


Chart II connecting 1824 Map with Chart I





TWO HUNDRED YEARS AND MORE OF THE FIRST REFORMED CHURCH LANCASTER, PA.

THE BEGINNINGS

Two centuries ago the infant city of Lancaster stood on the very frontier of colonial Pennsylvania. In the years immediately preceding its founding (in 1730) many Reformed families from the Palatinate and Switzerland settled in the Conestoga Valley. As there was no ordained minister amongst them, regular services were first conducted by a layman, John Conrad Tempelmann, a pious tailor from Heidelberg, Germany, who served in this way for many years and finally was ordained in 1752. In a report to Holland, dated February 13, 1733, he writes: "The church in Chanastocka had its origin in the year 1725, with small gatherings in houses here and there, with the reading of a sermon and with song and prayer, but, on account of the lack of a minister, without the administration of baptism and the Lord's Supper."

The principal place of meeting soon became known as the Hill Church (now Salem, Heller's) and those who gathered there from far and near were known as the Conestoga Congregation. Here Tempelmann served both as schoolmaster and as "Reader." On October 14, 1727, John Philip Boehm visited the Hill Church and celebrated the first communion in the Conestoga Valley, when fifty-nine persons communed. On one of his later occasional visits, May 31, 1730, he had the congregation adopt a constitution and place itself under the care of the Amsterdam Classis.

Two years later there were six meeting places in "Chanastocka." Three of these were served by John Peter Miller, who afterwards

went over to the Seventh Day Dunkers and succeeded Conrad Beissel as head of the Ephrata community. The other three, among them Lancaster, were served by Conrad Tempelmann. His report to Holland contains the earliest information about the Lancaster congregation: it then had thirty members, and its elders were John Jacob Hock, Andrew Halsbrun, and a third whose last name has been effaced but who may have been Nicholas Treber (or Trewer, or Drewer), who was an elder in 1740 and again in 1748. As Boehm never visited Lancaster in these early years, it is probable that the congregation was organized by Tempelmann, some time after Boehm's organization of the Hill Church in 1730. If this is the fact, that excellent man, the father of the Reformed Church in the Conestoga Valley, was the founder of the First Church in Lancaster, though he was not a resident of the town.

For the years between Tempelmann's report to Holland and the opening of the church record in 1736 no information is available except that one child was baptized in 1733 and one in 1734. It seems that during this period the members communed at the Hill Church, and also that Tempelmann ceased to serve the Lancaster congregation some time before May, 1735.

The Old Log Church was the first house of worship erected in the new town of Lancaster and the sixth Reformed church built in the province. The story of its building and dedication is told in the records of the congregation: "Now as regards the building of our church, the beginning was made in the year 1736, and by the help of God it was so far completed that on the 20th of June, or

upon the festival of Holy Whitsuntide, we held divine worship in it for the first time. The teacher and preacher, or pastor, called to this office of God, was the reverend and truly pious John Jacob Hock. Guided by God's spirit, he chose as his introduction [Scripture lesson] the words in the Prophecy of Isaiah, in the 35th chapter and the first verse, where it is written: 'The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them; and the desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose.' But the text was the latter clause of the fourth verse of the 103d Psalm, which reads: 'Who crown-

eth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies.' And we joined with each other in singing the 84th Psalm."

The Old Log Church stood on the site of the present building, but back some distance from Orange Street. Originally the ground was held under a lease, but on October 5, 1741, James Hamilton, in response to "the application and request" of the congregation, executed a deed in which he "freely and absolutely" gave the lot "for the promotion of religion." In 1746 the adjoining lot to the east was purchased, upon which a school house was erected. In the same year a steeple was added to the church to receive a bell, for the purchase of which (and a large clock) the members subscribed 60 pounds (\$150.00) in Pennsylvania currency. These had been bought, on December 27, 1745, from the Ephrata Dunkers, who at that time discontinued the use of such "Babylonian trash" and tore down their spire. Until the steeple of the Old Log Church was completed the bell hung on the hickory tree near the Court House under which the Indians held their councils and which gave the settlement its first name of Hickory Town. An authentic tradition relates that at a later time when Indians made an attack upon the town a quick-witted woman, Salome LeRoy Naumann, rushed into the church and gave the alarm by ringing the bell, whose peals could be heard four miles. When the church was removed in 1752, the clock was sold for 32 pounds, but the bell continued in use until 1774, when on an intensely cold day it burst as it was summoning the people to worship.

It seems that at the dedication of the new church a reorganization was effected, for in connection with that service all the places on the consistory were filled. In the church record the following entry appears immediately after the report of the dedicatory service: "As regards the election of the first elders of the church, John Henry Bassler, Felix Müller, John Gorner, and Peter Dörr were elected by the congregation and declared duly qualified. . . . The first deacons elected were John Käller and John Stephen Rammerstsberger." At the expiration of the first year Elders John Henry Bassler and Peter Dörr were succeeded by Peter Balspach and Frederick Strubel.

The first pastor, not an ordained minister but "called to this office of God," was the John Jacob Hock who as elder had been one of the signers of Tempelmann's report to Holland in 1733. It is probable that he conducted services after Tempelmann ceased

coming to Lancaster, and gave catechetical instruction to the children. Whatever his position while the church was building, it may safely be assumed that he was the leader in the enterprise, and also that the church officers elected on the day of the dedication were his most zealous co-laborers in the erection of the new church "in the midst of the wilderness, in a new world, in a newly organized county, and in a newly laid-out town" (Dr. Harbaugh).

During this first pastorate, of only sixteen months, thirty-four infants were baptized, showing that, as Boehm reports, the congregation was "pretty strong." What brought John Jacob Hock's ministry at Lancaster (and Cocalico, now Bethany, Ephrata) to an end is not known, but it was not because a successor had been found, for the charge was vacant during the following seventeen months. The record shows that no baptisms were performed during this period, indicating that no distant minister visited Lancaster in that time. In fact there were then only three Reformed ministers in the province, while the congregations numbered twenty-three.

The second to minister in the Old Log Church was John Bartholomew Rieger, who served for four years. He was a native of the Palatinate, had been for a few months a student in Heidelberg University, and then had gone to the University of Basel. He was ordained before he came to this country. Shortly after his arrival in September, 1731, he became pastor of the Reformed congregations in Philadelphia and Germantown, and a few years later he was minister at Amwell, N. J. The fact that his brother, Jacob Frederick, was a practicing physician in Lancaster doubtless had much to do with his coming here in April, 1739. For his support, a letter of Boehm to Holland records, "The High German Reformed congregation in Lancaster, Canastota, resolved to contribute fifteen pounds [yearly] of this country's currency," and on February 17, 1740, the elders, Jost Frenler, Niclaus Treber, and John de Huff, over their signatures pledged the "unfailing contribution" of this sum.

Originally Mr. Rieger had been engaged for a term of two years, but at the end of that time he was retained, apparently for another two years. In the latter part of his pastorate difficulties arose between him and his people, the reasons for which are not clear. The large number of baptisms in every year of his ministry and the fact that under his leadership the congregation ob-

tained title to the church lot indicate no lack of interest or diligence on his part. Perhaps the principal, if not the only, reason for the loss of his people's confidence was his independent and tolerant attitude, construed as proving him not "echt reformirt." He is reported to have said that, if faced with the choice, he would take communion from a godly Lutheran preacher rather than from an ungodly Reformed preacher, without feeling "any scruples of conscience about it." And when, towards the end of 1742, Count Zinzendorf visited Lancaster, in the interest of a movement which was believed to aim at the extinction of separate denominations, and attended services in the Old Log Church, Mr. Rieger made much of him, took him to his house, and the next Sunday in his sermon praised the piety and doctrines of the Moravian brethren. Sectarian prejudices were then so strong that such liberalism was certain to meet with quick and violent disapproval. However, the difficulties, whatever their origin, were resolved by Mr. Rieger's departure to Holland to pursue the study of medicine.

During the vacancy which followed, lasting for a year and a half, the congregation was not visited by any ordained minister. In November, 1744, the Rev. Caspar Ludwig Schnorr arrived in this country from Zweibrücken, Germany, and immediately was called to Lancaster. His was to be a short and troubled ministry. In June, 1745, John Bartholomew Rieger returned from Holland and began the practice of medicine in Lancaster, at the same time preaching at Schaefferstown and Seltenreich's. Soon he began efforts to supplant the Rev. Mr. Schnorr. In November the latter wrote to the Classis of Amsterdam that Rieger offered to build a parsonage and to secure a bell for the church if he were made pastor again. In the same mail went a letter from Rieger, alleging that at a Sunday service Schnorr had accused him of keeping money given to him by the Classis for the use of the congregation, and asking the Classis to establish his innocence. About the same time Christopher Saur, who had published a German Bible against whose alleged errors Schnorr had issued a warning, openly charged Schnorr with drunkenness. In the spring of 1746 the discredited pastor removed to Germantown, N. Y., where, according to the records of the Dutch Reformed Church, the "many misdemeanors" of this "ecclesiastical vagabond" soon put an end to his ministerial career.

For a few months Mr. Rieger supplied the vacant pulpit, but his efforts to become the regular pastor were unavailing, principally because of his friendly attitude toward the local sects. Finally his services were dispensed with altogether. He continued to preach to his congregations in the country and later took an active part in the organization and proceedings of the Coetus.*

For more than three years the congregation was now without a pastor. Fortunately throughout this interval Michael Schlatter took a great interest in its affairs. Having been commissioned by the Synods of Holland as Missionary Superintendent, in addition to serving as pastor at Philadelphia and Germantown he performed with tact and tireless industry the labors of a good bishop, traveling great distances through the wilderness, establishing order in the churches, and organizing (in 1747) the Coetus of Pennsylvania, a judicatory subordinate to the Synods of Holland until it declared itself independent in 1792. In September, 1746, within three weeks after his arrival in Philadelphia, he was in Lancaster, to preach in the Old Log Church and to effect an amicable separation between Mr. Rieger and the congregation. Afterwards he made more than a dozen visits, preaching, administering baptism and the Lord's Supper, ordaining and installing church officers.

In August, 1748, two young ministers landed at Philadelphia, Dominicus Bartholomaus and John Jacob Hochreutiner. The former preached in the Old Log Church on September 4th and the latter one week later, Schlatter being present on each occasion. When the congregation reported that either one would be acceptable as pastor, Mr. Hochreutiner was assigned to Lancaster and Mr. Bartholomaus to Tulpehocken. Mr. Rieger was appointed to install the new minister on October 16th. On the preceding Friday an elder was in Philadelphia to bring him to Lancaster when a gun from which he was attempting to extract the ball exploded, killing him instantly. Deprived in this tragic manner of a regular pastor, the congregation during the ensuing year had the occasional services of Mr. Bartholomaus. The statement that the new minister at Falkner Swamp, the Rev. John Philip Leydich, also served as supply probably has no other foundation than a visit by him and the Rev. George Michael Weiss to Lancaster in August, 1749, on the customary annual tour of the churches.

* His grave and that of his brother are a few steps in rear of the present church.

The congregation might have suffered much more from the lack of a regular pastor during this period had it not been for the aid of the schoolmaster, John Hoffmann. On May 4, 1747, he signed a contract in which, in addition to his duties as teacher, he engaged to read sermons on Sunday, as long as there was no pastor, and in summer to give catechetical instruction to the children. As he held the position of schoolmaster for thirty years, it may be assumed that during several later vacancies he rendered the same important service.

In October, 1749, the Rev. John Conrad Steiner upon his arrival in this country immediately received and accepted a call to Lancaster. The Coetus decided that he should live at Muddy Creek, "where there was a good parsonage," and that he should serve the congregations at that place, at Earltown, at White Oaks, and at Lancaster, preaching once every four weeks at each place. Instead of occupying this charge, Mr. Steiner put himself at the head of disaffected members of Mr. Schlatter's congregation and remained in Philadelphia as their pastor.

The Rev. Ludwig Ferdinand Vock, sixty years of age, a new arrival in this country, became pastor of the Old Log Church in January, 1750, engaged for only one year. By midsummer he had divided the congregation and the church was closed against him by his opponents, who, however, soon relented and permitted him and his adherents to meet in it. The Coetus warned the congregation to dismiss him at the end of the year, as "being everywhere in evil repute because of his conduct." This was done and nothing is known of his later career. The Coetus appointed as a committee of supply the ministers Leydich, Weiss, and Lischy, and the congregation was instructed "to send them the necessary invitations in advance."

In July, 1752, Michael Schlatter returned from a visit to Europe, bringing with him six young ministers, who had just been ordained by the Classis of Amsterdam. Within a month one of these, the Rev. Philip William Otterbein, had become the pastor of the Lancaster congregation. He was the first of many able preachers who have occupied the pulpit of the First Church and who have been eminent for their piety and prominent in the counsels of the Reformed Church. In the early months of his pastorate plans were formed for the building of a new church. Michael Schlatter relates that when, on June 14, 1747, he administered the

Lord's Supper to 225 communicants, "the multitude assembled . . . was so great that the church could contain scarcely half of them." The Lancaster congregation, next to the one in Philadelphia, was now the most important in the province of Pennsylvania. Growth in membership had made a larger building necessary and the primitive house of worship that had well served the needs of a pioneer period no longer satisfied the taste of a less rigorous time. Before the year was out the Old Log Church was removed to the northeast corner of Orange and Christian streets, where it served as a dwelling until it was destroyed by fire on January 4, 1836.

The building of the Old Stone Church was begun soon after Mr. Otterbein assumed the pastorate. Unfortunately the records do not tell when the corner-stone was laid nor when the church was consecrated. In the space in front of the wine-glass pulpit

stood the communion table within a circular balustrade around which the members gathered to receive the Lord's Supper. The gallery was not built until 1769 and did not extend along the sides of the room until the interior was remodeled in 1822, when, also,

a chancel replaced the wine-glass pulpit and communion circle, and a wooden floor was laid over the original brick pavement. In 1784, when the second bell owned by the church burst (as the first had done ten years earlier), the two bells now still in use were imported from England and a steeple was built to hold them. At the same time an ornate glass chandelier was purchased, which for sixty-seven years "gave light to all within the house."

An interesting relic of the Old Stone Church is the lock which now bolts the doors of the front west entrance. It bears the following inscription:

Nun gehen wir zur Kirchen ein,
 Und unser Heiland Jesus Christ
 Wolle bei uns sein,
 Ja, nicht nur heit allein
 Und so lang wir auf Erden sein,
 Sondern so lang das unsere Seele lebet.
 Jesus Gottes Sohn hat die ehren Kron;
 Er wolle doch uns auch helfen
 In dem Himmels Thron.

Ich bin gekommen die Sünder zur Busse zu rufen, und nicht die Frommen. Matth. 9, 13.*

In the early 1760's a lot was bought on the east side of Duke Street (now Nos. 45-49) upon which a parsonage was built and a new school house. To provide funds for these purposes a lottery was conducted, in which St. James' Episcopal Church took part.

In the last year of Mr. Otterbein's ministry he and his people cordially cooperated in establishing stricter church discipline. One of its features was the requirement that everyone, "without exception," who desired to receive communion should have a previous interview with the minister. This remained the custom for nearly eighty years.

* Now go we into the church, and may our Savior Jesus Christ be with us; yea, not only today and as long as we are upon earth, but as long as our soul lives. Jesus, Son of God, has the crown of honor; may He, on Heaven's throne, help us too.

I am come to call the sinners to repentance, and not the righteous. Mt. ix, 13.

Mr. Otterbein's last pastorate was in Baltimore, Maryland (1774-1813). His evangelistic zeal led to the formation within many congregations of societies, the purpose of which was to effect a revival in the church, but which in 1800 combined to form the denomination, the United Brethren in Christ, which owns Otterbein as its founder.

William Stoy was an able scholar and a somewhat eccentric character. For some years he was secretary of the Coetus. As he could not use the Dutch language, his reports to Holland were written in Latin. After his Lancaster pastorate he studied medicine in Europe and upon his return to this country practiced his profession in Lebanon, Pa., at the same time preaching in the Tulpehocken Host Church. Several of his remedies were extensively used and he was one of the early advocates of vaccination for smallpox.

During the vacancy which existed for the next two years the Rev. John Waldschmidt, pastor at Cocalico, served as supply. He was appointed by the Coetus and was to be assisted by other ministers as opportunity offered.

Dr. William Hendel was a leader in the Reformed Church. During his second pastorate he helped to found Franklin College, of which he became the Vice-President and a trustee. He was chairman of the synodical committee that prepared the first Reformed Church Hymnal. In his first pastorate he baptized, on December 14, 1766, the infant daughter of Nicholas and Catharine Hauer, who after her marriage lived in Frederick, Maryland, and became known to fame as Barbara Fritchie. Later, while pastor in Philadelphia, he faithfully ministered to the sick and dying during the yellow fever epidemic until he himself fell a victim to the disease, dying on September 29, 1798.

During the vacancy of the year 1770, Casper Wack, a youth of seventeen, whom the Rev. Caspar Weyberg, of Philadelphia, had taken into his home and was educating for the ministry, supplied the Lancaster congregation with preaching and catechetical instruction.

The next regular pastor, Charles Lewis Boehme, was a graduate of Heidelberg University and had served a charge in the Palatinate before coming to America. He was highly esteemed by his brethren in the ministry and in 1773 was President of Coetus. Besides

conducting services in the German language he preached regularly in French.

The Rev. Mr. Helffenstein's ministry encountered difficulties created by the Revolution and by the famine of 1777. Dr. Harbaugh says of him: "It was a rare blessing which this congregation enjoyed in those trying times to have for their pastor one to whom the highest of all earthly titles belonged—a good man!" He was an eloquent preacher and a faithful pastor. Several volumes of his sermons were published and were frequently reprinted, and an English translation of one of them had a wide circulation. He often preached to the Hessian prisoners of war interned in Lancaster.

John Theobald Faber came to this country in 1766 and immediately became pastor of the Goshenhoppen charge, to which he returned from Lancaster and in which he remained until his death in 1788. Of his Lancaster ministry neither history nor tradition tells us anything, but in his other charge he was greatly beloved.

Dr. Becker was thirty-seven years of age when he came to this country. In Germany he had already distinguished himself as scholar, preacher, and author. The members of the Lancaster congregation regarded him with the deepest affection and the spiritual interests of the church prospered under his ministry. He prepared many young men for preaching the gospel. A volume of his sermons, published in 1810, met with a warm reception.

Like Dr. Becker, Mr. Hoffmeier was born in Anhalt-Coeten and was educated at Halle. Both men came to America in the same ship, in the summer of 1793. Mr. Hoffmeier ranked high as a preacher and as a pastor manifested extraordinary interest in the sick and the poor. He was buried beneath the pulpit of the Old Stone Church.


Martin Brunner was the first regular pastor of native birth and the first to preach in the English as well as in the German language. At the conclusion of his ministry he continued to reside in Lancaster until his death, which occurred in 1852. In his last years he translated the church records into English and transcribed them with great care.

The Rev. Mr. Glessner preached in both languages. Under his care the congregation grew and prospered. At the end of his

pastorate there were about two hundred and twenty-five members.

When Mr. Keyes became pastor in 1847 the intention was to have a second regular pastor, to minister in German. When none could be secured, the Rev. D. Y. Heisler, of Columbia, was engaged to supply German preaching. This arrangement was continued until 1850, when the members who preferred English services formed a separate congregation (St. Paul's) and took with them Mr. Keyes as their pastor. In the mother church, services were conducted in both languages until in 1870 the German portion of the membership withdrew and organized as St. John's Reformed Church.

Within little more than a year after Dr. Harbaugh came to Lancaster the congregation decided upon building a new church and, beside it, a new parsonage. The property owned on Duke Street was sold for \$7850.00. The last service in the old church was held on March 21, 1852. The next morning the members removed their cushions from the pews and the work of demolition immediately began.

The corner stone of the old church became the corner stone of the new. It was laid on the afternoon of May 30, 1852. On December 19th the basement was consecrated, and in this room services were held until the completed church was dedicated on February 19, 1854.

On this occasion Dr. B. S. Schneck preached in German, the 84th Psalm (used at the dedication of the Old Log Church) and a German anthem were sung. The rest of the service was in English. In the afternoon there was a service for the children and in the evening the Rev. George W. Glessner preached in English.

In 1891 the church was refrescoed, and again in 1904. In the latter year new pews and new chancel furniture* were installed.

In recent decades many memorials have been erected—windows, tablets, hymn boards, etc. In 1921 a building for the use of the church school was constructed in the rear of the church.

Dr. Harbaugh was an eloquent preacher, a prolific writer of both prose and poetry, an indefatigable student. Many of his books, pamphlets, and poems (including the familiar hymn, "Jesus, I Live to Thee") were written in the study of the First Church. The custom, still observed, of holding an early morning Christmas service was inaugurated by him. He founded "The Guardian," a popular religious monthly that was published for forty years, which after his death was edited by Dr. Benjamin Bausman, a son of this church. In 1864 Dr. Harbaugh went to the Theological Seminary in Mercersburg as Professor of Didactic and Practical Theology, a position in which he served until his death three years later.

During the pastorate of Dr. Peters, the worthy successor of Dr. Harbaugh, the congregation continued to prosper. In early life Dr. Peters was for a time Principal of Franklin and Marshall Academy, and for ten years immediately preceding his death he was President of the Literary Department of Heidelberg University, at Tiffin, Ohio.

Dr. Titzel's wide interests and broad scholarship made him a leader in the community and the denomination. He was a member of the Peace Commission, a member of the committee that prepared the Directory of Worship and of the Committee to revise the Constitution of the Reformed Church, and in other important positions rendered valuable service. In his last years he was disabled by a paralytic stroke, during which time W. Stuart Cramer, the first Assistant Pastor, performed all ministerial duties.

Dr. Cramer's pastorate—his only one—was the longest in the history of the congregation, if reckoned from the time of his installation as Assistant Pastor. He was a faithful shepherd of his people and active in civic affairs. "The History of the First Reformed Church," published in 1904, was prepared by him. During the World War he organized and was Secretary of the National Service Commission of the Reformed Church, and was granted leave of absence to serve as Secretary of the War Time Commission of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America. In 1924, together with Dr. Charles E. Schaeffer, he dedicated the

Reformed Memorial Church at Chateau Thierry, France, erected with money secured by him from members of the Reformed Church in the United States. He died suddenly on the evening of November 6, 1930, a few minutes after entering his home upon his return from New York where he had attended a meeting of the Administrative Committee of the Federal Council. At his funeral, on November 10th, one hundred and twenty-five ministers of the Reformed and other churches were present.

The pastorate of Dr. Bollman, now in its fifth year, has been a time of harmony and progress. In all its activities the congregation gives evidence of vigorous life. The loyal cooperation of the members with their pastor in furthering the material and spiritual interests of the church is a pledge that the future will augment the rich heritage bequeathed to it out of its long past.
