



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TIDBITS FROM AN EARLY OHIO NEWSPAPER By Judith Miley FREED, 2005 (jmfreed@midohio.net)

While searching an early Chillicothe newspaper for an obituary of my ancestor, Ellis M. MINSHALL. a resident of Ross Co., Ohio, who died June 8, 1818,I became fascinated with the type of news that a person might read nearly two hundred years ago! Consequently, I began recording "tidbits" of information from the various editions of the newspaper that I was scanning. The title of the newspaper was The Supporter, established on October 6, 1808, and it was published weekly until it merged with the Scioto Gazette on February 21, 1821. I did my research at the Ohio Historical Society in Columbus, Ohio, which archives old Ohio newspapers and makes them available to researchers on microfilm. Using MF rolls #17203 (9/13/1816 - 7/29/1818) and #17204 (8/5/1818 - 1/17/1821), I began my research with October 1, 1816. Generally each newspaper edition contained four pages, and I recorded whatever appealed to me as a "tidbit" of daily life for Ross County, Ohio, residents. These newspapers are chock full of names of local residents, and it will be wonderful when a scanner is invented that will index these old newspapers!! Information in brackets [] are my personal comments.

October 1, 1816: A huge list of letters at the Post Office included one for William JONES. [These names were repeated in the editions of October 6 and 15.]

October 22, 1816: An ad for "Night School". [Even back then, classes were offered in the evening!]

November 12, 1816: This week's front page news was from Spain and Buenos Ayres. [Every edition of the newspaper had national and international news on the first page.] Also, there was a description of a new invention, a horizontal water wheel.

November 19, 1816: Many ads of "in lots" and "out lots" for sale. Also, a "Medical Notice: Samuel LEWIS is licensed to practice medicine".

November 26, 1816: George PHERSON is "praying to be divorced" from Elizabeth PHERSON "for willful absences".

December 3, 1816: An article about Napoleon Bonapart with a Dutch account of a Battle. Another article about a whooping cough remedy: Prepare equal portions of new milk and the lye strained from hickory ashes. Give one tablespoon every hour to a 7-8 year old. A statement that "the causes of this disorder [whooping cough] are in the stomach" !!

December 17, 1816: "The President's Message" was recorded but no indication as to who the President was! [It was James Madison, our 4th U.S. President. How young our country was!] Other small articles about stray hogs, a found purse, and an ad for "Coopers wanted".

December 24, 1816: "Notice: Polly HOLLOWAY left my bed and I will pay no debts without cause". Also, long reports about the actions of the U.S. House of Representatives and the Senate. [There was nothing about Christmas in this edition though it was Christmas Eve.]

January 7, 1817: A comment about U.S. mail: that it would arrive from and depart from Columbus three times a week...arriving on alternate days from departing.

January 14, 1817: An article for soldiers stating that a certain place was authorized to pay the soldiers. A short article about a runaway apprentice.

January 21, 1817: Someone wanting 100 tons of hemp; farmers could raise the hemp on three acres of ground.

February 4, 1817: A rare obituary, this one for Rev. Timothy DWIDAY, DD.

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March 18, 1817: A description of the March 4th inauguration of the President elect.

April 1, 1817: A long list of letters at the P.O., including letters for Josiah JONES, Patience JONES, John JONES, Moses JONES, and Abraham JONES. This same list was published on April 8, 15, and 22. [Moses JONES is also my ancestor, and in 1828 in Ross Co., Ohio, he married Anna HARRELL MINSHALL, the widow of Ellis MINSHALL.]

April 22, 1817: Prices for food indicated in cents: beef per lb 5-6, pork per lb 6, butter per lb 18-25, sugar per lb 20, eggs per doz 8, corn per bushel 50, oats per bushel 37, potatoes per bushel 50, whiskey per gallon 75; also, flour per bbl \$3.00, wheat per bushel \$1.00, fowls per doz \$1.50.

April 29, 1817: Offered: a \$100 reward for the return of servant John, age 25, to Wythe Co., Virginia. An obituary for Thomas TAYLOR, eldest preacher in Methodism, age 77; he traveled 100,000 miles and preached 20,000 times. An Ohio Canal article.

May 27, 1818: Alpheas CROSS, deceased, of Troy Tp., Athens Co., Ohio, with Phoebe CROSS as administrator. For sale "Paper Hangings", newest and most fashionable patterns! Sheriff's Sale at Peter MADEN's in Springfield Tp., Ross Co. Married: on 14th inst by the Rev. Robert G. WILSON, Mr. John SOMERS to Miss Harriet STEWART, all of this place. Court of Common Pleas article about Nathaniel MASSIE, deceased, a contested case by the heirs.

June 6, 1818: Frederick CARTER, late of Madison Tp., Fayette Co., Ohio, deceased. Jesse ALBERTSON of Scioto Tp., Ross Co. and Absalom FUNK of Paint Tp., Fayette, Co. have both "taken up" horses. "One Cent Reward" for the return of a "runaway apprentice in Tailoring" named Calendar McFARLAND, 15-16 years, request return to Edward SCOTT in Chillicothe.

June 10, 1818: For extracting poison from the wound caused by a rusty nail, take a bean, and after splitting it open, apply one half (flat side) to the wound, bind it on, let it remain until it comes off of itself, and the poison will be extracted and the wound healed!! On Sunday last, a "severe northeast storm and greatest rain" dumped thousands of live fish, both salt and fresh, on the Boston Commons. Richard BROWN, deceased. New Orleans sugar for sale by James MILLER and Co., Chillicothe.

June 17, 1818: "If an open navigation should be discovered across the polar basin, the passage over the pole or close to it, will be one of the most interesting events to science that has ever occurred." Long article about the migration of birds. Richard BROWN, deceased. Jebiel GREGORY, deceased. Shoe store ad and Liquor store ad. Married: James BEARD to Elizabeth CLARK, and Howard HOOD to Mary GROVES. 25 cent reward for runaway Daniel BERNGROVER, 17-18 years, an apprentice to George CHARLES, New Market, Highland Co.

June 24, 1818: A long article on nature, including paragraphs about lichens, thistles, black "mould". Married: Allen COORRANE to Catherine SNAP, both of Twin Tp. Frederick CARTER, deceased, late of Madison Tp., Fayette Co.

July 1, 1818: Letters at the P.O., including letters for John JONES, Robert JONES, and Miss Mary JONES. [Same list on July 8, 1818].

July 22, 1818: A huge list of letters at the P.O. including one letter for John MINCHELL. Every edition of the newspaper had a long poem on the left side of the first page. Many ads are listed on the fourth page of each newspaper, and in this edition there were ads for: Irish linen, Piano lessons, Land for sale, Books, Kettles, Flour and salt, etc. Partnerships and dissolutions of partnerships were often in newspaper editions, and sometimes repeated in future editions. Also, changes of addresses termed "Removal" were frequently listed. An announcement that the Chillicothe Academy was open for pupils costing \$3.50 to \$6.25 per quarter.

July 29, 1818: Lottery offered by the Pittsburg Lottery Exchange with first prize of \$50,000; 15,000 tickets to be sold at \$25 per ticket. An article focusing on a merchant's diary for a day. Short announcement about an insolvent debtor, Henry DAVIS. An ad for "Rags Wanted". *continued on pg 35*

August 12, 1818: An article about a treaty restoring to Spanish authority the city of Pensacola and other Spanish posts which were taken by General Andrew Jackson [who became our 7th U.S. President]. Another article about the Grand Canal which would unite Lake Erie and the Hudson River. An obituary for Mrs. Frances W. FARNANDIS, age 25, wife of Henry S. FARNANDIS, who died at Oldtown.

August 19, 1818: To rid your house of cockroaches, place a bowl of molasses and water in places frequented by them, and in a fortnight, they will be exterminated!! Almost every newspaper edition had short ads about horses "taken up", with complete descriptions of the horse.

August 26, 1818: "Hymeneal": married by Rev. Robert G. WILSON, Mr. George JEFFERIES of Norton to Miss Heater DANIEL of this place. [A hymeneal refers to a marriage, and almost all marriages in the newspaper editions were listed under this title.]

September 2, 1818: Lists of ministers for the Methodist Episcopal Church in many districts, not just Ross County. An article about a captive boy, John TAYLOR, who was found; he was taken by the Indians at age 9 in May 1790. Married by Levin BELT, Mr. Christopher ANTRICK to Miss Polly BRENSON of this place. Apples per bushel were 50-70 cents.

October 21, 1818: Treaties with the Wyandott Indians were explained. A list of all the items for sale in Isaac COOK's store was given...a huge and fascinating list.

October 28, 1818: Election returns listed for the Ohio governor and the General Assembly.

November 4, 1818: Soldier desertion reports for James DUGAN and William CURLES. "Industrious Settlers Wanted" for land on Darby Creek, Pickaway Co.--- five families are currently living there and many more settlement areas are nearby.

November 11, 1818: 6-7 estate notices. November 18, 1818: 4-5 estate notices. December 2, 1818: 2-3 estate notices. [Estate notices for deceased individuals were generally listed under the title, "NOTICE", and requested that "persons having claims against the estate of....", please contact the individual listed. Little information about the deceased person was given other than his or her name.]

December 9, 1818: Obituary of John GRIBBEN, age 25.

December 16, 1818: Died: Joshua BARNEY, age 67 years.

December 23, 1818: Married: John C. CLARK of Chillicothe to Nancy M'CUTCHEON of Ross Co. by Rev. Mr. ROBINSON on Thursday evening.

December 30, 1818: "Large Ox --- supposedly the largest ever seen will be exhibited and sold." A long "message" from Governor BROWN.

January 6, 1819: A huge list of letters at the P.O. and the same list on January 13.

January 13, 1819: Court of Common Pleas -- Charles SCOTT, deceased, and his heirs, Nancy SCOTT and their children, are listed. Married: 5th inst by Rev. John T. EDGAR, the Rev. John McFARLAND of this place to Mrs. Margaret LEWIS of Paris, Kentucky.

January 20, 1819: "Moses C. STOCUM now living in or near Chillicothe wishes to be informed where his brother Martin STOCUM now is." An estate listing for Thomas LYONS. An obituary for Capt. John BEACH, 71 years, at Cape Ann, Massachusetts. [It's puzzling as to why there are so many obituaries for individuals outside the county and relatively few for residents living in the county].

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January 27, 1819: A plant. "Evergreen", is a complete cure for cancer!!! Barr and Campbell listed two columns of their goods for sale: Mountain Tea or Pipsissiway. Globe top umbrellas, Spades and shovels, Gold leaf, Blue and white cotton, Shirt buttons, Black and colored Morocco and calfskin shoes. Carpenter's planes, etc. [just a sampling]

February 17, 1819: Steamboat sunk the 24th ult. [January] with Capt. Jacob REED, just below St. Genevieve, going from New Orleans to St. Louis.


February 24, 1819: Lottery tickets for sale! 1st prize=\$20,000, with each ticket costing \$6.

I terminated my research since I had not located any reference to my ancestor, Ellis M. MINSHALL, who had died in or around the Mississippi River in Louisiana, on June 8, 1818. Probate records [November 1818 in Ross Co., Ohio] reveal that he had a "wife [Anna HARRELL MINSHALL] and three children" [William Gilmore MINSHALL, Matilda MINSHALL JONES, and Mary MINSHALL HEAP] who survived him. How privileged I had been to study the life they had been experiencing in Ross County, Ohio.

Thanks to the Ohio Historical Society for preserving these nearly two hundred year old newspapers!!

CEMETERY INFORMATION

From time to time, we find older lists of burials in Ross County. On a recent trip to Columbus, Ohio, Bob Casari located such a book entitled "Early Vital Records" compiled by the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Perhaps many of the stones have been destroyed or time has taken its toll on tombstones and we were unable to read some of them. We have compared this new list with burials which we have in the library or cemeteries that we have copied ourselves. We find the following additions to the cemeteries in the various townships:

OBIT FILE

Discussion of the Obituary files and methods for improvement continues. Thanks to Joanne Johnson and Caroline Whitten for sharing obituaries they had. Please let me know if you share or donate. Sometimes I receive envelopes, cards etc and do not know who they came from; I would like to acknowledge the donors.

Recently I have wondered if my ancestors who seemed to have disappeared in the 1830's could have died of cholera. I scanned the local newspapers for 1832 and part of 1833. To my disappointment the obituaries and death notices were few. I am listing some that I found. Cholera is a contagious bacterial disease coming from India, producing gastrointestinal symptoms which resulted in a "quick and violent" death.

There is an excellent article in "Ohio History" entitled "Gods Scourge: The Cholera Years in Ohio" By Donald A. Hutslar; he states that between 5 Aug and 23 Sep 1834, 56 residents of the small Ohio village of Zoar, Tuscarawas Co. died of cholera. In 1832 Cincinnati had several hundred deaths while Columbus had no known deaths.

In Chillicothe papers in 1832 Cholera deaths were noted by the number of people who died in New York and Philadelphia. Then articles appeared indicating the disease was gradually moving west. The disease probably was at its highest in Chillicothe during spring and summer of 1833. The Scioto Gazette 21 Aug 1833 states "We are happy to state that the Cholera has nearly disappeared from our town, for the last few days, and that the general health of the place is good." In this same newspaper Mrs. Rachel (Inglish) Jackson fell victim to the scrouge of nations. (Cholera? probably.)

There were epidemics in 1849, 1854, 1866 and 1873. -- Shirley Ajax, Chairman

Scioto Gazette, Wed. March 11, 1874 -- page 3 The Death of Mrs. Sanuel Hardy

We have just received a copy of "The Pacific Methodist," a paper published in San Francisco, which gives an account of the death in that city on January 5th of Mrs. Samuel Hardy, a lady who will doubtless be remembered by all citizens of Chillicothe..... She was born in Boston, January 7th 1790. Her maiden name was Stevens, and she was a lineal descendant of General Joseph Warren....

She was united in marriage in 1810 to Mr. Wm. Jones of this city [San Francisco?].... Soon after her marriage she removed to Thomasten, Maine.... until 1819, when they came to Chillicothe, [Wm Jones d in 1828] where Mrs. Hardy lived nearly half of her long life. She is an aunt of Mrs. Joshua Seney, of this city.....

In 1832 she was married to Mr. Samuel Hardy of this city who died of consumption in 1858. Soon after Mr. Hardy's death she went to Washington to live with her son Wm. Carey Jones, whowas a practical printer, having learned his trade in this office, and was at one time editor and proprietor of the Scioto Gazette..... In 1849 Mrs. Hardy removed to California, where she has since resided with another son, Mr. H. R. Jones, and her only surviving daughter, Mrs. Richardson.....

Note: Ross County Marriages -- Samuel Hardy and Mary Jones m 5 Feb 1832. In 1830 census Mary Jones and children are living seven dwellings away from Sam'l Hardy and family. -- R. Mankin

(same issue as above) Another Baby for Sale

About half-past nine or ten o'clock on Saturday evening last, as Mr and Mrs Rufus Putnam were sitting before the fire in their residence on Church street, an express was heard to drive up, and directly a loud knock at the front door resounded through the house. Mr. Putnam immediately answered the call, and going to the door could see no one, however, but discovered lying upon the porch floor a suspicious looking bundle which upon examination was found to consist of a girl-baby apparently about two months old, wrapped in a woolen blanket, two bottles; one containing milk the other medicine, and the customary note pinned to the child's clothing which read as follows:

"Mrs Putnam--On account of misfortune and trouble, I leave my dear little baby with you. You are a stranger to me, but I have the assurance that you cannot be so cruel as not to care for this innocent child: hope you will be kind to it and bring it up in that manner which will give you great credit and satisfaction. Let me hear through the many journals of your true kindness, and may your name with the childs, be a living testimony to all mankind that you have done your duty. May God give you strength and motherly courage that you may not weary in the duties we owe to each other. The child is accustomed to this bottle you find with it."

No signature was attached, and no discoveries made as to its parentage. It is a beautiful bright child, and still remains with Mrs. Putnam, though as to what disposition she intends making of it is not yet known.

The Daily Scioto Gazette: Friday, August 10, 1900 A Pioneer Gone

Mrs. Elizabeth Little, a pioneer resident of this county, ended this life at 10:30 yesterday evening, at her home in Green township. She had been an invalid for twenty-five years and this, with the infirmities accompanying advancing age, caused her death.

She was born in this county, September 27, 1818. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Orr, who have preceded her to the grave and the parental home was in Springfield township.

.... She was the widow of James Little, and is survived by five children, Mrs. Joseph Hurst, of Pickaway county, Mrs. Jesse Withgote, of Kingston, Mrs. Benjamin Little, who lives some place in the west, and Fletcher and Thomas Little, who live at home. Her brothers are Mr. Jeremiah Orr, of Kingston, Mr Zebulon Orr, of Liberty township, and Messrs. Presley and Wesley Orr, of Springfield township. Her sisters are Mrs. Rebecca Miller, of Springfield township, Mrs William Crabb of Kinsgston, and Mrs. Mary A. Purdum, of Liberty township.

The funeral will take place from the home Saturday afternoon. The Rev. Steel will officiate and interment will be in Bethel cemetery.

A Sad Death

At Kingston Sunday night, Mrs. George Van Gundy died in childbirth. The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon, interment being at Mt. Pleasant cemetery. Rev Cherrington conducted the service. Deceased was in the forty-second year of her age, and was a sister of Mr. S. F. Garrett, of this city.


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REVISIONS TO BYLAWS

At the November 12, 1996 general meeting of the Society, revisions to the Bylaws of the Society were approved. In compliance with the Bylaws, an abstract of the changes follows:

- Art. VI A: Adds procedure for determining a quorum at Council meetings
- Art. VI B: Identifies who may attend and vote at Council meetings
- Art. VI F: Establishes procedure for voting by membership on items
- of special importance, such as purchase of property
- Art. VI G: Establishes the Council as the Trustees under Ohio statutes
- Art. VII: Deleted. Covered Board of Trustees (which had not functioned for many years). Former Articles VIII to XIV are renumbered
- Art. IX: Requires that only abstracts of changes appear in Newsletter



CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS BURIED IN ROSS COUNTY

Chillicothe, Ohio - Thursday, May 12 1887

Soldiers' Tombstones

Ten years since the Ross County Memorial Association opened up a correspondence with the Quartermaster's Department, U.S. Army, for the purpose of securing stones to mark the graves of Union soldiers in this vicinity, whose graves were not already marked. Somehow all these efforts seemed to miscarry, until last November Mr. George Perkins, then Commander of A.L. Brown Post, G.A.R., took the matter in hand, and after considerable patient and persistent work, succeeded in getting the necessary dates and other information which the Government required, and made formal requisition for seventy-two stones. In answer to the requisition seventy of them arrived at the Scioto Valley depot last Monday, and will be placed in position as soon as practicable. The stones are of plain American marble, 36 inches high, 10 inches wide and 4 inches thick, and have no bases.

The John Coyner Family His Ancestors and Descendants by

Margaret Dieringer The name Coyner is from the German name Keinadt, it became anglicized in a number of different ways. I have used the spelling that is found in the document from which I an auoting. The more drastic changes occurred after they went to Virginia.*

John Coyner and his wife, Hannah Laywell, brought their large family to Ross County in 1813 from Augusta County VA. They settled in Concord Twp near Frankfort. John was born 8 Aug 1768 at Millerstown, Lancaster Co PA, to Michael and Margaret Diller Keinat. When John was about five years old the family moved to Cumberland Co where Michael had bought a farm. After the Revolution, about 1789, the family moved to Augusta Co VA where some of the children had already gone. They bought land near Cremora. On June 19, 1793 John married Hannah, dau of Andrew and Rebecca Laywell. Andrew had died in 1779 leaving a will proved 18th May leaving wife, Rebecca and five minor children. Abram Laywell, age five, was bound to John Coyner to learn the art of farming.

Michael Keinath, the father of John, came to 1740 from Onstmettingen, near PA in Winterlingen, Wurtenburg, the son of Konrad and Maria nee Albers. From Onstmettingen church records comes the following information on Michael and his parents:

"1722. Born Michael. Parents, Konrad Keinath and

Maria nee Albers. Went to New England." "1682, Nov Konrad. Parents Johannes Keinat, Anna Maria." He was nicknamed the Ugly Butcher."

"June 24, 1704, Konrad Keinath legitimate son of the deceased Johannes Keinat. and Maria Legitimate daughter of Martin Albers, both of this place were married.

"Oct. 27, 1771, died old Konrad Keinath. Buried Oct 26, a widower aged 89 yrs 11 mos, and 12 days. Died of old age and failure of strength."

Since Michael was born 18 years after his parents were married he must have been one of the younger children.

John Coyner's mother, Margaret Diller, was born 13 Aug 1734 in Lancaster Co PA, the dau of Casper Elias Diller and his wife, Barbara Dornis, who had arrived in 1733, on the ship Samuel with Gauangelloch, Northern four children from Kraichgau. The name Diller appears on the passenger lists as Taylor, but the childrens names and ages agree with the church records in Gauangelloch. The Dillers were French Huegonots who had been driven out of France after the revocation of the Edict of Nantes. Casper Elias's French accented German must have been hard for the English to understand.

Margaret Coyner, the oldest dau of John and Hannah was married on 2 Feb 1813, to Martin Grove. They came with her parents and settled near Austin. Their children were: Elias, Josiah, Noah, Isabella, Elizabeth, Martin, Christian and David. In 1824 this family moved to Fayette Co.

When a young man Noah Grove returned to Ross Co the new village of South Salem, to work in a store that served students attending the newly erected Salem Academy. Some of the students thought it would be fun to take Noah on a Snipe hunt. When they started to talk about going he pretended not to know what a snipe hunt was, so they invited him to go. They took him down along Buckskin Creek, set him on a log, gave him a bag to catch the snipes in and went to drive the snipes to him. As soon as they were out of sight he slipped back to the store. When the boys came in laughing about the trick they had played, they found Noah sitting behind the stove eating candy he had gotten by trading in the bag.

While working at the store Noah met and fell in love with Eleanor Holliday. He invited her to go home with him at Thanksgiving to meet his family. In honor of the occasion his mother placed the turkey in front of Noah and asked him to carve. Proudly he arose picked up the carving knife and started, but somehow the turkey slid off the plate and landed in Eleanor's lap. Noah ran from the Later his mother found him behind the room. chimney. She asked him what he was doing. His reply, "I am trying to die." He recovered from his embarrassment and he and Eleanor were married Dec 1st 1842.

Their oldest son John Coyner Grove was born 10 Oct 1843. He was several weeks premature and weighted only three pounds, his head was so small that it would fit in a tea cup. They wrapped him in cotton and kept him in a shoe box behind the kitchen stove. Fortunately he survived for he was my grandfather.

Noah took over the farm where Eleanor had grown up. There they raised their family. John who married Ella Ervin, Margaret who died young, Harriet who married John Taylor and Martin who married Alice Plyle.

The other children of John and Hannah Coyner were: Elizabeth who m Martin Peterson, Sarah m Edward Shobe, Susan m Jonas Peterson, Hannah m George Clouser, Jane and Harriet both died unmarried, Julia Ann m Erasmus Tullys, Jerima m Rebecca m Richard Waugh, William Fisher, Christian m Elizabeth Teter, and David who was just two years old when they came to Ross Co m Sarah Mallow.
