"Our brothers of Texas were invited by the Mexican government while republican in its form, to come and settle; they did so; they have endured all the suffering and privation incident to the settlement of a frontier country and have surrounded themselves with all the comforts and conveniences of life. Now the Mexicans, with unblushing effrontery, call of them to submit to monarchical, tyrannical, central depotism, at the bare mention of which every true hearted son of Kentucky feels an instinctive horror, followed by a firm and steady glow of virtuous indignation.

Humanity Demands Action.

"The cause of philanthropy, of humanity, of liberty and human happiness throughout the world, calls loudly on every man who can aid Texas. If you ask me how I can reconcile the duties of a soldier with those of a Christian. I refer you to the memorable conversation between Generals Marion and DeKalb on this point, and the sentiments of the latter I have adopted as my own.

"If we succeed, the country is ours. It is immense in extent and fertile in its soil, and will amply reward all our toils. If we fail, death in the cause of liberty and humanity is not cause for shuddering. Our rifles are by our sides, and choice guns they are. We know what awaits us and are prepared to meet it. My dear brother, I am in the hands of omnipotence and rejoice in the hope of his favor and protection. Oh, how I would have rejoiced to receive a letter from some of you in Jefferson in compliance with the request I made in my letter from Springfield, Ill. I waited ten days and nothing came.

Then Leaves for Texas.

"In a few days we shall be in Texas and then having no means of writing when we please, you may not hear from us for many days, but when we can will write. Some of you must take the trouble of informing me at length of all that has occurred in Logan. I am extremely anxious to hear. I will some time write to Brother Anderson. Tell him I think well of the country about Quincy, Ill. I think he would be pleased with it if it is not too cold for him.

"My health has been tolerably good. I have suffered a great deal from my stomach, but am now considerably improved. I hope I shall recover entirely by the hardships I am destined to undergo. We have been traveling ten weeks and have gone over about 2500 miles. If I were with you I could talk enough to tire you. I hope we shall meet soon."

"Your affectionate brother,

"D. W. Cloud"

D. W. Cloud and his brother were destined never to meet again in this world. Cloud came straight on to San Antonio, passed alive into the Alamo and emerged as a corpse—his life given for the cause of Texas liberty.

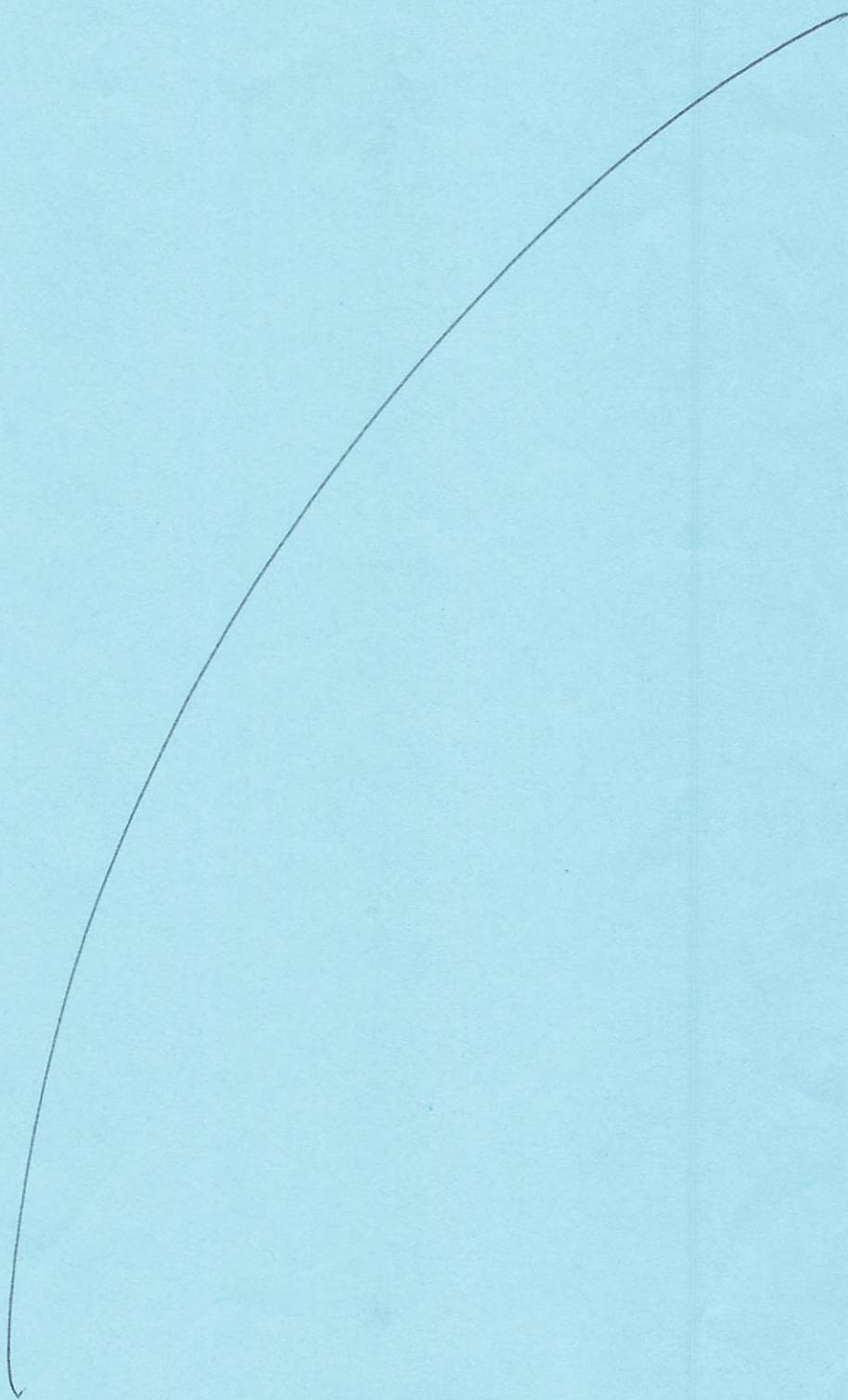

We the undersigned Commissioners appointed by the Honorable County Court of Bexar County at the November Term A.D. 1835 to review and mark

out a First Class Road from the City of San Antonio to the Gillespie line, and we jointly make our Return and Report as follows 'To Wit' commencing at Vance's corner to the San Pedro Springs. Thence with and along the present Travelled Road to Leon Springs; Thence crossing the Leon Creek above the Springs, and running near Parallel with the old Road for about three miles to a large live oak on the old Road; Thence, some short crooks, and running on the Old Road to Boerne on the Cibolo; [p. 34] Thence with and along the old and present Travelled Road to Brownsboro on the Guadalupe; Thence with and along the present Fredericksburg Road which has been laid off and worked out. We have made a few small changes which the overseers can have cut out according to our blazes and we return to your Honorable Body this Report as the best selection for a Road of the First Class and of the most benefit for the community at large, and we have reviewed and Report the above without prejudice.

Which Report being examined by the Court, and no objections being filed upon the said Report of the view therefore:

It is ordered by the Court that said Report be amended so as to read commencing at the line of the City of San Antonio, instead of Vance's corner to San Pedro Springs. And that said Report after being so amended be approved and Recorded. And that said Road be established and classified as a first Class Road.

It is further Ordained by the Court that the following named persons be, and are hereby appointed overseers of said Fredericksburg Road as follows "To Wit". Richard C. **Hawkins** from the City of San Antonio line to the top of the East bank of the Leon Creek at the Leon Springs. R. E. **Brown** from the top of the East bank of the Leon Creek to Joshua's Creek at McAdams. J. S. **Brown** from Joshuas' Creek to the Gillespie County line. And that said Overseer proceed to have their respective portions of said Road cut out clear of all trees at least thirty feet wide, the stumps cut down to six inches of the surface.

HISTORICAL MUSTER ROLL.

HISTORY OF THE SAN ANTONIO CO. OF TERRY'S RANGERS.

Famous Texas Command in the Civil War and What Became of the Members.

The reunion of the survivors of the famous Terry's Texas Rangers will take place in this city during the International Fair, and October 22 and 23 have been set aside by the Fair association as "Confederate Day." It is almost assured that the affair will be a great success, as nothing has been left undone that was possible to have the attending members enjoy themselves.

Judge W.C. Kroeger, president of the Rangers' organization, states that he is endeavoring to get as large an attendance as possible and has sent a personal invitation to each survivor of Terry's Texas Rangers, and expects to have the remnant of the regiment here on those days.

The Judge also says that any assistance that is lent towards making the visit of the survivors a pleasant one will be greatly appreciated by himself as well as by the friends of the cause that perished.

Given below is the muster roll of Company G, Eighth Texas cavalry, better know as Terry's Texas rangers. This company was enlisted and organized in this city over forty years ago. It was made up of young men of this city and the surrounding country.

The muster roll not only contains the names of the heroes that participated in the war but also tells it own tale of hardships undergone, and arduous, and severe services performed. This muster roll and that of the whole regiment, as well as other momentos belonging the Survivors' organization of the regiment, are temporally in the possession of Judge Kroeger, who is the President of the organization, and by whose courtesy the Light is enabled to publish the muster roll.

In this city only two survivors, of Company G, Eighth Texas Cavalry, still remain. They are Judge Kroeger and Mr. Sam Maverick as will be seen by the muster roll of the company, only a very few others are living anywhere.

The roll is as follows:

Captain W.Y. Houston, killed in action year 1862.

First Lieutenant W.M. Ford, captured in Tennessee, October 1, 1863 and escaped and returned to Texas but did not again return to the company.

Second Lieutenant M. Mitchell, died in service at Nashville, Tenn.

Third Lieutenant William Ellis, killed in action December 31, 1862.

AN ORDINANCE RENAMING CERTAIN STREETS.

Approved March 1, 1881.

Section 1. *Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio*, That the names of the following streets, west of San Pedro creek, beginning with Centre street, running north and south, be changed as follows, to-wit:

That portion of said Centre street lying north of Presidio street to North Concho; that south to South Concho; West street to San Saba; West First to Pecos; West Second to Leona; West Third to Frio; West Fourth to Medina; West Fifth to Salado; West Sixth to Comal; West Seventh to San Marcos; West Eighth to Colorado; West Ninth to Brazos; West tenth to San Jacinto; West Eleventh to Trinity; West twelfth to Sabine.

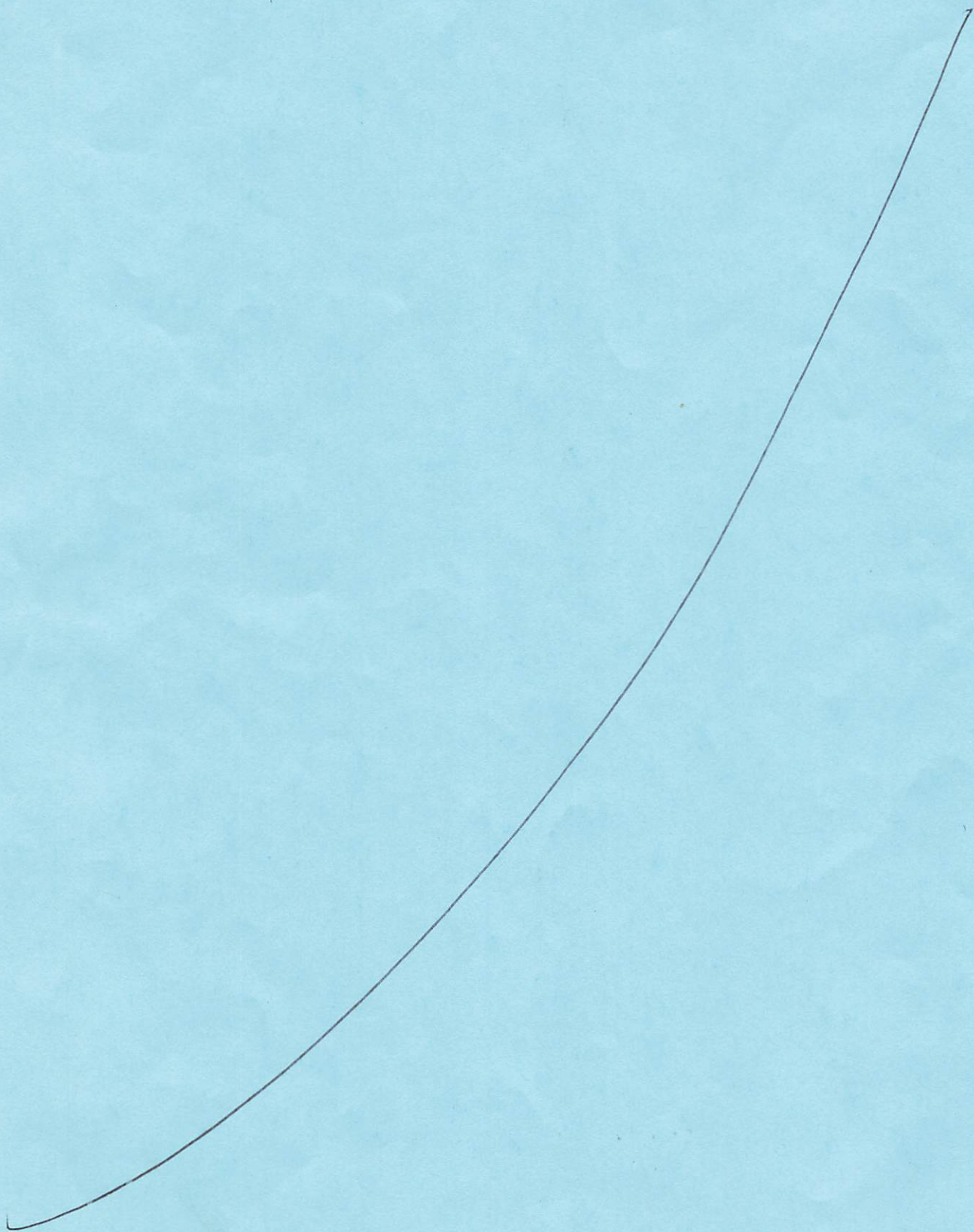
That those streets running East to West, and north of Presidio streets, beginning with North First street, which shall be changed to Zavalla; North Second to Chavez; North Third to Hidalgo; North Fourth to Morales; North Fifth to Perez; North Sixth to Ruiz; North Seventh to Lopez; North Eighth to Delgado; North Ninth to Rivas; North Tenth to Castro; North Eleventh to Menchaca; North Twelfth to Lombrano; North Thirteenth to Graza; North Fourteenth to Granado; and North Fifteenth to Diaz.

South of Presidio street, South Second be changed to Beuna Vista; South Third to Monterey; South Fourth to Matamoras; South Fifth to Durango; South Sixth to San Luis; South Seventh to San Fernando; South Eighth to El Paso; South Ninth to Guadalupe; South Tenth to Colima; South Eleventh to Vera Cruz; South Twelfth to Tampico; South Thirteenth to Parral; South Fourteenth to Saltillo; South Fifteenth to Merida; South Sixteenth to Ceralvo.

Those streets lying north of Romana street and south of Upper Labor ditch, beginning with North First street, shall be known as Oakland; Second as Augusta; Third as Dallas; Fourth as Camden; Fifth as Quincy; Sixth as Elmira; Seventh as Macon; Eighth as Marshall; Ninth as Warren; Tenth as Utica.

That First Avenue be changed to Richmond Avenue; Second Avenue to Lexington Avenue; Third to Baltimore; Fourth to Trenton; Fifth to Brooklyn; Sixth to Erie; Seventh to Atlanta; Eighth to Washington Avenue.

That those streets east of the San Antonio river and Alamo ditch, and north of Alameda street, beginning with North First, which shall be called Starr; North Second, Dawson; North Third, Nolan; North Fourth, Burnet; North Fifth, Hays; North Sixth, Lamar; North Seventh, Burleson; North Eighth, Sherman, North Ninth, Milan; North Tenth, Duval; North Eleventh, Crosby; North Twelfth, Van Ness; North Thirteenth, Mason; North Fourteenth, Carson; North Fifteenth, Quitman; North Sixteenth, Grayson; North Seventeenth, Collin, and North Eighteenth, Hamilton.
