The next and most important facet of this question arises from the discriminating practices found in heraldry; to wit, do women want armorial equality? We have found that most women do object to not having the same rights as men, hence it would follow that they would object to the discrimination in heraldry. Unfortunately, the subject of heraldry has been neglected by many women, possibly because of the unfair treatment they have received. Those knowledgeable few should address themselves to this problem so that their views and opinions can be read.




From a strictly artistic standpoint, the LOZENGE does not lend itself to the presentation of arms. The armorial bearings are generally designed for the shield-shaped presentation of the man's armorial bearings, hence the lozenge, being pointed at both top and bottom, distorts most presentations.

The restrictions placed on women's use of armorial bearings are obvious; heraldry predates women's rights by several hundred years, but does that justify continuing these discriminatory practices? Certainly not!

When said restrictions were placed on women, very few (Joan of Arc, etc.) were ever involved in military operations; hence it was understandable that women could only display the lozenge. Needless to say, times have changed. How many armigerous men have worn armor, carried a shield, used a helmet, etc.? Armorial bearings are not tied into a prerequisite of military service, in which many women are now serving, so why can't women use the helmet and shield?

## CEMETERIES

As we grow older, it seems we have more funerals to attend due to the deaths of loved ones and friends. These trips to the cemetery for burials are sad times for those close to the deceased and cause us to think of the passing of all those gone on before us.

Memorial Day is a time to travel to cemeteries in which our family members are buried to tend the graves and perhaps leave memorials of flowers. We walk through the cemetery looking for tombstones of friends and acquaintances, noting whether their families have "decorated" their graves.

It is sad to know that many cemeteries are not visited and graves not decorated on Memorial Day, or at any other time. These cemeteries, some containing only a few graves, seem to have been forgotten. They are difficult to find, many now in pastures or fields, with the headstones fallen over. Occasionally there is a fence in place to keep out cattle.

Some of us enjoy visiting cemeteries, strolling through the rows of markers, reading the inscriptions. We find them peaceful places where we can take a few minutes to reflect on the past and contemplate the future. Occasionally, when we visit an abandoned cemetery, it brings sadness that the knowledge of the people buried there is probably lost to their descendants. The name of a great-grandparent may be known, but not their final resting place.

Newspaper articles of cemeteries being moved to make way for a new shopping mall or highway sadden us. We should be more saddened when tombstones are quietly moved by a landowner to provide more grazing land for cattle or broken up to use as road fill .... the original burial ground lost to future generations.

As genealogists, we are probably more aware of the abandoned cemetery situation than most folks. To help resolve this problem, let's become acquainted with laws in our states governing cemeteries on private property. We can spearhead an effort to save a cemetery or join with others to provide upkeep.

Perhaps you can form a group to save a cemetery. Or maybe you choose to go it alone. Whatever the choice, we must remember those who went before us. They are the reason we are here.


changed to Rayden in memory of the man who founded the town, and several years later Rayden was changed to Gerty. It has been called Gerty ever since.

The town of Old Stonewall, now Frisco, was started around 1868, when a white man, named C. C. Rook built a log store building and put in a small stock of groceries and dry goods. Stonewall was on the south branch of the old California trail. William L. Byrd moved to Stonewall, and built a home. I was born there in 1875 and by 1887 the town of Stonewall contained six stores and between seventy-five and a hundred people lived there. William L. Byrd, one time governor of the Chickasaw Nation, put in a store at Stonewall. Doctor George H. Truax was postmaster at Stonewall in 1890. Doctor Truax was one of the first doctors to settle in this part of the country. I remember Papa Byrd saying he was in the mercantile business at Doaksville in 1875, then he moved to Stonewall. It was at this time 1875 that he and mama Byrd took me. At Stonewall he continued in the store business and stock-raising. In 1898 he sold out his store business and devoted his time to farming and stock-raising. At one time he had around five hundred acres in cultivation. He raised lots of cattle and a great deal of cotton. In 1888, he was elected Governor of the Chickasaw Nation, and he was re-elected in 1890 and 1892.



The Owl Creek Cemetery is apparently an Indian cemetery. Few of the headstones are still upright and some of the graves which were once covered by long slabs of carved sandstone appear to have been plundered. This cemetery is located in a pasture; remains of a metal fence are visible. The location is not at Owl Creek, as indicated in the PCHGS cemetery books, but is several miles east.

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## **Ayakatubby - Mayes Cemetery**

This Indian cemetery is located about three miles south of Stonewall, and may be in Coal County. The location is R-7-E, T-2-N, Section 25. It is in a wooded area and not accessible by road. The cemetery is fenced, but when visited in 2001, trees and shrubs were growing wildly. These burials are not listed in the PCHGS cemetery books.

## **HIGH HILL INDIAN CEMETERY**

**High Hill, as the name would suggest, is situated on the crest of a "high hill", overlooking the surrounding country, except to the northeast. High Hill Baptist Church was established by Reverend Newton Johnson about forty-five years ago. Mr. Johnson, as well as being a minister, was also a Representative and Senator in the Chickasaw Legislature for several years.**

**The ground on which the church is situated was part of Reverend Johnson's allotment and was donated by him to the church. At his death, Mr. Johnson was buried in the cemetery of the church he helped to found, two other former pastors of the church are also buried there.**

**Church services are still held regularly at High Hill and the cemetery is also still in use. The premises are in excellent condition as are most of the graves. Most of the graves are covered with a concrete slab, one is covered with a small concrete house. Another has a wooden box or house built over it in the typical Chickasaw manner. There are one hundred twenty graves, all are marked, twenty-seven with marble tombstones. This was once a typical Indian cemetery but as the wooden grave houses rotted away they were replaced with concrete slabs. At this time the place is not very different in appearance from a white cemetery, however, there are no white people buried there.**

**The tombstone of Rev. George Colbert is in the High Hill Cemetery, located about a mile north of Ahloso. The cemetery, adjacent to the High Hill Baptist Church, is well maintained.**

## A CEMETERY OF MANY NAMES

May be the old Citra Cemetery, or known as the Frazier Cemetery. Location: see map below. Town of Citra is existing as two old homes. Originally had a gasoline station, post office, store, and homes. Located on an extremely sharp corner, approximately 30 degrees. Citra lies approximately 15 miles north of Centrahoma. The cemetery is approximately one-half mile north of Citra, on Highway 68, southwest corner of Hughes Co. OK. Approximately 79 graves.



This cemetery is unmarked by any sign. When visited in November 2002 the latest grave marker found was for Jo Ann Carpenter who died in 1992. The above index and location information were found at the Oklahoma Historical Society Archives in a softbound Hughes County marriage book which contained information on two other cemeteries.

canvass of the same cemetery was done by Elsie Rumley and Joyce Fay Rumley Wilson June 1984, indicating it was a cemetery of colored and Indian in northern Coal County, north of Boiling Springs. They list several names not shown on the above index:

# THE MYSTERY OF MAY WILLIAMSON

It is not in dispute that May Pollock Williamson was born 01 May 1879 in McAlester and died 14 Feb. 1926.

The questions is -- where is she buried?

A researcher told of a lone tombstone on a ranch south of Centrahoma. No fence, only a few irises growing nearby.

Overgrown with grass, the stone was located between two trees. Nothing indicated there had been other burials there.

Coal County Genealogical Society president Verdell Clark researched May's death and said she was buried in the Coalgate Cemetery. Clark sent cemetery and newspaper articles confirming this.

The Coalgate Record-Register's issue of February 18, 1926 states Mrs. May Williamson, wife of Alex Williamson, died February 14, at 9:15 a.m. The article continues, telling us May's maiden name was Pollock and she was

born May 1, 1880, in McAlester, leaving three children and husband to mourn her loss. Funeral services were conducted at the family residence on the east side of Coalgate on Tuesday, February 16, with burial in the Coalgate Cemetery.

The Coalgate Courier of February 18, 1926, also states interment of May Williamson was made in the Coalgate Cemetery.

A trip to the Coalgate Cemetery did indeed reveal a tombstone for May Williamson with the dates 01 May 1879 - 14 Feb. 1926.

Two other stones reside in the family plot, one with no legible inscription, the other an elaborate stone for James S.

Williamson, born in Scotland in 1879. He perhaps was May's brother-in-law. The Coalgate Cemetery index does not indicate May's husband Alex is buried there.

The mystery remains. Where is May Williamson buried?

# **HARKINS/BYNUM CEMETERY IN JOHNSTON COUNTY**

**This cemetery is on private property south of Fillmore and exists in a decrepit condition. We visited on June 21, 2002. It's about a 3/4 mile walk down an old wagon trail to get to it. The current landowners have cleaned the timber from the whole pasture but kindly left the graveyard intact. It sets in a small clump of trees in the middle of a pasture on original Bynum land purchased by George Harkins from Mary Bynum's family.**

**This is Col. George Washington Harkins, son or Capt. Willis Harkins mentioned in THE TREATY OF DANCING RABBIT CREEK and Salina Folsom, daughter of Chief David Folsom. George was a Col. in the Choctaw and Chickasaw mounted rifles during the Civil War. He was born a Choctaw but lived most of his adult life with the Chickasaws. Most of his children are registered as Chickasaw. He served the Chickasaw people as delegate to Washington and Supt of Education, as well as a lawyer in the tribal courts. Known for being a "very refined gentleman". This is a massive monument about 2 ft square at the base with about a 4 ft cone shaped point on top. It's laying on its side with the top broken in three pieces. overall it stands about 6 to 8 ft tall. He married Mary Bynum, April 5, 1867, they had 4 children, Mary Angaline, Lucy, Charles Crittenden, and George Overton. Mary and Lucy both married Elias Rector Cheadle, (Mary died within 6 months.) Charles C. married Lula Harris, daughter of Gov. R. M. Harris.**

Sophia C. Thompson (1st wife) and Geo. W. Harkins were married on March 25, 1858. They had 2 children "Tuck" and "Willie" (Giles W. Harkins) who later became a prominent Doctor in Choctaw nation and was given much credit in containing an epidemic that threatened the entire nation. Tuck died young. Giles Thompson was a prominent salt merchant in Boggy Depot and I believe father to Sophia.

# OBITUARY OF T. K. TREADWELL

Thurman L. (T. K.) Treadwell, age 82, passed away April 1, 2003, in the St. Joseph Rehabilitation Center in Bryan TX.

Mr. Treadwell was born June 6, 1920, in Roff OK to Thurman K. and Myrtle Treadwell, Sr. In 1942 he married Nell Mc-Neely of Memphis TN. Nell passed away on Feb. 17, 1992. Mr. Treadwell remarried on March 15, 1997, to Joleeta "Jo" Little Wallrath of Ada and Miami FL.

Mr. Treadwell began his college education in 1937, receiving his teaching certificate from East Central State Teachers College. He went on to the University of Oklahoma earning his B.S. and M.S. in geology. In 1952, he received his Ph.D. in oceanography at Scripps Institution of Oceanography, an M.S. degree in arctic ecology from McGill University and in 1968, a certificate of computer programming from George Washington University.

Serving his country faithfully, he was a U.S. Navy submarine officer during WWII. From 1945-1968 he did field work in the U.S., Canada, Greenland, Mexico, Caribbean, South America and the Middle East. As a U.S. Navy map maker and oceanographer, he retired as captain. He served as chief in the U.

S. Navy Mission to Haiti and commander of the U. S. Naval Oceanographic Office. Mr. Treadwell was a liaison with USSR Institute of Oceanography and U.N. Oceanographic Commission.

He also served as senior staff scientist for the executive office of the President. He was a professor and head of the Department of Oceanography at Texas A&M University from 1969-1986. In 1989, he retired from the University as professor emeritus. He continued research and consulting as president of the Institute for Photographic Research from 1989-2003.

With his interests in oceanography, Mr. Treadwell served as director of the Explorers Club and contributing editor of the Explorers Journal, president of the American Society for Oceanography, director of the Marine Technology Society, past president and chairman of the board of directors of the National Stereoscopic Association, director of the Society of Exploration Geophysicists, chairman of the University Oceanographic Laboratory system, vice president and director of the Marine Geodesy Society and president for the Institute for Photographic Research.

His honors include the commendation for development of women in education, Eagle Scout, Distinguished Service Award from the Central Intelligence Agency in 1970, letter of commendation from the Department of Defense, Medal of Petion and Bolivar for training Haitian Coast Guard and fishermen, Diploma of Achievement in Arts and Sciences from Iran for his research projects, a plaque for his outstanding service from the NAACP, Distinguished Service Award from the National Science Foundation and National Security Agency, Distinguished Service Medal, Purple Heart Medal, Antarctic Service Medal, four combat area service medals, and the submarine combat pin with five stars, Governor's Award for Distinguished Service to Public Education, Minnie Piper Stevens Award and Regents Commendation from Texas A&M University and was named Honorary staff scientist with the USSR Institute of Oceanography.

Mr. Treadwell's publications include nautical charts and maps, separate books, booklets and magazine articles.

Mr. Treadwell is survived by his wife, Joleeta "Jo" Little Treadwell, and his two sons, Terry, a




