Author's comments: Flat bronze, 12 x 24". Mary Frances Shuford was the daughter of George Archibald Shuford, Sr. and Julia Elizabeth Bean. In the mid-1930s, Shuford had her medical office in the Flatiron Bldg. and operated at various location downtown until about 1870 when she moved her office to her home on Orange St.

Lois K. Merrick – Sect. K

b. 1833, d. 1892 (age 59)

Inscription: Erected by the W.C.T.U., Dillsboro, NC

Author's comments: Upright marble, 10 x 20 x 18". She was initially buried in Dillsboro and reburied in the old Asheville Cemetery portion of Riverside Cemetery.

Queen M. Carson – Sect. K

b. Feb. 9, 1865, d. Mar. 2, 1947 (age 82)

Author's comments: Flat gray granite, 12 x 24". Queen Maude Carson, born near Baltimore, MD. She was the daughter of Samuel R.. Carson and Virginia Randolph.

About 1899, she was a teacher at the "Factory School." In Asheville. In 1902, she joined Park Ave. School, Haywood Rd. in west Asheville, becoming principal about 1920, a post she occupied until the late 1930s. For some years thereafter, she ran the Carson Elementary School in Kenilworth.

Anna Pinney Pease – Sect. K

b. Apr. 12, 1823, d. Jan. 27, 1914 (age 91)

Author's comments: Anna Pease is commemorated together with her husband, Rev. Lewis M. Pease (1818-1897) on an upright gray granite, 12 x 35 x 50" (above ground). When New Yorkers Rev. Louis M. Pease and his wife Anna Eliza Pinney Pease settled in Asheville in the 1870s, they were affiliated with the Mission Work of the Northern Presbyterians. In 1887, they began the Home Industrial School, a training school and home for girls. The school took in girls age five to twenty and provided schooling for grades one to six. Miss Florence Stephenson, born in Pennsylvania in 1857 and died there in 1930, headed the Home Industrial School and also the Pease Memorial House from 1887 until 1917. These properties were located on Biltmore Rd. at Victoria. In 1892, an adjunct school, the Normal and Collegiate Institute was established on the same Pease property.

Hope Norburn – Sect. P

Inscription: w/o Dr. Russell Lee Norburn

b. Mar. 31, 1906, d. Sept. 7, 1973 (age 67)

Inscription: Author, benefactor, painter, sculptor

Author's comments: Very large, raised, flat gray granite, 6 x 38 x 80". A native of Cincinnati, OH, Hope Robertson Norburn was additionally an illustrator and poet. She was active in the management of the Civic Art Center and the Asheville (Art) Museum. Her second husband, Dr. Russell Lee Norburn, with a brother, operated a medical clinic in Asheville. Hope Norburn, a native of Ohio, was the daughter of Reuben Robertson and Hope Thompson.

Mabel Griggs Snowden – Sect. P

b. Aug. 1, 1892, d. July 25, 1988

Inscription: Educator – principal

Author's comments: Flat gray granite, 12 x 24". Mable Lee Griggs Snowden, widow of Jesse Clarence Snowden, was the daughter of James Patterson Griggs and Fannie Lenore Matthews. From about 1918, she was a teacher at the Orange School in Asheville. By 1930, she had become a teacher at the Newton School and by 1950, was principle of the school. After 1960, she taught at various other schools until she retired in 1970.

Louise Mason Ingersoll, M.D. – Sect. Q

b. Mar. 28, 1878, d. May 14, 1962

Author's comments: Raised, flat gray granite, 12 x 31". A native of Cleveland, OH, Louise Ingersoll graduated from Women's Medical College in Philadelphia in 1914. In 1917, she had an exhilarating tour of duty as a medical missionary for the Episcopal Church in villages in China and in Russia. She was active in medical practice on 46 Haywood St. in Asheville from 1931 to 1942. She was the daughter of Jonathan Edwards Ingersoll and Mary Fowler.

Elta Handte Blanchard – Sect. Q

b. 1899, d. 1962

Inscription: Musician, teacher, composer. Founded Blanchard Junior Music Club

Author's comments: Flat, gray granite, 12 x 24", located in the Handte plot. A native of Ohio, Elta Blanchard also published several books on poetry. She was the daughter of Jacob Handte. She married Arta X. Blanchard, a steward at the Langren Hotel.

Gertrude Johnston – Sect. S

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b. Mar. 15, 1897, d. Jan. 30, 1936

Inscription: Musician & composer

Author's comments: Claudia Johnston is buried beside her mother who was F. Gertrude Johnston. The two have matching upright gray granite stones, 7 x 28 x 28". A native of Mackey, NC, she came to Asheville in 1923. She was a pianist on local radio stations and in local theatres. She maintained a home and office in Biltmore.

Martha Price – Black Sect. E

Inscription: For many years a faithful servant in the family of Hon. C. C. Memminger
Charleston, d. Sept. 12, 1877, aged 75 yr.

Author's comments: Imported marble 2 x 20 x 34" (above ground). German immigrant Christopher G. Memminger (1803-1888) went to Charleston, SC in 1807. In Charleston, he was a principal organizer for the Charleston public school system from about 1831 to 1864. With his principal home still in Charleston, he was Secretary of the Confederate Treasury from 1861 to 1864. Around 1836, he established a summer home in Flat Rock, Henderson Co., NC, retiring there on a permanent basis in 1864. He was the first president of the Spartanburg & Asheville RR. Memminger is buried in Flat Rock. The *1860 Slave Schedule* for Henderson Co. listed just four slaves for C. G. Memminger, but apparently Martha Price had achieved free status by that time. How she came to be buried in Asheville remains a mystery. Who erected this prominent marker also remains a mystery. The burial site is in a black cemetery which precedes Riverside Cemetery.

Lillian Exum Clement Stafford – Sect. V


b. 1888, d. 1925

Author's comments: Flat, gray granite, 12 x 24". She was trained as a lawyer and achieved fame as North Carolina's first women legislator, serving a one-year term beginning in 1921. She appears in the *Dictionary of North Carolina Biography* and various newspaper articles under Lillian Exum Clement. Additional comments are noted in the article titled "Women's Firsts", also in this issue.




