## The Old North Sixth Street Cemetery Park Newark, Ohio



The first recorded owners of the present day Museum Park encompassing the land at North Sixth Street between West Main and West Church Streets were General Cummings and two Barnett brothers. These three people received the land as a grant for their being veterans of the Revolutionary War. The land grants were signed by then President John Adams and dated Jan 28, 1801.

In 1848 John and Harriet Crane gave to the City of Newark the land to be used exclusively as a cemetery, or burial ground. They received one hundred dollars from the city for the land. At that time it was already an over crowded burial ground called Sixth Street Grave Yard. (N. Sixth St. can be seen at the right in the picture)

In July of 1875, Newark City council passed an ordinance that all the bodies, tombstones & monuments, in the Old Grave Yard were to be removed to Cedar Hill Cemetery. For many years the old Grave Yard had been neglected and overrun with trees and bushes, local children played in the area, tombstones were toppled and broken. Neighbors complained of the neglect.

Cedar Hill Cemetery Records show that fifty-four bodies were removed and interned from Oct 2, 1875 to Jan 6, 1876. It had been estimated there were approximately two hundred and eighty two burials in the old cemetery. Removal was less than twenty percent.

There were many fallen tombstones that could not be asserted as to where they belonged. In 1877, they were collected and piled in the North East corner of the Grave Yard by the direction of the City of Newark. At this time the City of Newark was acting on several agenda's that would effect the old grave yard. The extension of West Church on the North side of the cemetery and the many complaints of total neglect of the cemetery from the citizens who lived in the area. One of the City improvements turned out to be the leveling off of the grounds except for one tombstone. It is said that this action explains why the graves now found are so shallow.

The one tombstone that was left was that of William B. Burgess who was b. June 30, 1798 and died Oct 22, 1837. The tombstone or monument is a tall obelisk as seen in the photo to the far right.

In 1906 a suit was filed against the city of Newark by the heirs of the original donors of the property. As the property was given to the city to be used exclusively as a burial ground, these heirs felt the city had broken the terms of the original agreement. This case was finally settled in 1915 by the Ohio Supreme Court. As the park is not now a cemetery, it's easy to say the heirs lost their case.

This tract of land has been used as a football practice field for the old Newark High School football teams. At one time a water fountain was placed in the park. There was a large Tabernacle built on the land in 1912. A WWI Memorial was added to the grounds not far from the Monument to Mr. Burgess.. The Buckingham House, the Davison House, and the King House have all been moved to their present sites from areas in the older parts of Newark. This explains why this old cemetery land is now called the Museum Park. Recently added to the park is a statue of Newark's Civil War legend Johnny Clem.

# The Continued Licking County, OH Township Series Harrison Township 1816

Harrison Township was created from the territory included in the original Union Township, it is five miles square and includes a strip of land two and a half miles long from north to south, and one and a half miles wide. This strip was taken from the Refugee tract possibly to give the township an outlet into Fairfield County. This protruding strip contains the village of Kirkersville, which is on the National Road (US Route 40).

Harrison and Lima Townships shared much the same history and progress through the early years of shaping Licking County. A Mr. Hatfield was said to have been the first settler in Harrison Township back in 1805-06. Mr. Hatfield built a cabin near the line of the present railroad and remained there a few years then he disappeared from the settlement and was not heard from again.

The next settler was Mr. Henry Drake, who came in 1805, from Western Pennsylvania to Lancaster, OH and on to Harrison Township with his young family in 1806. Mr. Drake raised quite a large family.

The next settlers were John Evans, Thomas Geary, John Piatte, and William Craige. These early settlers raised their cabins on land since owned by Joseph Atkinson, Abraham Baird, Abraham Miller, and Jesse Horn. These former mentioned were land holders at the time of the publication of N. N. Hill's book; The History of Licking County, Printed in 1881, our source of information.

The children of these first settlers went to school in Lima Township and were taught by Miss Cubberly, in a double log cabin. Close by lived Levin Randall and his brother Caleb. Esquire Randall performed the first marriage ceremony in the settlement between Mr. Richmond and Miss Cubberly.

Much is written about the distance between neighbors in this area, the neighbors being; Joseph Wilcox, from Herkimer Co., New York, William D. Gibbons, employed by Mr. Backus, from Blennerhasset's Island, an accomplice of Aaron Burr, Samuel Alward, from New Jersey, Captain John Herron, and Jesse Munson. In 1816, Mr. Joseph Wells and John Dennison settled in the southern part of the township. Mr. Dennison sold his land and moved west in 1839. Joseph Pond came and settled in the township in 1816.

Between the years 1820 and 1830 the township saw a large increase of settlers. Many settled on the road running north and south from the National Road (US Route 40), it was called "York Street", as the settlers were mostly from New York State. Isaiah Nichols, Henry and Charles Butler, Thomas Munsell, and Jacob Artz are mentioned at this time.

Harrison Township included a large amount of land owned by Rathburn, Backus, Hogg, and other non-residents.

There is a story about this land of the non-residents and remained uncleared and was an excellent range for wild game as was the case in other parts of the county. One season the game was so scarce that the settlers in the wilderness of Harrison Township were forced to hunt for wild game. Graves and others wandered away in the wilderness of Harrison Township on the Columbus road felt a need for pork. Selecting hogs that were in excellent condition several in this wilderness area. Word got out and those having swine in the wilderness found him dressing the game he had shot. Unfortunately for Mr. Ward, he was shot and his stock. Samuel Thrall found his mark on the ears of two or three of the hogs, tried and found guilty of stealing hogs. There was talk of a public whipping but the law prevailed, nevertheless a mark was made on the man as indelible as the lash would have made, he was there after known in the community as "Hog Ward".

MISC

The National Road was the means of building up many towns including Kirkersville. Kirkersville was laid out in 1832 by Dr. William C. Kerker. Thomas Youmans built the first tavern, the town grew rapidly, but the railroad stopped the growth as the RR took business away from the National Road establishments.

**JOHN DENNIS**; deceased, was born in Ireland in 1773. He served four years in the Tyrone County militia, and was discharged July 1797. About 1809 he married Miss Eleanor Dennis, born in Ireland in 1786. They had eight children: Hugh, Francis, John, James, William, Ann, Eleanor and Margaret. In 1839, Francis and John immigrated to America, and located in Harrison Twp. Francis engaged in farming, and John a blacksmith by trade, has made that his principal vocation. In 1842, Mr. Dennis, with his family, emigrated to America, and located in St. Albans twp; remained about two years; then in 1844 they moved on the farm in Harrison Township, owned by their son, Francis Dennis. John died January 2, 1851 & his wife died November 9, 1870. Two of the children are now deceased: Hugh and Ann. William left home in 1844 or '5, and has not been heard of since. The remaining five children three sons and two daughters are now living on the home farm in Harrison Township - (History of Licking County Compiled by N. N. Hill Jr. 1881)

**Mrs. Olive Thomas** wife of John Thomas, deceased, died at her home in Harrison Township, Licking County, Ohio October 22, 1886, aged 82 years, 6 months and 21 days. She was the daughter of Samuel Bassett, and was born in Rutland County, Vermont. At the age of 8 years she, with her parents, came to Licking County, where she remained until death called her home. At an early age the deceased made a public profession of the Christian religion and her devoted, godly life, ever after her profession gave evidence that it was no sham. She leaves two children, Mrs. Lucy Daniels of Licking County Ohio and Mr. Stephen Thomas of Iowa, who keenly feel the loss of a kind and affectionate mother, but "sorrow not, even as others which have no hope." The unusually large collection of friends and neighbors that were present on the day of the funeral gave evidence of the high esteem placed upon the life and character of "Old Aunt Olive" as she was familiarly called. Her body was consigned to the earth in the cemetery at Granville.

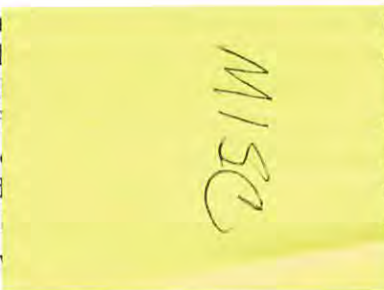


### Bloody Run Swamp

Bloody Run Swamp extended over 600 acres between Kirkersville and Buckeye Lake. There the Passenger Pigeons were known to roost. These large birds averaged seventeen inches long, and resembled the ever-present city pigeons of today. The last Passenger pigeon died in the Cincinnati Zoological Park in 1914.

Millions of pigeons were in the flocks that could block out the sun when flying over land on a tree branch all at one time and there are many stories about the name of Buckeye Lake.
