Included in this booklet is the text of the inscriptions carved in stone at the base of the monument epitomizing the story of the Texas Revolution.



The rolls which follow are substantially the result of a lifetime dedicated to the study of the sources of Texas history by the late L. W. Kemp. Mr. Kemp was president of the Board of Trustees of the San Jacinto Museum of History Association at the time of his death. The rolls as compiled by Mr. Kemp were first published in 1951.

Since that date research in the General Land Office records of Texas by Dr. Thomas L. Miller of the Department of History and Government, Texas A & M University, has verified that an additional seventeen names, eleven battle participants and six of the personnel on detached service at the time of the battle, deserve inclusion in the complete lists. These seventeen names have been marked with an asterisk and inserted alphabetically in this edition. We are grateful to Dr. Miller for his cooperation in amplifying these rolls.

Pevehouse, Preston Pier, James B. Inscribed in stone in eight panels, reading from the southeast corner around the monument's base, are the essential facts of the Texas Revolution. The text of the inscriptions follows:

THE EARLY POLICIES OF MEXICO TOWARD HER TEXAS colonists had been extremely liberal. Large grants of land were made to them, and no taxes or duties imposed. The relationship between the Anglo-Americans and Mexicans was cordial. But, following a series of revolutions begun in 1829, unscrupulous rulers successively seized power in Mexico. Their unjust acts and despotic decrees led to the revolution in Texas.



In June, 1832, the colonists forced the Mexican authorities at Anahuac to release Wm. B. Travis and others from unjust imprisonment. The battle of Velasco, June 26, and the battle of Nacogdoches, August 2, followed; in both the Texans were victorious. Stephen Fuller Austin, "Father of Texas," was arrested January 3, 1834, and held in Mexico without trial until July, 1835. The Texans formed an army, and on November 12, 1835, established a provisional government.



The first shot of the revolution of 1835-1836 was fired by the Texans at Gonzales, October 2, 1835, in resistance to a demand by Mexican soldiers for a small cannon held by the colonists. The Mexican garrison at Goliad fell October 9. The battle of Concepcion was won by the Texans, October 28. San Antonio was captured December 10, 1835, after five days of fighting in which the indomitable Benjamin R. Milam died a hero, and the Mexican army evacuated Texas.



Texas declared her independence at washington-on-the-Brazos, March 2. For nearly two months her armies met disaster and defeat; Dr. James Grant's men were killed on the Agua Dulce, March 2, William Barret Travis and his men sacrificed their lives at the Alamo, March 6, William Ward was defeated at Refugio, March 14, Amon B. King's men were executed near Refugio, March 16, and James Walker Fannin and his army were put to death near Goliad, March 27, 1836.



On this field on april 21, 1836, the army of texas commanded by General Sam Houston, and accompanied by the Secretary of War, Thomas J. Rusk, attacked the superior invading army of Mexicans under General Santa Anna. The battle line from left to right was formed by Sidney Sherman's regiment, Edward Burleson's regiment, the artillery commanded by George W. Hockley, Henry Millard's infantry and the cavalry under Mirabeau B. Lamar. Sam Houston led the infantry charge.



WITH THE BATTLE CRY, "REMEMBER THE ALAMO! REmember Goliad!" the Texans charged. The enemy, taken by surprise, rallied for a few minutes, then fled in disorder. The Texans had asked no quarter and gave none. The slaughter was appalling, victory complete, and Texas free! On the following day General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, selfstyled "Napoleon of the West," received from a generous foe the mercy he had denied Travis at the Alamo and Fannin at Goliad.



CITIZENS OF TEXAS AND IMMIGRANT SOLDIERS IN THE army of Texas at San Jacinto were natives of Alabama, Arkansas, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Virginia, Austria, Canada, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Mexico, Poland, Portugal and Scotland.



Measured by its results, san Jacinto was one of the decisive battles of the world. The freedom of Texas from Mexico won here led to annexation and to the Mexican War, resulting in the acquisition by the United States of the States of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California, Utah, and parts of Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas and Oklahoma. Almost one-third of the present area of the American nation, nearly a million square miles of territory, changed sovereignty.









The following are the Official Documents of Maj. Gen. Sain. Houston, Commander in Chief of the Texian Army, together with the names of the brave men who participated in the celebrated battle of San Jacinto. This but justice that they should be published to the world, as bright examples to all those who love Liberty better than oppression. Their actions were recorded in BLOOD—their names should be written in GOLD.

To his Excellency D. G. BURNETT, President of the Republic of Texas:

Head Quarters of the Army, San Jacinto, April 25th, 1836.

Sin-I regret extremely that my situation since the battle of the 21st has been such as to prevent my rendering you my official report

of the same, previous to this time.

Honoted Henry + Lucy

I have the honor to inform you, that on the evening of the 18th inst, after a forced march of fifty five miles, which was effected in two days and a half, the army arrived opposite Harrisburg; that evening a courrier of the enemy was taken, from whom I learned that Gen. Santa Anna, with one division of his choice troops had marched in the direction of Lynch's Ferry on the San Jacinto, burning Harrisburg as he passed down. The army was ordered to be in readiness to march early on the next morning. The main body effected a crossing over Buffalo Bayou, below Harrisburg, on the morning of the 19th, having left the baggage, the sick, and a sufficient camp guard in the rear.— We continued the march throughout the night, making but one halt in the prairie for a short time, and without refreshment. At daylight we resumed the line of march, and in a short distance our scouts encountered those of the enemy, and we received information that General Santa Anna was at New Washington, and would that day take up the line of march for Anahuac, crossing at Lynch's Ferry. The Texian army halted within half a mile of the ferry in some timber, and were engaged in slaughtering beeves, when the army of Santa Anna was discovered to be approaching in battle array, having been encamped at Clopper's point, eight miles below. Disposition was immediately made of our forces, and preparation for his reception. took a position with his infantry, and artillery in the centre, occupying an island of timber, his cavalry covering the left flank. The artillery, consisting of one double fortified medium brass twelve pounder then opened on our encampment. The Infantry in column advanced with the design of charging our lines, but were repulsed by a discharge of grape and cannister, from our artillery, consisting of two six pounders. The enemy had occupied a piece of timber within rifle shot of the left wing of our army, from which an occasional interchange of small arms took place between the troops, until the enemy withdrew to a position on the bank of the San Jacinto, about three quarters of a mile from our encampment, and commenced fortification. A short time before sunset, our mounted men, about eighty five in number under the special command of Col. Sherman, marched out for

the purpose of reconnoitering the enemy. Whilst advancing they received a volley from the left of the enemy's infantry, and after a sharp rencounter with their cavalry, in which ours acted extremely well, and performed some feats of daring chivalry, they retired in good order. having had two men severely wounded, and several horses killed. the mean time the infantry under the command of Lieut. Col. Millard. and Col. Burleson's regiment, with the artillery, had marched out for tha purpose of covering the retreat of the cavalry if necessary. then fell back in good order to our encampment about sunset, and remained without any ostensible action until the 21st, at half past three o'clock, taking the first refreshment which they had enjoyed for two The enemy in the mean time extended the right flank of their infantry so as to occupy the extreme point of a skirt of timber on the bank of the San Jacinto, and secured their left by a fortification about 5 feet high, constructed of packs and baggage, leaving an opening in the centre of the breastwork in which their artillery was placed, their

cavalry upon their left wing.

About 9 o'clock on the morning of the 21st, the enemy were reinforced by 500 choice troops, under the command of Gen. Cos, increasing their effective force to upwards of 1500 men, whilst our aggregate force for the field numbered 783. At half past three o'clock in the evening I ordered the officers of the Texian army to parade their respective commands, having in the mean time ordered the bridge on the only road communicating with the Brazos, distant eight miles from our encampment, to be destroyed, thus cutting off all possibility of escape. Our troops paraded with alacrity and spirit, and were anxious for the Their conscious disparity in numbers seemed only to increase their enthusiasm and confidence, and heightened their anxiety for the conflict. Our situation afforded me an opportunity of making the arrangements preparatory to the attack, without exposing our designs to the enemy. The 1st Regiment, commanded by Col. Burleson, was assigned the centre. The 2d Regiment, under the command of Col. Sherman, formed the left wing of the army. The Artillery, under the special command of Col. Geo. W. Hockley, inspector General, was placed on the right of the 1st Regiment; and four companies of Infantry under the command of Lieut. Col. Henry Millard, sustained the Artillery upon the right. Our Cavalry, sixty-one in number, commanded by Col. Mirabeau B. Lamar, (whose gallant and daring conduct on the previous day had attracted the admiration of his comrades, and called him to that station,) placed on our extreme right, completed our line. Our cavalry was first despatched to the front of the enemy's left, for the purpose of attracting their notice, whilst an extensive island of timber afforded us an opportunity of concentrating our forces and displaying from that point, agreeably to the previous design of the troops. Every evolution was performed with alacrity, the whole advancing rapidly in line, and through an open prairie, without any protection whatever for our men. The artillery advanced and took station within two hundred yards of the enemy's breastwork, and commenced an effective fire with grape and cannister. . Col. Sherman with his regiment, having commenced the action upon our left wing, the whole line, at the centre and on the right, advancing in double quick time, rung the war cry "Remember the Alamo,"

received the enemy's fire, and advanced within point blank shot before a piece was discharged from our lines. Our line advanced without a halt, untill they were in possession of the woodland and the enemy's breastwork. The right wing of Burleson's and the left of Millard's, taking possession of the breastwork; our artillery having gallantly charged up within 70 yards of the enemy's cannon, when it was taken by our troops. The conflict lasted about eighteen minutes from the time of close action, until we were in possession of the enemy's encampment, taking one piece of cannon, (loaded,) four stand of colours. all their camp equipage, stores and baggage. Our cavalry had charged and routed that of the enemy upon the right, and given pursuit to the fugitives, which did not cease until they arrived at the bridge which I have mentioned before, Capt. Karnes, always among the foremost in danger, commanding the pursuers. The conflict in the breastwork lasted but a few moments; many of the troops encountered hand to hand, and not having the advantage of bayonets on our side, our riflemen used their pieces as war clubs, breaking many of them off at the breech. The route commenced at half past four, and the pursuit by the main army continued until twilight. A guard was then left in charge of the enemy's encampment, and our army returned with their killed and wounded. In the battle, our loss was two killed and twenty three wounded, six of whom mortally. The enemy's loss was 630 killed, among whom was 1 general officer, 4 colonels, 2 lieutenant colonels, 5 captains, 12 lieutenants. Wounded 208, of which were 5 colonels, 3 lieutenant colonels, 2 second lieutenant colonels, 7 captains, 1 cadet. Prisoners 730-President General Santa Anna, Gen. Cos, 4 colonels, aids to Gen. Santa Anna, and the Colonel of the Guerrero Battallion, are included in the number. Gen. Santa Anna was not taken until the 22nd, and Gen. Cos on yesterday, very few having escaped. About 600 muskets, 300 sabres and 200 pistols, have been collected since the action; several hundred mules and horses were taken, and near twelve thousand dollars in specie. For several days previous to the action, our troops were engaged in forced marches exposed to excessive rains, and the additional inconvenience of extremely bad roads, illy supplied with rations and clothing-yet amid every difficulty they bore up with cheerfulness and fortitude, and performed their marches with spirit and alacrity-there was no murmur-

Previous to and during the action, my staff evinced every disposition to be useful, and were actively engaged in their duties. In the conflict I am assured that they demeaned themselves in such manner as proved them worthy members of the army of San Jacinto. Col. T. J. Rusk, Secretary of War, was on the field. For weeks his services had been highly beneficial to the army; in battle he was on the left wing, where Col. Sherman's command first encountered and drove the enemy; he bore himself gallantly, and continued his efforts and activi-

ty, remaining with the pursuers until resistance ceased.

I have the honor of transmiting herewith a list of all the officers and men who were engaged in the action, which I respectfully request may be published, as an act of justice to the individuals. For the Commanding General to attempt discrimination as to the conduct of those who commanded in the action or those who were commanded, would

be impossible. Our success in the action is conclusive proof of their daring intrepidity and courage; every officer and man proved himself worthy of the cause in which he battled, while the triumph received a lustre from the humanity which characterized their conduct after victory, and richly entitles them to the admiration and gratitude of their General. Nor should we withhold the tribute of our grateful thanks from that Being who rules the destinies of nations, and has in the time of greatest need enabled us to arrest a powerful invader whilst devasting our country.

ARMY ORDER.

HEAD QUARTERS, San Jacinto, May 5th, 1836.

COMRADES-

Circumstances connected with the battle of the 21st, render our separation for the present unavoidable. I need not express to you the many painful sensations which that necessity inflicts upon me. I am solaced, however, by the hope that we will soon be re-united in the great cause of liberty. Brigadier General Rusk is appointed to command the army for the present. I confide in his valor, his patriotism, and his wisdom—his conduct in the battle of San Jacinto was sufficient to ensure your confidence and regard.

The enemy, though retreating, are still within the limits of Texas—their situation being known to you, you cannot be taken by surprise. Discipline and subordination will render you invincible. Your valor and heroism have proved you unrivalled. Let not contempt for the enemy throw you off your guard. Vigilence is the first duty of a sol-

dier, and Glory the proudest reward of his toils.

You have patiently endured privations, hardships and difficulties.— Unappalled, you have encountered odds two to one of the enemy against you, and borne yourselves in the onset and conflict of battle in a manner unknown in the annals of modern warfare. While an enemy to our independence remains in Texas, the work is incomplete; but when liberty is firmly established by your patience and your valor, it will be fame enough to say, "I was a member of the army of San Jacinto."

In taking leave of my brave comrades in arms, I cannot suppress the expression of that pride which I so justly feel in having had the honor to command them in person, nor will I withhold the tribute of my warmest admiration and gratitude for the promptness with which my orders were executed, and union maintained throughout the army. At parting my heart embraces you with gratitude and affection.





Oops, our mistake - Volume 25, No. 2, p. 119: Ms. Karen Lawless, a descendant of George A. Spiller, tells us that George did not build the home, 'Esperanza'. Rather, he built his home on land which is located in the area of the present-day Danville Road, near the still-existing cemetery on Shepard Hill Road. This home no longer exists. George was a surveyor and planter and died in 1854 in Danville. Many years later, his son, William Fielding Spiller, chose a large homeplace for his family located east of present-day Highway 75, north of Willis. W. F. Spiller gave the name 'Esperanza' to his tobacco plantation.
