THE FOUNDER OF PINNEYVILLE (THE RICHWOOD GAZETTE, 14 AUG 1884)

The 23rd of July 1884 was the 65th anniversary of Elder Horace Pinney. The citizens of Byhalia manipulated a grand surprise for this aged and valued philanthropist by setting one of the grandest "surprise dinners" ever given in this locality. The occasion was well worth the consideration of our best citizens.

Mr. Pinney is the founder of Byhalia, having located the present thriving village and discarding the ancient name of Pinneyville, which is now almost obsolete, and only known to the oldest citizens.

Mr. Pinney was agreeably surprised and welcomed the guests in his usual manner, making all feel at home on his premises.

The neighbors assembled to the number of about seventy-five--more would have been there but for the busy season--and congratulated him on his prosperity, charitableness and good health. He receives the good wishes of this community, and with his unaccountable vigor may live to see many more anniversaries. MARYSVILLE TRIBUNE

On March 18, 1880 the Marysville Tribune started copying the names of persons married in Union County, from the earliest court records. The paper was published once a week. At first, the marriages for 2 or 3 years were listed, later, one year each week, and finally a part of a year.

After a period of time, letters to the editor began to arrive, stating that certain marriages were omitted, as follows:

John McDowell says his marriage to Polly Porter in 1835 was missed.

Robert Graham says he was married by William Richey, not A. Amrine. May 12, 1880. My oldest sister Zelinda and J. C. Miller, Sr. were married May 1821. My brother Jacob and Eliza Meacham in March 1823; our old friend and neighbor A. A. Woodworth and Hila Reynolds in April 1832. David Burnham's second marriage with Elizabeth McDonald is omitted--perhaps 1831 or 1832.

Leonard Bliss and Lovisa Spohn, I think in 1835.

General W. B. Irwin's daughter, Gratia, is represented to have married William Sager, whereas it was William Sayer.

Prudence Williams is represented to have married Hollis Strong. She married Hollis Amy.

The Editor said the above are missing from the records.


Charles M. Brooks stated we married him to the wrong woman in 1837. Should be Charles M. Brooks and Susanna F. Bennett by James Herd J. P.

PAGE 397--LIBERTY TOWNSHIP

DISCIPLES CHURCH, on Mill Creek, was organized by Rev. D. H. Hathaway, in the winter of 1838, with the following constituent members: Andrew Henderson and wife Sarah, James Henderson and wife Elizabeth, Charles Burr and wife Mary, Jonathan Bennington and wife, and daughter Margaret, Robert Ramsey and wife, John Ramsey and wife, A. H. Thompson and wife Harriet, Joseph Phifer and wife Charity, and Rev. D. H. Hathaway and wife Rachel, and probably a few others, with Andrew Henderson and Charles Burr as Elders; James Henderson and Isaiah Ray as Deacons. The organization was completed in the schoolhouse near where the church now stands. They continued to hold meeting in private houses and in the schoolhouses till about 1847, when they erected a hewed-log building about 28 x 24 feet for church purposes, which was duly dedicated by Rev. Jacob Reed. This house served the people till the building of the present one, in 1859, at a cost of \$1,200, and the same was dedicated January 29, 1860, by Huston January, since which time they have had preaching once every month to the present, and social meetings on every Sabbath day. The following pastors have administered to this society since its organization: Rev. D. H. Hathaway, Arthur Criffield, William Dowling, Sr., John Ferguson, Jesse Ferguson, Jacob Reed, George McCaul, John Reed, Mr. Lieurance, David Mitchell, Joshua Antrim, Michael Riddle, William Pinkerton, Mr. Peterman, A. J. Clark, John Stanard, J. J. Moss, George Morse, Alonzo Skidmore, and Rev. M. C. Gallier. The present membership is about 100 with Daniel Skidmore, Lemuel Ballinger, D. H. Henderson, James Henderson and Isaac Shirk as Elders: and Thomas Garwood, D. S. Argo and George Holloway as Deacons. A good Sabbath school is held here, which was organized here 25 years or more ago, and has been continued through the summer seasons.





~~X~~ The funeral of a ten-year-old daughter of George Jolliff, of Pharisburg, who died of whooping cough, was held last Thursday.

Herbert Kyle has purchased the drug store at Ostrander and went to that place on Monday to take charge of the business.



Aliquot Parts: Using the rectangular system of survey, land in each state was divided into Townships containing 6 square miles. Each Township was subdivided into 36 Sections, each containing 640 acres. Each Section was further subdivided into halves and quarters, repeatedly, until the piece of land was accurately described. Without the use of Fractional Sections, Blocks or Lots (in the case of uneven parcels of land), Aliquot Parts were used to represent the exact subdivision of the section of land. Halves of a Section (or subdivision of it) are represented as *N.*, *S.*, *E.*, and *W.* (such as "the north half of section 5"). Quarters of a Section (or subdivision of it) are represented as *NW*, *SW*, *NE*, and *SE* (such as "the northwest quarter of section 5"). Sometimes, several Aliquot Parts are required to accurately describe a piece of land. For example, "E SW" denotes the east half of the southwest quarter containing 80 acres, and "SWNE" denotes the east half of the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter containing 10 acres. It is important to remember that the Aliquot Parts shown on the system usually translates into words found on the land document. In general: a section contains 640 acres, a half section contains 320 acres, a quarter section contains 160 acres, a half of a quarter section contains 80 acres, and a quarter of a quarter contains 40 acres, etc.

Base Line: The true east-west line

extending from an initial point in both directions.

Block Number: A one-, two-, or three-digit number used to describe a block (or piece) of land within a township. For example, "Block 6 in Township 5 North, Range 12 West".

Cancelled Document: Land documents that were issued and later cancelled were marked "Cancelled" across the face of the certificate with either a stamp or a handwritten annotation. Cancelled documents were usually replaced by another document. The *Remarks* field for a cancelled document will sometimes make reference to the document(s) that were used to replace it.

County: The name of the present County or Parish where the parcel of land is located.

Date Signed: The month, day, and year that the land document was signed. (TO BE CONTINUED)

THE CHRISTIAN UNION
SOCIETY, BEECH GROVE
CONGREGATION, LEESBURG
TOWNSHIP

The Christian Union society, known as the Beech Grove congregation, had its origin in 1863. A number of the members of the Methodist Episcopal and of the Methodist Protestant Churches, who were dissatisfied with the political character of the public services held there, ceased to attend; but soon realizing the need of religious exercises, they formed a class, independent of any denomination, and met in the Beech Grove Schoolhouse for

prayer meetings. This class consisted originally of about sixteen members and, as nearly as can be ascertained, included the names of Richard Hoskins and wife, Abram Hall and wife, Arad Franklin and wife, Jane and Nancy Franklin and Jacob Hoskins and wife. After a little while, the services of Rev. Samuel Hall, an Independent Baptist minister, were procured; he preached to the society for six months. When the sect known as the Christian Union Church was organized, this independent society joined it. Rev. Roscellus Gates was the first Christian Union minister in charge. He entered upon his pastoral duties in 1864, and remained with the congregation two years. The services were held in the schoolhouse until the erection of Union Chapel. Among the ministers who have served this society are Revs. Jacob Hoskins, Durant, of Westerville, Lacey, Levi Ely, Hannawalt, Racey, and Baker. The circuit to which it belongs comprises four charges besides this one--Millville, Scioto Valley, Liberty and New Salem. Of these, the first three are in Delaware county; the last one is in Franklin County. The membership of Beech Grove numbers about thirty. Until the Sabbath school was organized at Mineral Springs, a year or two ago, one was regularly maintained in this church. The Disciple congregation that meets here was formed by the union of two similar societies, both of which were in Delaware County. One was known as the Money (Mooney) Church, in

Thompson Township, the other worshiped in a schoolhouse in Scioto Township. After they united, services were held in a Delaware County schoolhouse, until Union Chapel was erected. At that time there were very few members besides John McAllister from this township, but a number have afterward entered the township and joined the society. The membership at present is not very strong. Rev. Call was pastor when the church was built. Rev. Moss is now in charge. (History of Union Co., OH, Beers, 1883, reprint 1981)

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF MILFORD CENTER, UNION TWP., UNION COUNTY.

Was organized May 12, 1855, with the following constituent members: Elijah Witter and wife, Joseph Halterman and wife, John S. Fulton and wife, Lucy A. Lucas, Horace Andrews and Thomas Andrews, with Elijah Witter as Deacon, and Joseph Halteman as Clerk. Trustees, Elijah Witter, James Simpson, Joseph Halteman and Horace Andrews. The following have been pastors of the church: Revs. James Simpson, A. J. Wyant, H. H. Witter, Gray D. Bryant, John Wright, H. H. Dunaway, W. N. Bean and Rev. H. P. Clark, who is the present minister. Trustees, E. Witter, L. P. Monroe and John McClimans; Deacons, E. Witter and L. P. Monroe; Clerk Eli Gabriel. In 1856, they erected their present church edifice. It is a good frame building, 30 x 40 feet, with a vestibule in front, 8 x 20 feet; making the entire length 48 feet.

rest of the family's idea of "acceptable behavior." The reasons might be related to financial security, religious beliefs, choice of marriage partner, or even a legal misdeed. Some of these family members simply disappear into the distance, and all that remains are family stories about them. Fortunately, there are several ways to track down relatives who have "disappeared."

Check national census indexes or even check one state at a time for the most recent, public census index. Also check the Social Security Death Index to see if their death was reported to the Social Security Administration. You can search indexes such as Switchboard, which is located at <http://www.switchboard.com>, for your relatives' names. There's a chance they may have married and named a son or daughter after them or a family member. Don't forget to check the local and/or district courts for incarceration records. Although they are public, these records are sometimes difficult to find.

YORK TOWNSHIP CHURCHES- MCKENDREE CHURCH

The McKendree society was organized about 1838, at the residence of Gregory Storms. Besides Gregory, David Davis and Henry Tobey were the principal original members. Other early members were Harrison Storms, William Tobey, Abel Waites, John Sterling, David Sterling, Elizabeth Hyde and Margaret Brooks. Revs. Kimer and Phillips were among the earliest ministers in charge. Like most early churches, meetings for a few years were held at the cabins of the members. About 1841, a log church was reared on the site of the present church, which was built

about 1858. It stands near the center of the township between York Center and Bokes Creek. A steeple and bell have been added since. The society is in a prosperous condition and contains a membership of more than one hundred and twenty-five, divided into six classes. Since the first church was built, a Sabbath school has been held each summer, and for the last few years without any intermission. (History of Union County, Ohio, Beers, 1883, Reprint 1981, V.2, P. 531-532.)

May 14, 1862-Died on the 10th at his residence in this place, James Cluggage at an advanced age.

May 21, 1862-Remittances from the 66th Regiment.

May 28, 1862-Death of Absalom Liggett. On Thursday, the coroner was called upon to hold an inquest over the body of Absalom Liggett. On the 22nd, Mr. Liggett started out with his gun. Sometime after, he was found dead in the back part of his orchard. His gun was found discharged, the ball having entered his forehead which must have killed him instantly. For some time he had been laboring under aberration of mind.

June 4, 1862-Died in Marysville, May 29 after a severe illness of 19 days, Ada B., only child of Alonzo J. & Rubie S. Whitney, aged 6 months and 19 days.

Married on the 14th ult by S. McMahon, Esq., Mr. Daniel Rice and Miss Melinda Draper all of this county.

On the 2nd by the same, Mr. Tobias Beightler and Miss Nancy Edgington, both Paris Tp.

Jun 11, 1862-Died in this place on the 4th inst Augustus Turner, aged 31 years.

Death of James Carter. The telegraph brought tidings of the death of James Carter who was killed by a railroad

collision at Chester, about fifty miles west of New York City. He was on his way to the city with a lot of cattle. There were two trains running in the same direction. When the forward train stopped, the rear train ran into it. Mr. Carter was killed and two others wounded. His body will arrive here.

June 18, 1862-Money sent by soldiers.

June 25, 1862-Tribute of Respect. Capt. J. R. Gardner killed in battle of Shiloh.

James H. Brooks, son of C. M. Brooks of Liberty Tp. returned home from Virginia on Sunday. He was a member of company A., Capt. Fulton's 66th regiment, and was in the fight at Fort Republic. He is out on 30 days furlough, having been wounded in the left hand by a musket ball which carried away the forefinger and rendered useless the one next to it. He also received a slight wound in the left leg. He was offered a discharge but would not accept it, and is determined to return at the end of his furlough.

July 2, 1862-

July 9, 1862-Death of Cyrus Thompson. We regret to announce the death of Cyrus Thompson, son of J. W. Thompson of this place. He was a member of Co. D., 13th Ohio Regiment. He had been unwell for some time but kept his place in the company until three days before his death.

July 23, 1862, No 46-From a report of A. M. Gangewer at Washington City, we learn that the following soldiers from Union county are in hospitals in that place. J. W. Amrine, Co. D. 66th Regiment. Intermittent fever. Reuben Poling, Co. H., 66th. A. P. Orrahood, Co. F., 66th Reg. Shattered hand.

PIONEER DAYS IN RICHWOOD

Among the possessions of the late Mrs. Martha Tonguet, of Richwood, was an autobiography written by Clarkie Tonguet Calloway, aged 91, who was one of the early settlers in this section and was a sister of Larkin Tonguet Sr., Mrs. Tonguet's husband. ...

"My father, William Tonguet and his brother came from France to Virginia. He married my mother Sarah Clark and all of we children were born there. He got restless and wanted to move, so persuaded the Clarks to trade their big plantation for a quarter section of government woodland in Ohio. We all came, Tonguets and Clarks, in covered wagons. While in camp near Chillicothe, father died suddenly and was buried there. The rest of us with Uncle George Clark as boss, came on to Union County, six miles east of Richwood, only there was no Richwood then, only dense forest. Not a stick of timber had been cut. Some trees were four or five feet through.

"Our nearest neighbors were three miles east and six miles west. They were all friendly and glad to see us. We were glad to hear the tinkle of their cow bells in the woods. They all came and helped with the houseraising. They put up the cabin in a day right from the stump. They covered it with clab-boards and bound them on with weighed poles. We all had a good time.

"We would often have log-rollings to clear the ground. Uncle George made each boy clear sixty acres before he could have it to farm. When they run off the town of Richwood my brother helped.

We had never heard of a cook stove in those days. We did all our cooking by the fireplace. We baked our corn bread in skillets on the hearth.

"One day my brothers went hunting with the dogs. The dogs ran on ahead and came back presently, all slashed up and one of them missing. The boys went on and found a wild hog, who looked so savage they hardly wanted to tackle him. It took seven balls to kill him and his tusks measured eleven inches. Our school was down where Bethlehem cemetery is now. We followed a path of blazed trees through the woods and one of the boys carried a gun. The school house had log puncheons for floor, slabs split out and hued and slabs for benches, with sticks for legs. A large old fireplace had a stick chimney plastered with mud.

"The Wyandot Indians were very thick. They often came to our house to trade bullets and ribbon for bread. One time two came, one a chief with his hair run through little silver tubes and silver rings in his ears and nose. They brought their dogs with them. My brother and I thought we were going to be killed, so we went out and lay down behind a log. Then we decided their dogs would find us, so went back to die with the rest. We sat down back in a corner. The chief took out his tomahawk and laid it down; then his big knife and laid it down. We thought our time had surely come. Then he took out a big plug of tobacco, hit his tomahawk on the hearth and a pipe fell out. He shaved tobacco, and filled the pipe and calmly began smoking. We felt better then.

"I could spin better than most girls, and people often came for me to help them out. I spun flax on the little wheel and wool on the big wheel.

"I wove flannel and linsey and linen. One time I worked at Henry Swartz's down where the cemetery is, and I never was so scared. Two angry Indians came hunting Henry Swartz and Ned Williams. They said an Indian had been killed by two whites. They thought the two whites had come this way. A long time they stayed and hunted around, then talked Indian talk and went away. I wanted to go home, but Mrs. Swartz cried and said it was too near sundown. Henry came home, and after we had told him, he built up a good fire and put his gun and axe beside the door. All night he sat by the fire, and we lay on the bed awake. As soon as it was day, I ran through the woods from the cemetery to where Lew Jones lives and was glad to get home.

"The Wyandot tribe camped on the Susie Swartz gravel pit. They were painted for war

and on the hunt of whites who had killed the Indian, for a long time afterwards. This happened where Richwood now is.

"We had no buggies and rode horse-back to Delaware for supplies. My husband, John Calloway, opened the first store in Richwood. I married him August 20, 1835. It was one of the first wedding in Claibourne township. All of Richwood came to the wedding and everyone for miles around. Dr. Brookens and wife, L. H. Hastings and wife, Philp Plummer and wife, Hesikia Berdick and wife and others I can't remember. There were one hundred present. We were both dressed in white, and I wore a white veil. We were married on the Jones farm and went to live in Richwood in a log house where M. W. Hill's livery stable is now.

"Preachers would come through on horseback with their saddlebags filled with Bibles and hymn books. They were old-fashioned Bibles Christian preachers. We all belonged to this church. There were William H. Ashley, Wallet Barber, Elder Marvin, J. N. Walters, Old Daddy Case, J. N. McCumber, Daniel Long, Daniel Griffen and Josiah Knight. They followed paths of blazed trees from one settlement to another.

"I have seen this dense forest fall by the woodman's axe and cleared away to a "garden of Eden." I am now 91 and almost ready to leave this "Garden of Eden" and go to a rest prepared for me, a house not made by hands, eternal in the Heavens."

About two weeks ago he was taken down with lung fever, which after eight or nine days terminated in death.

Died—On Tuesday, May 19th, at the residence of John F. Sabin, Mrs. S. L. Sabin, wife of Dr. Andrew Sabin. May 27, 1863, Tribute of respect for D. D. Welsh.

Died in this place on the 16th instant, Adam Wolford, Sr., aged 65 years. Deceased was an old and respected citizen.

In York Township on the 12th instant Charles B. Eaton aged about 52? Deceased took suddenly sick with inflammation of the bowels.

Death of Aaron Coolidge. Died on the hospital boat Nashville, near Millikin's Road, on the 12th of April 1863, Aaron Coolidge in the 24th year of his age. He entered the army in the month of October, 1861, as a teamster, served in Missouri under Fremont until February, when taking sick he was discharged, returned home, and in August 1862 volunteered again and joined the 96th regiment under Capt. Hamilton and went South. He was in the battle of Arkansas Post. G. W. Coolidge.

June 24, 1863—Married on the 19th instant, in Liberty Twp. by S. McMahill, Esq., Mr. Jesse Warner of Logan county to Mrs. Rebecca Peach.

This morning in the 1st Presbyterian church in his place by Rev. Mr. Thompson, Mrs. Joseph K. Guthrie and Miss Hester A. Welsh.

Died in Onarga, Irriquois county, Illinois on the 19th inst, Lydia J. Foye, daughter of Elihu and Elizabeth Bunker, aged about 26 years.

July 22, 1863—George Knepper committed suicide by deliberately cutting his throat from ear to ear, severing arteries and the wind pipe. He was on trial for stealing \$130 from his father-in-law.

Tribute of Respect for Capt. W. D. W. Mitchell who died at Gettysburg, Pa. On the 22nd of July 1863 of wounds received on the 1st day of July. By discharged and furloughed members of Company F., 825th Ohio infantry.

August 5, 1863—Married on the 20th ult by S. McMahill, Esq., Mr. Albert Gibson to Miss Malissa Parthemore. The new M. E. church at Milford was dedicated Sunday last. The building is substantial, capable we should judge of comfortable seating 250 or 300 persons and its entire cost will reach about \$2400.

ITEMS FROM THE MARYSVILLE TRIBUNE, CONT.

August 12, 1863—Death of Corp. Wm. McElroy. The deceased enlisted in the village of Summersville, Union county, on the 22nd day of Nov. 1864,(?) having served the term of one year, seven months and nine days, before he received his fatal wound. During this time he was engaged in the battles of Cedar Mountain, seven days on the Rappahannock, two days in the battle of Bull Run, also engaged in the battle of Cross Keys, and was preserved without receiving any wound, and very little sickness. At Gettysburg, havin g received sever wounds in both legs, he was compelled to lie on the field the remainder of the day, until the morning of the 2nd of July, when he was carried from the field by one of his company, who was taken prisoner, to a private house, and afterwards removed to a private house in Gettysburg, where he lay until the 28th of July, when he died. We deeply sympathize with his bereaved widow and children. W. T.

August 19, 1863 Remittances from 121st OVI, 96th Regiment

Died on the 22d of July in the Hospital at Vicksburg, of chronic diarrhea and ague, Lucas, youngest son of Eliphas Burnham. Though a man of feeble constitution, contrary to his physician, volunteered in the 95th Ohio. He was rendered unfit for duty by an attack of diarrhea previous to the battle of Richmond, Ky, and was never fit for duty afterwards. He notified his father of his failing health and requested that an effort be made to get him home. To meet this desire, Capt. McAdams was dispatched to Vicksburg on the 20th of July but on his arrival found him dead. He brought the remains home, and they were interred on the 12th inst.

Departed this life, Aug. 23rd, 1863 in Milford Center, James Riddle in the 63rd year of his age. He was united in marriage with Miss Mary McCullough who still survives him—in Oxford, Butler county, Ohio Feb. 5, 1824 and made this village his home in 1826 and untid death had not changed his residence. Mr. Riddle had long been a victim of consumption. S. Tibbet
