The Social Security Administration's letter-forwarding service will send a letter from you to the missing person providing the purpose of your search is either humanitarian (locating an estranged family member) or monetary (tracing a missing heir). "The letter has to contain information that we determine the missing person wants to know," says spokesman Phil Gambino. You have to provide the person's date of birth, parents' names or other identifying information. The agency won't reveal the person's whereabouts or verify that the letter was received: It simply acts as the intermediary. There's no charge for humanitarian requests; other searches cost \$3.00. 

The information above was taken from a volume which is housed at the Wyandot County Museum, Upper Sandusky, Chio. This volume contains the constitution, minutes, etc. of the Wyandot County Bible Society which was formed December 3, 1846. The title page reads:

"This book was presented to the Wyandot County Bible Society on the 4th day of Decmeber, A.D. 1846 as a record book for said Society, by the Honorable Joseph McCutchen."

The Town of Upper Sandusky Wyandot County, Ohio G. Worth, Sec'y. W.C.B.S.

The main purpose of the society was to furnish each family in the county with a whole Bible (both Old & New Testaments).

Beside the list of names of the original members the amount subscribed by each was recorded. The amounts vary in range from \$1.50 to \$.10.

PIONEER ASSOCIATION CEMETERY - CAREY, OHIO Monument erected in memory

of the early settlers

In the July/August 1989 issue of the Wyandot Tracers newsletter was an article telling of the discovery of a list of the old pioneers who were buried in the Pioneer Association Cemetery located on South Patterson Street in Carey, Ohio. This was the first established cemetery in the Carey area and until the discovery of this list in 1989 there was no known record of those who were interred in the cemetery. This list was found while cleaning out some old files in the village's municipal building. What a find!


The article also told of the neglect of the Pioneer Association Cemetery and how in the 1940's it was decided to turn the cemetery land into a park for the Village of Carey. At that time no action was taken to preserve the site of the early cemetery and those interred in the cemetery were not removed.

The Wyandot Tracers in conjunction with the Village of Carey have been working to secure a monument to be erected in memory of these early settlers. A photograph of the plaque which was erected in 1990 at the site of the early cemetery is pictured and a copy of the list which was recently discovered has been reproduced from the July/August 1989 newsletter.



FAMILY NAMES

CASE OCCUS REFERENCE ONLY

CASE, an old and honored surname, is principally of English origin. It admits of at least two derivations. According to some authorities on the origin of names, it was bestowed in mediaeval times upon newcomers to a community who came from CASE, a place in France. It is said also that CASE was often applied, when surnames first came into vogue, to those who lived on the farm of a lord or nobleman.

JOB CASE, (1737-1798) and ZACHEUS CASE (1728-1812) were privates in the Connecticut troops during the Revolutionary War.

The progenitor of many embers of the CASE family in Wyandot County and vicinity was MYRON B. CASE who was born in Connecticut and was married in Lorain County, Ohio to Miss Lucinda Goodrich. Mr. and Mrs. Case came to Eden Township, Wyandot County in 1846 where Mr. Case was a successful farmer and also justice of peace and a township trustee. Mr. Case died on his farm in 1864. Mr. and Mrs. Case were parents of eight children, two of whom, AGUSTUS CASE and EMERY E. CASE, served in the Ohio troops during the Civil War and were killed in action. Another son, WILLIAM HENRY CASE, also took part in the Civil War and later was the owner of a substantial farm in Eden Township. Still another son, MYRON B. CASE, who was born in Eden Township in 1850 and died in 1890, was a farmer and teacher in the county schools and served also as secretary of the Wyandot Mutual Insurance Company.

WILLIAM SCOVILLE CASE (1863-1921) was justice, Supreme Court of Errors of Connecticut.

HOWARD GREGORY CASE (1880-1943), a physician of note, was professor of surgery at Syracuse University College of Medicine.

ARTHUR ELLICOTT CASE (1894-1946) was professor of English at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois.

EVERETT N.CASE was president, Cologate University, Hamilton, N.Y. FRANCIS HIGBEE CASE and CLIFFORD P. CASE were U.S. senators respectively from South Dakota and New Jersey.

HAROLD CLAUDE CASE was president of Boston University.

DAVIS

DAVIS is one of the most popular of English surnames. Of simple derivation, it merely is a shortened form of Davids and means "son of David." The latter signifies "beloved" and has been used widely both as a personal name and surname for many generations, particularly among the Welsh and Scots.

MALATIAH DAVIS (1717-1795) and WILLIAM DAVIS (1724-1780) served as lieutenant-colonels respectively in the Massachusetts and North Carolina troops during the Revolutionary War.

The progenitor of many members of the DAVIS family in Wyandot County and vicinity was WILLIAM DAVIS (1811-1846) who, although he died at the are of 35 was a substantial farmer of Crawford Township owning about 260 acres of land. His wife was Lucy Brayton, daughter of Elijah Brayton of Tymochtee Township. Mr. and Mrs. Davis were parents of 4 children, one of whom ALFRED K. DAVIS, was born in 1838 and was the owner of a farm of about 300 acres in Crawford Township. ALFRED K. DAVIS was married to SARAH HURD in 1865 and they were the parents of six children. One of their children, ORA C. DAVIS, was a teacher in the Wyandot County public schools.

HENRY GASSAWAY DAVIS (1823-1916) was employed by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad during the early years of his career, started a general store in Piedmont, West Virginia at the age of 35 and later became the owner of several thousand acres of nearby timber lands. He was United States senator from West Virginia and also, the Democratic candidate for vice-president of the United States in 1904. (CONTINUED)

JOHN MERRILL DAVIS (1841-1920) was professor of psychology and ethics at Rio Grande College, Rio Grande, Ohio

WILLIAM Z. DAVIS (1839-1926) was judge, Supreme Court of Ohio.

CURTIS WOODWARD DAVIS was executive vice-president, Libby-Owens Ford Glass Company, Toledo, Ohio.

EARL FRED DAVIS was director, Columbus (Ohio) Zoo.
BENJAMIN OLIVER DAVIS, Jr. was a major general, U.S. Air Force.

ELLIS

ELLIS is derived from Elijah, the Old Testament prophet, and was in widespread use as a personal name during the Middle Ages. It almost passed out of existence by the end of the 15th century; and in the 17th century the Puritans in this country replaced it with Elijah. At present, it is employed primarily as a surname and as such, enjoys considerable popularity both in Great Britain and the United States. It should be noted also that EILLIS has given rise to a number of family names beginning with "El" such as ELLISON, ELIOT and ELY.

One of the earliest immigrants to this country was JOHN ELLIS who migrated from Wales and settled in Medford, Massachusetts in 1641.

Among the patriots of Colonial days was Reverend JOHN ELLIS (1728-1805) who, with the permission of his congregation, left his church in Franklin, Connecticut to serve as chaplain with the Army at Valley Forge. TIMOTHY ELLIS (1724-1814) was a colonel of New Hampshire troops.

An interesting genealogy of the descendants of JOHN and SUSAN ELLIS of May-field, Maine, who were born in 1798 and 1797 respectively and had ten children, was compiled in 1936 by MILO H. MILLER of Pittsburg, Pa.

Ellis County, Texas was named for RICHARD ELLIS, president pro tempore of the first senate of the Republic.

HENRY ELLIS (1721-1806) served as governor of both New York and Georgia. ALSTON ELLIS (1847-1920) was president of Ohio University, Athens, Ohio for the nineteen year period preceding his death.

WILLIAM ROBERT ELLIS was vice-president and a member of the board of directors, Hercules Powder Company, Wilmington, Deleware.

CALVERT N. ELLIS was president of Juniate College, Huntingdon, Pa. in 1943. ELMER ELLIS was professor of history and dean of the College of Arts and Science, University of Missouri.

FOX

FOX, an old and honored surname, admits of a few derivations. Thus, it is interpreted figuratively as "a wise and crafty person" and was bestowed in ancient times upon those with such characteristics. The name may also have originated from the picture of a fox upon a tavern or shop and still again it may have been derived from the animal "fox" in much the same manner that the names Wolf, Bear, and Boar were obtained. It should be noted also that the Scottish form of FOX is "TOD" in French the name becomes "RENAUD" and in Irish it is "SHANNACH". In the latter connection, it is recorded that in the year 1333, certain members of the SHANNACH family, residing in London, angelicized their name to FOX.

JACOB FOX (1764-1849) served as a private in the Pennsylvania troops during the Revolutionary War. He died in Hancock County, Ohio and one of his direct descendants was MRS.MYRTLE FLICK ROBERSON who was born in Findlay, Ohio.

CHARLES EBEN FOX (1851-1916) was rear admiral, U.S. Navy.

JAMES D. FOX (1847-1910) was associate justice, Supreme Court of Missouri from 1903 until the time of death.

DIXON RYAN FOX (1887-1945) an educator and historian of note was president of Union College, Schenectady, N.Y.

G. FOX and Company was the largest department store in the state of Connecticut at one time.

HARRY CLIFFORD FOX was president of Findlay College, Findlay, Ohio.
KENNETH RUSSELL FOX, known widely in textile manufacturing circles, was vice-president and technical director, Burlington Mills Corporation with head-quarters in Greensboro, North Carolina.

JAMES HAROLD FOX started his career as a high school teacher in 1919, subsequently pursued advanced studies, and was professor and dean of the School of Education, George Washington University, Washington D.C.

HALE

HALE, an old and honored surname, admits of a few derivations. For example according to some authorities on nomenclature, it is of local origin and was the name often bestowed, when surnames came into vogue, upon emigrants from towns by the names of Hales in a few counties of England. It is said also that it is obtained from the surname HALL and was applied in medieval times to those who lived in or near the "hall" or great house of a landed proprietor. In its Welsh usage, HALE stems from "hayle", denoting a marshly land or salt river; and it should be noted also that an Irish branch of the HALE family migrated from Wales to Tirawley, Ireland in the 12th century.

NATHAN HALE (1755-1776) was the noted patriot of Revolutionary days who, upon being executed as a spy by the British, said "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."

EDWARD EVERETT HALE (1822-1909) grand-nephew of the martyred NATHAN HALE, was known nationally as a Unitarian minister and author. One of his best known works is "The Man Without A Country",

published in 1863. His brother CHARLES HALE (1831-1882) was an author, member of the U.S. diplomatic corps and assistant secretary of state during the administration of President Grant.

EUGENE HALE (1836-1918) was United States senator from Maine for thirty years. FLOYD ORLIN HALE (1882-1938) was president, Illinois Bell Telephone Company.

LINCOLN BELL HALE was president, Evansville College, Evansville, Indiana.
THEODORE BENEDICT HALE was vice-president in charge of sales, International
Harvestor Company.

ORON JAMES HALE, an educator of note was professor of European history at the University of Virginia.

STANTON GUDMAN HALE of New York City was vice-president, Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York City.

HOLOCAUST, WAR VICTIMS AND THE AMERICAN RED CROSS

Dear Red Cross! I am looking for my sister.,

More than 45 years have passed since World War II ended, but the fate of many victims of the War and the Holocaust is still unknown. For those families who survived, the peace that ended World War II was only the beginning of a lifetime of searching.

Today, the American Red Cross Holocaust and War Victims Tracing and Information Center hopes to bring a new kind of peace to those still seeking their lost relatives.

Millions disappeared into Nazi concentration camps and were never seen again. The reason? They were members of religous, political, ethnic or "racial" groups targeted for persecution and death under the Third Reich.

Six million Jews and hundreds of thousands of Gypsies died at the hands of the Nazis. The mentally ill and disabled were put to death as part of the so-called euthanasia program. Jevovah's Witnesses and other religious dissidents also suffered terribly. Homosexuals, members of opposition political parties, and many other were also persecuted.

Many people, especially in Poland and Yugoslavia, Russia, Czechoslovakia, Greece and other occupied countries became slave laborers in Nazi labor camps and German industrial firms.

Hundreds of thousands of people were separated from their families while fleeing the bombing and destruction of cities.

Many of those who survived the War were left with only the memory of those who disappeared. After War, the Red Cross was able to help some survivors find family members. But for may, the fate of loved ones remained a painful mystery.

The American Red Cross Holocaust and War Victims Tracing and Information Center works closely with local chapters of the American Red Cross across the nation in an effort to serve those who were separated from family members during the War

Your local Red Cross chapter can help. Call or visit for more information. The chapter will forward your request to the Center, located in Baltimore at the Central Maryland Chapter.

Through an arrangement with the International Tracing Service of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), the Center assists those trying to discover the fate of those lost during the War in Europe and the Soviet Union. Now the newly released lists of hundreds of thousands of names of civilian victims of World War II have been added to the vast numbers of documents already held at the International Tracing Service, there is new hope that information about lost loved ones may finally be found.

In some cases, certification of a family member's internment of death will be provided. Individuals interned or displaced during the War may also seek certification of their own hardship.

In a few cases, documentation may exist of a relative's survival and post-war destination. The Center will work with other Red Cross societies around the world in an effort to find these individuals.

ANSWERS TAKE TIME

Even with this new information, the search process is a long one... Cases could take a year or more to resolve.

The Center is a collaborative effort between the American Red Cross International Social Services in Washington, D.C., and the Central Maryland Chapter. Listed are some of the people whose obituaries were in the various newspapers, along with their approximate death dates. Please note that some of the spellings of the names are not as they are spelled today.



FAMILY NAMES

MOSER

MOSER, an old and honored surnames, is principally of English and German orgins and admits of a few derivations. For example, it is the equivalent of Mosser and in some cases is said to have been applied in medieval times to those who lived at or near a moss or moor. In addition, it may stem from the ancient personal names Moses; and still again, there is reason to believe, and especially in its German usage, that it is obtained from the German usage, that it is obtained from the German "genusse" which means "vegetable". Thus, in the latter instance, MOSER was bestowed, when surnames first came into vogue, upon greengrocers or dealers in vegetables.

JACOB MOSER (1740-1800) served as a captain of Pennsylvania troops during the Revolutionary War. He was born in Germany and died in Lancaster County, Pa. Another patriot of Colonial days was VALENTINE MOSER) (1758-1833) who was a lieutenant in the Berks County, Pennsylvania militia.

JOHANN JAKOB MOSER (1701-1785) was a distinguished German jurist.

JEFFERSON FRANKLIN MOSER (1848-1934), the son of a chemist who migrated from Vienna, Austria to Baltimore, Maryland in 1820, was commissioned ensign, U.S. Navy upon his graduation from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1868, advanced through the grades and retired with the rank of rear admiral in 1904.

POOL

POOL, an old and honored surname, is principally of English, Scottish and Irish origins. In its English and Scottish aspects, it is of relatively simple derivation. It is the equivalent of Poole and was the name bestowed in medieval times upon those who lived near a pool, pond, or small lake. This was in tune with the practice, often followed when surnames came into vogue about the year 1,000, of naming individuals in accordance with their physical characteristics, occupation or place of residence.

In its Irish aspect, POOL is the equivalent of such names as POOLE, POWELL and POLIN: and it is derived from the Gaelic form of the personal name Paul. The POOL and associated families lived in the Province of Ulster as far back as the 13th century; and later they were found in large numbers in Connaught. Their coat-of-arms bore the motto "This Is The Virtue Of My Ancesters".

It is said also the POOL may be a variant of the German name "BUHL".

SAMUEL POOL (1736-1831) served as a lieutenant in the Massachusetts troops during the Revolutionary War.

JOHN POOL (1826-1884) was U.S. senator from North Carolina. His brother, SOLOMON POOL, was the 5th president of the University of North Carolina.

STECHER

STECHER, an old and honored surname, is of German origin. The equivalent of STECHERT, it is obtained from the German "stecher" which means "jouster." In mediaeval times, a joust was a sport exercise or exhibition in which contestants, particularly soldiers on horseback, contended against each other with lances or long spear-like weapons. In many instances the surname STECHER was assumed by or applied to those who were proficient in the sport.

According to the Fifth Series of the Pennsylvania Archives, GEORGE STECHER and LEWIS STECHER were privates in the Lancaster County militia at the time of the Revolutionary War.

FAMILY NAMES (continued)

The progenitor of many of the STECHERS in Wyandot County were PETER and CHRISTINA (SCHMALZHAFF) STECHER who were born in Wurtemberg, Germany the former in 1779 and the latter in 1788. They were the parents of six children. One of their sons was GEORGE J. STECHER (1807-1887) who also was born in Wutemberg and emigrated to this country in 1854, coming directly to Upper Sandusky were he was engaged in farming. He was married to CHRISTINA NOLLENBERGER and they were the parents of eight children. One of their sons was GEORGE J. STECHER who was born in Upper Sandusky in 1857, attended the public schools there, studied law, and was one the leading attorneys of the county.

JOHN DAY STECHER, a native of Upper Sandusky and the son of GEORGE JOHN and HATTIE ELIZABETH (DAY) STECHER was a distinguished attorney who was admitted to the Ohio Bar in 1928 and practiced his profession Toledo until 1957 when he became executive director of the American Bar association with offices in Chicago.

* * *

STIEF

STIEF, an old and honored surname is of German origin. Although a search through a number of the leading works on the origin of names discloses no direct reference to it, it is logical to assume that it is a shortened form of the German "STIEFEL" which means "boot or high shoe" and was often bestowed, when surnames first came into vogue, upon dealers in footwear.

According to the "Pennsylvania German Pioneers", published by the Pennsylvania German Society and listing the immigrant arrivals at the Port of Philadelphia from 1727 to 1808, GERG FRIEDERICH STIEF arrived on the ship "Richard and Mary" on September 17,, 1753.

CHARLES STIEF (1835-1898) was a substantial business man and civic leader of Carey and Wyandot County. A native of Newlasheim, Baden, Germany, and the son of ANDREW and CATHERINE STIEF, he came with his parents to this country in 1851. They settled in Upper Sandusky. Subsequently CHARLES STIEF began to manufacture of bricks in Upper Sandusky in partnership with his brother-in-law under the firm name of STIEF and ULRICH. In 1860 he established a similar enterprise in Carey where in 1877 he also established a large plant for the manufacture of drain tile. MR. STIEF was a trustee of the Town of Carey and a member of the board of Education. He was married to CATHERINE ULRICH of Salem Township and they were the parents of three sons and two daughters. Two of their sons, HENRY B. and JACOB STIEF succeeded their father in the brick business, and the latter was postmaster of Carey for four years. Other members of the STIEF family have been active in the affairs of Wyandot County over the years.

SNYDER

SNYDER, an old and honored German surname is relatively simple derivation. The equivalent of SCHNEIDER and SNIDER, it is of occupational origin and stems from "schneiden" meaning "to cut". It was usually applied to a cutter of cloth and therefore has the same significance as the English "tailor".

As indicative of the fact that SNYDER is one of the most popular of German surnames, it should be noted that the Pennsylvania German pioneers, published in 1934 by the Pennsylvania Germany Society and showing the immigrant arrivals at the port of Philadelphia from 1727 to 1808 has 150 references to the name of SNYDER and its equivalents.

Among the high ranking officers who served in the Continental troops during the Revoluntionary War was Colonel JOHANNES SNYDER of the New York Militia.

Snyder County Pennsylvania was named for SIMON SNYDER (1759-1819) governor of that state for two terms.

TAYLOR

TAYLOR, an old and honored surname, is of relatively simple derivation. It is of occupational origin and is obtained from "tailor" a maker of garments. It is the equivalent of the German "schneider", and it is associated with such names as FULLER, TUCKER, and TRIMMER, all of which denote textile operations. Incidentally TAYLOR must not be confused with the name TYLER which means "one who lays tiles".

JAMES TAYLOR (1732-1814) and THOMAS TAYLOR (1743-1833) served as colonels respectively in the Virginia and South Carolina troops during the Revolutionary War.

Mount Taylor is a mountain in New Mexico, 11,389 feet high.

One of the earliest residents of Wyandot County, Ohio was JOHN TAYLOR who settled in what is now Belle Veron in about the year 1821.

ZACHARERY TAYLOR (1784-1850) was the twelfth president of the United States. He served as a general in the Mexican War; and Taylor counties in Florida, Georgia, Iowa and Kentucky are named for him.

FRANK TAYLOR (1844-1920) a direct descendant of WILLIAM TAYLOR who came from England in 1635 and settled in Concord, Massachusetts, purchased a small thermomenter manufacturing business in Rochester, N.Y. in 1866. From humble beginnings it developed in to Taylor Instrument Companies, one of the largest manufactures of temperature and humidity regulating and recording devices in the world.

WOLFE

WOLFE has been in widespread use as a surname for many centuries. It admits of at least two derivations and is the equivalent of such other surnames as WOLF, WOOLF and WULF. According to some authorities or nomenclature, it signifies "son of Ulf", the later being a personal name that was popular in ancient and mediaeval times in Great Britain and the Scandinavian countries. It is said also that WOLFE owes its usage as a surname to the fact that many centuries ago, when the vast majority of the people were illiterate, it was the custom for innkeepers, businessmen and the like to identify their places of business by means of a readily distinguishable pictorial sign. Such a sign might show an animal or bird. Thus, "Johnatte Wolf" signified "John at the sign of the wolf" In time, "atte" was dropped and the name of became JOHN WOLFE which in many instances was transformed to JOHN WOLFE.

GEORGE WENDELL WOLFE (1740-1825) served as a captain in the Northampton County Pennsylvania troops during the Revolutionary War. Another patriot was Private Anthony Wolfe, (1755-1810) of the Connecticut militia.

Wolfe County, Kentucky was named for NATHANIEL WOLFE, a member of the legislature of that state.

Wolfe Island is one of the Thousand Islands in the St. Lawrence River. It is eighteen miles long.

ON LAND TITLES

The following was taken from "Items of Interest about Engineers and Engineering" from a technical publication:

"The Defense Plant Corporation, making a routine investigation of the titles to a proposed plant site in Louisiana, received title proof as far back as 1803. A legal adviser was not satisfied with this and wrote for evidence as to ptior title. He received the following reply from a Louisiana Attorney:

'Gentlemen:

I note your comment upon the fact that the record of title sent you as applying to the lands under consideration dates only from the year 1803 and your request for an extension of the records prior to that date.

Please be advised that the government of the United States acquired the territory, including the tract to which your inquiry applies, by purchase from the government of France acquired title by Conquest from the government of Spain acquired title by discovery by one one Christopher Columbus, a resident of Genoa, Italy, traveler and explorer, who by agreement concerning the acquisition of title to any lands discovered travelled and explored under the sponsorship and patronage of her Majesty, the Queen of Spain. And the Queen of Spain had verified her arrangement and received sanction of her title by the consent of the Pope, a resident of Rome, Italy, and ex-officio representative and heir apparent of the Almighty God from whom He received His authority and the Almighty God made Louisiana.

I trust this complies with your request.'

CIVIL WAR CASUALTIES

The following was taken from an article which appeared in the June 10, 1864 issue of the Wyandot Pioneer newspaper, Upper Sandusky, Ohio: From letters written by several of the 49th Ohio boys to their relatives here, we learn that their Regiment was engaged in the severe skirmishes near Dallas, Georgia and on the 27th of May, during a fight of one hour and a half, lost 244 men, killed, wounded and missing. The following are the casualties among those who enlisted from here:

William Gibbs - killed Cyrus D. Wilt - killed

Jacob Grindle - killed Wm. Dunaway - killed

James Thompson - mortally Dora Jackman - severely

Frederick Hines - severely Chester Nigh - slightly

Jerami Nigh - slightly Alonzo Gibbs - slightly

The following information was taken from the book, "Hardesty's Military History of Ohio - 1886":

- 1. Wm. F. Gibbs enlisted Aug. 14, 1861 Co. A 49th O.V.I.(Ohio Volunteer Infantry); sergt.; promoted 2nd Lieutenant; veteranized at Chattanooga, Tenn.; killed at Picketts Mills, Ga.
- 2. J.S. Grindle, enlisted Aug., 1861 Co. A 49th O.V.I. (Ohio Volunteeer Infantry); killed at Dallas, Ga.
- 3. Jas. Thompson, served in Co. A 49th O.V.I. (Ohio Volunteer Infantry); killed at Picketts Mills, Ga.
- 4. Dory Jackman, enlisted Aug. 15, 1861 Co. A 49th O.V.I. (Ohiho Volunteer Infantry); veteranized with regiment; killed at Picketts Mills, Ga. May 27, 1864.
- 5. Fred. W. Hine, enlisted Feb., 1864 co. D O.V.V.I. (Ohio Volunteer Veterans Infantry); killed May 28, 1864.
- 6. Jas. A. Gibbs, enlisted at Carey, Ohio June 9, 1862 Co. G 87th O.V.I. (Ohio Volunteer Infantry); captured at Harpers Ferry; paroled; discharged Sept. 30, 1862; enlisted Sept., 1863 Co. A 49th O.V.I. (Ohio Volunteer Infantry); wounded at Picketts Mills Ga.; twice wounded at Nashville, Tenn.; discharged Nov. 22, 1865.

CIVIL WAR SUBSTITUES 1864

The following article was published in the Wyandot Pioneer newspaper, Upper Sandusky, Ohio, May 27, 1864:

LET US HAVE LIGHT

There seems to be some misunderstanding among many respecting the commutation for draft. We may state:

1st, That when a drafted man furnishes a Substitute, who is too young, too old, or is an alien, and therefore subject to draft, and is accepted by Government - Then the man drafted is free three years.

2nd, by furnishing a substitute who is liable to draft, the drafted man is free one year.

3rd, By paying Government ,three hundred dollars, the drafted man is free until the next call.

4th, A man in the one hundred days service and drafted, is allowed ten days service and drafted, is allowed ten days after the expiration of the hundred days to commute or he may do so at once, but he must serve during the hundred days; and if he goes into the service, the time he has served will be deducted from the term of three years.

WAR OF THE REBELLION The Civil War Fallen Heroes - 1864

An article which appeared in the May 27, 1864 issue of the Wyandot Pioneer newspaper, Upper Sandusky, Ohio stated that a letter had just been received from Albert Turner of Dalton who reported that "a man named Anderson, from near Upper Sandusky and Theopholis Gould of Carey, Ohio, members of Co. F 101st Reg. O.V.I.(Ohio Volunteeer Infantry) were killed during the charge upon the enemy at Buzzard's Roost Georgia."

To substantiate this information the following was recorded in the book, "Hardesty's Miliary History of Ohio" 1886:

- 1. Jas. M. Anderson enlisted Aug., 1862 Co. F. 101st O.V.I., sergt., killed at Buzzard's Roost Ga. May 11, 1864.
- 2. Theo. Gould enlisted Aug., 1862 Co. F. 101st O.V.I. killed at Rocky Face Ridge.
